There will be a number of sport and activity camps throughout the summer (July and August), mostly in August. Keep eyes peeled for flyers from the SRC this

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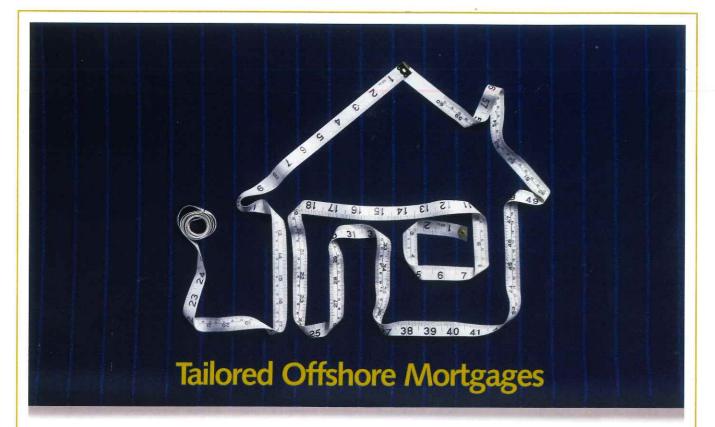


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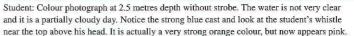




Aquatics 1 - Scuba

Examples of underwater photography and the effects of water depth on colour and contrast.



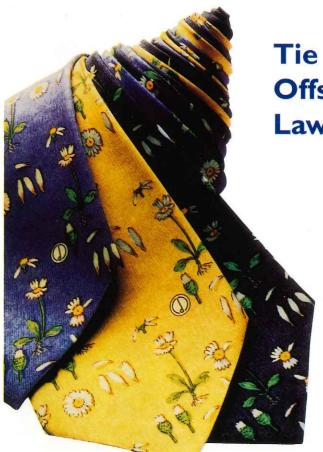

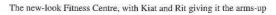

On Saturday, April 29th the Bangkok "Thai Stix" ball hockey warriors did battle in the 6th Annual Mekong Cup International Ball Hockey Tournament, the largest ball hockey tournament of its kind in all of Asia. This event takes place every year in the middle of springtime once the winter snows of Phuket have melted, giving way to the smooth surface of the Amari Coral Beach tennis courts and exposing the soft underbelly of Patong Beach (sounds exciting doesn't it?). This year, the tournament's historical combatants were all in attendance - Bangkok, Singapore and Kuala Lumpur. Heightening the drama was the fact that in spite of engaging strong troops in past years, Bangkok had never managed to win the war for regional ball hockey supremacy.

Personally, this year's tournament was truly the most extraordinary Mekong Cup that this reporter has ever been a part of over the last 4 kicks at the can. This is not simply because we won the damn thing (although that has plenty to do with it), but also the way in which we won (pulling off the most miraculous turnaround in Mekong Cup history). The team from Thailand got off to a terribly weak start, losing the first two games by a combined score of 10-3 (i.e., Singapore 4 – Bangkok 1, and Kuala Lumpur 6 - Bangkok 2).

Any reasonable person would have completely counted us out. Fortunately, we are not reasonable people. The team didn't let the dismal morning dampen its spirits. Some chalk-talk over lunch and a poolside pep-rally helped keep the team loose for the afternoon. The Thai Stix had the advantage of the other teams' supreme over-confidence and that was just the way we wanted it. They had fallen in to our trap, which we had spent 5 years perfecting. A couple of adjustments were made in the line-up, a little communal soul searching, and the team from Bangkok was off to the

races. And the scores tell the tale:

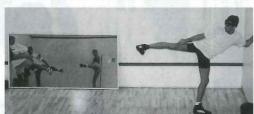
Everyone was focused and every player contributed with all they had. The Thai Stix truly played and worked together as a unit. Our founding fathers Rich Meiklejohn (now living in Sydney) and Philip Utsch (now in Seoul), despite some reservations, moved back to defense and played brilliantly. Marc Ehler, Germaine Bergeron, Keith Johnston, and Kelly Cailes made up the rest of the defensive core that thoroughly shut down opposing attackers. They were the backbone of our team and allowed only 2 goals in the three grueling afternoon games. There was not a weak link out there and guys were not afraid to throw their bodies around, blocking shots, and moving the ball like never before. The Thai Stix really took control of the play!

