


Craig Abson is a Project manager for Betonmast who oproduce Power Transmission Lines (I am sure I have





WE'RE BACK!!






Cricket




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1995 A.G.M.

Junior Tennis

Round Robin - Sunday 5th February

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This tournament went off very well. Kate and I had abandoned the BC and were basking in the sun on Koh Samet while Elaine and her trusty helpers were freezing in the Suriwong Sala juggling the numbers to make the players fit (actually we were a bit cold too, but we were enjoying a leisurely breakfast under palm trees...). Anyway, despite the NZ Ball the night before and the cricket nets calling, there were 1,2 there bright and early at 8 am, and 3 more arrived at 8.30am to keep John awake at the schedule board! These Round Robins are designed to improve social skills as well as tennis, as Michael R. discovered when he found he was playing as the only boy in a draw with 3 girls. Still it did him no harm, as he ended up in 2nd place to Chris Kelly. Ryan McNeilly came a good 3rd. Many thanks to Anki who, along with other parents and organisers Elaine and John spent a good few hours umpiring in the gale. Special thanks to Bob Rayner who donated bags and calculators as prizes. After the Round Robin was over, several energetic participants went on to play Club Championship matches and ladder matches too.

The Junior Ladder

The month of January was treated as a 'bye' month, which means that no players were moved down in January for not challenging. Most players were concentrating on the Club Championship matches and on Fobissea training at school; however, February was back to normal, with players being shifted down one place if no challenges were made/met.

Sportathlon Tennis Coaching

Sportathlon, a company specialising in sports coaching (in particular tennis, swimming and gymnastics), approached the British Club with a view to offering tennis coaching at the Club, and gave a demonstration of the sort of lessons to be expected by the juniors on the 18th February.

Following this demo, the Club has decided to let Sportathlon commence coaching to the juniors, starting middle of last month, with priority in March given to those who were being coached by Pichet and who want to change. Once those people have been accommodated, Sportathlon were going to advertise to fill the remaining places. The cost

will be approximately 650 Baht/month for under 6's and 790 Baht/month for 6-16 year olds, although please check when booking as this was written well in advance of the coaching start date. Groups are based on ability and each group works towards awards which are presented for set criteria.

For example, the first award, pink, is for the young beginners who are learning hand-eye coordination and ball sense through fun games and activities, while the red Intermediate 2 award is for minimum age 9 and comes from a '1 hour class concentrating on controlled stroke production, with court positioning and tactics introduced and lobs and passing shots developed.' Advanced awards (bronze, silver and gold) are for minimum age 10, requiring 'hard work to improve technique and match play skills using all strokes, with drop shots, half-volleys and other more advanced shots also being taught.' It appears to be a good, positive, inspiring approach.

Coaching sessions will be on Friday afternoons between 4pm and 7pm for juniors (and for adults: intermediate at 7pm and beginners at 8pm); and on Saturday mornings between 8am and 11am. Bookings for Sportathlon will be made through the Fitness Centre on a monthly basis and according to the conditions set down by Sportathlon.

Please note that coaching by Pichet will continue on a Saturday and Sunday morning as before. We hope that this arrangement means that everyone will now have the style of coaching they would like!

Next month we will have the report from the match against the Polo Club juniors which replaced the Round Robin on the 5th March, as well as the results of the Club Championships, which have so far produced some outstanding matches.

In the meantime, see you on court this first Sunday (2nd) of the month, and as usual, thanks to all those parents and bystanders who help with the umpiring, scoring, scheduling, organising and generally helping to keep the peace!

Felony or Misdemeanour?

