



Capacity Building in Key Advocacy of the British Club Bangkok

IRST OF ALL, it is a great pleasure to introduce the new format, editorial approach and design of Outpost. It has taken some time to reinvent, and as Chairman and lead of communications issues, I take responsibility for that. During the first weeks of the year I was hospitalised with an on-going illness that will require surgery later in the year. This delayed my editorial and creative direction to the project, for which I unreservedly apologise.

I am in the process of enabling our great Club to sustainably publish its own magazine, a knowledge transfer step that not only will build capacity, but will mean that this magazine firmly serves the needs of the Club — first and foremost. The General Committee of the Club has taken this step in the firm belief that we, as an organisation, have reached a maturity whereby communications and marketing are not responsibilities to be disposed of, but embraced as key result areas. Over the years the advocacy and benefit messaging celebrating this Club largely remained within the boundaries of Silom 18. Only last year, after communications and marketing plans were formulated did additional copies of *Outpost* start to be systematically

distributed to subscribers outside the Club. It is perhaps no coincidence that in 2008, we addressed the membership slide for the first time in a number of years, we made a POSITIVE FIGURE in the membership column. Whilst membership challenges will intensify in 2009, we have the strategy and tools to meet them head on.

great mass media coverage of events at the club in 2009. Quinton Quayle, British Ambassador, has been a frequent visitor to the Club and it was therefore an honour and pleasure to invite him to open our new *GreenSet* tennis courts on January 24th. Our other honoured guest that day, perhaps Thailand's greatest ever athlete, Paradorn Srichaphan, was on hand to simply wow the 80 guests with his charm, wit and world famous smile. As one of the most favourite players on the ATP tennis tour, it is easy to see why he has become one of Thailand's leading ambassadors both on and off the court. The day was rather perfectly complemented by a wonderful intra-club competition between Thailand and Rest of the World; the first of a new programme of events organised by our sports manager and lead tennis professional. At the heart of the Club, these magnificent new facilities offer the club yet another unique selling proposition.



28TH STC INTERPORT

Member Clubs from around the south-east Asian region descended upon the British Club Bangkok in late November for the 28th STC Interport Balut Competition. This was the first time that the Interport had been held in Bangkok and was a fitting first event staged on the Club's new back lawn redevelopment



N 21st-22nd November, the British Club Bangkok hosted the annual Interport Balut tournament, at which Clubs from around the south-east Asian region compete, principally those from Singapore and Malaysia. This was the first time that the Interport had been held in Bangkok and therefore we were determined to put on a good show and ensure that our guests both enjoyed themselves and wished to return at some point in the future. It is pleasing to report that this was most definitely achieved.

BALUT SECTION

Under the guidance of Balut Section Chairman Phil Alexander, various Balut section members had been planning and preparing for this event since last March and it certainly all seemed to come together on the day. We were most fortunate that the weather was kind to us (the rains of the previous week did not return) and the PAD kindly agreed not to shut the airport until after most of our guests had returned to their home countries on the following Monday/Tuesday, although half-a-dozen Singaporeans did have an unexpectedly extended Bangkok holiday!

The welcome reception and Party on the Friday evening on the front lawn went off splendidly. The evening's guest of honour, Mr. Danny Pruce (Deputy Head of Mission at the British Embassy), was piped to the podium by the Club's Pipe Band and declared the Games Open. We then all enjoyed some excellent fare and Sanuk until the late hours — with the Pipe Band returning for a much-acclaimed encore.

On the Saturday morning final registrations were dealt with and fortunately almost all the pre-booked teams seemed to have arrived: there were a total of eleven Clubs represented, with a total of 32 Teams (each of four players). We had about 100 competitors from abroad (together with a number of supporters), mostly from Singapore but also from Sarawak, Sabah and Brunei. After an excellent lunch, play commenced shortly after 1:00 pm and the eight games were finished on schedule by 5:30. Strict discipline was imposed by 'Headmaster'/MC Roger Willbourn, who meted out appropriate pun-

ishment when necessary to those who transgressed and incurred his wrath. Thanks to David Quine's ground-breaking web-based scoring software, and the hard work of Khun Prem's team from the Accounts Department, we knew the final results within about half-an-hour of the finish, much to the amazement of the assembled Baluters, who had never seen such an efficient scoring system in the previous 27 years of the Interport's existence.

