MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Three out of three is excellent !!

Driving into the Club this morning, I was listening to one of my favourite rock groups of all time...Meat Loaf...and I was thinking about this article, due to be submitted in a few hours time, when they played one of their best tracks: "Two out of three ain't bad". How time flies.....

This is already my 5th year on the General Committee, two years as Treasurer and now three years as Chairman. Yes indeed how time flies...

LAYING THE FOUNDATIONS

Under Jonathan Truslow as Chairman, my first two years on the General Committee were focussed on bringing back stability to the Club's financial affairs. With a solid foundation set and with prudent financial policies in place, our Club has gone from strength to strength in recent years.

The last three Committees have been able to devise and enact an impressive process of improving and upgrading many areas of our Clubhouse and its grounds. We were also fortunate to stop the roller coaster of General Manager appointments when we took the decision to appoint Khun Prem as the first Thai and the first female General Manager of the British Club. Her team have formed the backbone of driving the Club forwards and the Club has truly experienced three excellent years.

THREE OUT OF THREE EXCELLENT YEARS

It will come as no surprise to our Membership to note that our last, the third, financial year has proved to be the BEST YEAR ever experienced by the Club. In a recent article we highlighted the fact that our Membership level now stands at an all time high at the time of writing today it is 1121.

Our finances have never been so strong. At the financial year-end 31st November 2014 our Cash at Bank, despite all the investments made throughout the year of 5.9 million baht, had increased from approximately 21 million baht to approximately 31.3 million baht.

Over the last three years the General Committees have made a conscious effort to drive improvements and upgrades to the Club aimed at improving the British Club experience for all our Members in general and not just to satisfy the needs of a few and within a prudent financial policy of building in financial buffers.

None of this would have been possible without the excellent performance of our Staff under the

outstanding management of Khun Prem our General Manager. There is no doubt that our Club has improved vastly in both appearance, day-to-day operations, functions and financial strength over the last three years.

That said, the Management and the Committee are well aware of the constant need for improvements and fine tuning in the operations of the Club. I often wonder in amazement how Khun Laak and her team cater for such large events. Christmas Day was truly amazing with over 540 Members and their quests having a superb time with an enormous amount of food available.

FULL SPEED AHEAD... WITHIN A PRUDENT FINANCIAL POLICY

As the AGM draws near (24th March 2015), Members are still seeing a lot of activity around the Club with some additional upgrades and improvements being made all of which should be complete and operational by mid-March.

• A new building, which will be heavily landscaped, is being built on an unused area of land. This will house separate men's and women's toilet facilities and a changing-room area with showers for users of the multi-purpose court. As the Back Lawn often caters for up to 400 people (or more as at Guy Fawkes Night and on Christmas Day), it is unquestionably necessary to urgently provide toilet facilities to reduce the number of people using the limited Clubhouse toilet facilities to the detriment of Members



• The Pavilion coffee shop is nearly complete and is being built on a small totally unused area (save for some very old shacks which were demolished) between the Tennis Courts and Surawongse Road. This area will be well landscaped and incorporates a beautiful waterfall and upgraded spirit house



- Work to source a much-needed and integrated POS and Membership system has started and will be handed on to the new GC and Management to finalise the options and implement
- The cricket nets are undergoing a complete revamp with an increase in height and brand new playing areas
- For golfers we have looked at investing in a state of the art golf simulator which will be housed in an area of the proposed Silom Sala Integrated scheme. This will be an added attraction for our golfing community and many other interested Members
- Much-needed and long overdue refurbishment of the Staff House is essential and Management is finalising plans in this area.
- The back lawn will get a full makeover in a few months

UPCOMING EGM ... THE SCENE IS SET

For much of the last 11 months the General Committee has been spending time on the Silom Integrated Scheme, which is the last remaining area of the Club to receive an upgrade and refit. The increased use of the poolside and the frenzy at weekends is testament to how much this area needs development, and how important it is to provide improved and extended facilities to our Members, their families and their quests. Some of these buildings are close to 60 years old and are in urgent need of attention. The Committee believed that now was the opportunity to build for the long-term and to produce excellent facilities for all Members, their families and the Club's sporting community.

As most of you will appreciate, a large amount of work has been undertaken by some of the GC, the Management, our consultant Architects and a QS firm to produce all the relevant information that Members need to make an informed decision to vote on this ambitious plan on the 23rd March.