Continued from last month



Now for the best part, excuses for crime. The law presumes that every person is sane and accountable for his actions(if you ever have problems with the inland revenue and you have a creative accountant, ask him about your liability if considered insane under the Mental health Act of 1956), but is open to an offender when charged with an offence to prove that he is not responsible in law for his illegal act because he had no intention or wish to wrong, or to prove that he was justified in doing what he did, the following are some of the defences or excuses recognized:

- a) One that all British Club members might try, *insanity*. The accused may be an idiot or totally deranged in his mind or insane on some subject or subjects (golf or rugby perhaps), and his insanity maybe permanent or temporary. The person can be arrested and charged with the offence and the decision rests with the court on submission of evidence to prove the accused insane (it is interesting to know that at one time distinction was made between the insane and lunatics, since the latter were only insane during periods of the full moon, hence luna-tic.).
- b) Another good reason for the British Club, *Drunkenness*, as a rule not an excuse for crime, except when it is involuntary (that would be difficult to prove for Club members). A person intoxicated is prima facie liable for his acts, but may plead his condition in mitigation of punishment. If fraudulently made drunk by

another an offender would not be accountable for his actions while under that influence, good one to remember.

- c) Ignorance or Mistake. Ignorance of the law will not justify any breach of the law, even when committed by a foreigner or British club member. An honest and reasonable mistake of fact may excuse a crime if the intention of the person committing the crime was not unlawful.
- d) Accident, this may be an excuse for an offence committed in the performance of a lawful act which is being done with proper caution i.e. not negligent.
- e) Compulsion. This excuse is also known as coercion or duress and would probably hold good in a case of a person compelled by direct physical compulsion to commit an offence (e.g. kleptomania, compulsive gambling etc.) Compulsion of necessity will not justify the commission of a crime, even threats to persons or property present or future will not excuse crime.
- f) Married Women, here is a good one, the common law presumed that a crime, other than murder (unfortunately), committed by a wife in the presence of her husband was committed under his coercion and therefore excused her punishment. However this presumption was abolished in 1925, but directs that when a wife is charged with any offence, except treason or murder, it shall be a good defence if she can prove that the offence was committed in the presence of, and under the coercion of her husband. Also another little gem is that Husband and Wife may not be alone found guilty of conspiracy, being for some purposes considered in law as one person and therefore as having but one will.
- g) *Justification*. An act which ordinarily would be criminal may be authorised by law, as in the case of justifiable homicide, in which no guilt or fault attaches itself to the slayer, in this act

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Felony or Misdemeanour?

A previously mentioned, there are certain exemptions from liability of crime, this does not mean that they are not guilty of the crime but are exempt from punishment for the crime which they may commit.

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- a) *The Sovereign*. The maxim is that the Sovereign can do no wrong, and the Sovereign is beyond the reach of the law (for example Charles 1st?).
- b) Foreign Sovereigns and Ambassadors from foreign countries while resident in the U.K. do not come under the jurisdiction of English courts. If they commit Offences they may be requested by the state to leave the country. Diplomatic privileges have been extended (and abused) to staffs and representatives of certain international organisations and to Commonwealth High Commissioners and their official and (believe it or not) their domestic staff.
- c) A Corporation or Company composed of several persons cannot be dealt with as a human person, since it cannot be hanged or imprisoned; but it can be prosecuted as a corporation for all Offences which may be punished by a fine.
- d) *Infants* under the age of 10 are not punishable for any offence, as the law holds that under that age no child can be guilty of any offence. Therefore no child under 10 can be arrested or charged with any offence but may be taken to a place of safety and brought before a court if deemed needing care or control. *Children* between 10 an 14 are regarded as so wanting in discretion that they must not be punished for an offence unless it is proved that they knew quite well that they were doing wrong.

Offenders between 10 and 14 can be arrested and tried for an offence but may not be found

guilty unless there is clear proof of their guilty knowledge. This is an interesting point of law, since if the child kills somebody and conceals the fact, it is implied that he has guilty knowledge, if he killed somebody and told his parents or other witness immediately it could be argued that he had no guilty knowledge since he did not try to conceal the act. Also a boy under 14 cannot commit a rape or any offence of carnal knowledge.

