* For those members with a taste for Mexican food (and as an alternative to the THAI ROOM or the MEXICO) an interesting alternative called the LISBOA opposite the Malaysia Hotel in Soi Ngam Duplee is worth trying, particularly for their chicken enchiladas. As an aperitif, eyeball the notice board in the hotel first, and have something to talk about.

* In my opinion the best Thai-Muslim food in Bangkok can be found at LA-ONG in old Hongkong Bank/Bush Lane. Open even on Fridays - closed on Sundays and you can kick the cats.

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* Housewives please note that Bill Heinecke has demolished the upstairs DAIRY LANE COFFEE SHOP (a long time ago he used to have a franchise on it I believe) but after your shopping the DOWN TOWN next door is good value. (Get there early for lunch)

* The Sri Lankan (Ceylon) Embassy has packets of assorted spices for sale at very reasonable prices (or they can tell you from whom you can buy them) otherwise curry lovers should go down Silom Road to the New Road junction. On the opposite right hand corner there is a good spice shop.

* Plug-of-the-Month goes to the Spanish-named, Chinese-owned French restaurant LA PALOMA in Mahaesak Road off Silom (opposite THE WALL). Parking (ask the doorman the way) is in the M.D. Hospital compound. Businessmen's lunches, good decor. The menu is very broad and it is priced somewhat below LE VENDOME and the METROPOLITAIN. Clams, kidneys, tripe, pickled pigs trotters, very good and fresh oysters, substantial steaks, and a menu on the wall outside so that you can check your budget before you go in! Its one of the few restaurants I know which keeps on improving. (Budget Baht 150.- p.p. less drinks).



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RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Stuffed Beef Rolls

Have your maid purchase a few slices of meat (beef or even buffalo) these slices should be at least 15 x 15 cm in size and as thin as possible.

Take a tenderizer hammer and beat the slices of meat until they are the same thickness all over (about 3 mm)

Sprinkle salt and pepper according to your taste, even put more than you would normally use.

Take some hot mustard and spread it in the same way as you would spread butter on a sandwich.

Take two slices of smoked bacon, half an onion and half a pickle, put on top of the mustard then roll the meat very tight and secure the rolls by taking a thin thread and wrap it around the rolls.

Cooking:

Heat some cooking oil in a pot then add the beef rolls and fry them until all the water in the meat and mustard is gone. Fry the beef rolls until they get brown. Then add a little water so that the beef rolls will be half covered with water, keep adding water and cook until the meat is tender.

Serve the beef rolls with mashed or boiled potatoes. If you would like to serve a vegetable with this dish I recommend red cabbage simmered with cloves and some fried bacon.

Upgrading of Electrical Supply



GOLF SECTION

On Sunday 25th March, the Golf Section had their first outing this year to Hua Mark 'A' Course and this proved to be a very pleasant day as the course was in excellent condition. With all golfers moving smartly around the course the test of endurance experienced at the Rose Garden two weeks previously was not repeated. The Club was playing for prizes donated by Cathay Pacific Airways and the competition was an Individual Stableford. First prize went to John Davidson, who with 38 points just pipped Peter Speed who had the same number of points but a poorer second-half. Third prize was collected by Ernie Jurgens who is now making it a habit of getting amongst the silverware. Leon Van der Watt played his usual strong game and picked-up the prize for the best low gross score with an 86. Magnus Stirling and Tommy Madar, belying his years, collected the prizes for the best front and back nine respectively.

Peter Speed making it a day to remember also collected a prize for nearest the pin on the 4th hole, and not to be out done Ernie Jurgens also won a second prize for nearest the pin on the 16th hole.

Peter Speed and Margaret Miller chose the occasion to do battle with Dennis and Anne Quinn in the semi-final of the Dunlop Trophy. Dennis and Anne took a quick lead and by the 5th hole were lying 2 up but by the turn Margaret and Peter had pulled back to make the match all square. The lead changed hands regularly thereafter until by the 16th again it was all square but with Peter and Margaret due strokes on the last three holes, it was apparent that the Quinns had a struggle on their hands. As it transpired Peter and Margaret won the 16th and 17th to seal the match 2 and 1 thereby booking themselves a place in the final. The other semi-final did not take place, as Pravit had to wing off to U.K. and his partner, Peter Adcock was otherwise engaged. Over the long weekend of 13th/14th of April, the Golf Section set-off for Pattaya with The Siam Country Club and Sattahip being the venues for the matches. On Friday, the competition was a Four-Ball-Better-Ball Stableford with prizes being sponsored by Italthai. The course, while looking rather brown, was in fact in excellent condition as heavy rain on the Thursday had given the fairways a good "spring" and as a result most players found the course playing easy. Rupert Jamieson/Hans Daniels and David Frost/Mike Neville with better-ball scores of 46 were eyeing the silverware until Jacques Morin and Iain Brown who were in the last group, returned a best ball score of 47 points, thereby taking the first prize. Rupert and Hans won 2nd prize on a countback with David and Mike collecting third prize. For the front nine, John Davidson partnered by Sheila Neville with 21 points, won on a countback and for the 2nd nine, again with 21 points, Charles McLaughlin and Leo Bandiera took the honours. The nearest-the-pin prizes went to David Frost and Hans Daniels.

On Saturday, with a 7.30 tee-off at Sattahip, all golfers climbed out of bed to the background of a thunderstorm and rain pouring down, but all set off for the course, quietly confident that it was only a temporary downpour. Despite assurances from our wellknown French meteorologist, the first group in fact did not tee-off until 9 a.m. by which time all the other golfers had shown better sense, and had decided to go home to bed. As a result we had the course to ourselves and in some cases it was just as well. Sattahip is never a particularly easy course and when played in a steady drizzle it is even more difficult and this was reflected in the scores. However, Hans Daniels, presumably feeling he was back in his native Holland managed to put together a very good 34 points, and therefore won the Individual Stableford prize, which was sponsored by British Airways. Mike Neville doing his best to attract the attention of the Handicapper quietly slipped in with 33 as did John Davidson, but as Mike had the better inward nine, he collected 2nd prize and John picked up 3rd.




These useful tips will help you...




Avoid crowds during packing days by selling unwanted items well in advance. Packing is more secure and faster if only packers are present during packing days.




New furniture should be delivered at least two weeks before packing to ensure dry finishes. Furniture should not be oiled during the last two weeks as the oil might seep during transit: wrapping paper may adhere to and spoil finishes.




If possible, disconnect all electrical appliances, particularly refrigerators, deep freezes, airconditioners and stoves, the day before packing.



Discard all combustible liquids (such as lighter fuel) and acrosol cans from your belongings.

Have all your travel documents – passports, tickets, tax clearances, etc. -- assembled prior to packing.