Some Members of the General Committee have devoted a great deal of their personal time to create a base scheme with some alternatives, and they deserve many thanks for their dedication and input. We recognise that Members may have differing views on the form and shape of the developments, but this work is being undertaken for the Membership as a whole.

I hope that by the time you read this the Members will already have decided to proceed with these works which could be built over a 12 to 18 month period as we must preserve the financial buffer of around 10 million baht at all times.

UPCOMING AGM 24th March 2015, only a few weeks away

Yes it is that time of the year again will it be "out with the old and in with the new" as some splinter groups want? Or will the membership decide to maintain the momentum amassed over the last three years in the interests of all rather than a few? Who knows! But I would ask all those who are entitled to vote on this important evening to come along and make your voices and opinions heard.

In wrapping this article up, I feel a sense of pride in what has been achieved. My thanks go to those members of the GC who have supported me in our endeavours. We have worked hard to improve and enhance the overall environment of the British Club. We realise that it is impossible to please all of our Members all of the time but our Management and staff are doing their utmost to serve us the Members. They are very proud to be part of this great establishment and that is evident from their enormous work efforts in maintaining the Club and grounds to the highest of standards.

Those that know me well understand my passion, total commitment to and love of the British Club. The long hours that I devote are from a belief that we are building a stronger and better Club for the enjoyment of all. I am well aware that there are some small groups who feel otherwise. That of course is their right, although it saddens me to witness the depths to which some Members will sink in pursuit of their own agenda

The Club is in excellent hands with Khun Prem and her team so I will conclude by extending a very special thank you to them all and to you the Members for supporting me during my time on the Committee.

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LETTER FROM THE GENERAL MANAGER

In February there was a very good turnout for Quiz Night, Pancake Day and the Chinese New Year celebrations which included the Dim Sum Buffet & the Lion Dance afterwards which was held on the Front Lawn. Throughout the month, the weekends were very busy for all our outlets which is good although sometimes at peak moments the food and service becomes slow as a result. We are trying to overcome this with parttime staff and scheduling, so I hope you understand it is being addressed.

In March there is the One Direction concert, four tickets still available, St. Patrick's Day and UK Mother's Day buffets, as well as our monthly Wine Tasting. You can check details on our website and make reservations with events staff by email or through our Reception desk.

This month has also seen some Club maintenance. We have replaced the tiles at the front entrance of the Clubhouse as they were cracked, broken and slippery; these works caused some inconvenience which I hope was not too serious. We also replaced the fencing of the back tennis courts with new netting which should be a durable improvement, and we simultaneously provided the new netting at the front of the Multi-Purpose Court. 


SOME INVITED EVENING

- (b) Have a legal work permit and/or visa to reside in Thailand or be a permanent resident here.


Upon election you will be required to obtain a letter of affirmation from your Embassy and be registered with the Bangrak District Office.

The legalities are one thing, however it is having enough time that is the most essential aspect of any candidate.

Over the past decade or so the author has noticed that many Members with all the goodwill in the world stand for the General Committee, get elected, and then simply do not have the time to do the job! You may need to commit three or four hours a week to reading reports, sitting on Work Groups or sub-committees, interviewing membership applicants as well as committing to the monthly three hour (or so) main meeting (currently held third Tuesday of the month) ... and this is the minimum.

Applications for the General Committee close at the AGM so please give some thought to standing and please ensure you have **enough spare time** if you do stand.

We look back to the history of our Club in 2008 ...

The year for the Tennis Section did not start well when they were informed that their request for Allocation of Funds had been refused. It was argued that the section was sitting on a mountain of funds so did not need any additional monies. This affront was slightly compounded when the GC then decided not to go ahead with resurfacing the two front courts as the quotations had ranged from 3.6 MBaht to a staggering 11.0 MBaht and the 1.1 MBaht upgrade of the tennis lighting was put on hold until the courts situation was resolved. At this stage Tennis Players threatened to boycott the Club.

The incoming GC then decided to build a new All-Weather Court on the back lawn and make all four tennis courts 'hard' (Courts 2 & 3 were previously artificial grass) and to change the make of surface. (This led somehow to tennis players telephoning customers of the named contractors in an attempt to retain the existing contractor). The new Chairman of the General Committee took umbrage with the section and castigated them for "failing to abide by the rules and bylaws of the club" and after a very heated email correspondence the GC disbanded the Tennis Section, took back their bank balance and placed the new Sports & Recreation Manager, Reed Passmore, in charge of running tennis. The saga had not ended by year end (nor for that matter the next year's end either!).