The final event of the Tournament was the dinner and prize-giving in the evening, at which it became apparent that the British Club as hosts had done rather well....with our Members winning the Highest Individual Score, the Highest 'Doubles' Score and having the second Team overall out of the 32 competing. However, we didn't all cover ourselves in glory, as British Club Team One also achieved the Lowest Team Score overall! The Winning Team was the single entry from The Royal Brunei Yacht Club, which had 'borrowed' a couple of British Club members, since only two players were able to come from Brunei - so one could say that our Club achieved 50% of the first place as well. An additional 'trophy' presentation was made to Paul Cheesman, whose unflagging hard work over the previous nine months ensured that the Tournament was an outstanding success, as opposed to only a conventional success. CLUB SPOTLIGHT

A new column developed to keep you in touch with news from inside the Club, including amongst other things staff rewards, workings of the General Committee, and musings from amongst the membership.

GC MINUTES

I am often asked questions about General Committee meetings, i.e. what do we "get up to" during our formal monthly meetings. Basically the answer to this question is that we review the overall affairs of the Club from a tactical, strategic, policy-making standpoint. Yes, there are some operational areas to manage, and authorisations to give to our CEO. However, I have tried to move away from as many of the operational aspects of Club management as possible, entrusting them with our professional staff. The minutes of GC meetings can be reviewed in the Minutes Book at the Club. Salient points of the minutes are posted on the Club notice board once full minutes have been approved.

AGM 2009

By now all members will have received the pre-calling notice for the March 17 AGM. As with most AGMs, there are a number of key issues to review and a new GC to elect. On the latter point, much is often written in the run-up to the election, asking for member participation in, what is essentially, the management of the Club. This year is probably no different, with one important provision. I firmly believe that we need to change our Constitution to elect GC members to the committee for at least a two-year term, possibly longer for members of the Executive Committee (who are elected by the Chairman). Best practices in committee-run organisations is an important concept, the benchmark for committee tenures is, I venture, two years, if not three. The beneficial effects on the Club will be several-fold. We have not had a competitive election for committee seats since the infamous, and most welcome, AGM held at the Narai Hotel. The number of candidates available for election - willing, able and qualified to stand - is not increasing. The way to address this problem is not by RESERVING THE RIGHT to remove a committee year-on-year, it is in changing the structure of the decision making process itself. By staggering the terms of elected members, five GC seats will become available each year, hopefully prompting solid competition for these seats. Candidates will be required to disclose their "platform" for election, which I believe should be their area of experience, expertise or specialisation. I firmly advocate differentiating the roles of the 10 GC seats, from "general" operational oversight roles to strategic policy platforms that are facilitated by senior or functional managers within the Club. This way there is a synergistic approach between professional staff and elected members with responsibilities and accountabilities for key areas within the Club being firmly understood.

STAFF AWARDS

A final note for this month, the GC voted in November 2008 to extend the staff rewards to a monthly frequency. Award winners will appear in the *Outpost* FACES feature from next issue.

DEVELOPMENT — REVISITED

New Perspectives on The Churchill and Verandah

PETER HARPER was recently commissioned to offer new designs for our cherished Club facilities and talks about his design concepts and what they will bring to members

Plan and creating the original ideas for The Verandah and Churchill Bar, and seeing with some considerable dismay the current results, I was very pleased to be asked to work with the British Club once again to produce new concept designs. I think GOOD DESIGN for the British Club is about creating a range of places and experiences to make all members happy, from the very young to the older members.

THE VERANDAH

The name evokes it all, sitting by the Verandah looking out over the lovely back lawn—cricket, a place for family, friends and children—from breakfast through lunch, to dinner. Light nutritious cuisine with a light natural interior.

The Verandah — for me — BRINGING BACK THE FEELING OF THE OLD CHURCH-ILL BAR. The bar located to the left, displaying wines, member bottles, and boutique beers. Near the bar frame, on the wall, a discrete high definition TV with bar height tables and chairs for people to sit.

Bring back those lovely sofa seating groups, natural rattan, cushions in soft greens and creams; bring the garden inside. Create a quiet place to the right gallery area at floor level; create a window niche, good to sit by and look out to the garden, with lovely watercolour originals on the wall. In the evening, soft lighting side table lights with classical music in the background.


