

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

We have just started a fresh year at the British Club and are really going to make even more effort this year to organise events, food promotions, children's activities and much more. On the Food and Beverage side, we are launching new menus poolside and in the Churchill Bar. A new wine list was implemented in late December with a wider range and some high quality wines needless to say the best value for money in town! Also a new children's menu will be implemented this month. For more than 5 years the menus have not been revised at these outlets. Unfortunately some dishes will be increasing in price as the cost of ingredients has risen. On the other hand though all beverage prices will remain the same.

The last qualifying medal competition was held at Subhaprueck. The winners were as follows:





### Yes Let! Play better Squash


After a month of no rules let's get back to the most basic – let or stroke – as there has been much discussion over the last month, with my name often taken on both sides to back their respective argument.

All this stuff on lets and strokes relate to Rule 12 "Interference" – read it yourself on page 13.


### I quote:

- 12.1 The player whose turn it is to play the ball is entitled to freedom from interference by the opponent.
- 12.2 To avoid interference the opponent must make every effort to provide the player with
  - 12.2.1 Unobstructed direct access to the ball
  - 12.2.2 A fair view of the ball
  - 12.2.3 Freedom to hit the ball
  - 12.2.4 Freedom to play the ball directly to the any part front wall

12.3 Interference occurs if the opponent fails to fulfil any of the above requirements, irrespective of whether the opponent makes every effort to fulfil those requirements.



No interference, as the opponent is clearly giving full access to the front wall, if measured from the point of contact of the ball. No Let!




Interference, as the opponent is not giving the player full access to the front wall.

 If the referee decides that the opponent is making every effort to get out of the way
 Let!

- If the referee decides the player could only play a boast Let!
- If the referee thinks the player would make a good shot, and the opponent was not making every effort to clear stroke!

As normal people playing the game, without the view from above, and without eyes in our racket, it is difficult to judge. If in doubt play a let. However, as the opponent, remember that the person at the back has a better view of the situation than you do, and if he is standing with the racket poised behind your head or a\*\*e, then it is probably interference, and you are probably not giving him clear access to the front wall.





# One Hundred Years of the BC

In April 2003 the British Club of Bangkok will celebrate 100 years since its foundation. We intend to mark this unique occasion with a variety of special events and activities, combining all to make a fitting celebration for the centenary of the British Club of Bangkok.

### History of the Club

Our first task is to start gathering information on the history of the British Club so that we can honour its rich heritage. 



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# You Had to be There...

OB-BO" - the chant echoed through the Thunderdome in the dying moments of the Farang League Cup Competition on Saturday 18 November.






