






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

was there a real St George?

he image of Saint George, renowned for his defense of all in need, is among the most wellrecognized of Christian martyrdom figures. He is primarily famous for being the Patron Saint of England (replacing the former patron, Edward the Confessor) but he is also the most venerated saint in both the Eastern and the Oriental Orthodox Churches. Immortalised in a thousand myths, including the tale of George and the Dragon, he is the patron saint of Canada, Catalonia, Ethiopia, Georgia, Greece, Montenegro, Serbia, the cities of Istanbul, Ljubljana and Moscow, as well as a wide range of professions, organisations and disease sufferers.

Of the man himself, nothing is known with certainty. He was most probably born in Cappadocia (in modern Turkey) of noble, Christian parents and distinguished himself in the Roman army, rising to the rank of tribune . . . Eusebius of Caesarea, in 322 AD, writes of a nobleborn soldier of high rank in the Roman army, being thrown into prison for vehemently disagreeing with Emperor Diocletian's persecution of Christians and, despite being tortured, refusing to recant his beliefs. The following day, April 23, 303, he was dragged through the streets of Nicomedia (near modern day Istanbul) and beheaded. The Emperor's wife, Alexandria, was so impressed at the soldier's courage, that she converted immediately to the Christian faith and was also put to death. Although Eusebius makes no mention of the nobleman's name, country of birth or place of interment, it seems likely that this is the beginning of the St George leaend.

The popularity of St George starts with the totally unauthenticated Acta Sancti Georgii ("Acts of St. George"), which glorified his exploits and made him a big hit with the Eastern Orthodox Church from the fifth century on. His fame spread to England in the eighth century when the 'Acts' were translated into Anglo Saxon. Due to his widespread following, particularly in the Near East, and the many miracles which were coming to be attributed to him, George became universally recognized as a saint sometime after 900. He was adopted as the Patron Saint of soldiers after he was said to have appeared to the crusading armies during the Battle of Antioch in 1098 and Richard I ("The Lionheart") also adopted St George as protector of his army whilst campaigning in Palestine during 1191 and 1192. In 1222, the Synod of Oxford declared that a special celebration in his honor would take place every April 23 and, by the end of the fourteenth century, Saint George had been officially acknowledged as the Patron Saint of England . . . And the rest, as the say, is history.



Dear Members,

Development

We sincerely apologise for the inconvenience and thank you for bearing with us whilst the Churchill Bar is completed. We can assure you that some of the work to date has not been accepted and the Club has not signed any documents to the contrary.

Whilst there is some progress, we are disappointed with the fact that members are having to put up with a sub-standard product. The outstanding items (at the time of writing) include, but are not limited to, lack of glass in some of the wood panels; steel frames in the wood panelling; locks and bolts on all the windows; the open passageway to the kitchen; the bar bumper and hiding the WI-FI router. However, these problems are not insurmountable and with the aid of our new Project Management Team and the cooperation of the contractors we are confident that these issues will be resolved quickly.

There will also be a final coat of paint or varnish over all surfaces once all the defects have been rectified.

We shall be keeping you up to date on the progress of The Verandah via the notice boards and via emails from the Club.

Financials

The Club has started the new financial year very well and is THB 800,000 above budgeted surplus and THB 200,000 above last year's surplus at the same stage. March was an excellent month both in terms of Food & Beverage and Entrance Fees from

new members. The surpluses will enable the Club to limit its borrowing for Phase II of the Development Plan

The monthly financial statement is posted on the notice boards with relevant comments should you wish to review the figures. There is also a monthly Treasury Work Group meeting in which the figures are discussed and any member may attend this meeting. Please feel free to contact me if you would like to attend.



ANYONE FOR BALUT?

The Invitation

The Tanglin Club Balut Section from Singapore are planning to come to Bangkok on the weekend of the 28^{th} to 30^{th} April, and we are organising a tournament for the afternoon of SATURDAY 28^{th} APRIL. We will be having an "Introduction to Balut" on 9^{th} April at 7.00 pm.



