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

SARNELLI HOUSE

Bangkok Gentlemen Spoofers Charity Project

The Spoofers have recently completed their eighth Charity Project of the last ten years, all being funded from monies raised at the Thai National Championships and Asian Spoofing Championships. The Spoofers have now raised over 1.6 million baht, of which some 1.4 million baht has so far been spent on charitable Projects.

This latest Project expended 185,000 baht on providing 100 purpose-built desks and chairs, plus wall & ceiling fans, new lighting and other refurbishments for study rooms at the Sarnelli House Orphanage near Nong Khai. On Saturday 9th March, four Spoofers, led by Co-Chairman Tony Rodriguez, visited Sarnelli House to mark the completion of the project and to see for themselves the wonderful work being done there by the Redemptorist Order. These priests have founded, and operated for the past 14 years, a network of some seven Houses, all within a few kilometres of each other, which care for upwards of 150 children. These children are mostly aged between two and sixteen. Many are infected with HIV/AIDS and all have been either orphaned, owing to their parents dying of AIDS, or abused or abandoned. The Houses are organised by age and with teenage boys and girls having separate Houses. Some are for HIV infected children and some for the non-infected.

The visiting Spoofers were taken on an extensive tour of the Houses and shown the new desks etc in place in the various study rooms. We were also shown the Farm which has been started, with the aim of providing some 80% of the food needed to feed the children - rice fields, vegetable plots, chicken and pig rearing. What impressed us most on our tour was the cheerful and polite demeanour of the children and their positive engagement with ourselves and the staff. They are clearly exceptionally well cared for and given all the care, affection, schooling and a safe home environment that had previously been denied them.

The medical regime to care for those with HIV is most professionally managed by a specially-trained Australian (unpaid) volunteer nurse, who has been working there now for the past five years with great dedication.

Fr Michael and his staff have achieved a remarkable amount for so many children. They never know for certain from one year to the next where the required funding will come from but so far it has continued to arrive by some miracle or another and they have never turned away any child who has been brought to them for shelter and care.

As with all the Spoofers' projects undertaken for the benefit of disadvantaged children in Thailand, this is very much one that can be considered extremely worthwhile and hugely appreciated by the recipients.

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MAGICAL MUSIC

From the Stage:

The Bangkok Music Society encourages the performance of Western classical music, but we also raise funds for other voluntary groups. Proceeds from "Under Her Spell", performed at the British Club on 19 February, helped support the work of NightLight International, an organisation working with trafficked women trapped in Bangkok's commercial sex industry.

Mostly I chose songs and duets from the 17th century which witnessed the flowering of music depicting real three-dimensional women, in contrast to the stereotypes of previous ages. More songs about women in the sex trade were written in the 17th century than before or since. We also performed medieval songs celebrating the Virgin Mary, and an 18th century duet by Handel, about a young woman from an occupied country forced into prostitution by the occupying army.

From the Audience:

Following hot on the heels of St Valentine's Day it was, perhaps, appropriate that the Bangkok Music Society's concert was entitled "Under her Spell".

The programme was divided into five sections: La Musica - the Ancient Greek goddess of music, and the creation of opera; The Virgin Mary - Heaven and Earth united within the body of a Woman; Bloody Mary - the short and bloody reign of Queen Mary I of England; Wife, Maid and Mistress - a 17th century view of character; and What Magic has Victorious Love! - a survey of music with women as its theme. There were different combinations of instruments (harpsichord, flute, viola da gamba) and voices (mezzo soprano, countertenor, tenor and baritone) throughout, and also The Assumption University Gregorian Chant Choir.

Western classical music displays a surprising absence of women composers, one notable exception being Hildegard of Bingen, whose music was performed in the Virgin Mary section. The programme evoked reflection on how male composers have treated women as musical subject matter over the centuries. How many of us, for whom "Greensleeves" is such a familiar melody, were aware that the wearer of the greensleeves was a prostitute?

