

It has taken nearly 4000 years for pewter to reach Thailand. The first signs of pewter objects are found in discoveries of pewter jewellery in North Persian Tombs, dating back to 2000-1500 B.C. There is also evidence in ancient scriptures that pewter plates and other pewter products were used in the Roman Empire prior to the seafaring Phoenicians bringing the raw material tin to the Mediterrean area from Spain and England.

Although pewter is one of the worlds oldest alloys Thailand has not been known as a pewter producing country. Like the ancient Egyptians, Thais have only used tin as an alloy with copper in the making of bronze.

Out of the five largest tin producing countries in the world Thailand now ranks as the largest after Malaysia. Tin in Thailand is mined and refined from the rich alluvial ores in the dense jungle valleys of Kanchanaburi, the hot plains of the southern isthmus as well as off-shore in the Andaman Sea.

In 1976 a group of Europeans and Thais formed a company in Thailand to manufacture pewter objects using traditional methods as developed by European Pewterers many centuries ago. Pewter manufacture begins at the foundry with the melting of 100-pound tin; ingots to which only small quantities of antimony and copper are added. The exact method of mating these metals remains a closely quarded secret. Moulds for large items, such as beer tankards, are made of steel. Smaller items are cast centrifugally in silicone rubber moulds.

When the molten metal reaches the proper temperature, workmen ladle the silvery liquid from the furnace and pour it into the waiting moulds or casting machines. After the casting, skilled smiths remove burrs and rough edges. Depending on the type of finish desired, the article may be hand-turned or rubbed and polished by artisans who use a special abrasive material. The components like handles for jugs, stems and bases for wine goblets are carefully soldered together. Engravers can then etch designs into the finished piece or bevel the malleable surface of the pewter with a hammer.

Although pewter manufacture may seem relatively simple, the process is lengthy and complicated with each step of the operation requiring large amounts of hand work. The result of such craftsmanship is artwork with universal appeal that transcends the functional intent of the pewterware.

Yet function has always been an important consideration in pewter manufacture. From prehistoric times pewter has been both a medium for artistic expression and a material from which domestic utensils were fashioned.

Pewter has played an important role in the development of civilization both in the European countries as well as countries of the Orient. As its popularity spread, so did the names of pewter manufacturers. In medieval England it was customary for Pewterers to cut their "touch" into their wares to indentify their membership in a guild called The Worshipful Company of Pewterers. (This same company recently celebrated its 500th anniversary).

Manufacture of pewter in Thailand was practically unknown until recently. Thailand is now preserving this ancient art form in today's safe, stylish pewter and is making a new name for one of the world's oldest alloys-beautiful and utilitarian 20th century Thai pewter.




