

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

Natural motion is back Let's twist again!



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Approximately 80 % of people experience significant lower back pain at least once in their lifetime, and for many people, spinal disorders are a lifelong problem.

Causes of chronic lower back pain are varied including muscle strain, disc herniation, lumbar spondylosis, spinal stenosis, osteoporosis and degenerative disc disease.

The most common early symptom of degenerative disc disease is usually pain in the back that spreads to the buttocks and upper thighs. With degenerative disc disease, the main problem lies within one or more of the intervertebral discs. There is a disc between each of the vertebrae in your spine. The discs are designed to absorb pressure and keep the spine flexible by acting as cushions during body movement. They are similar to shock absorbers. Without the cushion effect, the vertebrae in your spine would not be able to absorb stresses, or provide the movement needed to bend and twist.

The treatment of degenerative disc



disease usually begins with conservative treatment, including rest. physical therapy and medications. When conservative therapy fails, surgical treatment may be recommended. To date, ongoing lower back pain from degenerative disc disease has been treated with lumbar spinal fusion surgery. This procedure attempts to permanently lock two or more spinal vertebrae together so they cannot move except as a single unit. However, spinal fusion does alter motion characteristics and mechanics of the spine.

But what about artificial disc replacement?

Artificial disc replacement has been performed in Europe since 1984 and has been used in treating nearly 10,000 patients worldwide. Replacement of the damaged disc with an artificial disc can relieve chronic lower back pain, restore disc height between the vertebrae and allow the spine to maintain its normal motion, which thereby reducing or eliminating the risk of degeneration in adjacent levels of the disc.

Artificial lumbar disc replacement offers an alternative to lumbar fusion for some patients who have chronic low back pain from degenerative disc disease. While fusion stops pain by eliminating movement in the afflicted disc, artificial disc allow natural motion in the implanted disc.

This article provides only an overview of artificial lumbar disc. Additional details should be reviewed with your spine surgeon so that all your questions and concerns can be addressed.

A TRIBUTE TO KHUN NOO

he beginning of the year was a sad and tragic one for all the staff here at the Club. On Thursday 29th December 2005 Pantiroop Onkum, better known as Khun Noo, was knocked over by a car on his way home from the Club. Khun Noo died from head injuries sustained in the accident on Thursday 5th January 2006 at 3.00 pm.

Khun Noo was an outstanding young man. He worked at the British Club for ten years and was both admired and loved by members and staff alike. In the ten years I worked with Noo, I never once saw him lose his temper, even when we were at our most busy. I know that Khun Noo loved working here at the Club. There were many occasions when he was here until 2.00 or 3.00 am, preparing decorations for functions and showing true dedication to members and to the Club.

During the Christmas Ball, or any large function at the Club, I knew I would always find Noo on the balcony looking over the whole event, feeling proud of what he had accomplished. The biggest event he worked on recently was the BNH bed push, where he was truly inspirational and as hard working as always.

Not only was Noo extremely conscientious about his work, he also truly cared about other people and their feelings. He had a great sense of humour and would always make us laugh.

At the moment, whenever we think of Noo we are sad, but what we must try to remember are the good times, his cheerful face and that he was a ray of light in our lives.

We all miss you Noo, your jokey ways and your silly laugh, and all realise how lucky we were to have known you.

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Shrove Tuesday is . . . Pancake Da 28 February 2006

A pancake feast.

Modern Pancake Day has its roots in the religious observance of Shrove Tuesday. The day always falls 47 days before the moveable feast of Easter Sunday, and so varies anywhere between February 3 and March 9.



Shrove Tuesday gets its name from the ritual of shriving, when the faithful confessed their sins to the local priest and received forgiveness before the season of Lent began.

Lent was a time of abstinence, of giving things up. So Shrove Tuesday was the last chance to use up the foods that weren't allowed in Lent. Pancakes were ideal for this purpose because they contained fat, milk, butter and eggs things forbidden during Lent and which would otherwise spoil during this period.

Therein lies the origins of the curious dual nature of Shrove Tuesday - on one hand it was a great opportunity to be penitent and confess no more wallowing around in guilt and pain caused by a build-up of past sins. But on the other hand one could also make merry and pig-out on all sorts of soon-to-be-forbidden foods on the basis that one was adhering to Church doctrine and preparing for the fast of Lent.

Shrove Tuesday - as a time to eat and be merry - has become popular all over the world. In many solidly Roman Catholic countries it is the last day of Carnival. In some historically Francophone places it is Mardi Gras, French for "Fat Tuesday"; although the most famous of these, the New Orleans Mardi Gras, is probably on hold this year . . .



