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LETTER FROM THE CHAIR



Jonathan Truslow Chairman - General Committee 2009/2010

After a brisk and business-like AGM, the sign-off on phase 1 at the earlier EGM, and the appointment of Jesper Doepping as GM, I was looking forward to an easy life. Barry's resignation shocked me out of complacency and into a flurry of meetings with Barry himself, Jesper, the staff and management team and the GC, not to mention conversations with concerned members. We all hope he will reconsider and stay with us; and we plan to give him every opportunity to get some much needed rest, take a critical look at the world outside the Club and make a well-reasoned decision.

As I said in opening, the AGM and EGM went very smoothly. I take this as showing that members feel last years GC was steering the Club in the right direction: incrementally improving facilities, supporting member sections, seeking ways to increase membership without losing the Club's British and Commonwealth ethos. These policies will continue through 2010 although the actions will increasingly be driven by Jesper and the Management Team.

Of course we received many useful suggestions from members during the AGM. A particular area of concern was the amount of bank fees the Club pays to collect membership dues. Other issues raised included rising staff costs, food costs, support for football and rugby, and canine access rights.

We held an informal GC meeting on 31st March so the new Committee could get to know each other and share our thoughts and concerns for the Club. These thoughts together with points raised by members during the AGM have been passed to Jesper for inclusion in his planning. The planning will cover two phases: immediate actions focusing on clarifying staff duties and responsibilities, use of the Verandah restaurant, the cost of collecting membership dues and IT issues, and a longer term strategy for marketing and development. Jesper will present his plans for immediate action and an outline for the longer term strategy to the next GC meeting after which we will share them with members.

WINE-TASTING WELCOME











HOUSE & GROUNDS

The monthly report on Maintenance and Development



The Annual General Meeting was held on 23 March and was preceded by an EGM at which the following Motion was discussed and voted on. "That Phase 1 be considered completed in its entirety and to the Members' satisfaction, as per point (d) of the proposal approved at the 2008 AGM". The Motion was carried by 52 votes to 2. This brings to an end a very difficult period in the history of the Club which cannot be forgotten, but which has hopefully provided us with some very useful lessons.

This now enables us to look ahead and consider future improvements. The Motion carried at the 2008 AGM had several requirements, including the preparation of a Master Plan for the next stage of development, As stated in previous reports, the Club has limited financial resources, and our recommendations will not therefore be on a grandiose scale, but more along the lines of a gradual improvement of our facilities with funding coming from revenue over several years.

It has to be stressed that the outstanding need to repair and maintain the Club infrastructure will put pressure on the finances available for new development. Certain essential services are in a very neglected state and reached the end of their efficient life cycle many years ago. We have started replacing A/C units and refrigerators but there are many other items of plant and equipment which are also due for replacement. The drainage system is in very poor condition and the pumps have probably reached the end of their reliable life. Sections of pipework are broken and the system has been kept going by our staff carrying out stopgap repairs, some of which have compromised the legal and efficient function of the system.

We should also consider landscaping improvements, something which was voiced at the AGM by a Member. The front lawn and turtle pond are certainly not in keeping with the traditional British ideal. We would surely be looked down on by our neighbours if the Club was in the UK. The lawn hardly rates as more than a bit of scrub and the pond area now resembles a rubbish dump. The car park also needs tidying up and the lines replacing to provide acceptable sized parking spaces which allow adequate room to open doors to get out of vehicles without trying to mimic a contortionist. I am painfully aware that we present a rather dilapidated appearance to potential Members and this does not help with our very important recruitment drive. The first feature witnessed by a first-time visitor to the Club is the shabby table and awning at the Silom security point. No comment required.

I mentioned in my previous report that I would be recommending acceptance by the General Committee of a proposal from a suitably qualified consultant to carry out a detailed review of our fire and firerelated systems. The General Committee was not convinced that this was a current priority and asked for information on other facilities which might require upgrading to comply with Thai and UK Building Regulations. Apart from the requirements for the Disabled, with which we cannot fully comply at the present time, the kitchens are the obvious facility to be reviewed. If anyone can recommend a kitchen/ hygiene consultant who can provide independent professional advice, without published, I am hoping that tennis is being played on Courts 2 & 3. trying to sell us something at the same time, please let me know.

