Any questions?

This issue may be light on reading matter: we hope for more contributions for February - send it in whatever it is!

We're pleased to see Gordon Burles (badly missed for too long) returning to fitness and we welcome Geoff Connor and Ian Brooks to our team for this issue and, hopefully, many more!

Belated birthday wishes to Auntie

SHE speaks 37 languages and celebrated her 50th birthday last weekend. Auntie, otherwise known to those of us outside the British Isles as the British Broadcasting Corporation's overseas service, passed the milestone anniversary with problems on her hands but her reputation probably as highflying as ever. A little shrivelled now — down to those 37 languages, including Thai and her native English — Auntie nevertheless is still going strong.

The BBC has proved that the best propaganda of all is truth, and that truth must be based on facts. It came under harsh criticism earlier this year during the Britain-Argentina war over the Falkland Islands. Many persons, the bulk of them British, thought that the BBC was reporting too much truth in support of "the enemy," Argentina. But it has gone through such criticism before and survived, its reputation enhanced. It is exactly because of its objectivity that tens of millions of persons throughout the world tuned to a radio station of a belligerent the BBC — to receive their unfettered, uncensored, uncluttered news of the Falklands war. Who would give such trust to Radio Moscow's coverage of events in Afghanistan? To the Voice of America's coverage of the Vietnam war? To Radio Hanoi's news reports on Kampuchea?

So congratulations to Auntie, struggling though she is for money for better transmitters and equipment; criticised though she is; victim of budget (and thereby programme) cutbacks though she is. Long may she stay on the air to bring the facts and reasoned commentary to her millions of fans and listeners.

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New Records ... by Camus

BRUCKNER'S FAREWELL SYMPHONY

THE SON of a poor schoolmaster in the village of Ansfelden in Upper Austria, Anton Bruckner came from the most primitive stratum of European society, the Catholic peasantry. Perhaps it is extraordinary that a peasant born and bred should have written music of genius, but all through the Ninth Symphony in D Minor (newly recorded digitally by Bernard Haitink and the Concertgebouw Orchestra on Philips 6514 191) the great stature of the music is at once vividly in evidence. Containing some of his most rewarding efforts, the ninth was Bruckner's valedictory work. Ending with a lovely adagio, it was unfinished in the theoretical sense, though the Te Deum he did not live to add now seems something of a superfluity.

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The opening movement, 'feierlich misterioso', is said by some to refer briefly to periods in his lifetime -- in early days his taste ran to pretty girls of teenage years, but he seems to have been refused on account of his modest circumstances -though the movement with its manifold beautiful themes, its ethereal, questing passages, and its awesome climaxes is arresting music, eight horns in unison giving out a statuesque melody, a slow violin cantilena later relieving with the second subject.

The scherzo follows, in which gossamer, nervous passages that seem to breathe on the edge of a precipice provoke stark brass responses suggesting a lifetime's dialogue between man and his Maker. Then the glorious adagio, impassioned, ecstatic, resigned, serenely accepting 'farewell to life', as Bruckner often termed it, the superb playing by the Concertgebouw and the benefit of the digital recording all contributing to an appreciation of the genius of the peasant from Ansfelden.

Well worth experiencing.

We might be forgiven for awarding the cognomen 'Master of Queen's Music' to conductor Louis Clark for his efforts to translate the sounds made by the pop group Queen into classical setting. In this herculean effort he is assisted by that august body of musicians, The Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, together with the Royal Choral Society, the performance having been recorded 'live' by EMI at the Royal Albert Hall (R.P.O. Plays the Queen Collection : EMTV 33).

A popular tune of some years ago stated 'The music goes round and around and it comes out here'. What 'comes out' from the RPO proves to be very acceptable indeed, while if the music cannot by any stretch of the imagination be said to be profound or rich in intellectual penetration, it is turned 'round and around' by Maestro Clark and his 'forces' to provide a new semblance, a freshness, a 'fraicheur', which tends to improve the listening enjoyment of these mediocre melodies to a considerable extent.

