MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN



t is still 2018 as I write, but Happy New Year everyone and best wishes for a prosperous 2019. I hope you all enjoyed the Festive Season. Thank you again for your support.

Our Financial Year ended on 30th November and 2018 proved a good year for the Club. We have been reaching record new Membership levels over the last few months, the total now standing at an all time high of 1,138, 46 higher than a year ago. Although subject to audit, we are expecting an operating surplus of around 4.7 million baht, compared with 1.2 million last year, and in spite of persistent bad weather, a sluggish economy and all the changes taking place around the Club, Food and Beverage revenues were close to all-time records.

Two changes late in the year that are already contributing positive results and will have a much bigger impact over a full year in 2019, were the reopening of the Neilson Hays Garden Café in July and the Silom Wing at the end of October.

Neilson Hays Library: We have been operating the Neilson Hays Library Garden Café again since July and revenues have steadily increased every month. Sales are now approaching levels achieved before we moved out in March 2015 and already substantially exceed subsequent average sales in our own Pavilion Café, which closed in 2017.

Silom Wing: Poolside revenues in November, the first month after opening the Silom Wing, were 20% higher than the previous year. We will expect usage to go on increasing as we continue to make improvements and the year progresses. Much will have been done or underway by the time you read this: new shade elements are being added which include a sale over the Children's playground; the temporary Wifi set-up is being replaced with a new router system; issues with the irrigation system which waters the façade

plants are being addressed; and improved lighting is to be installed throughout the whole area. Small adjustments to the electrical system have been made to ensure compliance with British standards and we are already in receipt of an Electrical Installation Certificate to this effect.

Perhaps more importantly our operations and activities will all be upgraded as we gain experience. Crèche, playgroup and other kids activities are already being planned for the Family Room and we will be promoting use of the Interactive Room as coworking space during the week and a wired-family lounge at weekends. We cannot have staff in attendance in all facilities but a buzzer system has been installed to take orders and sign out.

Most of the feedback has been positive and we welcome your suggestions for improvements. Please use the Suggestions Book at the bar.

New Entrance: Finishing touches are still being made at the new Silom Road entrance, including replacing some defective workmanship, adding signs, lighting and the Club logo. Reception will be located here where Members will be allowed direct access and there will be a waiting room for visitors. The Head of Security and Duty Manger will also be based here. We plan to add electronic card access during the coming year.

Phase 2: As mentioned before, we hope to proceed with Phase 2 of the Poolside Redevelopment as soon as possible and plan to call an EGM to get Membership approval early in 2019. As I write, detailed costings are being finalised and the Finance Sub-committee is preparing financial projections. A lot of thought is also being given to temporary arrangements required whilst the old buildings are

out of commission. The Fitness Centre will likely be relocated to the Silom Wing for the time being, whilst we are looking at portable cabins as temporary changing and shower facilities, and shelter provision over the new poolside deck whilst the Suriwongse Sala is closed. We are also looking at installing a BBQ/ Pizza station adjacent to the Silom Wing.

Visitors: This time of year we get lots of visitors, some annual birds of passage. We are already getting lots of complements on the changes. Two appreciative cricket teams this month were the MCC Cricket Team on tour to Thailand and the Koh Chang Cricket team who host the annual beach cricket tournaments. Both enjoyed afternoon practice sessions in our nets and were full of praise for the facilities and hospitality received. The Squash Section also entertained the first overseas visitors to play on the



new courts, from Yangon. They too were blown away with the quality of our facilities and the hospitality received.

Christmas Ball:

Almost 200 Members enjoyed the Christmas Ball.

It was the third year in the new, less formal, buffetparty style. The overall feedback was very positive. It was great night with many revellers staying late, but some hanker for something more formal and stylish since this is promoted as a 'Ball'. The format can always be reviewed in the future, but one challenge is the best date to hold it. This year we chose 1st
December to avoid the following long weekend and
then international schools breaking up the week after
when many families leave Bangkok. But this is early
to celebrate Christmas and a difficult one to get right.