Apart from mob-football in the streets - and cock-stoning (which has mercifully died out) the most traditional Shrove Tuesday activity is the pancake-race, which dates back to 1445. Pancake racing remains popular today throughout the British Isles and in many European Countries.

The most famous race takes place at Olney in Buckinghamshire. According to tradition, in 1445 a woman of Olney heard the shriving bell while she was making pancakes and ran to the church in her apron, still clutching her frying pan. The Olney pancake race is now world famous. Competitors have to be local housewives and they must wear an apron and a hat or scarf. Each contestant has a frying pan containing a hot, cooking pancake. She must toss it three times during the race that starts at the market square at 11.55 am. The first woman to complete the winding 375-metre course and arrive at the church, serve her pancake to the bell ringer, and be kissed by him, is the winner. The record is 63 seconds set in 1967 (quite a respectable time even without a frying pan!).



Most British Club members will be familiar with BNH Hospital on Convent Road. It is one of the popular and respected international hospitals in Bangkok. New arrivals may not however be aware of its long history and close association with the British community and the British Club. Both establishments have been around for over 100 years - opening around the same time as other well-known western influenced landmarks in Bangkok - the Neilson Hays Library, Hualampong railway station and the Oriental Hotel.

Until 2001 BNH Hospital was known as the Bangkok Nursing Home. It was at this time that the company was taken over by the Bangkok Hospital network, which also includes the Samitivej Hospitals. Although still on Convent Road it is not now in the original colonial style buildings - these were vacated in 1996 when the owners at the time saw an increasing demand for private hospital services and invested in a new, seven storey medical complex. The timing of the change was however unfortunate. The economic recession in 1997 did not bring the forecast numbers of new patients and the hospital, battling against repayment of inflated loans, went into a steady financial decline until the Bangkok Hospital takeover turned its fate around and ensured its continued existence.

The new owners have made a significant investment to improve the facilities and have worked hard to attract many famous and highly respected doctors to join the BNH Hospital team. As well as gaining popularity amongst the local Thai community, BNH has focused on rebuilding its relationship and raising its profile amongst the international community and is always supportive of community activities. It initiated its own community event in 2004 the Bed Push parade - which raised money for the Thai Red Cross AIDS charities and has since become a popular annual event eagerly awaited by the Expat community. The combination of improved services and facilities, and an increased presence in the community, have resulted in a significant increase in the number of patients using BNH Hospital over the last two years.

ng and close relationship

The British Club has seen a closer relationship develop over recent years too and appreciates the support given to the Club at sporting activities and children's events, such as the Tennis Tournament, the Bonfire Night party and the Children's Christmas Party, when the BNH Hospital sends an ambulance and medical team to be on stand-by. The British Club and BNH Hospital look forward to continuing their close relationship over the next one hundred years.

I members are invited to attend a discussion forum, on Monday February 27th, where plans for future Club development will be presented. At this forum the GC would like to get members' views on the proposals. Then, following some anticipated finetuning, if the plan is well supported, the GC will seek approval from the members at the March AGM to proceed with Phase One of the Development.

With an increase in available cash reserves and a consistent number of new members recruited each year, the Club is now in a good position to start upgrading and providing new facilities. The plan is that the new and upgraded and/or converted facilities should increase the capacity of the Club at peak times and attract members at less busy times. While we believe that in order to maximise use of the available space the plan needs to be integrated across the entire site, it is specifically designed to be modular, and taken a step at a time. Within each module there are options for members to consider. However, if supported by the membership, we believe that a long-term commitment to the plan is key in order to ensure continuity from one General Committee to the next.

As previously stated, initial feedback from the membership indicated that the following issues were of importance:

 The environment in which the Club is located is unique in the amount of green space it includes - our downtown 'oasis'. We must preserve this. The Clubhouse is an impressive historical building that is currently underused.

 The Club probably provides one of the best family environments in Bangkok. However the family orientated facilities provided are not sufficient.

4) The Poolside and the Clubhouse are separated by a traffic thoroughfare that effectively cuts the site in half; children's safety is therefore an issue.

APPOINTMENT OF HONORARY MEMBERS

The General Committee is delighted to award Honorary Memberships to two members who, in the opinion of the General Committee, have rendered valuable services to British interests and The British Club over a period of many years. This decision was also well supported by members who sent in nominations.

