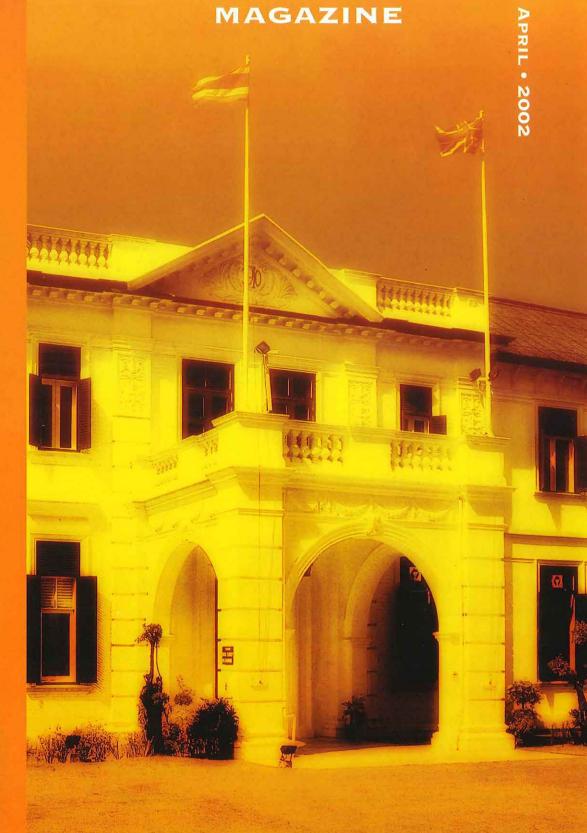

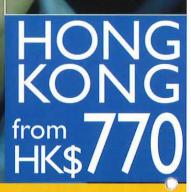

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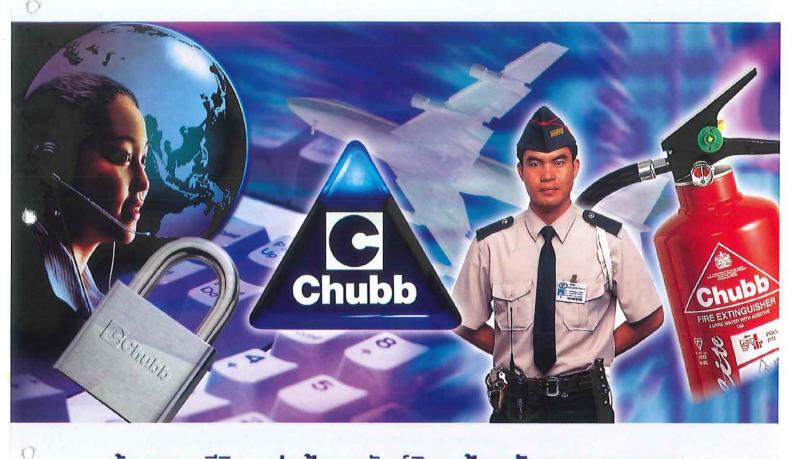
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FROM THE CHAIRMAN

s the British Club, not a tennis Club,

Dear Editor

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Its the British Club, not a tennis club

Recently an e-mail was sent to those known to be interested in playing tennis describing the regular block bookings for special-interest groups on virtually every day of the week. Added to this was some information on further block bookings for the current championship / league matches.

Well it seems to me that the direction of the Club with regard to tennis is going the wrong way. I believe the guiding principle should be that members of the Club should have equal access to the Club's facilities.

I'm not sure how to prosecute this view effectively, except perhaps by bringing it to public attention through the Outpost Magazine. Maybe I'm wrong, but at least this pretty fundamental issue on access to the Club's facilities is worth some discussion. Thus any views would be welcome.

In the meantime, I ask that the Club Committee consider and report back on the proposal that the guiding principle for use of the Club's facilities is that they should be available for equal access by all members. If the Committee agrees: then say so and implement the policy. If they do not agree: well please explain why. As further background my email in response

to the tennis notice is below:



I am going to start the ball rolling on trying to change how tennis courts are booked by responding to your e-mail, which I think will also go to all your addressees. I ask for you also to pass it to the Chairman of Tennis and the Chairman of the Club, if they are not in your list. I think I'm not alone in being increasingly fed up with the booking of tennis courts for different special interst groups to the detriment of other club members. The courts are a facility of the club and, in my view, the guiding principle should be that they are kept available for members to use. I am not against the traditional Wednesday and Sunday afternoon mix-ins. Arguably they are for all to join in, although I would make

All the other block bookings seem to have come into being relatively recently and I believe they should be stopped. Everyone in the club should have equal opportunity to book club facilities. Imagine if I tried to book the bar regularly on a Friday evening for a special interest group. I cannot see the justification of preventing me or others playing on Tuesday and Thursday mornings because the courts are block booked for a ladies group. Indeed for a long time I did play then, but now cannot. I am a Club Member and

