

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


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

Return to Warmer Waters

Just when you thought it was safe to get back in the pool... I'm back!

I am glad to be here and am looking forward to seeing and talking with you again by the pool.

SO WHAT WAS III DOING IN THE USA?

Well, the answer is "many things". I taught open water scuba classes at the Washington Athletic Club in Seattle, Washington. The pool sessions were on the 6th floor which was a challenge to get to with 6 complete sets of scuba equipment. The open water dives were in Puget Sound in balmy 47°F water using 7mm thick wet suits. Underwater visibility was limited, usually less than 3 meters. Now I remember why it's more fun to dive in Thailand's warm water!

I also taught introductory skin diving classes at the Issaquah Community Center for the local middle school students. It was very hectic and fast due to the classroom schedules.

My wife, Ming, and I helped to start a photographic business taking shots of kids and families during their skiing and snow boarding lessons at Crystal Mt. Ski Resort located very close to Mt. Rainier, Washington. Fantastic views!

Working with Evergreen Medical Center in Bellevue, Washington, I taught many medic First Aid/CPR classes and gained much experience demonstrating the Heartstream Advanced Electronic Defibulator (AED) which has proved to be as high as 70% successful in restarting a stopped heart.

Ming and I took the opportunity to go

camping one weekend in the north Cascade mountains near Mt. Baker in northern Washington State, hiking up to a very scenic mountain pass.

We also enjoyed short day hikes on some of the nearby foothills and saw a variety of wildlife including deer and majestic American bald eagles.

I had a wonderful opportunity to attend the 60th reunion of the American Volunteer Groups (AVG), more popularly known as the Flying Tigers who fought in China prior to the USA entering WWII. The reunion was in Seattle, Washington and we were able to meet the remaining 22 of the original 350 members of whom my father had been one. They presented to me my father's Bronze Medal. It was a very inspiring moment in my life.

We watched from the local stream and fish hatchery close to our house the migrations of the salmon through the year. It was very impressive to see how determined they were to succeed in their mission to swim against the strong current to spawn.

I have a secret passion for blackberry jam and this year was a good crop. The blackberry is considered a weed in most parts of the USA. There are two varieties and both produce very good eating berries. I was able to pick more than 8 full gallons of high quality berries at a secret prime location I found near our

a secret prime location I found near our house. We made many jars of jam and also enjoyed fresh blackberry pies and milk shakes.

I volunteered and my daughter often recruited me to do many projects

around her house ranging from building a back yard patio to a brick stairway and an endless list of repairs.

WHAT ARE WE GOING TO DO IN THAILAND?

Now that I'm back, I will focus on specialty courses, Rescue, and Dive Master training. There will also be BCB organized dive trips. Of course the beginner Open Water course will still be available.

To help encourage certified divers, those interested in learning to scuba dive or take continuing courses after the holiday season, we are planning a scuba section activity this month at the BCB. Further information will be posted on the bulletin board.

Ming and I are aggressively expanding our home cookie baking business so be ready to taste samples of our new recipes!

CPR/FIRST AID

The life saving courses have always been fun to teach and are valuable to the community. We will continue to expand this activity to include whole families as well as maids, nannies, businesses and schools.

Finally, I would like to thank Don Johnson very much for teaching scuba diving and Medic First Aid courses for me during my absence to visit my family in America.










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


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
Around the world with horses

emember Thelwell cartoons? A true scenario of completely mad horsey children and their parents racing across a show ground in hot pursuit of a large shiny silver trophy! Yep that was me many years ago! Obsessed. And my wonderful devoted parents who entered me for as many different pony classes every weekend just to avoid the next tantrum! With a great little show jumping pony called Bisto (gravy coloured of course!) and an equally fantastic gymkhana games pony called

Chico we acquired quite a collection of those shiny silver trophies, later progressing onto Team events in Dressage, Show Jumping and Cross Country in both Regional and National competitions.


And so the seed was sown. Horses were to be a permanent fixture in my life. I tried a grown up job in an office once, wearing clean, tidy, civilian clothes everyday, only to retreat home and cast them aside for smelly jodhpurs, jumper and the relief of my comfortable welly boots to plunge out the back door onto the farm and ride a horse! Winters are the only real hard work with horses in England and after many years of standing out in damp fields, arenas and show grounds with the rain coming down about my ears, battling with frozen pipes, chilblains, backpains from lugging around jumps or bales of hay and straw, it occurred to me there must be an easier, warmer way to get more out of my work!



On swiftly passing the first British Horse Society teaching qualification of Assistant Instructor I was offered a position in Arizona, USA. 'No mucking out, just teach and ride' said my friend! And there I went and that I did! It was very different and subsequently very easy. Mexican labourers did all the hard and mucky jobs. I thoroughly enjoyed my experiences there including getting completely lost in my first International Cross Country competition held in the desert! Each cactus looked the same as the last!