And Thailand's ultimate victory could only have happened with an equally strong effort from their offense. The KL and Singapore players never had time to get

set up because the Bangkok forwards were always on top of them, forcing the play and creating good scoring chances. Linemates were as follows: John "il Duce" Casella & Shane "Pchez" Gunther, John "BBB.com" Stevens & Jamie "all the way from HK" Hunter, and the threesome of Scott "Curator of the Dave Brown Museum" Murray, Jennifer "the Girl" Hall & Harold "Tuk Tuk to the Airport" Chislett. Hats off to John, Jamie & Germaine for pulling the trigger on most of the goals, but the whole offense was clicking on all cylinders. And Pat Brundson, goaltender extraordinare, was outstanding between the pipes and deservedly won the MVP award. The Mekong Cup was finally hoisted for the Thai Stix and the champagne overflowed. Bangkok's ball hockey players have already begun the campaign to defend their title at Mekong Cup #7 (tentatively scheduled for the end of April 2001). From the Chairman

A Time of Change

Manager with a different style of management and more activities for our Members. This has resulted in many changes, some have been implemented and there are more to come. Feedback is essential and I would be extremely pleased to hear from members with their views.

These changes include renovation projects, revised staffing levels, staff promotions, new menus at the different outlets and a comprehensive review of all the financial operations of the Club. Quite naturally, change often has an unsettling effect on staff and ours are no exception. I would like to dwell on some of the staffing issues this month.

Over recent years a number of working practices have crept into the Club and have come to be accepted as the norm by members of staff. The General Manager has been asked to resolve these issues in a timely and sympathetic manner. Regrettably a number of staff have not been able to accept our "new" working practices and have left our employment as a consequence. However well implemented these changes may be, there can be a knock-on effect. You may be seeing old faces in new places as staff lend a hand in order to get the job done.

The practices being introduced include: ensuring all staff get a full hour for lunch, overtime is no longer available on demand but when additional hours are required, staffing rosters that meet the needs of the job and standardising office hours. In conjunction with these more standard management approaches, a re-evaluation of staff benefits is being undertaken with consideration being given to the provision of staff meals, footwear and uniforms. Job descriptions and training programmes are also being introduced. This is no less than one would expect from an employer such as the British Club.

Both the Members and staff will feel the effect of these changes in the short term. These are not wholesale cuts to staffing levels, although at the recent AGM some would have us take this approach, but an interim step while suitable replacements can be identified and recruited.

The General Committee (GC) views the management of staff as a fundamental issue to be controlled by the GM. It is essential that he has the autonomy to staff the Club as he sees fit in order to meet the objectives set by the GC. Our issue is that of policy and whether the GM's plans are in the best interests of the Members.

I also would like to take this opportunity to announce the following staff promotions:

Khun Arpha from Pool Supervisor to Pool Manager Khun Morakot from Pool Waitress to Pool Supervisor

Khun Kasem from Lords Restaurant Supervisor to Lords Restaurant and

Churchill Bar Supervisor.

Khun Somchai who is facing a major task in reorganizing the kitchens and will head

the kitchen team.

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Underwater Vision

cuba diving lessons have been very active lately as some of you have noticed the tickling feeling of our rising bubbles while you are surface swimming in the pool.