In the conservatory, open the windows to the floor with timber framing. Create two lounging seating groups and a Sunday dining niche all looking out onto the beautiful garden.

A concealed door leads to the kitchens behind, with the floor on the same level as the Churchill Bar, making access easier for all. Reuse existing equipment where we can, re-energise and refurbish, make more with less.


CHURCHILL BAR


Churchill, the giant of a man....create a bar in his image and quintessentially British – strong, classic and urban. Build the bar on the same level as the foyer and


with a concealed door to The Verandah for easy access for staff. Build the floor at a lower level in solid stained hardwood, with a central carpet runner in a rich warm colour. Create an original Churchill's curved bar, solid timber top, rich dark colour to allow you to sit with all your friends on comfortable refurbished

Peter Harper presented these drawings to the General Committee back in November 2008. Whilst looking at them (Figures 1-3) one can appreciate:

- The great usage of space in both the former Churchill Bar and the proposed Verandah, especially the latter where seating would be increased by 30 pax on current covers;
- How many different environments have been created in the new facility, creating many ambience choices for all;
- How a new Verandah could effectively provide a fitting gateway to our new back lawn.

chairs and to easily see three framed TVs. Provide easy staff access either end with a concealed fire exit door in the rear wall and rich timber panelling. For the big matches provide a pull down projection screen on the end wall. Create a rich warm panelled wall behind the bar and ceiling with glowing bottle niches in classic English rose colour. Refurbish the existing furniture, stain in a dark colour, with new classic dark brown leather.

Original large format oils of Churchill adorn the walls — an audience with the great man himself. To the inside

entrance wall, display the BC heraldic memorabilia. Plan the space classically, provide island bar tables for groups of friends to mingle and create a unique corner space for *The Spoofers*. Lighting is classic and concealed, glowing together with classic pendants. Windows are framed in dark timber Venetians, a classic warm Victorian colour scheme.

THE PROCESS

Develop the concept with careful documentation, integration of services, lighting. Work with a quality contractor, fabrication offsite, minimum loss of business and build the two projects quickly to exceed the members' expectations.

Finally, add in the wonderful British Club community! The Churchill and The Verandah – from morning to late – with members and friends quickly returning the investment and helping restore the BC to its rightful position as the premier place to meet, dine and drink in Bangkok.





ANGKOR BALLOON RIDE


The next day we were once again on the road at 9am and headed off for the Angkor Air Balloon. All members were brave enough for the flight and we man-



CHRISTMAS PARTY & MIX-IN



HUA HIN







JACK DUNFORD takes advantage of a quiet spell on the "Squashy" front to meet old friends and research the Club's squash trophies...

t is still early January as I write this and most squashies are just getting back into action after the holidays. The weather is gorgeous, one of the nicest cool seasons in memory. The Club is looking splendid and it has been a pleasure to welcome back old friends passing through as they do this time of year. Prominent amongst these were Val and Tony Austin (pictured) who visit us as regularly as the Siberian water-fowl. Tony Austin, as in Tony Austin Cup, the annual open squash tournament played by the over-45s and won last year by Ja.

TONY AUSTIN CUP

When I started writing Squashy Bits few years ago I started a series of articles recording the origins of the various trophies we play for and the people behind them. So here was the chance to add another. I sat down with them one lovely sunny morning to get the basics, Val as usual wrapped in "The World's Biggest Book of Sudoku Puzzles," and Tony surfing his laptop...with two pairs of spectacles perched on his nose. (His mother always warned him!)

Tony first came to the Club in 1979 working with Dale in the power generation business and lived in Bangkok with Val from 1982 to 1992. He was yet another larger-than-life, no-nonsense, but likeable Yorkshireman from Scarborough, neighbour and workmate of Harold Mercer in whose memory the Harold Scarborough.

rold Mercer trophy was donated. Tony was a regular and enthusiastic squashy and part of the life and sole of the section during his time with us.

In 1991, before leaving Bangkok, Tony donated the Tony Austin Cup, getting the idea from RBSC where they also had a trophy for age-challenged squashies. Although it seems that most of the BC squash members are now over 45, the competition still has a certain dignity about it by excluding the younger riff-raff.

