



JOURNAL A Chance to "Get Past No"

HE NEW CLUB YEAR is nearly upon us, March 17 marks the date of our Annual General Meeting and the annual "reinvention" of the Club. It will be most welcome if many members put their names forward to volunteer their time in shaping the decisions that contribute towards the operations, strategy, and policies of the Club — the more the better. It will also be a big plus to the Club's stakeholder relations, if those that wish to play no part in the Club's decision-making process, take a constructive role in the consultative processes that have been established and open to all this year.

I have worked with GC colleagues to create channels of communication whereby members can consult on key issues. The first is, naturally enough, development. The Development Special Interest Group (DSIG) was created to facilitate a change in the development decision-making process, but also provide an appropriate communications channel so that all members can sit with qualified volunteers from the field, and debate issues in a friendly, small group environment. In the last few months, the DSIG has worked with Peter Harper to develop some

visions of improved Churchill and Verandah facilities. As reported in the last issue of *Outpost*, and more specifically in the *Announcer* newsletter, these are nothing more than conceptual designs. At this early stage they are ABSOLUTELY NOT anything resembling a proposal to the membership. They are merely branching points for further discussion on a subject that has no "silver bullet" solution.

At the last DSIG meeting, 12 members met with three officers and talked candidly on the designs, their possible finalisation, costs, contractors, and the process that will need to be followed so that eventually members may vote at an EGM to approve any such rehabilitation projects. This was no village hall type meeting, no angry mob venting their anger; just a focus group type discussion, mod-

erated by a Chairman and officers who have both a profound love of the Club, and wealth of experience and expertise in the field. This is the way to contribute to objective, principle-based discussion within the Club. The ill-informed, subjective expressions commonly circulated are becoming rather jaded and irrelevant — they serve only to erode credibility and create divisiveness within the Club. Moving from confrontation to cooperation is the way in which we, as an organisation, can "get past no" and move into an era of proactivity over procrastination.

At the end of February I had the great honour of presiding over our annual 20-year members gathering. This was the British Club Bangkok at its best, the Club community together enjoying the first class food and facilities. I warmly encourage all those not familiar with the Club to join us, even just for a trial weekend, to discover what so many have enjoyed for decades.

TheatreWorks dinner theatre production of Gilbert & Sullivan's zany comic opera at the BRITISH CLUB BANGKOK

MIKADO







HE MIKADO is one of the bestknown and loved of Gilbert & Sullivan's collaborations. Although the operetta was inspired by, and purports to portray, Japanese culture, style and government, it actually draws on the Victorian and Gilbert's own (and mostly imagined) view of the subject! By setting the piece in Japan, an exotic location far away from Britain, Gilbert was able to satirise British politics and institutions more freely by disguising them as Japanese. The script also reflects the general British fascination with Japanese fashion and art at the time. TheatreWorks own version of this classic piece, echoed this fascination, but in our own modern times. The TheatreWorks production took an affectionate and admiring look at the Japan of today, drawing on the fashions as well as the now familiar brands and pop icons seen around the world.

As usual, there were plenty of British Club members treading the boards and working away behind the scenes. The Director and Producer of "The Mikado" were the same dynamic duo who staged Bangkok Community Theatre's production of "The Pirates of Penzance" at the British Club in November 2006, "Trial

by Jury" for TheatreWorks in 2007 and "Rumours" for BCT in 2008 — British Club Bangkok members Angela Daniel and Bonnie Zellerbach.

Angela and Bonnie have a long history of working together. Between them they have directed and produced over 30 productions for Bangkok Community Theatre (BCT) and many of them were staged right here at The British Club. The January production of "The Mikado" was their second collaboration as TheatreWorks and they were very pleased to be able to stage it for Bangkok audiences in co-operation with BCT and the BCB.

THE CAST

British Club audiences were treated to a combination of new and familiar faces in this latest G&S offering. The story revolved around the leather-clad rocker

Nanki-Poo [Brent Poling — last seen as The Defendant in "Trial by Jury" and as Frederic in "Pirates"] who was returning to the town of Titipu, because he had fallen in love with the beautiful young harajuku girl Yum-Yum [newcomer Hannah Phillips]. To his dismay he found out that Yum-Yum was marrying her guardian and Ninja wannabe Ko-Ko, The Lord high Executioner (BC member Jonathan Truslow, aka The Judge in "Trial by Jury" and The Pirate King in

"Pirates") and the wedding was to take place that very afternoon. To stir things up a bit, Ko-Ko received a letter from the Mikado (BCT veteran Ismael Mercado) saying that unless he executed somebody immediately, the town would be demoted to a village and disaster would befall them all.

