Hope to see you all around the Club soon and look forward to a postbag full of replies from the Children (ages 0 -16 or older if you wish!).



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
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New Members








Grandstand view of the Match of the Sunday

Come see Paradise



When my husband said to me "We're going away for a long weekend - on our own - you choose the place" it was enough of a surprise already! Usually it's me who says "we need to get out of here for a few days, let's go to Jomtien". So I phoned Expat Travel, asked them to send me some brochures of romantic hide-aways, anywhere in or around Thailand. Ever helpful they did, I received brochures ranging from Hua Hin to Lankawi. My eye fell immediately upon a brochure which had a drawing of a lovely place on it in Koh Samui.

Do you remember in the UK, when you book a holiday to the Costa del Sol, make sure the brochure always has photographs of the hotel, as a drawing quite often means that the hotel has not been built yet.



The date came along soon enough, John arrived from Hong Kong to look after the office, Nicole went to stay at Olivia's and James went to Kieran for the weekend and we set off to Don Muang airport.


We checked in, and we were asked if we wanted to go on the earlier flight as we were just in time to catch that. So we arrived one hour early in Samui, which left us without transport, but Mai Pen Rai, the hotel's mini bus just happened to be there anyway, so in we popped and off we went.

After a forty minute drive along the coastal roads of Samui the driver turned off and went right though a coconut plantation, down a little sandy road and towards the beach. We thought he might have made a mistake but there was the first sign : A perfect lunch, like a Gauguin painting - Vogue.)

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The bus was parked, we got out and we welcomed by David, the owner, who sat us down and offered us a welcome drink. A delicious fruit drink arrived, I could taste banana, papaya, pineapple, orange it seemed all the fruits were blended together to a wonderful concoction. After a chat with David, who

told us he had owned the hotel for over 10 years and lived there as well, he suggested he'd show us round the




place. We looked at the pool, which in turn overlooked the sea, saw the 'basic' bungalows, which are the usual Thai thatched cottages with woven bamboo walls. These are non airconditioned, and not screened, so you sleep under a mosquito net. The next accommodation up is the same cottage but this time with aircon, all cottages have an attic so you can bring the children who can then climb upon the ladder at night and sleep under the rafters.

As this was the room we booked as David said, of course it was available, but should we feel adventurous, he'd just show us the more upmarket rooms.

We climbed up the hill, past some more rooms, some lovely shrubs and trees and admired the view over the bays all ready made for private beach lounging and the blue, blue sea and arrived right on top of the hill at the Kho Tan suite. (I am actually not sure about the name but it sounds good doesn't it?) As the brochure says: "A breathtaking entrance atrium leads onto a beautifully furnished lunge with a full length balcony offering stunning views over the Southern isles to the mainland 30 miles away."

No aircon, but large ceiling fans and windows all round already allowed a cool breeze to waft through the room. A bathroom, with bath, two wash basins and a bidet (oh, luxury) finished it all. The mini bar is a cool box on the balcony which is replenished every day with fresh ice and drinks of our choice.

So, no question for us of course we were adventurous and we upgraded ourselves on the spot and ordered breakfast in the room. Well I had breakfast and Joe had lunch. We'd barely looked around the room, admired the view and opened the shutters or the waiters arrived with a delicious looking egg concoction and Joe's fresh Thai Tuna fish salad. A pot of tea to British taste and fresh milk made our day!

Breakfast is served in the room or in the restaurant. In fact, whatever you wish for is there. Want some souvenirs, tell David and he'll get them for you. There is an art exhibition on in the Gallery, there is a library with enough books and magazines (ranging from romance to spy thrillers and fashion to computers) so don't bring any. In the meantime, we'd unpacked our bags, put on fashionable swim-wear, got our towels, sun tan lotion, books (we did not know about the library) and took a stroll to the beach.

Two deck chairs we conveniently places in the bay near our room, so we plonked ourselves down and relaxed. At around 3pm the waiter came along with a cocktail. Joe had organised that. A Pimms that any establishment could be jealous of! A large wide rimmed glass, with fruit of every description hanging on it looked more like a fruit salad than the usual BC Pimms with stick of cucumber in it and the Pina Colada was just the right creamy coconutty drink it should be. The waiter also carried the menu for dinner, there were 3 or 4 choices for all courses and the price ranged between 175 and 250 Baht.

We ordered dinner for 8pm and went to sleep.