The Middle East beckoned a few years later and I accepted a position





in Dubai just as the Gulf War was starting! Great facilities (owned by the ruling Sheikh), fabulously expensive horses for us to keep tuned up and compete and equally fabulously wealthy clients for us to instruct! Although the Arab boys were very pampered and precious, the Sheikh's daughters were a delight to teach.

Returning to England I trained and passed the next level of Courses with Horses for the BHS Intermediate Instructor at an established Equestrian Centre in North London which just happened to be frequented by celebrities. But that's another story!!

Ideal and generous opportunities crossed my path to set up my own stables/business where I could concentrate on competing more seriously like my friends, some who were already riding at Burghley Horse Trials or Showjumping at Wembley. But I already had the travel bug and wanted to see how horses arrived/survived in the rest of the world in their respective disciplines. It's true, the more you travel the smaller the world becomes.

ASIA

Just as the coldest winter for years in England was setting in (96/97), through a contact a door opened in Asia. I had always wanted to travel and work in the USA, Middle East and the Far East, the backup qualifications I had are recognised worldwide. I accepted an offer too good to miss from The Hong Kong Jockey Club teaching over 150 riders a week! Registered with The British Horse Society the set-up was very similar to Dubai, and as well as various imported ponies and horses from around the world, we also had to make use of the majority of the 200 retired racehorses each season and try to find them a new life either in the school or even better privately. Following my fiancee to Singapore, I took up a teaching position at The Singapore Polo Club. Clinics in Taipei gave me further insight to another country's horsey customs!

OVERALL


One tries not to get too attached to horses which do not belong to you but through training and trust a relationship is formed very quickly and that animal depends on you for social interaction and psychological stimulation on a daily basis. This is acquired through fun and confidence-giving training exercises. Equines are naturally very social. Over time man has domesticated them within small enclosures, some never seeing the grass that should be beneath their feet. My job is to educate and train not just the horse but the human! The equestrian facilities in Thailand that I have visited so far are superb, catering for all levels of horses/riders and I look forward to contributing to the local Equestrian scene.

Thailand-Burma Railway

(1942 - 1945)

An illustrated talk by Mr. Rod Beattie

WEDNESDAY, 13 FEBRUARY 2002, 7.00PM SURIWONGSE ROOM

ecember 2001 was the 60th anniversary of the Japanese entry into World War II, starting with the simultaneous attacks on Pearl Harbour and South East Asia. British, Australian, Dutch and American members will doubtless be aware of the events which culminated in the fall of Singapore on February 15 1942 and the Netherlands East Indies soon after.

The Japanese quickly realised that the huge numbers of allied prisoners would provide an ideal, and expendable, workforce for various Japanese projects throughout the region now under Japanese control. One of these projects was to construct a railway from Thailand into Burma to enable supplies to be safely shipped to their forces occupying Burma.

The story of what followed will be related by Mr. Rod Beattie, of Kanchanaburi, and illustrated by pictures, documents, maps and artifacts, on Wednesday, 13 February 2002 in the Suriwongse Room of the British Club at 7.00pm.


Mr. Beattie is the Area Manager for the Commonwealth War Graves Commission and has conducted private research of the railway for eight years. He was appointed the Project Manager for the construction of the Hellfire Pass Memorial in 1996 by the Australian Department of Veterans Affairs and is a Director of the Thailand–Burma Railway Centre now under construction in Kanchanaburi.



The talk will cover many aspects of the railway project such as the daunting engineering problems, logistics, camp and working conditions and the human cost of constructing such a railway under wartime conditions. Many fascinating, and indeed surprising, items will be

on display including recently obtained photographs taken by Japanese engineers and never seen in public before.

I'll freely admit that in the past I thought Tex Mex was a Country & Western singer, but rather than look stupid on paper (any comments to the editor, please) I decided to consult a rather shy resident expert who wishes to remain anonymous. So...thanks Dave C, who works not a million miles away from me, or even a few feet at times, for some valuable background information.

First myth - Mexican food is hotter and spicier than its American fusion counterpart.

Wrong - the staple fare in Mexico is based around stews and pies, as seen in the menu, not around stomach-dissolving chillies.

Second myth - I'm not going to pontificate about the soup.....

Before I move on to the menu, a few words about the music, "where was it?" I didn't seem to notice anything happening, even in the background, which is unusual in a food promotion. I was expecting a call relieving me of the Airey "Spryogyra" collection for the evening but the phone stayed silent. If someone wants to write in and state that Spyrogyra aren't Mexican, feel free. 

Ex Gratia Payment To Far East POW's and Internees

Thanks largely to the persistence of the British Legion, the UK government announced about a year ago an award of £10000 to service personnel and civilians (including children) held by the Japanese. There was very little, if any, publicity given to this announcement overseas and it is possible that there may be some members/ widows who may not have realised that they are entitled to the grant.

