




MEMBERS ACCOUNTS AND THE CHIT SYSTEM

"Great action in the Men's Final ... " L to-R: Henry, Martin, John, Steve





Happy Easter, Readers

Back again with more football news after a break for a couple of months. Somehow the inspiration was not there which matched our football at the tail end of last year. In the last two games in the first half of the season we went down 4-3 to the Germans and 1-0 to the Indians to turn a three point lead into a one point deficit behind RBSC at the turn of the year which assumes they win games in hand. This takes us onto the action.

MATCH REPORT:

We opened the second half with our first game against the French which had been postponed earlier in the season due to rain. After two defeats and minus mid field dynamo Chris Davin plus the suspended Frank Hough and Howard Neville who has unfortunately been transferred we had every right to be concerned but as so often happens in these circumstances we turned on the style. Hero of the game was Chairman Ron Aston who notched a great hat-trick but special mention must also go to the recalled Andy "Bonecrusher" Maynard who scored two and led the line well. In a six goal avalanche Adam Caro also scored but it was by no means one sided as the French had opened the scoring and matched us goal for goal until early in the second half. The final score finished 6-3 and sent the fans home happy.

For our next game we played the Gauls next door neighbours the Huns again minus Davin, plus the younger Houghman, Roger, and still without long term injury victim Nigel "Chairman" Oakins. We had a point to prove however having been defeated by the Germans earlier and started in a determined mood. It was no surprise then when after nice lead up work by Ron Aston on the right the final pass found Steve Casteldine who squeezed a shot post the German goalie from a narrow angle. The second and sealing goal was vintage Hough again from an Aston cross and that's how the score finished in a workmanlike rather than debonair performance.

The Young Thai Sikh Association (YTSA) were next on the calendar and we got off to a flying start when Steve Casteldine scored off a nod down from Ritchie Crook's new hairdo (nice one Ritchie). Our lead was short-lived as the YTSA had their best spell and equalised before winning a penalty which proved to be the turning point. Neil Torrance saved brilliantly and that was the confidence booster we needed. The Sikhs gave us a further boost with an own goal to give us the lead and early in the second half Captain Carruthers who is always dangerous at dead ball situations rifled in number three from a corner. Frank Hough got his almost statutory goal late on to help the goal difference further and make the final score 4-1.

The first real "four pointer" of the year came up next with the rematch against Shell who were lurking in third place only two points behind. Chris Davin was recalled to the mid-field line up but we were still down to a basic thirteen man squad although this concentration on quality rather than quantity has served us well this season so far. As Jimmy Greaves says "It's a funny old game" as despite turning in what I felt was one of our best performances of the season and literally outclassing the much younger Shell outfit we could not convert pressure into goals and the game finished 0-0 which left us now two points adrift of RBSC who continue their winning ways. 1

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Next came Les Frenchies encore and in a bad tempered game we won trois à zero. Les goals est scored dú Monsieur Casteldine et Ron Aston et Monsieur Casteldine encore.

The performance unlike game one was more vin payee rather than of champagne vintage but it was still satisfying and a 3 goal win is not to be snuffed at. We welcomed back John Sheehan to the squad for this one and he came on late in the second half. Vaughan Elias also played his first full game for a while and almost scored a spectacular goal with a powerful run from deep.

One last league game at time of press was the twice yearly youth versus experience fixture against ISB. The kids again ran and harried their hearts out and it looked as if they might pull off a shock draw but again it was not to be their day as Casteldine deservedly scored with 8 minutes to go when their young keeper failed to hold a low Caro shot at the right hand post. Minutes before that Hough almost scored the goal of the season when with back to goal he brought down a cross and in almost one movement he swivelled and volleyed a sweet left foot shot which ricocheted off the left hand post. It was poetry in motion.

The firsts also took part in the Iranian Embassy National Day Victory Tournament in early February (although what Iran ever won I'm not sure). We did not exactly set the heather a fire losing our fist game at the ungodly hour of 08:30 to the Indians 2-1. We followed this with three "nil-all" draws and this was not enough to put us through to the semi's. The French proved the surprise packet of the tournament beating the much fancied Iranians who had a few Thai "ringers" in their team in the final.