Breakfast, lunch and dinner each day (we stayed for 3 1/2 days) were scrumptious every time, as the menu was ever changing so no chance to get bored, service was excellent. We almost felt like royalty, never signing a bill,

David actually wrote a book (joke) about the hotel and what/where and how things work in it. It describes the staff system, all the staff are Thai and have been working there a long time. The concierge/manager speaks excellent English and always seems to be around to take your orders. The general advise is to forget all about worldly goods, lock your papers and wallet up in the safe and only look at your bill at breakfast time to check it. Want to take a midnight stroll with the romantic wife/husband/lover? Tell David and he will arrange chairs, blankets and a bottle of bubbly in a strategic place. Want to rent a jeep, mountain bike, canoe, snorkling equipment! Ask David and they are readily available from the hotel. Dinner is served on the terrace in front of the restaurant

between 7 and 10pm. A different menu is available every day for lunch and dinner with locally purchased produce, so whatever is freshly available on the markets and from local fishermen is cooked up for you in the kitchen.








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Come see Paradise

The following is not meant to be an in depth look at the Law and Crime but an introduction to a subject which all people think they know but don't. It is a lighthearted attempt to introduce the concept of law (United Kingdom), the Law is changing all the time and I apologise already for any inconsistencies detailed herein and for the sake of any American lawyers reading this, already state, that any misrepresentation is innocent and is one made honestly, and with reasonable grounds for believing in its truth. This hopefully will avoid any complex litigation. I also take this opportunity to apologise for any syntax, grammar, spelling or incorrect usahe of the English language since I am not a writer by profession or inclination and seem to remember getting a Grade 'F' (just passing for my 'O' level English language examination.

There are many definitions of law from the jaundiced :for the obeyance of fools and the guidance of wise men" and it was defined by the lawyer Blackstone as "a rule of action prescribed or dictated by some superior which an inferior is bound to obey". It has also been defined as "Law is a body of rules for the guidance of human conduct which are imposed upon, and enforced among, the citizens of a given state", also it has been defined as "a rule of action to which men are bound to make their conduct conform".

It can clearly be seen that the law by definition is open to interpretation (depending on which side of it you stand and of course in accordance with the interpretation act 1978) and can be used and manipulated for the good or the opposite of the citizens of the country to which it is applied and always to the benefit of the lawyers.

The word "law" implies obedience, the word law also implies penealty or sanction - namely, that if a law is broken some punishment ought to fall on the breaker so as to prevent a repetition of the breach and to deter others from doing likewise. So firstly laws are imposed upon the citizens of a given state and secondly the laws must be enforced, without enforcement of the law there is no law. There are several elements of enforcement. First, the criminal laws must be policed by a body of police (usually a civil force which maintains public order) officers with the powers of arrest. The police at one time prosecuted offenders but in 1985 the Prosecution of Offences Act set up a Crown Prosecution Service and charged it with the duty of prosecuting offenders. This removed from the Police service the duty of determining who should be prosecuted. The head of this service is the Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP).

Laws apply only within the boundaries of nation states and the law apply within the territory of the state to all citizens and non citizens alike, who are resident there, for however short a period. There are h, howeverm (as always) exemptions from Liability for crime, which will be covered later. This article in priciple will cover the law from the aspect of criminal law since the other areas of law are numerous ad worth individual articles. The law covers many aspects including, but not limited to, Municipal Law, Public Law, Constitutional law, Criminal Law, Administrative Law, Community Law, International Law, Private Law, Law of Property, Law of Contract, Law of Torts (the law of civil wronhs, which are actionalble at the suit of the aggrieved party), law of succession, Law of Trust, European Community law etc, etc. A real lawyers paradise.

It used to be nice and simple, the law was composed of two kinds:

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1. Common Law

Which was (and still is) made of of those general ustoms which have been regarded as laws of the land from time immemorial (which is by the way AD1189). By general agreement endorsed by the practice of the courts certain rules of conduct have by custom become laws and these laws are known as common law for example affray (An affray is the offence committed by 2 or more people fighting together to the terror of the Queen's subjects) and conspiracy (is the crime committed when 2 or more persons combine together to execute some act for the purpose of injuring some other person or the public).

It is much easier and simpler (perhaps) to create laws by written statute or order of the ruling authority, but it is still possible to deal with an act tending to the prejudice of the community, not especially provided by the law, by bringing the offender before a judge and jury, who, by convicting him, will therefore create another common law offence.