One of the first aims of the incoming General Committee (besides upsetting the tennis section) was to improve Club operation so eight sub-committees or Special Interest Groups were formed each with a champion to lead them. The Communications Special Interest Group was led by the Chairman of the General Committee who decided that Outpost should be less frequent and go to a wider, external audience and that a new publication the 'BCB Announcer' was created to fill the monthly gap - both to be done in-house. Unfortunately neither plan worked well and within months the 'BCB Announcer' was gone and Outpost back in the hands of an outside supplier.

The Development Special Interest Group did well, however, and its first major achievement was the building of the All-Weather Court on the site of the old 'back lawn rubbish area' [current site of the new Multi-Purpose Court build in 2013]. This court hosted its first event being the STC Balut Interport tournament in the November (see below) and led to the re-founding of the soccer section as well as use by the Thai Stix, Canadian ball hockey squad.

As a result of the founding in 2007 of the Balut Section (see last month), it was asked to host the 28th STC Interport Balut tournament, a pan-Asian Balut tournament founded in the Singapore Town Club in 1981. To run this major event the 28th Organising Committee was formed of 'T.C.', 'Swampy', 'Mr. C', 'Bowling Ball', 'The Squire', 'Slowpoke' and 'Jammy'. A fellow Balut player, 'DQ' (often wrongly nicknamed 'Kweenie') created for the tournament, and subsequently for international use, the first ever internet based Balut scoring system (see www. teambalut.com) and so on 21st November we were as ready as we would ever be for the Club's first major international sports tournament.

Danny Pruce, Deputy Head of Mission at the British Embassy, opened proceeding which attracted 29 teams from 15 Members' Clubs around South East Asia, and with quests amounted to 142 attendees plus three Club Members acting as officials. As host Club Khun Laak, our Executive Chef, provided a lavish welcome buffet on the Friday, a Thai luncheon on the Saturday followed by an International Buffer dinner. As play commenced under the watchful eye of 'Jammy', Khun Prem (Deputy General Manager) and her accounting team meticulously added up each and every score sheet (amazing how many Balut players thought 18 and 14 equals 36) and finally we had a winner ... well three-quarters of a winner ... in the Royal Brunei Yacht Club. They had turned with only three players so one BCB Member played as a substitute. A great time was had by all but sadly a political uprising close to the airport prevented many of the 104 overseas players and quests from getting home but most enjoyed their extended stay and all got home eventually!

Lots of other things happened in 2008: The Billiard table was reinstated in the Clubhouse as the experiment of a pool table was taking less money; In February smoking was banned inside the Clubhouse; The POS system came on-line but (as was found out later) it did not interface with our Club Management Accounting System! In the August, we agreed to a request of the Nielson Hays Library to service their new café as it had been designed without a kitchen; membership grew to 1,038 and finally a number of development plans were created by the General Committee ... and as usual you will to wait until next month to find out what!

THE ONES THAT GOT AWAY

Hugh Wilson was 23 years old on conscription into the Sherwood Foresters Regiment of the British Army at the start of WW II. He met his great pal Alf Lee very early on and they were to remain close throughout what was to come their way. Shipped off to Singapore in 1942 they were captured and sent to Banpong to work on what was to become the infamous Thai-Burma Railway.

Hugh and Alf worked at some of the worst camps and suffered the horrors, cruelty and deprivation so well documented now but this story is not about the railway; it is about something else entirely. Once the railway was completed, the Japanese selected groups of "fit" prisoners to go to Japan to work, so Hugh and Alf were 2 of 1,317 POWs crammed into the hold of a freighter, Rakuyo Maru, sailing in convoy for Japan on September 6th 1944.

A wolf pack of US submarines had slipped into place near Hainan on the 31st August 1944; Growler, Pampanito and Sealion, made up the pack ready to disrupt Japanese shipping and within days they found a Japanese convoy.

In the early hours of the 12th September 1944, the wolf pack attacked. Sealion sank a tanker which spilled oil into the sea, before being driven off by depth charging from the escorts. One of the transports which they hit at daybreak was a freighter, carrying a type of cargo that the captain of The Sealion had no way of knowing about. It was the Rakuyo Maru full of 1,317 allied POWs.