The opening 'Flash' is quite electric in its instant impact -a dominant beat punctuated by regular choral flashes with a truly lyrical moment for contrast -- the following attractive tune 'Play the Game' being treated 'pianissimo' by the orchestra, brass-playing effectively well-subdued. Several contributions are non-vocal - ('Don't stop me Now' with its subtlymanaged syncopated passages --, 'Love of my Life' where the flute simulates solo vocal participation, and just listen to 'That Crazy little thing called Love' where the demisemiquavers felicitously manage to 'come out here' -- an orchestral 'tour de force', no less.

Lyricism comes in the 'Cling Song' ('Teo Torriatte'), a lovely, leisurely, languorous opus where the unison chorus appears at the end as if to justify the number's 'raison d'etre'.

'Maestro of Queen's Music?' Louis Clark is worthy of the title.

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Now's the time to invest

The US Stock Market has moved ahead strongly in the last three months and at the end of October stood some 22% above the level at the end of July. Historically, major upward movements such as this have lasted an average of 30 months with an average gain of 60%. We believe that this will prove no exception and that there is substantial scope for further share price increases, for five main reasons.

1. Falling interest rates

US interest rates must continue to fall if the Reagan administration and the Federal Reserve are to work successfully towards reviving the economy. There may be short term reversals but the expected lowering of the discount rate this month should do much to encourage the downward trend.

2. Rising demand

Demand for shares is expected to increase as the rates of return on cash and bonds become less competitive. Already the average yield gap between shares and bonds has been reduced this year from six to two percentage points.

3. Economic recovery

By the end of the year a recovery in the US economy should be under way, brought about by a relaxation of the Government's strict monetary policy.

4. High liquidity

Many financial institutions are holding large sums of uninvested cash. This will cease to be profitable as interest rates fall.

5. Company profits up

An improvement in corporate profitability is expected early in 1983, boosted by the much lower level of interest rates.

.... John Coghill Waits Patiently

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The British Club cricket season continues in swash-buckling fashion and after the team's performances in Chiangmai, mostly off the field, the Thailand Cricket League must be trembling at the prospects of BC's enthusiastic entrance in this season's competition. With our first league match scheduled for 15th January the lads are all getting their heads down and so far this month only one more Narai Hotel window has been broken. The Chiangmai weekend was tremendous practice for some and confirmed the match winning potential of at least three players - Craig Price, David Apps and Paul Eastaway. However since there have been outrageous allegations of biased reporting in recent months it is now with pleasure that we present the following official (Aussie) account of the weekend's proceedings, submitted under the title 'Team Spirit Established in Chiangmai':-

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The British Club's trip to Chiangmai was a great success, although the performance on the field wasn't as impressive as the attempted takeover of Kloster Breweries. Saturday saw J. Dunford winning the toss and electing to bat on a wicket that had a little early life. After being 2-5 the side recovered slightly after No. 3 Craig Price scored 35. Jack Dunford 24 and Paul Eastaway 7 figured in the biggest partnership of 25 while the other batsmen showed the effects of the train trip. David Apps with 12 was the only other batsman to reach double figures. The Chiangmai bowlers weren't giving anything away with J. Ellis 4-14 proving to be the most successful. D. John 2-16, A. Buckley 2-19 and A. Wilson 1-17, all helped to dismiss the British Club for 105.

After lunch P. Eastaway provided the initial breakthrough and both openers were back in the Pavilion cheaply. A swashbuckling innings by A. Buckley (31) and a solid 30 by J. Hamilton paved the way for C.M.G.C. to reach 108-4 for a comfortable victory.

The wicket was playing true with P. Eastaway getting the odd ball to rear. Eastaway, Parry, Staddon and Price each took a wicket.