Balut is a dice game invented at the end of WWII by an American soldier who lacked playing cards for playing poker, and initially named the game Poker Dice. Years later, in the early 1970s a Dane named Niels Lumholdt working for Thai Airways picked up how to play the game but decided to name the game Balut when he brought it with him back to Bangkok. The word "balut" in Filipino is the name of an unhatched duck egg and these are commonly sold by street sellers walking around screaming "BALUUUUT".

The Game

The game consists of 28 rounds. In each round, you roll five ordinary dice and then score the roll in one of seven categories:

- O 'Fours'/'Fives'/'Sixes' based upon the number of each you rolled.
- O 'Straights' like Poker, a run from 1-5 or 2-6
- O 'Choice' again like Poker, a set of three and a pair
- O 'Balut' all five dice with the same number.

Once you have scored four times in each of the seven categories, all the scores are then totalled and the winner declared!



GGCITING **Easter** Craft

These bright and funky eggs are a blast for kids to make - and they're a great party decoration too. If packed away carefully, they should last for years.

CRAFT MATERIALS:

- Thin cotton yarn
- Balloons
- Craft glue
- Newspaper
- Waxed paper
- Clothespeg
- Clothes hanger




1. For each egg, cut twenty 3-foot-long strands of cotton yarn and blow up a balloon to a 6- to 8-inch diameter. Mix equal parts of glue and water in a shallow disposable container.





2. Cover your work area with newspaper and a sheet of waxed paper. Hold a strand of yarn by one end, dip it into the glue mixture, then wrap it around the balloon. Repeat with the other strands, randomly overlapping them and tucking in loose ends, until the balloon is evenly covered.



Your child can mark spring's arrival (or the Thai New Year) with this colourful eggshaped chalk.

CRAFT MATERIALS:

- Plastic eggs
- Petroleum jelly
- Plastic spoon
- Plaster of Paris
- Powdered tempera paint

Time needed: Afternoon or Evening

1. To make a piece, first separate the halves of a plastic egg. Liberally coat the insides with petroleum jelly, adding extra near the seam, and then set both halves upright in an empty egg carton.

2. In a disposable cup, use a plastic spoon to mix together 1/4 cup of plaster of Paris, 2 tablespoons of cold water, and about 2 tablespoons of powdered tempera paint. Spoon the plaster into the egg halves, filling them both almost to the top, and let it set for a few minutes until it reaches a mud-like consistency. Then snap the plastic egg back together and briskly shake it to combine the mixture.

3. Repeat for each colour of chalk, disposing of the cups and spoons in the rubbish bin. Let the chalk eggs set overnight before removing them from the moulds, wedging the tip of a table knife between the chalk and the plastic (a parent's job) to help loosen it, if needed.





As this pretty flowerpot proves, a traditional basket isn't the only container that can hold Easter treasures.

CRAFT MATERIALS:

- Terra-cotta flowerpot
- Acrylic paint
- Puff Paint
- Construction paper
- Scissors
- Large Iollipop
- Tape
- Pen



Time needed: Under 1 Hour

- 1. Paint the pot with non-toxic acrylic paints. Once it has dried, add an Easter greeting with puffy
- 2. For the flower, cut out some paper petals and tape them to the back of an oversize lollipop, wrap the lollipop stick with green paper to make a stem, then plant it in the pot.
- 3. To personalize the pot, write the person's name on a simple green construction paper leaf or paint their name on the flowerpot.

To complete the flower theme, fill the "Easter pot" with gummy worms, ladybug stickers, candy eggs and butterfly barrettes (hair-pins) or other treats.

Method:

- Bring stock to the boil. Add galangal, lemongrass, lime leaves, mushrooms, chilli, lime juice, fish sauce a little bite sugar and simmer until fragrant about 2-3 minutes.
- 2. Add pork and simmer.
- Add tomato and sprinkle with chilli, coriander leaves, cook briefly about 20 seconds. Remove from the heat immediately.