The interval brought with it very welcome complimentary Bloody Marys, followed by some particularly beautiful pieces by Henry Purcell. Judging by the audience's enthusiastic reaction both before and after those Bloody Marys, the concert was greatly enjoyed by all, with the performers justly deserving the rapturous applause.

OUR DECQUICENTENARY

"Some milestones of our first eleven decades"

1903-1913

- The Club is founded on 23rd April 1903
- The first Clubhouse opens on 7th July 1903
- The second and present Clubhouse opens on 23rd April 1910

1913-1923

- Land donated by H.M. King Rama VI in 1914
- Club mortgaged to the Chartered Bank of India in 1915
- Bangkok Lawn Tennis Club (current poolside) purchased in 1919

1923-1933

- A tramway on Silom Road in 1925 prompts us to open a back gate
- Club remortgaged to the Hong Kong & Shanghai Bank in 1927
- Siam becomes a Constitutional Monarchy in June 1932

1933-1943

- Local beer Singha joins our menu of imported beers in 1933
- British Envoy Sir Josiah Crosby calls meeting on 8th December 1941
- The Club ceased on 9th December 1941 with the Japanese invasion

1943-1953

- The Club was re-opened on 10th September 1946 with 60 members
- Single ladies could use the Club with 'Ladies Privileges' from 1948
- Membership extended to 'those of British descent' in 1952

1953-1963

- Ambassador Sir Berkeley Gage becomes Honorary Member in 1954
- Membership interviews first instigated by Committee in 1958
- The Thepanom was adopted as the Club logo in 1960

1963-1973

- The Club mortgage with the HSBC was finally paid off in 1965
- The Swimming Pool and Squash Court 1 opened in 1966
- Squash Court 2 and the Dining Room opened in 1971

1973-1983

- Pravit Purananda becomes first Thai and first Associate member in 1977
- Silom Sala and Squash Court 3 open in 1981
- New Centre & No. 1 tennis courts opened by Björn Borg in 1983

1983-1993

- The Bar renamed the Churchill Bar in 1983
- The Poolside Bar re-opened as the Surawong Sala in 1986
- Miss J.V. Candy becomes first female member in 1986

1993-2003

- The Pisamai Fund Club charity started in 1993
- Associate membership quota increased to one third in 1997
- Club Centenary celebrated with 100 minutes of free drinks in 2003!

2003-2013

- First female Chairman, Mrs Angela Daniel, elected in 2005
- Churchill Bar and Lords dining room swapped locations in 2007
- Swimming Pool and Fitness Centre refitted in 2012



HOLY DAYS & FESTIVALS

This is a Public Holiday first decreed in the UK following the Bank Holidays Act 1871 although many Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox countries also celebrated this as a feast day, being the day after the Resurrection of Jesus Christ.

This Thai observance day celebrates the founding by H.M. King Vajiravudh (Rama VI) of what is now the Government Savings Bank on 1st April 1913 – the Thai Government uses this day to urge Thai people to save.



THAI HERITAGE

CONSERVATION

DAY April 2nd



Not actually a holiday but a day whose earliest record is in Canterbury Tales (1392) whereby people play jokes on each other until midday. Members may recall the General Committee placing ten 'Reserved for GC' signs in the Silom Car park on this day in 2006 ... some Members were not amused!

On 26th February 1985 the Thai Government decreed that from the thirtieth birthday of H.R.H. Princess Maha Chakri Sirindhorn on 2nd April 1985 that this day would be Thai Heritage Conservation Day.



April 13th to 15th is the Therevadin Buddhist New Year – the days themselves named Wan Maha Songkran, Wan Nao and Wan Thaloeng Sok. This year the Thai Government has added Friday 12th and Tuesday 16th as well, although banks should be open on 12th. Although most people only see Songkran as a water throwing festival, it was traditionally a time to pay respect to one's elders and to monks, and to clean the Buddha images at household shrines and in monasteries.

Members are reminded that throwing water in the Club is not permitted.



FAMILY DAY April 14th

CHAKRIDAY

April 6th

Traditionally held on the second day of Songkran since 1991, this day is dedicated to family life and most families try to gather on this day.