On Sunday J. Dunford again won the toss and allowed his batsman more time to recover by fielding first. P. Eastaway (15-2-33-3) and D. Apps (13-0-42-4) bowled superbly, but without luck, to restrict the batsmen to 26 runs after 12 overs. They bowled unchanged till drinks, extracting lift and cut to trouble the batsmen. Again A. Buckley (32) proved difficult to dismiss but was finally bowled by a delighted J. Coghill. At that stage the C.M.G.C. were in trouble at 7 - 78 but a gutsy partnership of 56 by I. Law (37) and I. Bolwell (38) pushed the score along to 134. After 40 overs C.M.G.C. had scored 153 for 9.

D. John soon had the British Club in trouble and at 3-8 looked set for a quick victory. C. Price and J. McBeth figured in a 36 run partnership which temporarily denied C.M. victory. C. Price 38, J. McBeth 10 and C. Staddon 10 were the only batsman to reach double figures. The team fell apart for 82 giving C.M. a clean sweep.

D. John 10-3-17-3 was clearly the most effective bowler.
A. Wilson bagged 3-13 off 4.3 overs and Ellis, Law and Jones (2) chipped in.
The whole team performed admirably and our bowlers showed that with more match practice they will trouble a lot of batsmen this season.
A fine weekend was had by all. The C.M.G.C. showed they will be a difficult side to defeat this season. We thank them for such an enjoyable weekend.
An extra large thankyou goes to the ladies of the C.M.G.C. for their generous hospitality and for providing lunch and refreshments (hic) on both days.

BRITISH CLUB - SQUASH SECTION ACTIVITIES

The Squash Section is the most active Section of the British Club with over 140 regular playing members of all standards. Throughout the year the Section organises many competitions for participation by anyone capable of completing one of the exacting application forms. The current programme is as follows:

1. British Club Squash League

Every second month there is an organised League competition. Entrants are divided into Divisions of 6 (sometimes 7) players each and the league runs for the calendar month. Prizes are given to the Winners of each Division and usually at least 100 players enter. Application forms are widely circulated mid-way through the preceding month - but don't apply late!

2. British Club Squash Ladder

The Squash Ladder operates throughout the year and it should be the priority of any new player to get placed on it. Ladder rules are on the board and new players should feel free to challenge anyone to get an assessment of their standard-someone just has to be worse than you!

3. Don Johnson Cup/Parra Handy Plate

Each year there is a Club Knock-out cup competition open to all Club members. Players are seeded and first round losers enter the plate competition. Deliberately losing in the first round is a cause for tough disciplinary measures.

4. Ladies Cup/Plate

As above but for the gentler sex only.

5. Club Handicap Competition

There is also an annual Club handicap competition open to everyone, in which the best players are hopefully given such heavy handicaps that anyone can win.

6. Rod Carter Shield

The British Club also hosts an Open Knock-out competition for competitors in and outside the Club. This one is for the big boys.

7. Thailand Squash Racquets Association League

The TSRA organises an inter-club league competition once (sometimes twice) a year. The British Club enters a number of teams (10 in 1982) of widely varying playing standards, and matches are played on a once-weekly basis over a 3 month period at the Club and other Bangkok venues. Good one for getting your name in the Bangkok Post this.

8. Other Inter-Club Matches

The Club arranges other Inter-Club fixtures on an occasional basis which includes Chiangmai, Hong Kong and Singapore clubs, and RBSC.

9. Fun Days

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At least twice a year the Section organises a Fun Day of novelty competitions for all players. These are normally pretty energetic affairs necessitating the laying on of appropriate food and liquid refreshments afterwards.

10. Coaching

The Club organises coaching sessions on an occasional basis-usually at weekends by Division 1 players, but sometimes by visiting professionals. Perhaps we should try to do this more often.

11. Ladies Squash Day

Every Tuesday the ladies get together for 'social squash' from 9.00 a.m. to 3.20 p.m. This is a good way for new lady members, including beginners, to get into the swing of things.

12. Squash Socials

Being such a fit and active lot, the Squash Committee organises wild Socials on an occasional basis -- biggest venture yet -- 'The 1982/83 Hogmanay Gala'