Nanki-poo offered himself up for the axe if he was allowed to marry Yum-Yum for a month, an arrangement to which Ko-Ko very reluctantly agreed. There was much rejoicing until a fiery kimonoclad Katisha, an elderly matron/villainess [BCB Member Louise Truslow last seen as The Counsel in "Trial by Jury" and Ruth in "Pirates"] who was pursuing Nanki-poo, showed up to claim her betrothed. To top it off, the Mikado made a surprise visit and thinking that Ko-Ko had executed his son, decreed that he and his alleged accomplices were to be boiled in oil. But did that actually come to pass? Of course not! In typical G&S fashion, the impossible became probable, couples were rearranged and everyone lived happily ever after!

Other key cast members included BCB member Ray Stafford as the pompous Pooh-Bah (last seen in the June production of "Rumours"), G&S veteran

ously emancipated so that not only the look but much of the music had a more up-beat, up-tempo feel and parts of the action took place around the audience. The curtains opened in Act 1 to reveal flashing billboard lights and a host of Japanese icons and logos. A chorus of identically suited, briefcase wielding, Japanese supermen took the stage chatting on their cell phones. At the end of their first number "Gentlemen of Japan," the lights dimmed and a mysterious red glow took shape on their briefcases spelling out the words "The Mikado." That was the first of many delightful surprises the show had in store. A favourite highlight for many was the surprise entrance of the Mikado himself in Act 2. First the warning music, then the heavy breathing and at last the Mikado (aka Darth Vader, the villain of all villains) was revealed. Night after night that moment brought the house down - only to be surpassed by the Mikado/ Darth Vader boogie in his showstopping number "My Object All Sublime" a few minutes later. Other great moments include the trumpet solo in "A Wandring Minstrel", the gospel styled Act 1 finale "We Do Not Heed Your Dismal Sound," and many more.

British Club Members enjoyed a great evening's entertainment and also a delicious buffet dinner prepared by our Head Chef, Khun Laak, and her team. "Great food, great company and great entertainment!" commented one happy BC member. "I love the dinner theatre productions at the BC," said another. "They're such fun; I never miss a single one!" "The Mikado" was sold out well in advance with a waiting list for every performance. Several hundred wouldbe theatre-goers would have missed the event if the seating had not been so cosy, and the majority seem to take the squash in as part of the fun. We hope you'll agree it was worth it.

WINE CELLAR

JEREMY WATSON presents a new feature column in *Outpost*, the Wine Cellar. Jeremy has been a long term advocate of developing the wine experience at the British club Bangkok and has had the opportunity to work with General Committee (GC) colleague Warwick Newton to broach ideas with a group of interested members and bring output to the attention of the GC.

WINE IS AN IMPORTANT PART of many clubs, particularly in markets where excise and duty can account for 200–300 % of the retail cost of a bottle. Whilst member clubs cannot negate this cost hurdle entirely, pur-

chasing policies and raw spending power can enable members to sample a wider choice of wines at very competitive prices.

More than cost, wine contributes significantly to the overall value and quality experience that many members can enjoy.

Late last year I was amongst a group of members who submitted a motion to the GC asking them to take a closer look at

the handling of wine within the Club.


The GC responded by asking F&B issues champion Warwick Newton,

to proceed with the organisation of a Fine Wine Dinner - a chance for wine aficionados within the Club to meet and discuss wine whilst enjoying a sumptuous meal. In preparation for this evening, I placed a proposal to the GC to form a WINE SOCIETY within the British Club Bangkok. In addition to providing a forum for discussion of wine issues, the society would be a branch of the International Wine & Food Society, and be a focal point for fine wine within Thailand. After being co-opted to the GC, I have been afforded the opportunity to make some changes to the pricing policy of wine within the Club, and on a trial basis, I am about to debut a revised system in conjunction with Barry and his staff. In this inaugural Wine Cellar, I of-

fer a couple of articles addressing critical wine issues; serving wine at the optimum temperature and "when does a wine peak." I hope these are of interest and welcome your comments and contributions

on wine within our great Club.





