Peering into the cubby hole kitchen of Bangkok's latest curry house THE TAJ (situated in Honey Square off Suriwongse) I couldn't help but notice that the chef bore a remarkable resemblance to a jagar I used to see setting up his charpoy of an evening along New Road. Nor, I might add, did the quality of the food that I received later dispel this impression. The chicken kurma, dear friends, came minced. Yes, minced! Vicky would have been enraged. The speciality of the house, gurma massala (curried kidneys), is not on the menu; you have to ask for it. Portions are skimpy by local standards and average out at Bht 40 per dish. Decor is so-so and an alpinestock will certainly help you to tackle the stairs (67°).

For something different you could try the Filipino food at THE LITTLE HOME BAKERY in their car park soi branch off Thaniya Road. Have a crack at their buff tail and multi-veg stew (kare-kare) or on Fridays their adobo pusit (calameres en su tinta). Their Gaysorn branch on the other hand is better for pancakes.

Perhaps the only bargain left in Pattaya now is the truly excellent lobster bisque at the VILLA SEA FOOD on the beach road at Bht 15 a bowl.

Has anybody tried the FONDUE HOUSE down the Pattaya end of Sukhumvit Road? Those having comments on its sapidity please contact the grommet who will pass along the word.

We hear that UNCLE TOM'S CABIN is putting on excellent buffets Sunday evenings at the astonishingly low price of Bht 40 per head.

This one got edited out of last months grommet column so its got to be good! There's a little Froggie chew and choke down the Wang Burapha end of town in Tee Tong Road called KANITS BAKERY run by a Thai lass who qualified for her Cordon Bleu Credentials after two years study in Paris.

The ALLIANCE FRANCAISE on Sathorn Tai has a nicely decorated coffee lounge which puts on a special every lunchtime (not Sundays) at about Bht 50. Other plusses are that it has ample car parking and is open from about seven every morning. Croissants too and the eldritch cries of recorded Froggie chanteuses.

Plug-of-the-month goes to the CEDAR in Soi Pipat. It is no longer necessary to book in advance (although to get many of their specialities it's better to do so - pidgeon with peas plus 300 more dishes) because the ad hoc choice is limited. Two people would get offered perhaps stuffed chicken, three or four a leg of lamb, and there's always the mezze which can be a meal in itself if you take the full one. Cost - budget Bht 200 per person for two courses and coffee. Even if you don't like the food (its Lebanese - Greekish) the service is always superlative and the decor different - you lounge around on piled up pillows Roman style, slither around on highly polished floors, and have your chance at the hookah. ("Hookah; not hooker, Sir!").



FILM NIGHTS

Weekly film nights will begin on Sunday 24 June. The main film will begin at 8.00 p.m. and seats (฿15 each) will be bookable in advance by telephone or, on Sundays, at the poolside bar.

Experience last year showed that there is a limit to the number of persons that can be reasonably accommodated in the (non-airconditioned) cinema room. 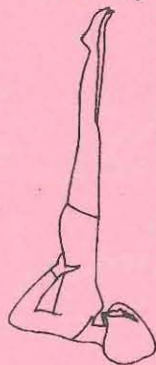
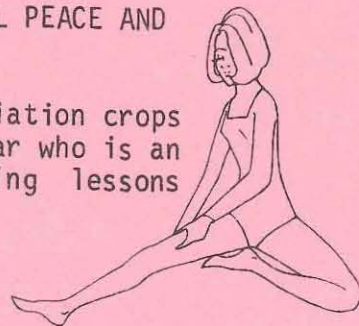

DARTS SECTION

The front and back nines went to Hans Daniels and Sheila Neville respectively whilst John MacDermott and Ernie Jurgens took the prizes for the nearest the pins. Jacques Morin with his trusty No. 1 wood collected the prize for the longest drive.

In the final of the Dunlop Trophy, Margaret Miller and Peter Speed playing very steady golf beat Jacques Morin and Iain Brown 2 and 1. Peter and Margaret took the lead right at the 1st hole and never fell behind thereafter. On the front nine Margaret was sinking putts of 20 feet and over regularly and when she eased off Peter became hot with his putter, emulating his partner. After the front nine Margaret and Peter turned two up and although Jacques and Iain pulled one back, they could not square the match as on the occasions they were in what looked like a winning position either Peter or Margaret would sink another long putt... Congratulations to them on a very good victory.