CASUALS CORNER :

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The Casuals phenomena goes on with fixtures almost every Saturday. Games in the last period included a 2-1 defeat by the Patana School teachers where Captain, Stormin Norman Bright allegedly scored our only goal. New opposition was unearthed in the shape of the Ayudaya Insurance Company who proved a little too sharp on the day and turned in a "premium" performance to win 4-2. An in-house game also proved very enjoyable with the regular Casuals defeating a combination first team/irregular players 2-1.

POSTSCRIPTS :

The next month sees the finale to the Farang league. Quite simply if we win our last four games we become Champions. One of them is against the RBSC and is like a Cup Final as defeat would leave them four points clear and virtually uncatchable. Watch this space.

As stated earlier we lost the services of Howard Neville who has moved to Hong Kong and there is a possibility next month will see the departure of Ritchie and Jan Crooks with Roger Hough returning to the States in May. Ritchie has most "time in" and will be a sad loss to both football and rugby alike. A quiet man he always gives of his best and is a great team member. Wife Jan also has done much for the Club not least her involvement in organising Chiangmai tours. Roger is of course our youth policy and his pace at the back has been a real contributing factor to the successes of this season as was Howard Neville's unpredictability up front.

As some doors close others open and we welcome Paul Grenhaulgh to the Club and Section. Paul joins from Dubai where he used to play on sand but he promises to leave his bucket on the touch-line.

The section would like to congratulate Frank and Gill Hough on their silver wedding which left Frank torn between the candle lit dinner and the RBSC game. You'll have to read next month to see what he chose. Twenty five years is a real milestone and Gill must be doing something right as Frank appears to have the same energy and enthusiasm he had quarter of a century ago. Congratulations and best wishes.



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

The return of serve plays a very important part in match tactics. This return determines:


• who will reach the T first


• who will have the first chance to attack The standard reply to a serve is a long, safe straight volley to the back of the court.

- force the server to the back
- give control of the T
- avoid possible difficulties in the back corner.

posite Pegasus Club in Soi 23. Go visit, why don't you.

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

Held in conjunction with the Hong Kong International 7's tournament, the competition attracts teams from Singapore, Japan, England, Thailand and of course Hong Kong.

This year the team will include exciting players such as David Power, Andrew Whillas, Alex Stamp, Lachland McBain and Christopher Foo. These are the experienced players of the team having played in the competition last year. Power and Stamp are capable of taking on the best as they frequently rampage up the middle of rucks, sometimes appearing unstoppable. 


The 'Beginners Match' against the Polo Club as advertised in last month's ish as a February fixture was postponed until March some time, so report next month.

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With April Fool upon us Outpost thought we'd tell you some amazing stories. Hoaxes and Frauds, true or not?

**** In 1980 the British newspaper, the Daily Express published a feature on how Guardsmen have to have their famous busby hats cut. The report said that the fur on the hats continues to grow and has to be cut from time to time. There was even a photograph showing a Guardsman at the busbybarber's shop. Thousands of readers believed the story to be true but it proved to be a hoax.

**** Many listeners to Radio Leeds in England were furious when they heard that their city square was to be demolished and that the statue of the Black Prince was to be sold. Some were consoled, however, by the news that local citizens would be able to buy cheap petrol from Arab sources in return for the stature.

Whatever their views, listeners realised how gullible they were when they discover the story to be an April Fool joke.

**** On April 1st, 1957 a film about the Swiss spaghetti harvest was shown on British television, with a documentary by Richard Dimbleby, one of the country's most respected presenters. Swiss peasants were shown gathering spaghetti from the trees in the Ticino district and Richard Dimbleby gave a serious explanation of how spring had come early that year, producing a bumper spaghetti harvest.

Hundreds of people phoned the BBC after the programme. There were no complaints that they had been hoaxed, all they wanted to know was where they could buy spaghetti plants. In answer to this question they were told that such plants were not available in Britain but that some British enthusiasts had produced some acceptable results by planting a small tin of spaghetti in tomato sauce!

**** On April 1st, 1982 a British television announcer on ITN's News at One announced that St. Paul's Cathedral in London was to be moved to London's Isle of Dogs - brick by brick. To most people it sounded like a real crazy idea - and that's what it was. The story was a hoax.

