TRADING INCOME

As a result of a number of queries raised on catering prices the Committee feel it appropriate at this time to bring to the notice of members the Clubs general pricing policy.

In general it is Club policy to separate the income arising from Subscriptions from that generated by Trading.

Subscriptions are used to finance the running of the Club and cover such overheads as Office and maintenance staff costs, electricity, consumables, insurance, land tax, repairs and maintenance, swimming pool upkeep and other similar costs.

Trading income is used to cover all associated expenditure and the surplus is put towards development of the Club facilities. For a considerable period the targets set have been an overall gross return of 40% for trading which after deducting applicable overheads has given around a 10% surplus for improvements.

Many members point out that the Club is a non-profit making establishment. This is correct in that, as we have indicated above, there is no objective of creating an annual surplus. The amount and degree of improvement of the Clubs facilities depends on trading profit and the surpluses arising from the modest target set have been used for that purpose. In adjusting trading prices the object has not been to increase the surplus percentage but to maintain it by keeping up with the increases in costs. Members are aware that the costs of food have increased gradually but considerably during the last two years and more recently the costs of local beers and imported spirits have risen as a result of the new taxes,

shipping costs and exchange rates. The main increase in trading overheads have been staff and cooking gas costs.

It is Club policy to hold food and drink prices at as reasonable a level as possible. This will continue to be done but members are reminded that the loans being obtained to finance the developments agreed in the long range plan will be repaid mainly from the net trading income.



EVENTS FOR JUNE 1978

We begin the 1978-79 series of monthly programmes with a cello and piano recital to be given by Ross Pople and Michael Freyhan, at the Alliance Francaise on June 7th at 8.00 p.m. Ross Pople is the principal cellist of the BBC Symphony Orchestra, which makes him one of the top three cellists in Britain, and he is fast becoming one of the best known recitalists in the country. He was born in New Zealand, and by the age of 16 had won national music competitions, become a frequent broadcaster, achieved a record score (98%) in his LRSM examinations and won a scholarship to London's Royal Academy of Music. Since then he has worked with Andre Navarra, Yehudi Menuhin (both as a co-recitalist and as a section leader in the latter's Festival Orchestra) and toured extensively. The programme for Bangkok comprises Sonatas by Boccherini, Beethoven, Brahms, pieces by Schumann, and the witty and easily accepted Divertimento by the present-day British composer Elizabeth Maconchy.

Tickets for this concert will be on sale at the British Council Library in Siam Square, and at the Alliance Francaise on the night.

WORLD (FOOTBALL) CUP

It has possibly escaped the notice of most except the most ardent Scotland fans and Punch readers that the final series of World Cup 1978 matches is about to be played in South America this month.

Readers of Punch who have been following the adventures, or misadventures, of Jimmy and Tadder on "the Road to Argentina" must hope that after being stranded in mid-Atlantic, arrested in Cuba, deported to the Horn of Africa, interviewed by President Amin and grilled in Moscow, those two keen supporters at least arrived safely by June.

In the meantime the reviews of participating national teams released by the news agencies appear to have overlooked Scotlands prospects. One article published in the local press, attributed to Reuters, was entitled "Scottish 'Tartan Army' Worst Feared". In it there was not a mention of football; only alarums of trouble, as if Wallace himself was due to lead a pack of highland supporters into the southern hemisphere.

Scotland are competing in Group 4 with Holland, Iran and Peru. One hopes, despite the results of last months home international matches, that the team selected to travel to Argentina will keep UK chances alive through to the final.

A colour TV set will be in the Main Bar for those interested in viewing throughout June. We understand that the first game and the final will be broadcast live via satellite on 2 June and 26 June between 1 a.m. and 2 a.m. local time. From 5 June videotape replays of other matches will be shown on different TV channels from 8.30 p.m. each night until the full match programme is complete. As usual which matches, on which channel and at what actual time will be subject to the whims of local programme organisers who no doubt will keep us in suspense until the last, or even 30 minutes after the last, moment.



DARTS NEWS

In two games during the month the Lilywhites failed to field a full team, on one occasion raising a belated 6 after some phrantic phoning and the next week mounting a fine-Lilywhite challenge at what once was a favourite venue. Admittedly, the rules of the current league make it more difficult for us in that only Lilywhites registered before the start of the league are eligible to play, unlike in previous leagues when we could sign on players as necessary during the league. Nevertheless it is disappointing, never having failed to raise a full team for over four years, to have it happen on two consecutive Thursdays. Regrettably it occurred after a series of defeats and Bangkok dartists are bound to draw what hopefully is an erroneous conclusion. Your favourite team have a reputation for promoting the finer aspects of the sport of Nais in Bangkok; perhaps it was merely fortuitous that only 5 of our 12 card-carrying players could turn up on those two occasions.

MATCH REPORTS

The second game of the 10th league, our first at home, was against 20 Hotel and found the Lilywhites in a more determined mood than in the previous week. The singles were evenly divided after a fine opening victory by Ian Gadsden.

Robin Polglase and Nai VI put the club ahead in the first doubles and hopes were high, but were soon shattered when the remaining doubles and both the triples went to the Hoteliers without much serious opposition from the Lilywhites. A consolation point was picked up in the 1001 to give victory to the lucky (?) opposition by a margin of 11 to 6.