We will have four or five students ready to complete their Open Water dives in June. The next topic of our Diving Medicine and Health update relates to:

VISION

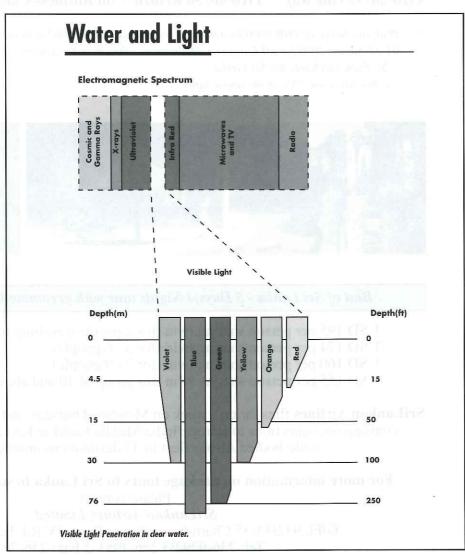
Diving, besides being a very wet sport, is definitely one of the most awesome visual experiences we can have. We dive into the underwater world to see marine life with colours ranging from almost invisible to an intense rainbow of unbelievable patterns. It is no doubt the strongest reason we pursue diving.

There can be several vision-based medical complications related to diving. These are most often associated with recent injuries, ruptured interior blood vessels or corrective surgery. Limited colour blindness, being farsighted or nearsighted, or even astigmatism is seldom a reason to prevent a person from enjoying normal recreational level diving. However, these conditions can and will have a direct bearing for those considering deep technical, commercial or military diving careers. Word of caution: if you have had any eye surgery recently please consult with your doctor first before any diving activity. Some types of eye injury and surgery require extended recovery periods.

Blurry Vision – Being underwater causes some very interesting changes for visitors from the land and air world. First of all, our eyes are built to see clearly in air. In water, we see everything blurry. Not to mention that salt water is not the most pleasant thing to have in your tender eyes. We must therefore employ artificial

methods to correct these problems. The best overall solution to date is the dive mask. Dive masks come in many styles, colours and sizes that provide a dry airspace in front of our eyes that allows us to see as we are used to on land. Thus that problem is effectively solved unless we accidentally get water in our mask. Do not worry, we train divers how to easily remove any water that may get into the mask while still underwater.

Bigger and Closer – Another interesting thing happens to our vision: due to the speed of light (warp 1 for Star Trekkies or even in our atmosphere) is slowed down in water and creates a condition called 'refraction'. Without getting too technical, it simply means that even with our masks on we humans see everything underwater about 25% closer than it actually is. It is fun to watch a new diver for the first couple of times underwater as they reach for an object and miss it by several inches. Normally, after only a few dives, they start to adjust to this condition. Distance is

always estimated or physically measured horizontally underwater rather than vertically and can be difficult to accurately judge even by experienced divers. The other condition: objects appear 25% bigger and this is clearly observed when the new divers surface and start to tell about the "big fish" they saw underwater. Discount their tall tales by at least 25% and it will probably be more realistic!

Bang Go the Reds – Water does another strange thing that affects our vision. It appears to reduce nearly all the colours as the diver descends deeper. The normal daylight we see is called 'white light' and is actually a combination of all the colours (trust me, it's true). However, when normal white light travels through water odd things start to happen! The water acts as a colour filter and it is very obvious to divers as they descend.

The colour affected first and most dramatically is red, depending on how clear and deep the water is as well as the amount of sunlight available. Reds will turn into muddy browns and later black, sometimes at depths as shallow as 5 metres. I remember early in my diving career when I accidentally received a small cut on my finger while diving at around 17 metres – I squeezed the injured finger and a small amount of blood came out looking as black as ink! At first it was a little scary until I remembered about the filter effect of water (and no, I do not have a black heart, as some may think!). The next colour affected is orange, followed by yellow, green and finally blue.

Many of you are probably thinking, "But what about all the beautiful underwater colours I see on TV in National Geographic

or Discovery programmes?" Good point! They cheat and use big powerful underwater lighting that restores the true natural colours. This is also why many smart divers today bring along a smaller bright light even during the day to see the marine life in its true colours. The problems of distance and colour in underwater photography are complex. If you ever take underwater photographs with an inexpensive diving instamatic using regular print film without using any flash and then have the film developed with fast 1-hour processing which is not corrected for underwater, the photographs will come out very blue. This is because the water filtered out or greatly reduced the warmer colours of red, orange and yellow. These problems along with distance focusing are strongly suspected of causing grey hair or baldness in many underwater photographers! For examples of these colour changes, please see the photographs on page 11.