Hot cross buns

"Crossed" buns were originally used in pagan ceremonies and rituals and so, of course, the Christian Church attempted to ban them! But they were just too popular so the Church eventually 'Christianised' the buns.

During the reign of Queen Elizabeth I a law was passed limiting consumption of hot cross buns to proper religious ceremonies, such as Christmas, Easter or funerals.

Here's a traditional recipe:

Ingredients:

- oz Caster sugar
- 4 fl. oz. water
- fl. oz milk
- oz fresh yeast
- Ib plain flour
- tsp salt
- heaped tsp ground 1 mixed spice
- oz raisins
- oz mixed peel
- oz melted butter 2
- beaten egg



Mix these together to form the paste that is piped into the buns (see Method: stage 9).

- tbsp plain flour
- tbsp caster sugar
- 3-4 tbsp water

Method:

- 1. Cream the fresh yeast and sugar together.
- 2. Add the beaten egg to this mixture.
- 3. Warm the milk, water and butter to blood heat temperature, then add these to the above mixture.
- 4. Add the flour, salt, mixed peel and raisins and mixed spice.
- 5. Work to dough, knead for about 5 minutes.
- 6. Cover and leave until the dough has doubled in
- 7. Now knock back the risen dough to its original
- 8. Roll into small buns, place on a well-greased baking tray. Leave these to rise for approx. 30 mins.
- 9. When risen, cut a cross into each bun, this is where you will pipe in the cross mixture.
- 10.Place into a pre heated oven Gas mark 7 for 15-20 minutes.



- 1 oz Grenadine Syrup

Shake all ingredients together and pour into fancy glass Garnish with a slice of orange



The Cornish Pasty started life as the working lunch for the tin miners to take underground with them. The pasty was easy to carry, could be eaten with dirty fingers (and the outer pastry thrown away) and it was nourishing. It could even have savoury at one end and sweet at the other.



Often miners would eat one half of their pasty for breakfast and leave the remaining half for lunch, so they had them baked with their initials to distinguish one pasty from another.

A typical pasty recipe for two would be:-

Shortcrust Pastry

225 gm plain flour

115 gm fat (mixture of lard & butter)

(calorie warning**)

pinch of salt

225 gm steak cut into small cubes 2 or 3 large potatoes piece of turnip or swede onion, peeled and chopped salt and pepper

Method:

- 1. Sift the flour with the salt, rub in the fat and mix to a pliable consistency with some water, leave to rest for half an hour.
- 2. Roll out half the pastry into a round about 5mm thick (quarter of an inch).
- 3. Peel and slice the potatoes thinly onto the centre of round to form a base for the rest of the filling.
- 4. Slice the turnip thinly over the potato, then spread the beef on top.
- 5. Add a little onion, season with salt and pepper.
- 6. Dampen the edge of the circle of pastry with water to help seal it, bring together the edges and make a parcel with the filling in the centre.
- 7. There should be a neat pastry parcel. If you do get any holes, then patch them with a little extra pastry. You can make the pastry neater by crimping the edges. Fold over the edge to make it slightly thicker, then squeeze tightly every 2 cms to make a neat pattern along the edge.
 - 8 Put the pastry on a piece of buttered paper, make a small slit on the top to let the steam out, brush the top with a little milk, and put it on a greased baking tray.
 - Bake in a pre-heated oven at 200C (gas mark 6) for 30 minutes, reduce the heat to 190C (gas mark 5) and cook for another 30 minutes.
 - 10. You can make the pasty as a starter, by making it smaller. Use a saucer as a template to get the size.







Cricket and Squash in Chiang Mai, January 20/21

Last year the annual cricket/ squash weekend in Chiang Mai was cancelled because of flooding, but this year the Gymkhana Club looked magnificent