I wish not to be prevented from using a Club facility regularly at that time. Similarly, the booking of one of only two hard courts for the so-called 20 best players at

the prime time of Sunday morning and at no cost to those players, is, I think, completely There is a shortage of supply against demand in that the club has only two decent courts, against reasonable practice for a members' Club. ie the hard courts. Thus they should be held available for any Club Member to use under

normal booking arrangements, except for traditional mix-ins on Wednesday evenings This in turn leads to consideration of how courts are booked. It was interesting to hear recently from a previous Chairman of the Club that during his tenure telephone booking

was not allowed. I'm not sure if this is a good or bad thing but it surely is for consideration if it helps to equalise the use of Club facilities by Members. There is an accepted need to keep some form of soft surface for rugby and football sections and for these sections to have suitable access to the soft courts. However, there is a fundamental problem with the soft courts in that the lines cannot be seen and it does

seem that the Club is somewhat weak in resolving this. Whatever, I should like to ask that the hard courts are kept free of block booking, except

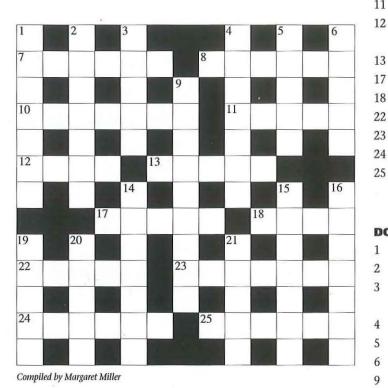

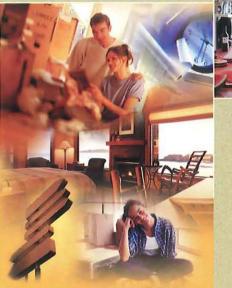

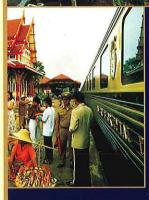

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CLUB HISTORY SINCE 1821

The Club was formed in March 1972 by the amalgamation of the United University Club and the Oxford and Cambridge University Club being called the 'United Oxford and Cambridge University Club'.. For the first year of its

life the Club was housed at 1 Suffolk Street, and thereafter at 71 and 77 Pall Mall. At the time of its creation the Club had 2,897 members and 563 lady associates.

FACILITIES

Dining and Refreshments

The principal dining room - the Coffee Room - is situated on the first floor. Breakfast, Lunch and Dinner are served in this magnificent spacious room which runs the full depth of the Club house.

On the walls are portraits of some founder Members of both the United University Club and the Oxford and Cambridge University Club which were the predecessors of the present Oxford and Cambridge Club. Tables in the Coffee Room can be reserved in advance and a Member dining alone may enjoy the use of a single table.

Situated in the original Club house is the Blomfield Room (Wine Bar) which is decorated with many rowing trophies. A quick moderately priced lunch service can be enjoyed here.

The food draws on both traditional English and French cuisine. Particular pride is taken in both the quality and range of choice and the menu is varied daily.

The Morning Room (Bar) on the first floor is dominated by a portrait of the Duke of Wellington, a founder Member. This room provides Members with newspapers, reference books, and in winter a real fire. Refreshments are available in the Morning Room (Bar) at lunch time and late into the evening.

LIBRARY/GAMES

Some 20,000 books are held in several superb library rooms and books may be borrowed through the Librarian. As a corporate member of the London Library, the Club is able to borrow books on Member's behalf.

Cards can be played most nights at the tables in the Smoking Room and there are several matches held throughout the year.

Chess evenings are held and the Club features prominently in the London inter-club competition.

Golf competitions are held from time to time.

The Billiard Room is of traditional character where many enjoyable evenings can be held.

The squash court area is in the lower part of the Club house, with its own changing room, and has a separate Bar serving drinks, sandwiches and snacks. There are three teams sponsored by the Club and they are well represented in the inter-club Bath Cup. There is no charge for guests.

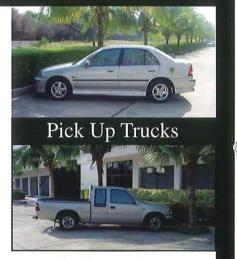
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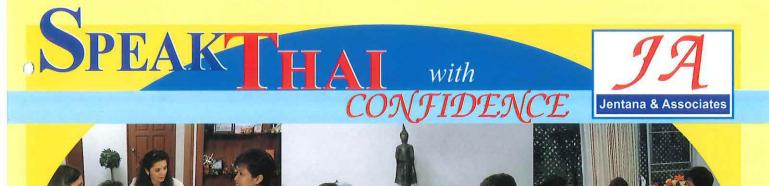