This is the festival day for the patron saint of England, St. George and also the Club's birthday! Born around 275AD, George was of Greek Christian parentage and became a tribune in the Roman army in the personal guard of Emperor Diocletian. However in 302AD the Emperor decreed that all Roman soldiers must offer sacrifices to the Roman Gods. After many attempts at persuasion, George would not give up his Christian faith and so was executed on 23rd April 303. King Edward II of England (1327-1377) adopted Saint George, the solider saint, as the patron saint of England and in 1348 the Most Noble Order of the Garter was founded in his name.







Most of you will have noticed the strange rectangular shape that has appeared recently at the edge of the Front Lawn next to the turtle pond. This is our new Pétanque Court. Pétanque (pronounced 'pay-tonk') is a simple and social game, quite similar to the beach bowls we play in England.

General Pétanque Rules

- 2 teams of 1 or more players
- With singles or doubles, players use 3 boules each but with triples, they use 2 each.
- The aim is to get your team's boules closer to the small ball ('coche' or 'jack') than your opponent's boules.

Deciding Who Goes First

The normal method is with a toss of a coin.


Tossing the Coche (small ball)

The team that wins the coin toss chooses the starting location and then selects one of their players to throw out the coche. The starting location is usually a drawn circle, but on the small British Club Court standing behind the wooden boundary at one end is fine. The player who leads off stands with both feet inside the circle and throws the coche. The coche can be thrown in any direction but must come to rest within 6 to 10 metres of the starting circle and one metre away from any obstacle.

Throwing Your Boules

Boules must be thrown from within the starting circle and with both feet on the ground. The aim is to throw the boule so that it comes to rest as close to the coche as possible; it is allowable to touch or move the coche. The player should stay in the circle until their boule has landed. Next, a player from the other team will have their throw. They will step into the circle and try to land their boule closer to the coche - it is fully allowable to knock your opponent's boule out of the way as part of the process. (In fact as you become more experienced, you will see it is an important part of the strategy of the game). The boule closest to the coche is said to be "holding the point." The other team must then continue throwing their boules until they are holding the point or they run out of boules.

Team members are not required to play in any particular order when throwing their boules; however, they must only throw their own boules and they must throw their boules one at a time from within the starting circle. They must also only throw



their own boules; they cannot borrow boules from a team mate. If they take the lead (hold the point), the other team then tries to reverse the situation by landing a leading boule.

Winning the End

Once a team has thrown all its boules, the other side is allowed to throw their remaining boules. Once all boules are thrown, the points are counted. The team that has their boule closest to the coche wins that end. Additionally, they also get an extra point for each boule that is closer to the coche than their opponents' closest boule. Only one team scores points per end. You cannot score negative points.

Beginning a New End

Once the points are tallied, the next end begins with the

previous end's winners drawing a new starting circle. The team that won the previous end then selects a team player to toss out the coche to start the process all over again.

Winning the Game

The first team to 13 points wins the game. There is no minimum or maximum number of ends that must be played. The Pétanque boules can be collected from the Fitness Centre. They must be signed in and signed out after each session. Members who sign them out are fully accountable for the boules until they are returned and signed back in.

We will be holding a friendly Pétanque tournament within the next few weeks. I hope to see as many of you participating as possible!

In the last couple of weeks, there have been some additions to the Poolside area to make it more environmentally satisfying.


A floral display wall has been erected next to the showers, which is lovely and also masks the kitchen area behind it.

Four new Riviera-style sunshades have been installed, each of which has a floral display at its base. These are white, providing full shade cover whilst allowing maximum light beneath.


The existing sunshade umbrellas have been refitted with white material to blend with the new sunshades and the overall colour scheme of the area.

