





Golf Report

Both matches against T.S.D. and Cosmos found the team in top gear, and with the defence playing better than at any time during the season, opponents are finding life very difficult in scoring against us. The only goal recently conceded arising from a wayward clearance and consequently presenting a 'gift' to a T.S.D. forward. Three consecutive matches since then showing a blank scoresheet testifies to our defensive improvements. Mid-field and Forwards too have been combining very well, yet our last two matches found the opponents defending courageously also.

Our most recent match against the Scandinavians deserves special mention, since neither team could afford to lose without being virtually eliminated from the final champion-ship run-in. A ball cleverly played from defence by Col Cobbett, followed by swift interpassing in mid-field, eventually found leading goal scorer Roger Winter, who without any hesitation shot under the advancing goalkeeper.

With four matches to play the Championship is wide open, with all our forthcoming opponents having a mathematical chance of reaching the final.