Imperfect Vision - So far, so good, we have fixed all the above problems, but what about those of us with less than perfect vision on dry land? Not to worry! Divers can use their soft contact lenses (no hard lenses please) with their dive mask or can have pre-made lenses (available from -1.5 to -6.5 diopters) or your own prescription to special lenses attached to the inside of their dive mask tempered glass faceplates. From a safety point it is important that for the diver to remain visible at greater distances both underwater and at the water's surface the colour red is not very good. The colour neon yellow is generally seen very well both under and above the water. Now you know why much of my students' equipment (mask, fins, snorkel) and mine is neon yellow. It is all for safety, not fashion.

Meet a Member - Bryan Baldwin OBE

A Minute, Mr. Chairman

ffable, modest and ever with a twinkle in his eye, Bryan Baldwin OBE is a well known figure in Bangkok circles.

But that hint of shyness belies an impressive list of credentials which pays tribute to his many years of participation in Bangkok's commercial and social communities.

Twice bombed out of his childhood town of Catford in London, Bryan was evacuated as a boy to Harlech, North Wales, but even to this day knows only from one to eleven in Welsh. "Technically, I'm qualified to join the St. David's Society. Never did, though." Instead, Bryan joined the Bangkok St. George's Society and was in fact President in 1983. After attaining six 'O' levels and three 'A' levels from Bromley Grammar School, Bryan joined the RAF in 1955 for his two years of National Service. He joined Castrol in 1957 as an Order Clerk, staying with that one company for a career spanning 40 years, including 5 years in Germany and 20 here in Thailand. "Castrol is a good company, I was very happy there, but it always irritated me that I was never head-hunted..."

Arriving in Thailand in February 1978 as General Manager of a very disorganised Castrol Thailand, Bryan sought relief from the strains of business at the Rotary Club, Bangkok South branch, where he could "be with people who had never heard of Castrol". A past President of that branch, Bryan is justly proud of the Club's fundraising efforts and charitable activities.

("that 'Coins on Silom' campaign raised a million baht!"). Indeed, the warmth and pride in his eyes is only too evident as he describes the annual day trip of 200 handicapped children from the Pakkred Home to the Royal Varuna Yacht Club in Pattaya, with Rotarians assisting; a rewarding activity now in its fifth year. Rotarians come from all walks of life, Bryan estimates his branch alone boasts 17 nationalities among its membership of 120, of which about 40% is Thai.

Other charity-based involvement includes sitting on the committee of the British Community in Thailand Foundation for the Needy (formerly the UKCTC), the outfit behind the hugely successful Ploenchit Fair held every November in the grounds of the British Embassy. Castrol has for many years run three stalls at Ploenchit darts, a raffle and that confounded contorted wire electric bell game, encouraged (and sometimes manned) by Bryan himself. "Ploenchit is a really good demonstration of British participation and action in the community," a view made true as much by the dedication and hard work of people like Bryan as by the amazing coordination skills of Ploenchit supremo Carolyn Tarrant MBE.

Another little known role for Bryan is as Chairman of the Bangkok Nursing Home Association, a non-profit, charitable trust founded over 100 years ago which owns that plot of land on Convent next to Christchurch on which the old and new hospitals are sited. The BNHA leases the land to the new BNH hospital in exchange for a shareholding and three seats on the Board; Bryan took over the Chair in 1997 from Nigel Overy CBE, also a long time Bangkok resident and still on the Board (along with Ian Gibson).

As well as the Rotary Club, Bryan joined the British Club on arrival here in 1978 but didn't stand for General Committee until 1991, when he ended up as Chairman "purely by accident!" He explains, "I was persuaded to stand and agreed before the AGM that if elected I would act as Vice Chairman under Nigel Oakins." However, Nigel failed to secure enough votes for election, so Bryan went straight in as Chairman. He describes his two years as "hard going" and has great admiration for anyone who gives their free time to stand on the BC General Committee.