SERVING WINES AT THE BEST TEMPERATURE

rsula Hermacinski, a past Christie's wine auctioneer, advised that in serving wine "Twenty minutes before dinner take the white wine out of the refrigerator and put the red wine in."

This advice fixes the two most common errors in the serving of wine. White wines being served too cold and red ones too warm — properly chilled wines do taste better.

Jim Gordon advises that white wines too warm will taste alcoholic and flabby whilst too cold will be refreshing but nearly tasteless. For reds too warm they will taste soft, alcoholic and slightly vinegary whilst too cold they will have much less flavour and a tannic bite.

Champagne and other sparkling wines need to start out totally chilled. Put them in the refrigerator an hour and a half before serving or in an ice bucket with an ice-water mixture at least twenty minutes before serving, though for vintage bottles you then need to let the bubbly warm up a bit if you don't want to miss out on the mature character for which you have paid extra!

Sauvignon Blanc, Pinot Grigio, White Zinfandel and other refreshing white wines should be chilled to refrigerator temperature (usually 35 to 40 degrees) for an hour and a half before serving, with the better examples, such as barrel aged Fume Blanc (made from Sauvignon Blanc grapes) improving if brought out 20 minutes early.

Chardonnay, White Burgundy and other rich full-bodied and barrel fermented white wines of high quality taste their best at classic "cellar temperature" or 55 degrees. Winemakers in France know what they are doing when they offer tastes to visitors directly from the barrels in their cool, humid underground cellars. So put these wines into

the refrigerator an hour and a half before serving, but bring them out 20 minutes before quaffing to warm a bit.

Sweet desert wines need the same treatment as Sauvignon Blanc, with the exception of fortified wines like Port and Sherry, which are better at cellar temperature or above, also treat Dry Sherry like Sauvignon Blanc.

Nearly all Red Wines show their best stuff when served at about 65 degrees — cool, but warmer than cellar temperature. This is not room temperature, unless you happen to live in a Scottish castle. So if you keep your wine in a cool cellar or cooled storage, then you will enjoy it more if you take it out 30 minutes before serving, or if stored in a warmer place chill for 20 minutes in the refrigerator.

LET THE WINE BREATH

"Would you like me to open the wine now so that it can breathe?" Yes I would like the bottle opened, but not for this reason.

One of the first things a waiter should be taught, when serving wine, is that merely opening the bottle does not let the wine "breathe". A gasp is about all that it will achieve. This is one of the most common misconceptions about wine.

But this is not to say that wines don't benefit from exposing them to air. Many young concentrated red wines, like an expensive Cabernet Sauvignon or Bordeaux that can age for several years, undergo a sort of micro aging process by getting lots of air into them.

The same goes for a young and concentrated or especially astringent white wine, such as a white Burgundy. The reason being that forced exposure to air begins to oxidise a wine, causing subtle chemical changes that affect both the flavours and the textures.

If you've ever left a half-empty bottle of wine for a few days in your kitchen you know that it will soon turn stale. The idea of "breathing" is to start the process but stop it in time — by drinking the wine — to achieve only a mild oxidation.

Just popping the cork isn't going to get you there, however. The best and most entertaining way to accomplish real aeration is to pour the wine into a decanter. It doesn't have to be crystal or silver, it doesn't even have to be a real decanter, just whatever glass pitcher or jar or ceramic bottle with a wide mouth that you have on hand. Your decanter, whether elegant or funky, can add a nice new element to the table, so it's tempting and perfectly acceptable to aerate young wine.

You don't need a candle for this either. That kind of decanting is called for only with a bottle of much older wine that has a lot of sediment in the bottom.

If you're at home, get your wine to breathe by pulling the cork and pouring the wine into the pitcher from the greatest height you can achieve without spilling everything all over the counter. The idea is to splash it as much as possible to maximise the wine's contact with air.

At a restaurant, answer the waiter by saying yes, please open the wine. Then ask if it can be decanted. If the restaurant isn't set up for decanting, then ask that your wine be opened and glasses poured for everyone, even if you are saving the wine for the next course. Your wine will do a lot more breathing in your glass than if ever would have whilst still cooped up in the bottle.





WHEN DOES A WINE PEAK?



nly a small percentage of the world's wine get better with age, but those that de are worth the wait. Drinking an age-worthy wine at its peak of perfection is something no wine drinker should miss.

My wine-aging epiphany happened with a bottle of 1959 Petreus from Bordeaux that friends shared with me last year. But I've enjoyed similar experiences before and since, and with wines that cost much, much less.

