

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Christmas Ball: The Christmas Ball was ... well ... a Ball! The new less formal format was a great hit with over 250 Members turning out in finery of their choice on a cold and frosty evening to dance the night away. The Lawns were were magical under the lights and live jazz created a wonderful atmosphere for the new buffet style feast featuring a huge choice of western, Thai and Indian delights. The Boss Band were brilliant and the dance floor was full from the minute they struck up their first number until the most determined revellers staggered on to breakfast in the wee hours of the morning. A huge thank you is due to Khun Prem and her staff for the seamless service and especially to Khun Laak our Executive Chef who teamed up with BC cricket captain and master chef, Rahul Gupte to produce the delicious festive fare. Probably a good idea to book your tickets for next year now ... it will be a sell out!

Priorities: New Year is the time to reflect on past achievements and to look ahead. The General Committee (GC) started its term in April with high hopes and an ambitious agenda. After a couple of fractious years, besides making the Club a friendlier place to be, our stated priorities were: to initiate the long awaited poolside redevelopment project; to improve communications with Members; to broaden Member participation in decision making; to review the Club constitution and disciplinary procedures (which had been the source of much of the dissatisfaction); and to establish an internal audit function.

Results: Frustratingly, whilst having made progress on all fronts, everything has been more difficult and more time consuming than we had hoped. A huge amount of work has been done by the architects, engineers and quantity surveyors though, and we are now ready to present Chapman Taylor's final design for the poolside redevelopment for your consideration at an EGM on 31st January. Details will be sent out with the calling papers and posted on the website. If approved, this will be a huge milestone for the Club, our largest investment for decades, delivering the first phase of an exciting modern family/ sports hub. The GC believes this will revitalise the Club but Members have to approve it. Please make every effort to be at this crucial EGM, and if you are unable to make it, please send in a proxy vote. Watch out for more information.

Much work has also been done on the review of the Constitution and disciplinary procedures. The task has become a little less daunting as the atmosphere in the Club has calmed down but it remains to be seen whether this work can be completed before the AGM. However, an independent member's audit committee has been appointed. Since it took time to be established the scope of its work will be limited this year, but this will be a very valuable instrument for assuring accountability for the future.

A dozen sub-committees (SCs) and interest groups have engaged 40 Members, spouses and nonvoting categories, in every aspect of club life and we have also established Facebook/ Twitter pages and conducted three online surveys. Whilst I think we can



therefore justly claim that we have improved communications and the participation of Members, all of this is very much 'work in progress' and will require far more time and energy to become really effective than has been devoted hereto.

As reported before, the GC has been working on many other projects beyond these priorities including upgrading our IT systems, putting in place a human resource policy, improving Club security, upgrading maintenance and safety checks, establishing on-line menus, and strengthening our budgeting process. We may not have achieved all we set out to do but we have certainly been busy!

Changing Times: Throughout the 38 years that I have been a Member there has always been tension between some traditionalists whose bastion has been the Churchill Bar and others who want a more relaxed Club, often affectionately known as 'that lot over there'. Indeed a perception by many Members that the Club was becoming too stuffy was another reason behind the fracas during the last couple of years.

I have always believed that our Club can cater for all tastes but in any case the world is changing rapidly and to survive, the Club must move with the times. We must attract more young families to redress our aging membership and if approved, the Poolside redevelopment will be a major step in that direction.

But this doesn't mean that tradition goes out of the window. We are also developing a vision for a refurbished Club House, offering stylish drinking and dining options as well as space for functions and entertainment ... and some guest accommodation. The future British Club can have the best of both worlds ... first class family/ sports facilities one side complementing our classic Club House offering all the traditional facilities and more on the other.

Whilst still floating on the warm buzz of the Christmas Ball and enjoying the early success for our experimental Sports Bar I think we have also already shown there are ways to freshen up the way we do things even before we get new facilities. The demand is surely here for more relaxed events and a less formal dress code.

Looking ahead: As we move into the New Year a lot of groundwork has been done but there will likely be much unfinished business by the time the next AGM comes around in March. Then it will be time to choose your new GC to take things forward. Last year we had the unprecedented situation when an entirely new GC took over. This certainly had its advantages but hopefully there will be some continuity this year, ensuring that the things which are working well progress, and any new blood brings fresh ideas and energy.