In the Men's Changing Room, we have changed all of the floor drains in the shower cubicles. I hope that this now provides reasonable drainage John Boisclair - Development & Facility Manager

without replacement of the pipework in the toilet below. We will probably replace the pipes when the toilet is refurbished later this year. I have a concept for a stainless steel hanging rail which is currently being priced.

You will be wondering what is happening about the notice boards in the Clubhouse corridor. Unfortunately, the General Committee were not willing to approve the quotation for replacement which I recommended at the February meeting. They thought the price could be too high. Approving expenditure is one of their most important functions and I respect their decision. Again, if anyone can introduce a contractor who can provide competitive quotations for this sort of work I would

I now come to our major current project, the resurfacing of the tennis courts. I never thought this would be easy but did not foresee the series of problems we have been experiencing at the time of writing. It was agreed that the asphalting of tennis courts 2 & 3 would start on Monday 15th March. We waited with anticipation on the Monday morning but the only activity in progress was the setting out of the new levels by the surveyors we had engaged to help ensure compliance with our requirements. It eventually transpired that stocks of the geo-textile membrane which was to be laid under the asphalt had run out. A case of poor planning, or undue optimism, one could say. In the course of the next 3 days, an alternative membrane had been chosen, there had been one heavy rainfall, and the red shirts were disrupting the traffic, resulting in restrictions on heavy vehicle movements being imposed by the Police. By Saturday, a start had actually been made on the laying of the membrane. In the next two days the first layer of asphalt was also laid. The surveyor came back to site to check the levels and it was found that there were high spots in the central areas of the courts. Eventually, the asphalt contractor located a suitable machine which was used to grind off the excess asphalt. In my 49 years of experience I have rarely seen excess material used by a contractor, usually the reverse. During the grinding off process, some of the membrane was ripped up.

On 29 March the asphalt contractor replaced the damaged area of membrane and started laying the asphalt wearing course. He completed approximately 40%. We then had another delay due to red shirt activity, broken wheels on the dump truck, and a period of 3 days in which no bitumen was being sold by the oil companies, pending a price increase. It should be explained that the term asphalt is a generic name for bitumen or natural asphalt, but is also used, particularly in North America, for the material we know as tarmacadam which consists of stone aggregate mixed with bitumen or asphalt. A Scottish invention in the early 19th century.

The asphalt contractor then decided to complete the wearing course by working through the night on the 2nd April. The surveyor returned on 5th April and his check revealed that there were at least 2 areas which were low. The roller was used again on 6th April and a water test was carried out the following day. This revealed no less than 14 'bird baths' so further rolling will be necessary. By the time this edition of "Outpost" is





Refugees from Burma: A People's Scrapbook


More than Nine Thousand Nights have passed since the first refugee camps were set up on the Thailand-Burma border in 1984, over twenty five years of drama, suffering and the triumph of the human spirit over adversity. Refugees have lived through these long nights, while outsiders have endeavoured to understand and support them.

My organisation, the Thailand Burma Border Consortium (TBBC) has been working with them since the beginning, and last year decided to mark 25 years on the border by producing a "scrapbook" to tell the story.

This book brings together memories, art, and photographs contributed by hundreds of refugees and people now scattered around the world. It is a 'peoples' scrapbook, containing the very personal reflections of 'ordinary' people whose collective experiences amount to a unique portrait of a time, place, and events that are, by any measure, anything but ordinary.

Contributions came in the form of handwritten letters, some penned by candlelight, that were gathered in the camps and delivered by hand to Bangkok by aid workers. More stories arrived via email or the postal service from across the globe. Young people from the camps sent paintings and poetry, and professional and amateur photographers sent thousands of battered, faded, and beautiful images.

Refugees recall the pain and trauma of fleeing from bullets, torture, and forced labour at the hands of the Burmese army; of their determination to survive and build new lives in exile, and of their frustration with the restrictions of life as 'temporary guests' in another country.