Nigel Overy CBE (01)

Nigel Overy arrived in Thailand in the early 50's and became Managing Director of the Anglo-Thai Company (later to become part of the Inchcape Group) one of the oldest British companies in Thailand. He was closely involved in the development of the British Chamber of Commerce and was Chairman in 1972 and 1973 and then again in 1979. He also was 2nd Vice President of the Thailand Board of Trade in 1973 and 1974. In 1975 he became Vice Chairman of the British Club and then became Chairman from 1976 to 1978. He was also on the Board of the British International School, Bangkok Patana. In 1979 he was awarded a CBE (Commander of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire) for working to promote British interests within the Thai Community. In Thailand he was awarded the Most Exalted Order of the White Elephant, 4th Class, in 1986. Nigel is probably most well known for his work with the Bangkok Nursing Home, which he helped to establish, and was Chairman of the Association for around 18 years. He was instrumental in the Nursing Home's move from its old home to the new and he still serves on the Committee. Nigel has been a British Club member for 53 years.

Dacre Raikes OBE (R1)

Dacre was Managing Director of The Borneo Company (also to become part of Inchcape) the oldest foreign company in Thailand, and started his career working in the Teak forests of Northern Thailand in 1947. He was Hon.Sec. and then Chairman, of the Timber Exporters Association of Thailand from 1956-58 and V.P. on the Thailand Board of Trade from 1971-73. Dacre served on the British Club General Committee in the 1960's and played an instrumental part in the building of the Club's swimming pool. He was also Chairman of the British Chamber of Commerce Committee from 1967 to 1969. Dacre has been closely involved in The Siam Society and in the promotion of Thailand (5th Class) and received an Honorary Doctorate from Silapakorn University. He was also awarded an OBE (Officer of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire) in January 1984 for his work with the British Community in Thailand. Dacre celebrated his eightieth birthday about a month ago. He has been a British Club member for 51 years and is currently completing a book on his life in Thailand.







JUNIOR RUGBY

Another Memorable Year Ahead for the DHL Bangkok Lions RFC

Planning for a host of Junior Rugby initiatives throughout 2006 is well advanced by the DHL Bangkok Lions RFC. The Club will host another regional mini rugby tournament during February as well as sending three age group sides to a youth tournament held in Hong Kong in the days leading up to 30th edition of the Hong Kong Rugby Sevens next March. All this before their regular season recommences on 22nd April 2006.

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Regular coaching recommenced on 8th January and will run to Sunday 19th February before visiting teams from Hong Kong, Indonesia, Malaysia and Singapore take part in the Club's Second Asian Mini Rugby Festival which will held at Bangkok Patana School on Saturday 25th February.

The Second Asian Regional Mini Rugby Tournament will be sponsored by DHL and Jardine Shipping Services and will again feature ESPN Star Sports TV Personality Justin "Sambo" Sampson who will be on hand to judge the best and fairest players in each age group plus present medals to each of the over 500 anticipated players. The event will be followed by an evening function on the back lawn of The British Club.

Based on performance at this tournament, three squads of 15 will be selected and invited to participate for Under 12, Under 14 and Under 16 year old age groups in a Youth Rugby Tournament hosted by the Hong Kong Rugby Colts Association. The tournament itself will be held the day before the Hong Kong Rugby Sevens and the players and coaches, along with we hope many accompanying parents and family members, will then enjoy one of world rugby's finest festivals at The Sevens.

The Tour to Hong Kong will comprise six days for 45 of the more senior players who will be accompanied by three teachers from Bangkok Patana School and three Lions coaches. Aside from the Youth Tournament and the Hong Kong 7's, it is intended that the tour will also feature perhaps other games with Hong Kong teams and a visit to Hong Kong Disneyland. The tour will be sponsored by Dhevatara Properties, Oil & Gas Professionals and Ben Line Agencies Thailand. In the lead up to the Hong Kong tour training will be held for all age groups, including those not directly involved in the tour, from 4th to 25th March.

The third season of the DHL Bangkok Lions will commence on Saturday 22nd April and will run for 12 consecutive weeks until 8th July. Following the mid year school break a further five weeks of coaching will be held from 2nd to 30th September once international schools have re-opened. The 2006 Season sponsors will again include DHL, Transpo Asian Tigers and Bangkok General Hospital as well as new sponsors Raimon Land, Manpower and VSL.