SQUASHY BITS By Bruce Madge








Soi Dao Away Weekend – February 23rd/24th/25th




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STANDREW'S ON COURSE

WEAK 2-BIDS (An article by Larry Cohen)

In the first 30-40 years of contract bridge, all two-level openings were strong and natural. Then, sanity prevailed. Now, 2 (artificial) is used for all (rarely-dealt) strong hands, freeing up 2 , 2 , 2 for more practical use. Today, only dinosaurs use strong 2-bids (although ACOL and other systems where 2 , 2 , and 2 have special meanings are prevalent in certain areas of the world).

What should a weak two-bid show? Typically a 6-card suit and about 5-10 HCP. Within that definition there is lots of room. I wouldn't open 2 with:

♦KQJ1098 ♥-- ♦A432 ♠652 – This hand is way too good—it is a 1♠ opening.

Meanwhile, I'd gladly open 2 with:

▲KJ10986 **♥**4 **◆**10874 **♣**32 -- Even though it is out of the HCP range.

At one point (in the mid-1980's) the ACBL had the "5-and-5 rule" (some people called it the "Marty Bergen rule"). You had to have at least a 5-card suit and 5 HCP for a weak two-bid. That rule lasted only a year or so. Now, "anything goes."

There is lots of room for judgment. Vulnerability and position are crucial. If you are vulnerable, try to have a good suit and to be at the upper end of the HCP range. If you are in second seat (a bad position to preempt because the contract could easily belong to your side), be very sound. In all situations, be aware of suit quality. I don't think it is a good idea to preempt with a suit of jack-empty-sixth.

Here are the "top-three" questions students ask me about weak two's:

1. Can you open a weak two-bid with a void?

2. Can you have a side four-card major?

3. Do I need 2 of the top 3 honours?

My answers:

1. Side voids?

Absolutely possible. I wouldn't preempt if the void made the hand too good for a preempt (see the first example in this article). But, if the hand is in range, why not have a void? I can't imagine not opening $2 \ge 10943 = -222$ with, say: $\ge K \downarrow 10943 = -222$ ≥ 9864 .

2. Side majors?

You can preempt with a side 4-card major. But, I wouldn't open 2 ♠ with, say: ♠Q J 8 7 6 5 ♥A Q 10 3 ♦5 4 ♣3. We could easily belong in hearts, and I'd be afraid of preempting our side out of that suit. However, I'd proudly open 2 ♠ with, say,

♠KQJ1087♥8743 ♦32 ♣2. Who cares about the hearts when my spades are so good and my hearts are so bad?

3. Top honours?

Not really important. Rather than focus on the top honours, I care more about the intermediate spots. I'd much rather have Q J 10 9 8 7 than A K 5 4 3 2. The cards in the middle are what make the suit of "good quality" for preempting.

Here are a few (relatively easy) examples. Note the vulnerability and position. Assume you are playing a "normal" style (not superconservative, not crazy aggressive). Answers at the end of the article:

What would you open as dealer, nobody vulnerable?

A) ♠1096542 ♥A762 ♦A2 ♣2	B) ♠65 ♥KQJ853 ♦762 ♣54	C) ♠83 ♥2 ♦8762 ♣KQJ1082	D)	What would you open in second seat, vulnerable against not?
E)	F)	G)	H)	
♠Q 4 2	♠53	♠2	♠A 10 7 6 5 2	
♥K J 8 6 5 2	♥2	♥K Q 10 9 7 2	♥Q 43

Answers:

1. Pass. No weak two for me with that awful suit.

2. 2. If you are waiting for V Q J 10 9 8, you'll never get to preempt. This is a textbook weak two (albeit a minimum).

3. 3. Since there is no weak two-bid in clubs, we sometimes have to open 3. with only a six-card suit.

4. 2. The side-void doesn't bother me. The side four-card club suit is no problem. The suit is excellent. So, why not 2.

5. No. It's not so much the side major that is the problem. It is the poor heart suit. Maybe with VI 10 9 x x we could talk. But, second seat unfavourable calls for extreme soundness.

6. 2♦. Great suit, great shape—no reason not to preempt.

7. 2♥. Sure. Why not?

8. Pass. Terrible suit for a weak two, especially in this seat at these colours.