Outsiders tell of their often moving, disturbing or puzzling encounters with peoples, histories and cultural and historical complexities that remain little known or understood in the wider world. They recall meeting women and men in the border camps whose courage, humour, and resilience left a deep impression, and inspired them to want to know more, or to help.

The scrapbook is rich in history and human emotion. It will be a permanent reminder of a remarkable period of human suffering and endeavour, to be treasured by all who are concerned about the plight of Burma, and the plight of refugees.

I hope Nine Thousand nights will appeal to all who are interested in and care about South East Asia.

"Nine Thousand Nights" is now published and will be available in bookstores but copies are also on sale at the British Club at Bt750. The cost of the book will provide rice for a refugee for another Ninety Nights.




If asked to name three rivers, what comes to mind? Do you picture the grey of the River Thames as it passes through Westminster? Do you remember the Nile, and history lessons about Ancient Egypt? Or do you conjure up images of the mighty Amazon snaking through mysterious rainforests? Perhaps it is not surprising that the Chaophraya River is slow to be mentioned, even for people living in Bangkok. Our helterskelter lives tend to focus on traffic jams in Sukhumvit and journeys on the Skytrain rather than Thailand's River of Kings.

Yet shaded not only by trees but by condominiums and factories, and encased in concrete retaining walls, the Chaophraya continues its centuries-old journey from Nakhon Sawan, through the former capital Ayutthaya, and on through Bangkok to the sea at Samut Prakarn, carrying with it stories and secrets, and even a part of our complicated urban lives.

Imagine the tears that those brown waters have carried over the centuries, the countless kratongs its currents have taken away, and the kings, warriors, merchants and fishermen who have used its waters. These are some of the stories that are unwrapped by the Prem Magic Eyes Barge Program as its barge travels between Bangkok and Ayutthaya. Contributing to the UN Decade for Education for Sustainability, the Barge Program empowers students to reflect on personal actions that they can take, to adjust their lives to reduce their impact on the watershed and contribute to a more sustainable way of living.





Celebrating 15 years of experiential environmental education, the Barge Program works to bring participants in touch with this life-blood of Thailand, letting the River be the teacher, supported by games, activities and watertesting as we travel along its waters on our converted rice barge. The brainchild of M.L. Tri Devakul in the mid 1990s, the Program works throughout the year helping students to understand the economic, social and environmental importance of both the River and the whole Chaophraya Watershed.

The Program began on the River, but has gradually grown to include all parts of the watershed: Chiang Mai, where the first tributaries of the River Ping flowing into the Chaophraya begin; to forests, where rivers flow; and finally to marine environments where the rivers meet the sea. The Barge Program also considers the role that the Chaophraya has played in Thai art, culture and history, providing an amazing resource for many students living in Thailand and SE Asia.

Members of the British Club have enjoyed several family trips aboard the Barge, and as part of our 15th year celebrations we are planning a family trip on 23rd May, Join us to find out how you connect with the great Chaophraya River, to catch a glimpse of riverside Bangkok, or simply to escape the hectic business of Silom.

We continue our peek into our Club's past as we look at events

As recorded last month one of the major complaints of 1950 was a leaky Clubhouse roof, so in February 1951 we employed local contractor Tuim Lee to supply and fit 82 sheets of zinc. This may seem quite an ordinary transaction until one reads that the terms & conditions meant that the company was not to be paid until sufficient rain had fallen to show that the repairs had been satisfactory completed. It is not recorded when or if they actually got paid.

A second major concern for this year was the poor cutting and maintenance of our two lawns and the eight tennis courts. It is noted in the minutes that "there were three gardeners employed by the Club, none of whom appeared to have any interest at all in the work that they were doing". Further investigation found that three of the Club's six lawn mowers also did not work. One wonders why three staff needed six machines?

In the May of 1951 the Club was requested to formally register itself with the Special Security Police. The Sor Kor Sam document was signed on behalf of the Club by the Chairman, Charles Mabbatt and the original document is still on file (see insert).