Certain wine types of the world, like red Bordeaux and white Riesling from Germany have proven their ability to evolve — becoming more interesting and complex in flavour as they get older — without deteriorating. Sometimes they'll go for more than 100 years, such as the 1870 Chateau Laffite Rothschild that a read about recently.

A more practical example is a case or two of 1980 Chateau Smith Haut Laffite that I bought at \$35 a bottle when it was released. I've been popping the corks on this wine at the rate of about two bottles per year since 1990. It's a taste pleasure as well as an intellectual exercise of sorts in following its evolution. It has gone from powerfully fruity and sweetly oaky in flavour and quite firm and tannic in texture, to much more mellow in flavour, with what's called bottle bouquet réplacing the straightforward aromas of a young wine, and with more intricate, spicy flavours and a milder easy-drinking texture

Thus a wine doesn't have to be super-expensive or super-old to show the benefits of aging. It has to be the right kind to start with, and has to be kept in a cool storage area that's as close to 55 degrees year round as you can manage or afford. Here's a look at several types of wine that might be worth aging, and when you should drink them.

BORDEAUX

The red wines of Bordeaux are the gold standard of age-worthy wine. Made largely with Merlot and Cabernet Sauvignon grapes in the warm, south-western corner of France, they seem to have an inherent ability to age well. Vintages

vary significantly here, but the best years will produce \$100 and up wines that improve for 20 years or more, \$50 wines that improve for about 15 years and even \$15 wines that will evolve interestingly for five or more years after their release.

CALIFORNIA

Francophile's claim that Californian wines don't age. Napa valley wines do age naturally very well up to 30 years. Most \$20 up cabernets from the Napa Valley and Sonoma County get a lot more interesting with age. Though most can do with drinking after 5 years.

RED BURGUNDY AND US PINOT NOIR

Some red Burgundies age beautifully, but unless you buy a blue chip like Domaine de la Romanee-Conti it's a gamble. Even more so with American Pinot Noirs, which usually don't have the combination of acidity, tannin and concentration to carry them forward in time. Red Burgundy at \$26 a bottle or more is safe for five years, but I'd drink the US Pinot Noir as quickly as possible — anyway they are too tasty to leave for long!

ZINFANDEL

You rarely find the magic happening to an old Zinfandel that happens rather regularly with nice Bordeaux. Basically you should drink them on release and for a couple of years afterward. After 10 years in proper cool storage they won't turn bad, necessarily, but the odds are against the becoming more enticing than when they were young.

TUSCAN REDS

Many of these are too new to be certain, but most are inherently structured to age. The best types include Brunello di Montalcino and the early super-Tuscans like Tignanello and Solaia. All these can benefit from 10 or more years in a cool cellar.

RHONE REDS

Not as high profile as Bordeaux, but certain subcategories of wine from this French region have great track records for aging. Chateauneuf-du-Pape, Hermitage and Cote-Rotie are three of the top Rhone Appellations (districts) to look for when you want a wine that will show its best stuff after 10 or more years.

GERMAN RIESLING

A great white wine with which to experience the benefits of age. The best types are the richer, often sweeter styles such as a ripe Spatlese, riper Auslese and super-ripe Beerenausles. Even Spatlese can improve for several years, and super-concentrated Beerenauslese can go for many decades.

CHARDONNAY AND WHITE BURGUNDY

The best wines for aging are often the most tight and tart when young, including French Chablis, the various Montrachets and Mersault from Burgundy, which in the \$40 and up price range can get better for 5 to 15 years.

PORT

Real vintage port from Portugal is virtually ageless. Aficionados today are still deciding whether their 1963s are too young to try. So these are a slam dunk for the cellar. Avery good vintage from a very good label can easily improve for 40 years.

In the last month or so, members may have been in receipt of conflicting information on member dues and staff remuneration in 2009. On January 5 2009, members were sent a letter incorrectly informing them of a 3.5 % hike in member dues effective January 1. Discussion in the December General Committee (GC) meeting led to the Treasury Working Group (TWG) being asked to assess the effect of a freeze in member dues on Club finances, for report back to the GC. BCB POLAR SWIM


The Club's Unique New Year Therapy







After the 11 O'clock service a luncheon is held on the floating restaurant near the new Bridge over the River Kwai. Last year, on the 26th, the band played at the Australian Rules football match between Bangkok Tigers and Jakarta Bintangs. The ex-POW's attended the match as guests of honour and a great time is had by all.

