
# The Bc Trip To Surin For The Elephant Round Up - Nov 14-16



Stuart is installing inventory systems into PTT with Email as a pilot project, which, if successful, may ensure a stay of longer than 3 months. From Yorkshire but



London-born Yvan's from Surrey and turned 30 as this issue of Outpost was rolling off the press. He's still single and he plays squash.




### Mr. and Mrs. Paul Jensen




#### **Ms. Meredith McNab**

# The march goes on!

Is the Farang League season approaches its climax BC are poised on top of the table four points clear with only two games to go. The local press are already hailing us as champions, but Greg Watkins and his men won't believe it until the final games are played and the points are won.

# Strength in Depth BC 1st XI 4 - 1 Siemens

The strength of Greg Watkins' squad was demonstrated in a difficult fixture against Siemens. Without top scorer Tim Ross, injured, Dave Atkinson, suspended, and George Everest, flu, BC were able to put out a strong team which Siemens were never able to match. The game started at a lively pace, with Siemens marginally on top in the first fifteen minutes, but making no progress towards the BC goal. Having absorbed the pressure, the BC midfield took over, and after twenty minutes Keith Dougall scored a fine solo goal from a narrow angle. BC looked comfortably in control until five minutes before half time when a harmless through ball into our penalty area took a deflection off a defender's foot, and with Norman Bright unsure as to whether to treat it as a back-pass, a Siemens player nipped in and helped the ball into our net. Half time BC 1-1 Siemens.

### Lively play

The second half started out in a similar way with livelier play from Siemens, but little progress towards the BC goal. Ten minutes into the half excellent work from Keith Dougall, Marc Hagelauer and Chris Davin resulted in a BC penalty which Willie Carruthers coolly fired in. John Cochrane had a goal disallowed shortly before being substituted by Nigel Oakins. For the remainder of the match Siemens never managed to trouble Norman, and at the other end BC opportunism saw further goals from Nigel and a first goal for Stuart Bradley on his Farang League debut.

# One-Way Traffic BC 1st XI 7 - 0 Scandinavians

A completely one-sided game against a weak Scans team. With a full squad to choose from Greg Watkins turned out a strong team which the Scans could not compete with. Twenty minutes after the kick off BC were 6-0 up and the game as a spectacle was over! A hat-trick from Keith Dougall, two from Tim Ross and one from Dave Atkinson did the damage, and the remainder of the half was understandably an anti-climax. Half time BC 6-0 Scans The half time pep talk saw Greg and Chris Davin trying to motivate the team to keep up the pressure. All three substitutes, Vaughan Elias, Nigel Oakins and Stuart Bradley were introduced with no disruption to team rhythm. # Ron Thomson's Adages Golfing Terms

The game of golf originated in Scotland and it is thought that the oldest recorded Club is at Muirfield, Edinburgh. In the 16th and 17th centuries the French Navy maintained a Naval College on the Firth of Forth just outside Edinburgh. On weekends the Cadets would carry the golfers' bags to earn some pocket money. The French pronunciation of "Cadet" was, and still is, "Caddie".

### **Plus Fours**

These were very popular with golfers in the 1920s. To obtain the width necessary to allow the tuck to be properly made below the knees, the trousers required an extra four inches of width at that point, or simply "plus four (inches)".

#### From the Horse's Mouth

Thus: guaranteed correct. Before the births of foals were registered the only accurate way to


assess the age of a horse was to open its mouth and inspect its incisors or front teeth.

#### **To Pass the Buck**

Meaning: to pass responsibility, came from the USA. Its first recorded use was by Mark Twain in 1872. In a game of poker a piece of buckshot would be used to remind the player on the left of the dealer that it was his turn to deal next. After each deal the piece of buckshot would be passed on but, exceptionally, a player would not want to deal and would "pass the buck(shot)" instead.

10 eggs


200g sugar

# Ingredients

- 2kg large white noodle
- · 200g black soya sauce
- 200g nam pla (fish sauce)
- 300g cooking oil
- 500g pork, beef or chicken
- Method
- **1** Slice the kale into strips of approx. 3/4" wide and place to one side.

- **2** Slice the meat of your choice into strips and cook in the hot oil for approx 5 mins.
- 3 Add the roughly chopped garlic.
- **4** Beat the eggs lightly and slowly whisk into the meat and garlic.
- **5** Add the sliced kale to the mix. Quickly saute for 2 minutes.
- **6** Finally, add the white noodle and soya sauce, fish sauce and sugar to taste.
- 7 Quickly saute and mix together all ingredients thoroughly to ensure even flavour distribution.
- 8 Serve while hot, offering the full range of Thai condiments so that consumers can spice it up a little if desired.



# **BC Surin Elephant Round-Up**

ertainly the most stylish trip available" On 15th November, the British Club will once again be packing their cooking utensils and sleeping bags ready for you to join them on this very exciting, once-a-year event. The elephant round-up in Surin makes news in Europe and the States; have you ever seen 250 elephants together in one field? All walking peacefully, munching away on bananas and sugar cane and not being lumbered by showy outfits, all au naturel! There is a show as well, of course, and an interesting market at the round-up site. Young and old enjoy this trip. We leave Bangkok at around 8.30pm from Bangkok train station (Hua Lumphong) and arrive in Surin early (4.30am - I said early), where you are collected by the BC tourbus and taken to our meeting point for a (Thai style) shower and BC breakfast. At around 7.30am we set off for the round-up - plenty of time for you to have a look around the market and make your way leisurely to your reserved, covered seats to watch the round-

up. The show ends at around 12.30 - 1pm, and the bus will take you to a Khmer ruin with a picnic area, plenty of safe space for the kids to stretch their legs and for you to havea quiet relax while enjoying the full splendours of the BC bar. In the afternoon there is time to visit local handicraft centres, ride on elephants in Surin town centre, visit a Khmer ruin on a hill, or anything else you'd like to do which can be arranged. The train leaves Bangkok at around 8pm and arrives in Bangkok at the unholy hour of 4am, so plenty of time for sleep in your own comfy beds. We expect the price for this incredible trip to be Baht 3,200 (adults), Baht 2,200 (children over 3 yrs old), Baht 1,200 (children 3 and under). As the trip takes place in November, this price is still a guesstimate; the total price will depend on the price for the train tickets, rental of the bus, round-up ticket prices, etc. As last year, we aim to book first class airconditioned sleeper berths on the train both ways.


There is a billiards room on the third level of the clubhouse. Members and visitors can relax over a few drinks and play a game or two of snooker. Adjoining is the rooftop beer






