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

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
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From the Editor



Get Wet, Get Fit, Get Hooked!

No aches and pains. No tricky dance steps. If you want to have fun while you tone your whole body, our water workout's for you. Low- to no-impact moves make aquatic fitness perfect for all ages, body types and fitness levels — whether you swim or not. It may look like leisurely splashing but jump in and you'll get a total body workout - the same calorie-burning, muscle-toning benefits of a land routine but with much less risk of injury.

"A 150-pound woman standing in water up to her chest weighs about 38 pounds," says Julie Twnyham, president of Body Check Inc and a Speedo Aquatic fitness trainer, as standing like this, 75% of your body weight is supported by water. However, your newfound buoyancy won't make your workout easier - movements are slower and about 12 times more intense than those at the same speed on land. "Water allows each person to work at her own pace with less impact and danger of injury than land acrobics," says Dr Doug Clement, co-director of Vancouver's Allan McGavin Sports Medicine Centre. Water workouts involve all muscle groups, using similar movements to walking, jogging, cycling and cross-country skiing combined with calisthenics such as kicks, knee-lifts, jumps and lunges. A full workout can improve your flexibility, agility, balance and cardiovascular and muscular strength.

No wonder elite athletes, such as hockey star Eric Lindros, skater Nancy Kerrigan and runner Lynn Williams have jumped into water to bounce back from injuries and cross-train with their land routines.

The Tony Austin Cup, an annual squash competition for 45 years and over squash players, was held during November 1997. This was the strongest field since the competition's inception in 1992.



The following short article may inspire some of you to get serious about those New Year Resolutions — do it for the family!

Parents - A Major Influence on Children's Activity

Because children learn best by example, you'd expect active parents to have active children. It's tough to say how strong the influence can be, because conclusions on the subject rely mostly on self-reported data, which is not objective. Lynn Moore, M.P.H., and colleagues at the Boston University School of Medicine overcame this snag by using a movement sensitive instrument which children and parents wore for several days.

They found children of active mothers twice as likely to be active than children of inactive mothers. Fathers had an even greater influence — children of active fathers were 3.5 times more likely to be active than youngsters of inactive fathers. Families in which both parents were active had the most active children.

So now there's an added reason to feel good about working out regularly: it's not only good for your own health but also has a strong influence on your kids' behaviour.






Holiday Havoc


This year the Club was fortunate to have our traditional 'Carols by Candlelight' transformed into a 'Christmas

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














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
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
From the Chairman