**** When a newspaper in Paignton, England published a photograph taken on a local beach of the Loch Ness Monster, it received several telephone calls from worried readers. But the paper was dated 1 April, 1982, and the story was a joke.

**** A group of businessmen flying to Belfast on 1 April, 1980, were surprised to hear the announcement: "We shall shortly be arriving in Paris". Some of them may have hoped it was true, but it turned out to be yet another April Fool hoax.

**** In 1977, Tom Jackson, General Secretary of the British Union of Post Office Workers voiced his protests on a radio programme against the proposal that Britain adopt the German system of addressing envelopes. In this method the house number is written after, not before, the name of the road.

Mr. Jackson was furious at the idea, for it would, he said, 'alter a great deal of the way we work in the Post Office. Postal workers would be furious because it would turn upside-down the way we have learned to sort.'

As a result of the broadcast, several people telephoned the BBC to support Mr. Jackson in his fight. They were politely reminded of the date - it was 1 April.

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Science

H ave you ever wanted to speak a foreign language? - Well, now you can, in fact any language you want, with no effort or learning at all, thanks to a remarkable new invention developed by some of the world's leading scientists. The personal language translator was launched recently at a press conference held at the Department of Communication (DOC). Our raving reporter Herb Raine was there and has sent us this special report:

The Conference was chaired by the ever popular, loquacious and grandiloquent Dr. Ivel (of the well known Cornish cheese family) and he made these opening remarks to a hushed but excited audience.

"Ladies and Gentlemen, and members of the Press, for centuries people around the world have pondered on the strange phenomenon of language. Why should languages be so different from country to country? Is it simply the assertion of a national characteristic or exhibition of nationalistic pride? The team obtained volunteers from countries all over the world and started to build up comprehensive x-ray pictures of jaw structures. With the help of modern powerful computers, the team were able to match the sounds of languages with bone structure patterns. It was here that the astonishing discovert was made: minute changes in bone shape caused enormous changes in pronunciation - so much so that the language changed. The scientists realised that by distorting bone structures ever so slightly, they could overcome the language barriers which are so familiar to us all. Work immediately started on a small microprocessor controlled device which could be fitted into the mouth to enable distortion of the bones to be achieved by the wearer. Language could be selected by the type of distortion applied. Using highly sophisticated techniques such as polydirectional alphanumerical laserometry (PSL), ultrasonic triggerometry (UT) and optopneumatic mechanics (OM), all of which have only recently been developed for the Star Wars programme, the team built the first prototype personal language translator. The device has now been perfected and is to be marketed worldwide. We have named it "PERSONAL IN-TERPRETATION EXPRESSION AND COMMU-NICATING EQUIPMENT" - PIECE for short. Ladies and Gentlemen, I would now like to invite my colleague, the distinguished Hungarian scientist Dr. Ren Tagob, to demonstrate the invention."

Dr. Ivel handed the microphone to Dr. Tagob amidst considerable applause, and when the audience resumed their seats, Dr. Tagub, using the invention, had this to say:

It was at this point that the microphone failed and Dr. Tagob staggered off the stage clutching desperately at his throat. Dr. Ivel calmly took the spare microphone and assured us that this was a minor technical hitch. Free samples of the invention were handed round and Dr. Ivel closed the meeting by reminding us of the DOC motto -"Speak now, or forever hold your PIECE."

EDITORS FOOTNOTE: An informed source has reported that Dr. Tagob has formed a new research group aimed at increasing yields of animal products. This is being achieved by improving creature comforts, for example piped music and carpets in cowsheds. The latest invention is a shampoo for pigs being marketed under the name "Hogwash".





Look at the children running around Look at the rubbish on the ground Look at the babies with big bright eyes Look at the old, smothering their cries


Talk to the world about what it's worth Talk to the powers about our earth Talk to yourself, 'til you're blue in the face Talk to the children, this is their place

- Keep a sense of humour and remember that every committee member gives up an enormous amount of their free time to serve the club


I do realise that there is an outside chance that I may still be chairman. If that is the case, then I trust I shall listen to my own advice.

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