Few were killed by the torpedo impacts and most Japanese fled over the side in the life boats leaving the POWs on their own. They lowered the sick onto anything that would float before the fitter men jumped into the water. A few POWs used the opportunity to settle scores and it wasn't long before some Japanese guards lay about the deck battered and bloodied. Two POWs swam round the area and drowned as many Jap guards as they could find before they too drowned from exhaustion.

Elated at their release, many POWs sang Rule Britannia but a Japanese boat roved the area looking for their own survivors and any POW who got close had a gun

> pointed at them and some were stabbed by bayonets. It was just as well few if any got picked up because within half an hour, the Japanese escort frigate blew up.

> An ordeal of a different kind then began. The sunken oil tanker had spread oil all round the area and as night fell men covered in oil were slipping off the rafts. As the next day broke, Hugh and Alf spent all day helping men back on to the rafts and listening to the cries of men taken by sharks or drowning.

In a haze of thirst and despair with nothing to eat or drink there are reports that some men cut up Japanese bodies to drink their blood. The Rakuyo Maru was sunk on the 12th September so by the morning of the 15th, rafts had drifted apart and men were scattered. In the afternoon of the 15th, Hugh heard a sound, both worrying and exciting at the same time. It was the sound of approaching engines.

At 17:08, Sealion had received a request from the U.S.S. Pampanito to assist with the rescue of allied POWs; Pampanito having gone back to survey damage, came across some of the POWs. As Sealion steamed





towards the area 40 miles north of the attack, lookouts spotted debris and then at 18:31, the first signs of life. Small groups of bedraggled men, covered in oil, clinging to floating debris were dotted all around as the crew of the submarine looked on in disbelief before hauling men aboard.

They pulled in 54 men including Hugh, before nightfall and the threat of enemy ships made Eli Reich, the captain, decided to depart for Saipan. His records show that he was heartbroken at leaving but his first duty would always have been to protect the boat and his crew.

The medical orderly tended to one man who was still making the motions of treading water after he had been hauled aboard and once told he could stop, he


promptly died. It seems he might have been treading water for so long that stopping simply shut down his will to live. Three more men died so Sealion delivered 50 rescued men to Saipan. The other subs delivered 102 men some of whom had spent six nights afloat without sustenance. In all, 152 men made it into Allied hands, about 136 were picked up by Japanese ships and did more time as slave labourers, so about 1,029 British and Australian men did not make it. One can only imagine the ways in which they perished in the South China Sea, but depth charges, drowning and sharks would account for many.

The survivors were shipped back to the USA where they were met

by Admiral Nimitz, clearly taking the whole incident very seriously. Hugh reports that Nimitz cried when he learned of the loss of over 1,000 men from a "friendly fire" incident. The US navy cannot be faulted for the tragedy as the Japanese had not marked the ship as carrying POWs so the subs did not know what they were firing at. The Japanese had again demonstrated their utter disregard for international agreements.

The British were shipped home on the Queen Mary to a strange but predictable reception. Unlike their welcome in the USA, they were debriefed, given a rail pass home and ordered to report back for rehabilitation. Hugh Wilson simply walked from Lewisham station to his house, upsetting his wife as she had not had time to put make-up on to greet him.

The worst part of Hugh's ordeal must have been parting from his mate Alf Lee. They had been through tough times together and finally clinging to their raft, covered in oil, eyes burning and throats swollen from the oil fumes and lack of water, Alf slipped off several times and had no strength to get back on. Hugh clasped Alf's arm for as long as he could before Alf slipped away and drowned; a mere 1 hour before Sealion returned to rescue the men. But for 60 minutes, Alf might have survived.



Alf had made Hugh promise to deliver his wedding ring back to his wife if he didn't make it and so Hugh went round only to find that Alf's wife had assumed him to be dead and taken up with an R.A.F. officer. Hugh's only comment was: "Alf could never win", but it must have hurt Hugh's feelings.

Hugh Wilson lived on to a ripe old age and was one of a handful of people to escape Japanese captivity during the Second World War. (Hugh Wilson was my father's first cousin).

The above figures are the optimal blood pressure levels for a normal (whatever normal means!) healthy adult according to medical experts worldwide. Furthermore,