2. THE STATUTE LAW

Which includes all the laws made by direct order of the state and set out in Acts of Parliament or Statutes. Acts of parliament alone can overthrow custom, the decision of judges, earlier acts of parliament etc. Its most common use is to codify and tidy up the law which has become excessively complicated and contradictory.

Such a law, in the form of a bill, is usually (but not exclusively) proposed in the House of Commons. It is there discussed and amended (if necessary(and then approved it has to pass in the same manner through the House of Lords before being presented to the Sovereign for Assent. When the Bill has received the Royal Assent it becomes a Statute or Act of Parliament. Many Offences which were originally common law Offences have been dealt with by Act of Parliament, hence an offence may be both a common law and statutiory offence.

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Crime has been defined as "an act of disobedience of the law forbidden under pain of punishment". Punishment in this criminal sense may be death or loss of liberty (custodial sentence) or (and) money penalty (fine). There is however another kind of "disobedience" of law called "civil injury", in general ("all generalisations are dangeous including this one") crime affects the community at large, while the effect of a civil injury is usually restricted to the injured person or persons. The criminal law is intended to secure public peace and order, the object of criminal proceedings is punishment, but in civil proceedings the persons whose rights have been interfered with will take action to obtain compensation or damages. So the litmus test of crime is - whether the particular act or conduct is a crime if it is punishable by the criminal law - therefore any act or conduct punsihable by criminal law is a crime and, on conviction of the crime, the wrong doer is entitled to the title "Criminal". The state of mind also affects the definition of the crime, for example when a person does an act of his own free will he is said to do it willfullym if an act is not freely willed by the doer, it is said to be involuntary. It is interesting to note that you can commit an offence by neglecting to take action, if an act which should have been done by law, is not done, it is called omission.

Proof of criminal intent, a court or jury in determining whether a person has committed an offence shall decide whether he did intend or foresee that result, by reference to all the evidence, drawing such inference from the evidence as appears proper in the circumstances.

Motive - the motive for the crime is the condition of mind which leads the criminal to commit the crime, motive is not intention, for a persons intention is connected to the results of a concequence of the act he intends to do. Fo example, a persons intention might be to go to a petrol station, his motive is to het petrol. In a robbery the motive is (usually) need of monmey and the intention is to take money from his victim. Motive from the police point of view is important, it is part of the big three (Means, Motive and Opportunity).

Crime can be arrange in two groups.

1. Indictable Offences, which are serious breaches of the criminal law and for which an indictment (accuse by legal process on a written charge) lies which is a charge triable by a judge and jury.

2. Sumamry Offences - which are less serious and are triable by justices without a jury and termed non-indictable.

Indictable Offences - at one time the more serious indictable Offences (e.g. trason, murder, rape and arson) were called felonies (still so called by our American cousins) whiereas the less serious (e.g. assault, bribery, perjury etc.) were classified as misdemeanors. In the United Kindon the distinctions between the folny and the misdemenour were abolished in 1967.

It used to be very important for a police office to know the distinctions, for he must know if the breach of the law is an arrestable offence, a police officer had no power to arrest without a warrant in the case of a misdemenour unless it was a) an arrestable offence b) a breach of the peace committed in his presence or c) some particular statuta had given hum power of arrest for that particular offence. With regards to a summary offence, he would have no power to arrest without a warrant.

In the "Good Old Dyas" (perhaps my leaning to the right is showing though a little here) punishments for crime included death by various painful methods, disemboweling, emasculation, quatering, tortue, transportation (again an interesting fact is England only started trasnporting prisoners to Australia after the loss of the American colonies, prior to this North America was the destination of England's unwanted criminals) loss of property, imprisonment and fines but as time went on most of these penalties fell into disuse. The Criminal Justice Act 1948 abolished penal servitude, imprisonment iwht hard labour, whipping and corporal punsihment. The law (to the best of my knowledge) still allows the sentence of death on conviciton of trason, pircay with violence, and certain naval and military Offences,

Other forms of "punishment" were introduced, for example binding over to keep the peace and (or) to be of good behaviour, put on probation, discharged absolutely or condinitionally and suspended sentences (for a long time I thought this was hanging).

Hong Kong here we come!

For any of you who are visiting Hong Kong end of March for the Hong Kong 7's and or 10's here follows a handy guide .

Hong Kong is a bustling, vibrant city, renowned for its hard work, play hard ethic and its enterprising entrepreneurial spirit. Its most valuable asset is its deep-water harbour which steadily buzzes with luxury liners, container ships, sampans and pleasure yachts.