Don Johnston

One of the most difficult trophies to research was the Don Johston Cup; the Club's oldest squash trophy for the Club Championship. It took several editions of Outpost and input from members to dig up that Don was basically a good bloke and modest squash player who worked with New Zealand Insurance. By accident I recently came across an article in February 1982 Outpost with an extract of a letter from Don, dated 8th July 1980:

"Very briefly, whilst I was in Thailand from 1961 to 1966 there was in fact no squash at the British Club, all the squash was played at the RBSC and the British Club was in fact a very much smaller operation, which I had the pleasure of overseeing as Secretary for two years of my stay in Bangkok. Very briefly, efforts were made to extend the British Club during 1965/66 when in fact the swimming pool and squash court were built. When I left Bangkok in October 1966 the squash court had not been completed. We provided the contractor with the full measurements of the squash court and when it was built it was found a little strange. On checking it was found that the contractor, without reference I anybody, had built the squash courts according to American dimensions. However this was duly rectified, but unfortunately, not before I left Thailand. However, in order to encourage

squash at the club, I had taken the opportunity to donate the trophy just before I left. I am very pleased to see that it has gone from strength to strength and that there is obviously some keen competition for the cup. Whist I was I Bangkok I was Secretary of the squash section of RBSC but with regards to my prowess again this was somewhat limited and I should think there were about 20 players could give me five or six points a set and still come out winners. However it was really the enjoyment of the game and the friends that I made whilst in Bangkok through the squash section that gave me my love of the game".



VALENTINE FORTUNE COOKIE PINS

You can easily make these adorable fortune cookie pins with a special message inside for Valentine's Day. These make a great gift for teachers, friends and family as well!

What You Need

- Pink & Red Craft Foam or Circle Foamies
- Jewellery Craft Pin
- Low Temp Glue Gun
- Paper
- Scissors
- Package in a Chinese Food Container

What you do

Cut a 2-3/4" circle out of craft foam. rold in half and put a dab of hot glue to hold it together. Put your thumb in one end and your middle finger in the other end. Pinch together, using your index finger to push in the centre. Put a dab of hot glue where the foam comes together so the cookie keeps its shape. Make up tags or fortunes and glue one end inside the cookie. Hot-glue on a pin.

COOKIES

It wouldn't be Valentine's Day without Conversation Hearts. We've created a way to express your feelings in a BIG way by making these conversation heart cookies. Don't hold back...show your Valentine how you really feel!

What you need for cookies:

I roll of refrigerated sugar cookie mix or your favourite sugar cookie recipe (OR pre-baked or bought cookies will do). Heart-shaped cookie cutter

What you need for icing:

- Red, yellow, green, blue and purple paste food colouring
- 4 cups powdered sugar
- 4 TBSP water

Roll out chilled dough on a lightly floured surface to a 3/8-inch thickness. Cut out hearts and bake as per directed on the package or follow the directions in the recipe below. Cool completely before icing.

Decorating Cookies

Mix the powdered sugar and water in a bowl until smooth; adding more water, if needed, a few drops at a time. Divide into 6 bowls for pink, yellow, green, blue & purple and leaving one bowl to colour red - it will be used to write the words on the cookies. Colour the icing using the paste food colouring. **Tip you only need just a dab of the food colouring to get a light pastel colour for the cookies but you will need to use slightly more red for a nice, deep red writing colour. Ice cookies following the outline of each heart, stopping short of the edge of the cookie.

Add the red icing to a plastic baggie. Push the icing into one corner of the baggie. Snip off the very end point to make an icing bag. Print Valentine's Day words and sayings onto the cookies. (Refer to the cookies in the picture above for ideas).

SALT DOUGH LIPS PIN

Salt dough is such a fun medium. So many cute things can be made from salt dough and a little craft paint. Try these cute little lips on for size! Make them from a heart cookie cutter and little manipulation, glue a pin on the back and you're done! Hint: This is a very fun gift to give to teachers!

You will need:

- I cup salt
- 2 cups all purpose flour
- I cup water
- Red acrylic paint
- Pink glitter glue
- Paintbrush
- Heart shaped cookie cutter
- Toothpick
- Pin back
- White craft glue or hot glue



IMPORTANT NOTE: This recipe for salt dough makes a lot of projects. If you only plan on making a few, cut this recipe into fourths or in half.

These forms will also be distributed to members along with the Official Notice.