The Golf Section had their 1st round of the Club Championship on Sunday 13th May at Unico Golf Course. The course, unfortunately, was not in particularly good condition but nevertheless with the greens playing true, a number of golfers managed to record very good scores. The Club Championship is played over two rounds off "the stick", but in conjunction with this 1st round, prizes were awarded for the best net scores, the prizes on this occasion being very kindly donated by the Borneo Co. The 33 golfers who took part, were split into two flights, with flight "A" covering players of handicaps up to 17 and flight "B" for handicaps of 18 and above.

In the low handicap section, Richard Richardson obviously benefiting from his rest during the cricket season came home with a gross 81 to take the lead in the first round of the Championship. However, right on his heels with 82 was Leon Van der Watt, who played his usual steady round. In third place, despite getting a car in one off the first tee was the Sports Club's Golf Captain, Tom Moran, who made a welcome return to our Section, with a gross 84.

In the "B" flight, Des Kenneally, in his second outing with the Section, sizzled round in 89, whilst Denis Quinn was only one off with a 90. Dai Pravit, despite taking some time to settle, put together a 93 to take third place. From the foregoing, it is apparent that anything can happen in the second round which will take place at the Rose Garden on June 3rd, with tee-off time 07.06 hrs.

Most unfortunate player of the day was Marshall Douglas with a gross 91 but as he forgot to putt-out on one green, his score was invalid with regard to the Championship.

Leon Van der Watt, with 34 took the prize for the front 9 whilst Marshall Douglas playing with a very hot No. 4 wood, came home with a net 30 to take the prize for the second 9. Richard Richardson, with his 81, took the low gross prize.

The two prizes for nearest the pin went to Jean Taylor on the 8th and to Denis Quinn on the 12th, whilst left hander, Tom Moran cracked the longest drive on the 15th. The eagle's nest by Sunday held 10 balls and was won by Des Kenneally, who chipped in from off the green at the 14th, much to the chagrin of his opponents.

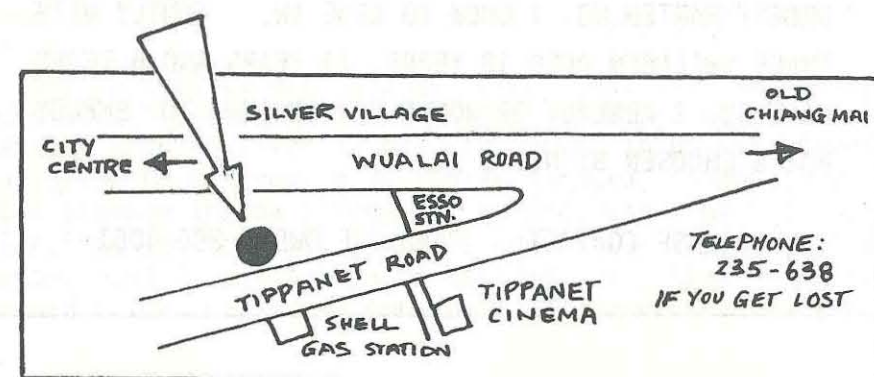

SOCCER SECTION

End of Season Report

The final played before a large crowd and in temperatures around 100° F proved to be a stamina sapping match. Slack defensive marking after 15 minutes proved to be our downfall, when following a throw-in an Indian forward, completely unmarked crossed the ball from the byline, and from the ensuing goalmouth melee the ball ran lose and was easily slotted home. A second goal 10 minutes later settled the match, for try as we could it was not to be our day. A direct free-kick given

against us on the edge of the penalty area was only partially struck, yet the ball deceived goalkeeper Bill Appleyard, who succeeded in parrying the ball into the net.

This second goal forced us to go forward and before half time both Roger Winter and Steve Balme came close to scoring on several occasions. One particular move from midfield involving good work from Iain Brown and Dave Wallace, resulted in Steve Balme hitting a tremendous shot only to watch it hit the post and rebound into the goalkeepers arms.

The second half saw us attacking from the re-start and immediately, following one of numerous corners, a 25 yard drive from Howard Tiffin was just tipped over the bar by the Indian goalkeeper, who continued to thwart our forwards.

Until the final few minutes we continued pressing and further chances were created, however the Indian defence held to register a well earned victory.