Recollections were a tad sketchy as to what was happening at the Club during his tenure - though he did remember that Keith Bell was the GM - and his most memorable achievement was "raising the entrance fee to 40,000 baht!"

On the other hand, Bryan does recall "many great Thursday nights" at the Club, Thursday being darts night. And yes, he was Captain of the BC Darts Team for years (playing with the likes of Arthur Hawtin and Brian Heath); perhaps unsurprisingly Bryan was also President of the Bangkok Darts League! Sadly the BC Darts Section has become defunct, having been such a rich source of entertainment and camaraderie for so many.

Baldwin and Business

Bryan's somewhat turbulent start at a Castrol in a state of disarray is now a distant - but no less significant - memory. That the company has been turned around during his tenure as GM into a thriving enterprise pays particular tribute to his management ability and his adaptability to the oftenunique environment of working in Thailand. One of the difficulties he encountered was the tendency of Thais to expect the boss to do everything, and on this point he has some criticism of the Thai education system: "[It] doesn't teach you to think, so all decisions are passed to the top." In business, he says, "you have to give people accountability and responsibility, so if they make a mistake you have to handle it carefully, and continue to build up their confidence." A delicate balance, one which takes all new international managers here time to accomplish.

Bryan brought his business experience and sociable personality to bear during his many years with the British Chamber of Commerce, Bangkok (now Thailand). A popular figure on the Executive Committee,

Bryan further extended his business connections and made many friends.

It should go without saying that with his knack of always finding himself at the helm of organisations, it wasn't long before Bryan became Chairman of the BCCB in 1992, although he insists that this too was an accident of fate. "Quite simply, they [the Executive Committee] ran out of Brits!" There were only two Brits left on the committee - he and Simon Makinson - but the Chamber's constitution stated that both Chairman and Vice Chairman must be British, so Bryan found himself as Chairman and Simon as Vice Chairman. However, according to Bryan there were some "very sharp" Thais on the committee at the time, so at the next AGM he proposed to change the rule that either the Chairman or Vice Chairman should be British. Previous British ambassadors had vetoed such a move but the then ambassador, Christian Adams, supported it, "as long as there was a British voice available in the business community for when a British dignitary came out."

That change of rule notwithstanding, Bryan stayed on as Chairman of the BCCB for five consecutive years, and remains an Honorary Advisor along with such esteemed peers as Viroj Phuttrakul OBE and M.R. Sarisdiguna Kitayakara.

And it was in 1994, during his five years incumbency as Chairman, that Bryan received the OBE for 'Services to British commercial interests in Thailand', although with typical modesty Bryan claims that this too was "also an accident". He believes that, "Christian Adams must have thought when he came out here that 'It's been a long time since there has been an award in Thailand', and I happened to be Chamber Chairman at the time."

A Family Man

No one could accuse Bryan of not being a family man; after all, he's had plenty of practice at it! Married "more than once", Bryan gave wife Orin a long-service award last year for staying with him the longest! "Well, Castrol were always giving out these awards so I thought, 'why not my wife?"" Bryan became a grandfather in December when his son Anthony and his wife produced the family's first child, and this despite Bryan's requesting them "not to hurry about this!" There's also a daughterof 28 in the UK, and wife no. 2. An Aston Villa fan since the age of seven – because "Dad reckoned they were doing well and they had nice colours", Bryan gets back to the UK just once or twice a year these days. Here in Bangkok Bryan has a daughter Ariane (by wife no. 3) finishing Bangkok Patana School this year and hoping to go to Kent University in the autumn. And that's another of Bryan's occupations: sitting on the Bangkok Patana School Board, "the only one on the Board without a degree!"