In Cantonese, Hong Kong (heung kong) means 'fragrant harbour', the original name of a precolonial fishing port near Aberdeen. The area was also known for producing incense, a truly fragrant commodity. Kowloon, kow lung in Cantonese, means 'nine dragons' and derives from an ancient Chinese believe that mountains are inhabited by dragons. Kowloon has eight peaks, the ninth being named after the boy emperor Ping, who because of his regal status, was also believed to be a dragon.

The territory of Hong Kong extends well beyond Hong Kong Islands and includes the Kowloon Peninsula, the New Territories and 235 outlying islands.

Much of the 1,070 km is mountainous, while the low-lying areas are used for housing, farming and industry. Of Hong Kong's 5.8 million inhabitants, 2.2 million live in the largely agricultural New Territories.

The outlying islands know as the 'other face' of Hong Kong, have a tranquil beauty with little traffic, unspoilt wilderness and traditional farms and fishing villages.


Hong Kong is a vibrant mix of East and West, old and new, where the abacus is almost as prevalent as



the pocket calculator and high tech architecture soars above ancient temples. There is so much to see here, with fascinating Chinese traditions and festivals, excellent shopping, restaurants, and nightlife, that the Hong Kong Tourist Association incites you to stay and extra day.

Like Bangkok one can find literally thousands of eating places in Hong Kong, from streetside dai pai dong stalls to European dining salons, all of which are packed for breakfast, lunch and dinner. At weekends, and particularly for dim sum lunch, restaurants often have long queues waiting for tables. Dining out for Hong Kongers is a regular social event, involving convivial groups of families and friends enjoying a meal together and exchanging gossip. There is even a Cantonese greeting which loosely translates into "Have you had your rice today?" 0

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Cantonese - Most Hong Kong residents originate from China's Guangdong (Canton) province hence the most popular cuisine is Cantonese. The basic cooking method involves bringing out the food's natural flavours. Seafood, river fish, pork, beef and vegetables are brought in from Guangdong (Canton) province every day, to be freshly cooked and served in the territory's many Cantonese restaurants. Yum the Cantonese word for fish, is similar in sound to the word for 'prosperity', making the fish dish a virtual necessity at any Cantonese meal. Popular fish is widely available in Hong Kong includes garoupa, pomfret, red mullet, sole and bream. As prices are seasonal, check the cost before ordering.

Dim Sum - the dim sum tradition, which is uniquely Cantonese, dates back to the 10th century and literally means "to touch the heart", although these days it is loosely translated as "light snacks". Dim sum forms an integral part of the yum cha or "drink tea" meals, where tea is taken throughout the meal. Dim sum dishes feature small, bite-sized morsels of chopped meat, seafood and vegetables wrapped in a wafer-thin coating of pastry or dough and then either steamed, braised, fried or boiled.

Chiu Chow cuisine originates in the port of Swatow in eastern Guangdong Province, and with Guangzhou (Canton) being the local capital it is not surprising that the food has a distinct Cantonese influence, with Fukienese flavours adding a heavier texture.

Hong Kong here we come!

Typical menu items include thick shark's fin soup, sliced goose in soy sauce, and fried chicken with cheunjew sauce. Dubbed the Sicilians of China, the Chiu Chow people enjoy eating late and their restaurants stay open until the small hours, some say on account of the strength of the tea!

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
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Hakka, the peripatetic Hakkas, originally from China, often carried their food with them. Much was salted down. Innards were also extensively used. Highly recommended items are baked salt chicken, pork with preserved cabbage and steamed bean curd stuffed with minced shrimp.

Hunan vies with Schezuan province for the honour of having the spiciest of Chinese regional cuisines. The province's most famous national, Mao Tse-tung, said that the more chillies you ate the more



revolutionary you were, which gives some indication of the fieriness of this culinary style. Hunan specialities include consommé with mashed pigeon, chicken broth with dried scallops, duck tongues served with mustard sauce and fish coated with preserved bean paste. For a very hot dish try the fried chicken with chilli.

Peking duck, which originated in the Imperial capital of Peking, is a feast fit for Emperors. The duck is airdried, basted with a soy-based glaze an then roasted. When this is ready, the bird is ceremonially carved at the table. Diners place slivers of meat, finely cut cucumber, spring onion and a dab of sweetish plum sauce on wafer-thin pancakes, which are then rolled and eaten.