Richard Hopkins: There is an Obituary for Richard Hopkins later in these pages who died suddenly in November at the far too young age of 68. Richard was a lovely person and will be missed by many people in and outside the Club. This has been a bad year for the Cub in this sense, five senior, faithful and active Members having passed away since March. Cherish your loved ones while you can.

War Memorial: We have had our first meeting with Embassy Officials to begin planning the move of the War Memorial from the Wireless Road compound to the Club. It will be located at the Suriwongse Road end of the Front Lawn and we are engaging architects to review the landscaping to provide a dignified setting whist also ensuring adequate space for the Annual Remembrance Day service, which attracts 300-400 guests. The actual move needs to take place before the rainy season.

Since our lawns are constantly in use for all kinds of events, big and small, throughout the year, and we use awnings of different shapes and sizes we are looking at the possibility of installing permanent foundations on a grid system on both lawns so that awnings can be erected quickly to any required specification.



As political melodrama goes UK events in early December were extraordinary. The Cabinet debated for 5 hours over a 500+ page draft European Union Withdrawal Agreement, approving a draft a few days later.

Then, the following morning Dominic Raab, (the "Brexit Secretary") resigned. Subsequently, two senior ministers resigned, and the press is suggesting more to come.

Theresa May now faces a potential leadership election as cabinet discipline collapses and parliamentary approval of a finalised agreement looks diminished at this point.

Mrs. May will hope that Remain supporters within the other Parties will ride to her rescue and vote the deal through. Given the wide aversion to a "No Deal" outcome what is left is a choice between this agreement, a general election or a second referendum.

Like their Brexit colleagues, they may instead choose to vote the deal through than face the electorate.

So how are matters likely to play out if as appears likely there is insufficient House of Commons support to approve the settlement? First, the special EU Council summit on November 25 is expected to happen but with a focus on a "No Deal"

contingency planning by members and alternatives on the table are down to the UK.

It is unlikely Mrs May will put the agreement to an EU vote if there is a high probability of defeat, so the summit may have to focus on a request to halt negotiations or more formally request a grant of extension to Article 50 negotiations. A reworking of the current withdrawal draft seems unlikely, but interest may turn to a Norway type arrangement that would see the UK remain in the EEA for a time with a temporary customs union added on. Such a scenario would allow sterling to recover some but it would likely peter out after a time.

The other option would be for the government to offer to append a clause in the bill allowing for final agreement via a referendum. This seems unlikely and would have to be supported by the EU, but it may be enough to get backing from Labour and other opposition parties.

Sterling would again benefit though volatility would spike as uncertainty around the eventual result builds.

The least favorable outcome for sterling is the government losing a confidence vote, however, this may be a less likely outcome before March 29, 2019. Under the Fixed Term Parliament Act this could lead to a general election where there is a chance of a Corbyn government (even if Brexit is lost) and such an outcome could see sterling tumble to levels lower than after the 2016 referendum vote.

Since outset of the Brexit process sterling movement has been the main risk barometer assessed by the markets.

Sterling volatility has fed through to equity prices and this increased uncertainty has led FTSE100 large cap stocks to outperform more UK small to mid-cap stocks in the short term.

Expect heightened sterling volatility to continue until some of the uncertainty has been removed. When will that will be is hard to say as there are too many moving parts in this equation.

OBITUARY Richard Hopkins 1950-2018



e were saddened this month to lose Richard Hopkins who died at home on 17th November after a heart attack at the age of 68. He had been a very active Club Member since 1984 serving on the General Committee between 1985 and 1988.

Richard was born in Cardiff, the son of an Anglican vicar and was brought up to love music, singing in the church choir as a boy. He studied Maths and Philosophy at Bristol University but in 1972 got itchy feet and abandoned his studies to travel the world. Setting off on the Orient Express he travelled down through Europe, Turkey, Afghanistan, India, and South East Asia, before finally reaching Australia where he spent a year in Perth.



