Lockers






Mr. and Mrs. Alec Stewart


Mr. John Rooney


Mr. & Mrs. David Hawkins

Mr. & Mrs. Andrew McDonald








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Mr. & Mrs. Robert Carpenter


Men's Interclub Doubles Tournament



BC thrash Bangkok French 8-1

fter a poor start to the new Farang League season, the BC bounced back into superb form with a convincing 7-2 victory over last year's champions, the Italians, followed by an outstanding 8-1 result over an in-form French side. Elsewhere, our teams performed with credit in the annual Manila Soccer Sixes, whilst the Casuals won the annual Patana Tournament for the first time for the BC.



The Farang League started with a disappointing result against last season's wooden spoonists, the Scandinavians. BC never took the game as seriously as they should have and suffered the consequences. In the first half we controlled the game, hitting the post twice and bringing some excellent saves from the Scans keeper. The Scans failed to get a shot in against Frank Duggan and at half time the game remained scoreless.

Back of the net!

The second half followed the pattern of the first until Captain Greg Watkins slotted home an own goal to give the Scans a 1-0 lead. With this the BC game plan discipline disintegrated and we reverted to a long ball game against a tall Scandinavian defence. Substitutes Terry Willcox and Christian Parker, on his Farang League debut, could do nothing to reverse the

flow and we fell behind further to eventually lose 3-0. Best performances came from Frank Duggan making two excellent second half saves and overall from Adam Caro.

After losing to last season's bottom side 3-0 we followed this with a 7-2 drubbing of last year's champions, the Italians! On this basis past reputations mean nothing and the League looks extremely competitive this season. Fielding a weak side the Italians were no match for a determined BC team in a very one-sided fixture. Goals from Tim Ross (3), Dave Atkinson, John Cochrane, Vaughan Elias and Marc Hagelauer secured an excellent victory.

The following game against an in-form French team was our best performance of the season. Tim Ross with five goals was outstanding with Keith Dougall grabbing his first hattrick of the season, won the points for the BC. Our fourth game of the season against a young, lively ISB team showed continuing good form. 1-0 up after 10 minutes through Tim Ross this was followed by an excellent finish from Paul Greenhalgh. ISB pulled the deficit back to 2-1 by half-time but the second half saw the BC pull away to a 6-1 lead with further goals from Tim Ross (2), Paul Greenhalgh and Dave Atkinson. Close to the end ISB scored a second consolation goal to give a final score of 6-2. This result gives Tim Ross the remarkable achievement of scoring three hat-tricks in a row and a tally of 11 goals in 3 games.

Patana School Tournament






was scored by Phil Hall and refereed by Martin Reed.



Wethod


- **1** Saute green curry paste, add the coconut milk and cook for 5 minutes

eople are often curious as to what happens to the substantial funds raised during Ploenchit Fair each year. The 1994 Ploenchit Fair raised approximately 4.8 million baht and slightly more than this was allocated to a wide variety of projects in Bangkok and the provinces during 1995.

All projects are approved by the United Kingdom Committee for Thai Charities (UKCTC), which meets each month to consider new proposals for assistance, to review progress of current projects and to oversee the disbursement of funds. Emphasis is given to selfhelp projects and those which help communities over a long period of time, particularly

educational, medical and communal projects. General cash allocations are never given.

Approved

Once an application for help is approved, a committee member is assigned to liaise and coordinate the project until completion, always ensuring that proper financial records and invoices are kept. The Committee is voluntary and consists mainly of long-time residents from the British Community in Bangkok.

Among the 35 projects financed over the past 12 months are:

Rural Area Medical Aid Society

This dedicated group of doctors, nurses, dentists, students and aid workers have been visiting the rural poor once a month to provide medical help, cancer screening, dental care and minor surgery for 15 years. UKCTC pays all their pharmaceutical bills.

Medical School Scholarships

Five final year medical students from Siriraj Hospital were sent on a 6-week study course to Guys and Kings Hospitals in London. UKCTC and Glaxo are joint sponsors.