The Band is looking forward to ANZAC Day 2009 and is practicing hard so as to acquit itself well on the day and contribute positively to a such an historical occasion.





BOOKS








THREE BOOKS THIS MONTH, one author (Grisham) surely known to most, the other two may surprise you. Janet Evanovich's *Plum Spooky*, is the latest in a line of Stephanie Plum novels, a Trenton-based bounty hunter who makes a hilarious habit of failing to apprehend an ever-widening cast of freaks, criminals, deranged felons, and lunatics! Plum's sidekick, Lula, is a plus-sized African-American women who in addition to packing a Glock 45, possesses a rapier wit. A great addition to the series, yet probably best on audiobook, where the characters are truly brought to life by brilliant narrator, Lorelei King.

STIEG LARSSON'S The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo has gone to the top of my list as best mystery/thriller. The mysteries unfold in Sweden as the characters, Lisbeth and Mikael, try to crack multiple perplexing crimes, one taking place 20 years ago. Lisbeth is a firecracker young woman who has Asperger's Syndrome and is a captivating character. She sees the world and how we interact with each other very differently and it was interesting to see how she reacted to sometimes bizarre or horror-ridden circumstances. Just when I was thinking there wasn't anything new on the horizon, along comes Larsson with this wonderfully unique story.

JOHN GRISHAM'S The Associate is not at all to the standards that I have come to expect from one of my favourite authors. It was hard to accept the initial premise of the storyline i.e. Kyle could do nothing and could not get any type of help. Then after dealing with this flawed premise Grisham unveils the obvious solution — The End — and he lived happily ever after. The quick ending left far too many issues hanging and unresolved. Throughout the book I kept waiting for the real story to develop knowing that there was going to be more. Rather disappointing.

DICK WOOD TROPHY




HOLE IN ONE




TOURNAMENT FORMAT

In this month's Kid's Zone, Khun Suzie takes a look at some environmentally friendly arts & crafts, Can-Do Robots and a Jet Boat that can be made from "post-consumer content" or "rubbish" in everyday speak!

RECYCLABLE CRAFTS

CAN-DO ROBOTS

These friendly robots are more than just good-looking; magnets hold their fea-Utures in place, making the 'bots the metallic equivalent of a Mr. Potato Head.

- Craft Materials:
- Tin can
- · Electrical tape (optional)
- · Hardware and various recyclables such as bottle caps, keys, etc.
- Hot-glue gun
- Strong disk magnets

METHOD

- I. Open a tin can with a safety can opener so there are no sharp edges. (If you only have a regular opener, line the inside of the can's rim with electrical tape.)
- 2. Empty, wash, and dry the can.
- 3. For facial features, arms, propulsion devices, and communication arrays, look for items around the house and at the hardware store. We used bolts, brackets, hinges, keys, wing nuts, switches, bottle caps, washers, knobs, and more.
- 4. Hot-glue the items to strong disk magnets.





JET BOAT

Kids will love being the captain of this balloon-powered jet boat — perfect for racing in pools, ponds and bathtubs.

- I. Thread the nut on the plastic pipe elbow. Then cut a hole in the bottom of one of the trays and push through the elbow's non-threaded end.
- 2. Stretch the balloon over the threaded end. Next, secure the elbow underneath the tray with the rubber band, wrapping it around several times.
- 3. Cut a rudder from the other tray, and insert it through a slit cut in the stern of the boat. TIPS

To operate the vessel, inflate the balloon by blowing into the elbow. Block the end of the pipe with your finger as you set the boat in the water, then release it and watch the boat zip away.

If you wish to nominate your spouse, an application form must be sent to the Club at least 24 hours in advance of the meeting. These forms will also be distributed to members along with the Official Notice.

GENERAL COMMITTEE MEMBER NOMINATIONS

One important function of the AGM is to elect the General Committee (GC) of the Club, composed of a minimum of 8, and a maximum of 10 Ordinary members. GC members are required to attend one formal meeting per month, and in addition may be required to attend sub-committees and review materials "out of session" in order to facilitate management of the Club. However, it is preferable to circulate the list of candidates ahead of the meeting, so please submit your application for the attention of DGM Premrudee Tanyaluck, no later than Tuesday, March 10th 2009.



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