Squashy Bits

L had surmised that writing something about Tom Annas, our oldest playing - and only -Squash Section life-member, would be easy. Get a few stories of heroic deeds on the ball courts and playing fields, I thought, and some racy titbits of a soldier's life and I would have a nice spicy, humorous story to tell. But having taken b*ll sh*t from Tom for about 20 years on the squash courts I had no idea how frustratingly modest he would prove to be about his life achievements.

We sat down one day before Christmas over a few pots of Earl Grey tea and Tom gave me his story with Khun Rumphai in attendance. No, he wasn't going to give me any scope for frivolity or misrepresentation (don't blame him really!). He was meticulous in making sure I got the details right and dismissive of my attempts to dig up the dirt. But as we progressed I became more and more impressed with Tom's sincerity and life values. He is a deep thinker and was (is) clearly a great sportsman. He must have been a formidable opponent in his prime. And clearly he was a great soldier much appreciated by his peers. His personal life wasn't easy (he didn't really want to get into that) and he devoted his life to the Marines. "Tough but fair" someone apparently once described him. I'm sure he was. But he's obviously content with his lot today and enjoying the comradeship of his extended squashy life. It's a pleasure to know him better and to have him with us.

Themistocles Thomas Annas was born in Manhattan, New York City on 3rd October 1925. His parents and ancestors were Greek, his father arriving in the USA as a young man, his mother just 9 months old. His Dad was drafted into the army, served in WW1, and then worked with his brother in the family trade as a woodwork contractor fitting out stores in Manhattan. Young Tom attended De Witt Clinton High School

on the Bronx where he developed a passion for American football and enjoyed baseball and basketball.

Graduating from High School in 1943, Tom joined the Marine Corps and was sent off on active service for two years in the South Atlantic. At the end of WW2 he was on the security guard team that took charge of German prisoners captured from the last submarine allegedly carrying high-ranking Nazis to Argentina. He was discharged in February 1946, studied evenings at City College of New York, worked with his Dad and somehow found time to get married in 1947. This didn't really work out, but they had three kids two



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of whom have done exceptionally well professionally whilst the other served in Vietnam. Sport was always important and he won some "small honours" at football for his college and was selected for the Greek All-American team in 1946.

Tom was still "young enough to be patriotic" when he graduated from college in 1951 and enlisted again with the Marines. He underwent officer training in Quantico, Virginia after receiving a direct commission to 2nd Lieutenant. He then served with an engineer battalion at Camp Le Jeune, where he had his first company command. In December 1953 he was sent to Korea.

There was an armistice in effect and US troops were eyeballing the North Koreans to make sure they didn't do anything naughty. Tom's company had the task of "wiring all the bridges in case they started moving" ("No, the Koreans, not the bridges"!). It was bitterly cold, terrible conditions for engineering work. One of Tom's closest escapes came at night when, zipped up over his head in his sleeping bag, he suddenly woke up to find himself covered in soot, with his tent on fire. The sentry doused the fire with an extinguisher whilst the blackened Tom fled in his long johns. It was minus 17 degrees and Tom's only option was to shower under a 4" running

> mountain water pipe. No wonder he never complains about the British Club showers!

Tom's Dad died in 1954 aged 61. Tom managed to get home but his father was already in a coma from which he never recovered. After Korea he was sent to "Parris Island", South Carolina, then an island surrounded by sharks "just in case anyone felt like leaving".

<u>Souash</u>

This was one of those boot camps we are all familiar with in the movies, a "gruelling experience" during which recruits occasionally died during extreme tests of their stamina ... great character building for marathon 5-gamers with Dick Anwar later in life! But recruitment fell off, Tom's battalion was disbanded and he was reassigned to the much more reasonable responsibility for asphalt mixers on camp maintenance.

In 1958 Tom was sent back to Little Creek, Virginia, which he described as the "high point" of his learning curve. He was an instructor in amphibious operations, "learning more than his students". A highlight was being sent to Spain to train the

Spanish Marines. Tom played his last Football game at Little Creek and also played in the 10th Naval District Championship softball team. He was also playing handball in the all-Marine and the Washington area championships where he came up against national ranked players.

In 1960 Tom attended junior officers school at Quantico and after 9 months was sent to Okinawa, Japan, which was still under US control. Here he worked as an assistant logistics officer at the HQ of the combined operations of the Marines in the Far East. It was from here that he made his first visit to Thailand, covering operations in Laos, where he met his new wife to be, Khun Rumphai. Khun Rumphai was working in a gold shop. "Did Tom know much about jewellery Khun Rumphai?" I asked . . . "No, but I knew about people who worked in jewellery shops" Tom interrupted.