Manorom Christian Hospital

Purchase of a mobile x-ray unit.

Princess Mother's Personal Project

Setting up of rice and water banks in remote villages under the supervision of the Princess Mother's Foundation. So far 2 villages have been set up, and 6 more are under way.

Princess Wother's Wedical

Volunteer Foundation

Assistance towards building two day-care centres. Provision of two TV sets and education videos to train northeastern children to speak Thai prior to entering primary school.

St. Vincent de Paul

Provision of a drinking water tank for a village in Phanom District. Setting up of a water bank for hilltribe villagers in Kamphaengphet. Construction of a library area plus provision of handicraft materials to provide AIDS-infected women and widows with better living standards.

Assistance to the Deaf, Khon Kaen

Provision of a special FM transmitter and

hearing aid equipment for children with speech potential at this special school under VSO aegis.

Aberdeen House

Construction of a security wall surrounding a pre-school centre in Chiang Mai.

Rural Ear Nose & Throat Association

Purchase of a suction machine to replace one donated 8 years ago.

Huay Sarn Nok School, Mae Hong Son

Repairs to the roof of this remote school, plus provision of a dynamo for electricity and a rice bank for the village.

Good Shepherd Sisters, Nong Khai

Providing a water purifying system for the Huay Sai Centre as local water supply is polluted. Providing training materials to teach young unemployed girls handicrafts.

Association of the Deaf

Purchase of a projector and equipment to teach sign language.

Human Development Centre

Purchase of a plate maker to train slum community boys to do printing work.

Centre for Village Vocational Building Technology

Purchase of moulds and equipment from England to train people in Udon Thani and nearby areas in making roofing tiles, paving slabs and other concrete products.

Dear Ladies

Equipping 35 schools in the Kamphaengphet area with First Aid rooms.

Kavilla School for the Mentally Retarded

Purchase of a copy printer to prepare inexpensive school books and teaching materials for mentally retarded children.

Fountain of Life Centre, Pattaya

Assistance with repairs to the Centre building, which offers job training to former pros-

titutes and is run by Sisters of the Good Shepherd.

Low Vision Centre

Printing booklets to distribute to hospitals giving help to the partially sighted.

Phud Hong Leper Colony

Allocation to build a new classroom in an old school building within the colony in Nakhon Si Thammarat.

St Joseph's Home for the Aged

Payment of food bills and operational expenses for geriatric inmates in Betong. UKCTC has suported this home for many years.



McKeans Hospice

Purchase of prosthetic devices, wheelchairs, suction machine and a sidecar to transport invalid patients.

Foundation for Slum Care


Provision of equipment to run a creche and day care centreto enable mothers to work. Equipped a mobile clinic for communities living under bridges.

Video for Mentally Handicapped

Production of special text books and video for distribution to schools dealing with mentally handicapped children.


Peeping Tom and the Monies

Dollar


The dollar is probably the most common form of currency in use in the world today. The first American dollars were struck after the War of Independence in 1794. The name 'dollar' almost certainly derived from the old German word "Thater", meaning 'valley'. Silver coins mined from a valley known as "Joachim's Tal" became standard international coins, and other coins like them became known as "Thaters". The actual dollar sign, interestingly, is believed to be simply the 'U' of the United States superimposed on the 'S', giving \$ (although modern printing fonts now use only one vertical line).

Florin

The old, predecimal two-shilling piece was known as a "florin". This was because the design was copied from the silver coin of the city of Florence.

Tanner

The six-pence was known as a tanner, and actually survived for eight years after decimalisation with a value of 2 1/2 (new) pence. It was named after a famous engraver at the Royal Mint in the 1700's by the name of John Sigmund Tanner.

Remember, faxing can be safe and enjoyable for anyone as long as you use a degree of common sense and follow the proper procedures.



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
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The Dentist

housands and thousands of people around a good slice of Asia blinked and squinted on the morning of Tuesday 24th October to watch that impressive solar spectacle, the total eclipse, and residents of Thailand were no exception.