Persons of 14 and upwards are considered to be of sufficient discretion to be liable for their illegal acts, so all exemption is lost from the age of 14.

e) Remission of penalty, this in principle is a remission of punishment by the granting of a pardon with or without condition, or by commuting the sentence. The Sovereign may extend the Royal mercy to any person who may be imprisoned for non payment of any sum of money.

It is time to bring this short article to a close, this article has only covered briefly Crime and Basis of law, other topics such as criminals, Arrest, courts of Justice, procedures, evidence, etc., etc., can cover volumes of books. Nevertheless if anyone is interested in my superficial and cursory sight perhaps at a future date further articles can be submitted for consideration.

I will only be suspicious that if after reading this article I discover that a drunken, compulsive, insane child of an accredited diplomat under the age of 10 accidently but under the mistaken impression that he had justification, commits a criminal offence.


Ladies hockey in Bangkok





HOUSE AND GROUNDS SPECIAL REPORT

Dear members,

Because of the declining income of the Club, House and Grounds have decided on some fairly sweeping measures designed to reverse this trend. The back lawn will be turned into a vegetable garden - this will reduce the cost of purchasing vegetables and members will be able to enjoy really fresh produce. Similarly, all the trees in the grounds will be cut down and replaced by fruit trees. As this will remove the shade provided by the existing trees, sunshade sheets will be available for hire at a modest charge. The committee room at the top right of the stairs, currently somewhat under used, will be mirrored on the walls and ceiling and be available for hire, long or short time.

Downstairs, the Lords Restaurant will be turned into a disco, complete with lights and chromium poles. Earplugs will be available for hire. The snooker room will be completely revamped as a video games room, each game costing 10 baht. Because of the surplus of staff at certain times during the day in the Churchill Bar, it has been decided to introduce licensing hours. These will be 12.00 - 2.00 pm. and 6.00 - 10.30 pm, and the bar will be completely closed on Sundays. This will reduce staff costs.

To further enhance the facilities at the Club, a special chiller unit will be purchased. Curling stones and skates will be available for hire of course.

It is realised that all these exciting new opportunities will attract many more members (and their cars) to the Club. 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Easter Info

Easter is an annual festival commemorating the resurrection of Jesus Christ, and the principal feast of the Christian year. It is celebrated on a Sunday on varying dates between March 22 and April 25 and is therefore called a movable feast. The dates of several other ecclesiastical festivals, extending over a period between Septuagesima Sunday (the ninth Sunday before Easter) and the first Sunday of Advent, are fixed in relation to the date of Easter.

Connected with the observance of Easter are the 40-day penitential season of Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday and concluding at midnight on Holy Saturday, the day before Easter Sunday; Holy Week, commencing on Palm Sunday, including Good Friday, the day of the crucifixion, and terminating with Holy Saturday; and the Octave of Easter, extending from Easter Sunday through the following Sunday. During the Octave of Easter in early Christian times, the newly baptized wore white garments, white being the liturgical color of Easter and signifying light, purity, and joy.

Pre-Christian Tradition

Easter, a Christian festival, embodies many pre-Christian traditions. The origin of its name is unknown. Scholars, however, accepting the derivation proposed by the 8th-century English scholar St. Bede, believe it probably comes from Eastre, the Anglo-Saxon name of a Teutonic goddess of spring and fertility, to whom was dedicated a month corresponding to April. Her festival was celebrated on the day of the vernal equinox; traditions associated with the festival survive in the Easter rabbit, a symbol of fertility, and in colored Easter eggs, originally painted with bright colors to represent the sunlight of spring, and used in Easter-egg rolling contests or given as gifts.