The award is tax-free and payable to:

- 1. Service personnel (including the Merchant Navy) who were POW's in the Far East.
- 2. Civilian internees (no matter how young), and
- Widows/widowers of those in categories 1 and 2 provided that they were still married at the time of death.

Assistance about how to claim can be obtained from the War Pensions Agency, Norcross, Blackpool, Lancs FY5, UK, or from the British Embassy Consular office (Tel 02305 8333 ext 2239). I approached the Consul last month after the Remembrance Sunday Service to see whether the Embassy would "field" any local inquiries, to which he immediately agreed.

Even if Members are not entitled to the grant themselves, they may know of relations/friends who are and can pass the news on.

These few individuals who I know were entitled to the award all told me that payment had been made promptly once the completed form had been sent to WPA.

With very best wishes for Christmas and the New Year to all members and staff and, as ever, my appreciation of the welcome received from all with whom I have come into contact.



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
Last Chance for a Medal

So for Karen Carter, Cheryl Lamb, Gareth Sampson and Mike Staples to bring back both 'magic balls' – and win the day - was impressive...


There was also an individual competition won by Cheryl Lamb who scored an amazing 27 Stapleford points on nine holes.

HUA HIN WEEKEND

As usual over the long weekend of Constitution Day the BCGS made its annual pilgrimage to Hua Hin in search of the perfect round of golf and for the more skilled (or luckier) players, the chance to bring home one of the several 'pots' on offer at Majestic Creek, which has the reputation for being one of the most scenic - and most challenging -golf courses in Thailand. The Italian restaurants in town also proved something of a lure and provided a measure of consolation for those of us who failed at the first two objectives.

THE DEEMED TROPHY

Each year the Committee takes on the rest of the club members in pursuit of the prestigious DeeMed trophy. This year I am delighted to report that the Committee (finally) hit upon a format that gave them victory. The average net score achieved by the committee (70.5) was compared to the members average (75.7) and therefore the committee awarded itself the DeeMed Trophy and a round of applause for such a convincing win. Calls for an independent audit (and the use of a calculator) were put down to sour grapes and the Captain moved rapidly on to the next item on the agenda - which was:

It was an excellent days golf on one of the best courses in Thailand. As usual the prizes for the competition were sponsored by Dougal Forrest of **DeeMed**. This is a big event

and it is Dougal's unstinting support that makes it so memorable; once again we are in his debt and hope to see him at Hua Hin next year to thank him personally – and give him a chance to win one of the awards he so generously donates.

SUNDAY

The second day saw the annual match against the Golfers Cocktail Lounge. This is a pairs 'Combined Stapleford Matchplay' event and one which the BCGS has not won in living memory. Nevertheless our rising membership is giving us a 'depth of play' which has previously been lacking (we fielded 15 pairs) and we felt sure that this year we were in with a chance. And I have to say that it started out looking really good, the first three teams home announced victory, alas, it didn't last. Our lead was soon cut to one game and then came a succession of 'halved' matches that we'd counted on winning. The scales began to tilt toward the GCL, two late victories gave them the edge and after all the scores were in they were declared the winners by the closest margin ever: 7 points - 6 points.

It was disappointing to come so close but the trend is in our favour (!) and next year should see us the victors in this keenly contested match. As is traditional the GCL hosted us to an excellent Bar-B-Que that evening and the individual prizes for the day were awarded. 



GOLF COURSES AND HOW TO FIND THEM...

There are several books on 'Golf Courses in Thailand'. However the information given on how to find any particular course, especially the less-frequented ones, is usually abysmal. Having exhausted my vocabulary of 'expletive-deleted' as I pass the same petrol station for the third time searching for some elusive country club (I sometimes think these places don't want to be found...) I've decided to try and do something about the situation and am putting together a collection of 'Dummies Guides to Golf Courses' for use by the BCGS – or anyone who'll buy me a beer. And I need some help; the idea is that anytime you visit a golf course which takes a bit of finding please make a sketch map of its location and add any details you feel might be useful. To give you an idea of what I'm hoping for – and to start us off - I've attached directions to Dragon Hills Golf Course and added some notes I made the last time I was there.

DRAGON HILLS

- 1. There are no trolleys, so if you have one of your own take it along.
- Book ahead, it's cheap and companies like to reserve it for 'corporate golf days', it's a long way to go to find out you can't get a game.
- 3. There is nothing else to do out there.
- 4. The 'drinks stops' don't stock golf balls make sure you have enough.
- 5. The hotel is across the road from the Golf Course entrance. The restaurant is primitive so eat at the course if you can.
- 6. It's approximately 1hr 45 mins from Bangkok.
- Special deal weekdays: 850 Baht for two rounds of golf, overnight accommodation and breakfast (based on two people sharing a room).