On the subject of education, another of Bryan's positions is as Vice Chairman of the Thai-Pestalozzi Children's Education Fund, an organisation seeking to provide bright kids from poor families with a good education to maximise their potential. The original Pestalozzi school was set up for orphans after the Napoleonic War, followed by a village set up after the Second World War in Battle, near Hastings in Sussex, for intelligent kids from underdeveloped countries, the average IQ of the first intake being 136. Wife Orin was among the first children to attend, arriving in England as a 10-year-old. A Foundation was established in Thailand in 1990, with scholarship money coming from fundraising, the British Chamber, and corporate and private sponsorship; today there are around 100 kids going through secondary

Call This Retirement?

These days Bryan has officially retired, but that doesn't mean he's sitting around. Apart from his position as Advisor to Loxley plc (major shareholder in Castrol Thailand), Bryan is Chairman of several companies, of which O'Reillys Pub on Silom Road is one of the better known. And then there's all those other roles. Personally it exhausted me just keeping up with all those positions and responsibilities, but it all must suit him as he is obviously still very much enjoying life in this, his adopted home.

And he had special reason to celebrate on the day I met him, as he had just been granted Thai citizenship, so in the bottomless annals of local bureaucracy he is now officially named 'Burin Nai-Ogard' (Mister of Opportunity), a name they picked

On being asked how he feels he has made use of all the experience gained from living and working here for so many years, Bryan replies - as always - with considerable modesty. "I believe most of the help I have given is by example. Especially on matters of honesty and integrity there's no compromise, because when all else goes wrong you only have your reputation to rely on." And the best piece of advice he has received along the way? "When you think you understand Thailand you have just made your first mistake..."

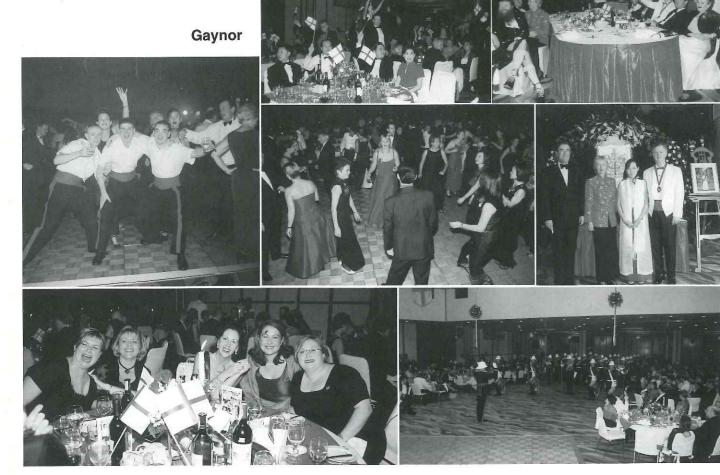
Last Night of the Proms

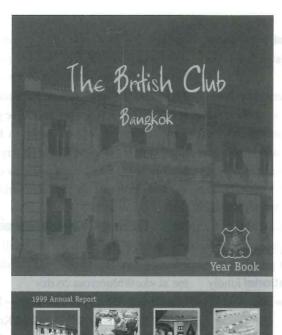
Obviously the word is spreading, as there were far fewer spare seats at this event than last year!

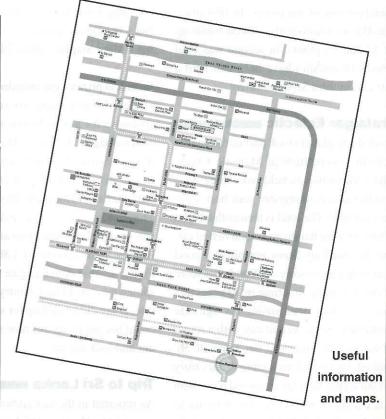

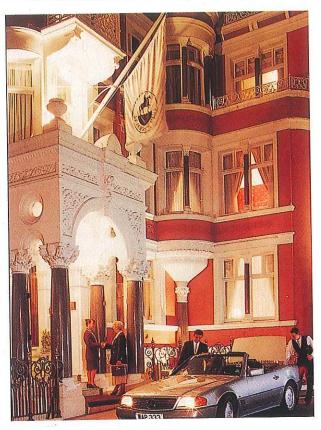