Such festivals, and the stories and legends that explain their origin, were common in ancient

religions. A Greek legend tells of the return of Persephone, daughter of Demeter, goddess of the earth, from the underworld to the light of day; her return symbolized to the ancient Greeks the resurrection of life in the spring after the desolation of winter. Many ancient peoples shared similar legends. The Phrygians believed that their omnipotent deity went to sleep at the time of the winter solstice, and they performed ceremonies with music and dancing at the spring equinox to awaken him. The Christian festival of Easter probably embodies a number of converging traditions; most scholars emphasize the original relation of Easter to the Jewish festival of Passover, or Pesach, from which is derived Pasch, another name for Easter. The early Christians, many of whom were of Jewish origin, were brought up in the Hebrew tradition and regarded Easter as a new feature of the Passover festival, a commemoration of the advent of the Messiah as foretold by the prophets.

The Dating of Easter

According to the New Testament, Christ was crucified on the eve of Passover and shortly afterward rose from the dead. In consequence, the Easter festival commemorated Christ's resurrection. In time, a serious difference over the date of the Easter festival arose among Christians. Those of Jewish origin celebrated the resurrection immediately following the Passover festival, which, according to their Babylonian lunar calendar, fell on the evening of the full moon (the 14th day in the month of Nisan, the first month of the year); by their reckoning, Easter, from year to year, fell on different days of the week.

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Christians of Gentile origin, however, wished to commemorate the resurrection on the first day of the week, Sunday; by their method, Easter occurred on the same day of the week, but from year to year it fell on different dates.

Easter Info

An important historical result of the difference in reckoning the date of Easter was that the Christian churches in the East, which were closer to the birthplace of the new religion and in which old traditions were strong, observed Easter according to the date of the Passover festival. The churches of the West, descendants of Greco-Roman civilization, celebrated Easter on a Sunday.

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Rulings of the Council of Nicaea on the Date of Easter

Constantine I, Roman emperor, convoked the Council of Nicaea in 325. The council unanimously ruled that the Easter festival should be celebrated throughout the Christian world on the first Sunday after the full moon following the vernal equinox; and that if the full moon should occur on a Sunday and thereby coincide with the Passover festival, Easter should be commemorated on the Sunday following. Coincidence of the feasts of Easter and Passover was thus avoided.

The Council of Nicaea also decided that the calendar date of Easter was to be calculated at Alexandria, then the principal astronomical center of the world. The accurate determination of the date, however, proved an impossible task in view of the limited knowledge of the 4th-century world. The principal astronomical problem involved was the discrepancy, called the epact, between the solar year and the lunar year. The chief calendric problem was a gradually increasing discrepancy between the true astronomical year and the Julian calendar then in use.

Later Dating Methods

Ways of fixing the date of the feast tried by the church proved unsatisfactory, and Easter was celebrated on different dates in different parts

of the world. In 387, for example, the dates of Easter in France and Egypt were 35 days apart. About 465, the church adopted a system of calculation proposed by the astronomer Victorinus (flourished 5th century), who had been commissioned by Pope Hilarius (reigned 461-68) to reform the calendar and fix the date of Easter. Elements of his method are still in use. Refusal of the British and Celtic Christian churches to adopt the proposed changes led to a bitter dispute between them and Rome in the 7th century.

Reform of the Julian calendar in 1582 by Pope Gregory XIII, through adoption of the Gregorian calendar, eliminated much of the difficulty in fixing the date of Easter and in arranging the ecclesiastical year; since 1752, when the Gregorian calendar was also adopted in Great Britain and Ireland, Easter has been celebrated on the same day in the Western part of the Christian world. The Eastern churches, however, which did not adopt the Gregorian calendar, commemorate Easter on a Sunday either preceding or following the date observed in the West. Occasionally the dates coincide; the most recent times were in 1865 and 1963.


Because the Easter holiday affects a varied number of secular affairs in many countries, it has long been urged as a matter of convenience that the movable dates of the festival be either narrowed in range or replaced by a fixed date in the manner of Christmas. In 1923 the problem was referred to the Holy See, which has found no canonical objection to the proposed reform. In 1928 the British Parliament enacted a measure allowing the Church of England to commemorate Easter on the first Sunday after the second Saturday in April. Despite these steps toward reform, Easter continues to be a movable feast.