Another popular dish, beggar's chicken, should be ordered when making the dinner reservations. A whole chicken is stuffed with mushrooms, cabbage, herbs and onions, wrapped in lotus leaves, sealed in clay and baked. The hardened clay is then struck with a mallet, releasing the aromas.

Shanghai - like New York, Shanghai does not really have a cuisine of it own but successfully refines the foods of lots surrounding provinces. Steamed dumplings filled with meat, eels cooked in wine with great chunks of garlic, sautéed freshwater shrimps and noodles are just some typical Shanghai menu items.

The best Shanghai speciality is the freshwater hairy crab. Harvested during the autumn breeding season, these are trussed in green straw and flown to Hong Kong, where they are eagerly consumed.

Schezuan, this is the spiciest of all the Chinese cuisines, although Huanese cooking also makes that claim. Common flavours include garlic, fennel, coriander, star anise, chilli and black pepper. Simmering and smoking are common cooking methods. Sizzling chillied prawns and eggplant braised with garlic, chilli and soy sauce, and smoked duck are popular Schezuan dishes.

Taiwanese food is full-flavoured much like Chiu



Chow cuisine which also originates from a coastal region. The Taiwanese enjoy fish and other seafoods which are cooked in hotpots and enhanced by chilli and sesame flavoured oil condiments.

Of course when you have tested all of the above there are Asian, Indian, Indonesian, Japanese, Korean, Vietnamese, Malaysian, Western, and in case you feel homesick, Thai restaurants all over Hong Kong.

In Hong Kong you can travel by ferry, MRT (Underground), train, tram, Peak tram, bus, minibus, maxi-cab and even helicopters!





Heaven knows what the traffic will be like in this area once work starts on Silom and Surawong roads for the elevated mass transit system, so please allow good time to get to the Club for this important meeting. please also bring your cheque books because, as a reminder, Club rules are that those with accounts outstanding cannot vote.

Change of dialing codes in the UK

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A new system of dialing codes was introduced in the UK on 1 August 1994. The new numbers have been running in parallel with the old numbers from that time, so the change has not been obvious to users. However, at 01.00am British Summer Time on 16th April 1995, the old numbers will be discontinued and only the new numbers will connect to the subscriber. The old codes will connect to recorded messages notifying you of the change - but still costing you the expense of a wasted call to the UK.

There are three elements to the changes:

1. All UK geographic area codes (including London) will be changed to include the additional digit "1" in front of the existing code. Non geographic codes, such as mobile networks and some paging services, will not have their codes changed.

2. The cities of Leeds, Sheffield, Nottingham, Leicester and Bristol will have completely new codes and all numbers will have an added digit as follows:

Leeds code was 532 and will 113-2-xxxx Sheffield code was 742 abd will be 114-2-xxxx Nottingham code was 602 and will be 115-9-xxxx Leicester code was 533 and will be 116-2-xxxx Bristol code was 272 and will be 117-9-xxxx

3. The international access code for the UK will change from 010 to 00 - in line with European Community standards (1). However, in Thaialnd we have been using 00 as the prefix code for some time already.

To give some examples of the changes:

1. To dial a new number, using an inner London code as an example, when you call from Thailand you now dial:

00144-71-xxx xxxxx

With the need system you will need to dial:

00144-1-71-xxx xxxx

2. To give another example should you wish to call a Bristol number after 16 April you would need to dial:

00144-1-117-9-xxxx

Titbits

Traditional Kedgeree

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Serves: Preparation: 30 minutes, Cooking: 30-40 minutes

450 g (1 lb) smoked haddock, cooked, skinned and flaked 225 g (8 oz) long grain rice, cooked 3 hard boiled eggs, shelled and roughly chopped 2 tablespoons freshly chopped parsley 2 teaspoons lemon juice pinch of grated nutmeg pinch of cayenne pepper salt and freshly ground black pepper 150 ml (1 oz) butter fresh parsley sprigs, to garnish



1. Place the fish, rice, eggs, parsley, lemon juice, spices and seasoning in a large bowl. Pour in the cream and mix through gently.

2. Transfer the kedgeree to a buttered, shallow, ovenproof dish. Dot with the remaining butter.

3. Cover and cook in a pre-heated oven (180° C/350° F/ Gas Mark 4) for 30-40 minutes, until heated through. Serve hot, garnished with fresh parsley sprigs.


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
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Extra Childrens Corner



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
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