On return to the UK he indulged in his great love, music, gaining a degree at the Welsh College of Music and Drama in Cardiff followed by a Teaching Diploma at Bath College of Higher Education. Then, with happy memories of South East Asia, he accepted a teaching job in Chiang Mai in 1979, before moving to Bangkok in 1980 to be nearer Nitta, whom he had met in the library of the British Council. They were married in 1982, first in a Thai ceremony in Bangkok and then on a cold wet day, two days after Christmas in his Dad's church in Port Talbot, Dad presiding.

Richard became a teacher at Bangkok Patana School where he was integral to developing the music department and the teaching of Theory of Knowledge. He taught for 30 years until his retirement and was still active in the Patana community as resident accompanist and supply teacher right up until the time of his passing. Music was the joy of Richard's life, not just teaching at Patana School, but also in the wider Bangkok community. He was Choirmaster and Organist at Christ Church in the 1980s and 1990s; a Musical Director with the Bangkok Music Society and music director and pianist for countless Bangkok Community Theatre productions. British Club Members may particularly remember Richard's performances in Old Time Music Halls and Pantomimes. He had a great sense of humour and at rehearsal time was often found behind the piano improvising some witty musical punctuation with a half-empty bottle of Speckled Hen on one side.

Richard taught music privately and shaped the musical lives of many young people. One of his greatest satisfactions was inspiring students to reach their full potential.

Richard's interest in philosophy led him to freemasonry, which became an important part of his life. He joined Lodge St John, and later become a Founding Member of Chula Lodge where he occupied many positions including that of Worshipful Master.

A proud Welshman, Richard also served on the St David's Society, three times being elected as Bard and presiding over the Annual St David's Day Ball.



Richard had two younger brothers Phil and Peter who flew out for the funeral and two daughters Cathryn and Sarah who grew up running around the British Club swimming pool. He doted over his three grandchildren, Cathryn's three sons. Richard's death was sudden, without warning and the family rejoices that they have recent happy memories of a month together in England in July and of Richard splashing around in the BC pool with Dylan his oldest grandson just a few weeks ago when Cathryn and Sarah were visiting. Since retirement Richard was often seen at the poolside doing his crossword and leisurely swimming up and down the pool for his daily exercise.

Richard was a lovely person and will be missed by his many friends in the different orbits of his activities. We are glad to have had him with us all these years and our thoughts and condolences go to Nitta, Cathryn and Sarah and their families. **Rest in Peace Richard**.







WINE TASTING 19 Crimes Cabernet Sauvignon

s usual the December Wine Tasting on the front lawn is one of the best of the year with many suppliers and lots of wines to select from. It's a must to stock up your supplies for the festive season ahead.

During my tasting I came across a 2017 CABERNET SAUVIGNON, bright red to crimson in colour, firm and full on the palate with a subtle sweetness giving a rich mouth feel, my perfect red for Christmas. Upon further tasting the vanilla aromatics carry through on the palate and compliment subtle flavours of red currants, dark cherries, and chocolate. I was sold.

I was told the growing season leading up to the 2017 vintage was challenging. A season of extreme, sometimes isolated weather events resulted in some vineyards being hit by storm and hail. With a cool start to the season and with good soil moisture profiles, vintage commencement was generally late,

running 3 – 4 weeks behind past seasons. The cooler weather and delayed ripeness, favoured good varietal fruit flavour development in the whites and strong varietal fruit flavour and good colour, across the main stream red varieties. Patience was needed to allow the red fruit to properly mature and to manage the risks associated with a late completion to harvesting.

The other amazing thing about this wine is it is the first-ever wine brand to use Augmented Reality (AR) with the downloaded app over 19 Crimes wine bottles will bring the character on the label to life, sharing their scandalous stories of rule breaking that sent them on a long journey to build a new life across the ocean in Australia. appy New Year ladies and gents.