In closing, I am delighted to report that for all who enjoy a bit of nostalgia all past copies of Outpost going back to 1974 are now on our website, and the scanned GC Minutes going back to the beginning of time will soon be available.

Happy New Year. I hope to see all voting Members at the EGM on 31st January. This is a hugely important decision for the Club. Please be there.









GIVING BACK TO THE BRITISH COMMUNITY

As a long term resident of Asia, with extensive stints in Hong Kong and Thailand, and my wife from the Philippines, two children at Bangkok Patana, I consider Asia, especially Thailand, to be my home. However, I often think of Britain, with my happy childhood in Durham and Perthshire, and key family members still in Edinburgh and Durham. I like to think we bring part of what is good about Britain to these distant shores...

The British, Australian, Canadian & New Zealand community in Bangkok is quite tightly knit, with Embassies & Chambers of Commerce functions, Rotary Clubs & the British Club, and the varied International schools bringing us together. Overall, most of us can be thankful for a standard of living rarely enjoyed in our home country.

In Thailand, there are 600 members of the British Chamber of Commerce, approximately 50,000 British nationals resident in Thailand, of which over 10,000 are living in Thailand on retirement visas, and in 2015 there were over one million British arrivals, the majority of them tourists with whom we have relatively little interaction. It came as some surprise to me, whilst attending an Embassy Consular briefing by the British Consul, Layla Slatter last year, just how much good work their office does: apart from processing 7,646 notarisations for the resident community in 2015, the team also handled over 1,400 assistance cases, including 334 deaths, 46 missing persons, and 259 hospitalisations (and unfortunately 161 arrest cases).

Ms. Layla, then went on to mention a number of examples of cases which had somehow "fallen through the cracks" of normal process. Cases where British subjects became stranded in Thailand with no financial lifeline to access urgently needed medical care, or lacked the price of a ticket home, or were even desperate for a basic meal after being pick-pocketed. Hard to imagine amongst BCCT members, but who knows, it could happen to any of us (and probably did when we were students !).

The Embassy helps in a number of ways, firstly in terms of immediate assistance, from an emergency relief fund, which survives entirely on charitable donations, and generally dishes out between Baht 1,000-5,000 to the most urgent cases, and did so for 37 cases in 2015. The next level, are cases where the person is just a bit short of funds for a ticket home, or in unfortunate cases where someone dies, but relatives lack the funds to arrange transportation; in these cases the Embassy lends money against a "promise to repay", but there is an internal policy limit per individual. Thirdly, are the more financially demanding cases where patients cannot afford their medical bills, but often have reserves back in Britain that they cannot access. Again the Embassy may lend with a promise to repay, but because the amount is larger the approval process may take longer, which exacerbates the financial burden.

Having taken all this on board, I decided I would like to help, and the thought occurred to me that other British Club Members might like to contribute too. As a result, we have established The British Community Charitable Fund (BCCF) which is administered by the British Embassy. The Embassy offered to have representatives from the British community to participate in the decision-making, but we felt it would be better to rely on their judgement. Instead, the Embassy will produce a quarterly report, with a simple tally of inflows and outflows, and real life examples of beneficiaries.

So far this year, the BCCF has received Baht 150,000 in donations. The BCCF would look to fill any gap up to Baht 50,000 per case where the Embassy has reached its "promise to pay" limit for repatriation or medical cases. A reasonable estimate of money needed to fully fund the program is about Baht 500,000 per annum, much of which would be more like a revolving facility: effectively making loans to recipients which would generally be repaid at a later date.

In conclusion, there is an opportunity to share your good fortune, in a small way, to assist your stranded or distressed countrymen return home, after a sojourn gone wrong. The Embassy will issue receipts and recognize larger donations in the form of embossed certificates. 

Wednesday mix-in: Courts 2 & 3 are available to book for League/Champs only, from 8pm.


Friday mix-in: Courts 2 & 3 available to book for League/Champs matches only, from 8pm.

GCL receive the SUAL Bell from Pete Gale for another year