He retuned to Thailand in 1962 with an expeditionary unit at the request of the Thai Government, concerned about a possible incursion from Laos. Tom coordinated logistics between Bangkok and Udorn Thani. Sadly his

mother died of cancer that year. Tom reflected wistfully that officers were supposed to put their jobs above personal matters and she died before he could get back.

After 1962 Tom retuned to Quantico with the Marine Corps research development command where he was put in charge of an ammunition requirement study. Backed up by computer simulations of warfare at Stanford Research Institute, ammunition options were tested against different opponents under different conditions, producing a mix of recommended ammunition requirements for different battle scenarios. This is where we can assume Tom worked out the potency of firing a squash ball up the backside of any opponent threatening to take up position on the T.

Tom was then transferred to the Fleet Marine Forces HQ in the Pacific in Hawaii. He was assigned to the engineering section responsible for all military construction and facilities in the Pacific. A Major since 1962, he spent most of his time travelling to Vietnam and sometimes to Thailand. "Bangkok was an oasis in those days".

It was "like a village and people were not materialistic". "Taxi drivers would sometimes take passengers for free." Most of Tom's contacts were with the engineering community involved in military construction.

Tom, by now a Lieutenant Colonel, was sent to Vietnam in 1968, commander of an engineer battalion. I really couldn't get Tom to say too much but he was obviously in the thick of the action spending most of his time "trying to keep my ass nailed on"! His battalion took many losses but Tom is proud of the fact that they tried to help civilians by building small dams, schools and brick making facilities. His battalion's job was to build military bridges and sweep roads for landmines. "If you didn't find them with your minesweepers you would find them with your vehicles!" Tom was fired at "a few times" and narrowly escaped a mine laid for him but which his driver missed as he swerved to avoid a civilian.

By now Tom was "thinking more about life" and "re-examining his priorities". He returned to California in August 1969 and joined the 5th Marine Division as battalion commander of the 5th Engineers, which was deactivated four months later. Marines were now being pulled out of the war and Tom was reassigned as

Logistics Officer of the 5th Marine Brigade. Tom decided he wanted to retire. This was initially refused since it seems he had been such a dedicated Marine that no one really believed him. But his request was accepted a year later when his friends at HQ realised he was serious.

I asked Tom whether he felt more American than Greek. "Sure. I never felt Greek". But he grew up speaking the language with his family and recollected that in 1962 he was sent to Greece for a short period to train senior officers. He was pretty rusty but they asked to him to carry out the training in Greek and was obviously flattered that the trainees soon began to regard him as one of their own, talking about the Americans as "them".

Tom came to Thailand in August 1970 aged 45 to "start something". "The first 5 years were very difficult" trying to establish himself. He worked for an investment company for a couple of years and then formed his own company, Omni Capitol, with three friends. By 1974 he had had enough of that and went into market

research forming another company Martec doing market research, public relations, executive recruitment and special projects.

The famous knees saga began in 1968 when he had surgery on his left one and in 1983 it was the turn of his right one to go under the knife. After a holiday in the USA with Khun Rumphai and their two kids Constantine and Vanida, he worked as a consultant with Thai British Security Printers.

Tom joined the British Club as an Associate Member in July 1980. There were only 50 Associate slots in those days and they were at a premium as they rarely turned over. Tom was introduced to Charles Stewart and Arthur Phillips by David Frost and a shady deal was done.

In 1981, at the age of 56 Tom decided to join the squash league and came up against his toughest challenge yet ... *moi*! ... Jack Dunford ... squash ladder coordinator ... Sir! In spite of claims to being Thailand's number one racquetball player at Jusmag and Soi Khlang, there was no room for sentimentality. Tom had to start in

> Division 18 ... the bottom ... where he was consigned with the lady beginners! To be fair he never complained (well not more than 10 times a day) and diligently worked his way up, Division by Division, to Division 4 winning umpteen trophies in the process. "Who was your greatest victim Tom?" I asked. "Guess I whipped everyone!" was the typical Tom reply!

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Tom had one or two more jobs but when a teaching position was cut short by the economic collapse in 1997 he decided to retire permanently. These days he spends most of his time "shopping and visiting the hospital" where he has recently undergone major new surgery on both knees. "When are we going to see you back on court Tom?" "Well the doctor is 'waffling' but I hope to hit a few balls soon".

We hope so Tom, but no rush. As you say, the new knees are guaranteed for 20 years and you need to get your money's worth.