Unfortunately also in May 1951 the Revenue Code Amendment Act 2494 came into effect imposing a Hotel & Restaurant Tax on all hotels, restaurants and clubs, something we failed to realise until November 1951 when the Head Officer of Amphur Bang Rak stung us with a bill for 20,000 Ticals.

Fortunately we applied for exemption to the Revenue Code as we were not open to the public and Finance Minister Major General Phao Plienlert Boribhandh Yutthakit granted us this exemption in March of 1952. This exemption continued for many decades until revoked (along with other clubs) when the Finance Ministry decided that allowing in guests meant that we served the public.

Membership of our Club rose guite dramatically over this period and in 1951 we had a net gain of 33 members ending the year with 191 members the highest number to date. 1951 was also the first year that we bestowed an Honorary Membership, which was unanimously given to our first post-war Chairman Victor Jacques - his story appears in the December 2009 edition of Past Participle.


To quote James Young, "A Tennis Club's vitality is a reflection of the strength of the Junior Section" and with 25 juniors playing, the Section is defiantly healthy.

Pork Schnitzel with Salad

Serves 2

2 pork fillets Salt and black pepper Flour

1 large free-range or organic egg, beaten

3 large handfuls of dry, fine breadcrumbs Olive oil

A small handful of cornichons (gherkins), drained and chopped into matchsticks

1 lemon extra virgin olive oil

To prepare your meat, put the escalopes on a chopping 2 tsp garam masala board, put a piece of greaseproof paper on top and beat the 2 tbsp chopped coriander leaves meat with the bottom of a saucepan to flatten it a little - you want to get it to about 0.5 cm/1/4 inch thick

Ham and Melon Ingredients:

1 large ripe cantaloupe (rock melon) or honeydew melon freshly ground pepper

12 slices prosciutto

Method:

1. Peel the melon and cut into slivers, removing seeds and fibers. Arrange the slivers radiating out from the center of a serving plate. Sprinkle with pepper.

2. Lightly curl the slices of ham in the center of the plate. Blend all ingredients together until Chill well and serve.

Tomato Ginger Soup

Serves 4



1 lb (450 g) fresh tomatoes

3 tbsp fresh ginger, coarsely chopped

2 pints (1.1 ltr) chicken stock

1 tsp light soy sauce

2 tsp sugar

If you are using fresh tomatoes, cut them in half horizontally. Squeeze the seeds out and coarsely chop the tomatoes and set aside. Put the stock into a saucepan and bring to simmering point.

Add the ginger, soy sauce, chilli bean sauce, sugar, and tomatoes.

Simmer for 2 minutes. Serve at once.

Plaster of Paris Aluminium pie case Shells, pebbles, acrylic gems, marbles or other water-resistant bits of treasure for decoration. You could even use small plastic toys such as figures or beach bag so that you can preserve your sandy treasure in a toy cars.

Instructions:

Sandy Hand Mosaic

Materials

- Make sure that you have a covered surface to work on and Beach treasure, such as shells, rocks, and sea glass (no
 - 1 1/2 cups Plaster of Paris in a quart-size re-sealable bag

 - Chopstick

 - Wood glue

Instructions

- 1. Press your hand into damp, hard-packed sand, making a 2-inch-deep impression.
- 2. Line the handprint with treasure in some kind of pattern, taking care to set it lightly without pressing it too deeply into the sand.
- 3. Add 1 cup of water to the bag of Plaster of Paris. Seal the bag and knead it to combine the two. Carefully pour the wet plaster into the palm of the handprint, covering the inlaid items.
- 4. Use a chopstick to push the plaster into the fingers and thumb. Add more plaster to the palm as needed.
- 5. Set the chopstick in place with 2 inches of one end submerged in the plaster.
- 6. Let the plaster set until it's hard, at least 30 minutes. To remove the hand, carefully dig out the sand from around the plaster, then slowly lift the hand up by the chopstick handle. Wrap your project in a towel to transport it. For a tabletop display, ask an adult to drill a hole 2 inches deep and a little wider than your chopstick into a piece of wood. Insert the chopstick handle, and secure it with wood glue, if necessary.

















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
