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

In June we are organising many activities at the Club, especially on the culinary side. We have invited two Guest Chefs this month, Mr. Oscar Pasinato who will present Italian-Asian fusion cuisine in Lords Dining Room on 1 and 2 June, and Mr. Leif Benson from Oregon who will present cuisine from the Pacific Northwest on 15 and 16 June.

Also this month we have a great comedy show presented by the Bangkok Community Theatre. They will be staging the Classic Country House Murder Mystery "The Real Inspector Hound" as a Dinner Theatre at the British Club on 27–30 June.

For the children, we are reinstating the children's activities programme from 2.00 pm - 4.00 pm on Sundays, starting 3 June. This programme was discontinued for a while, but there has been a great demand from both children and parents to bring it back.

On the development side we have started the Suriwongse Room renovation which will be completed by 20 June. The wastewater treatment behind the pool kitchen and Fitness Centre has been completed, as well as the electrical re-wiring of the Club House kitchen.

We received almost 400 completed questionnaires regarding the development of the Club House. I believe that this to be an extremely positive sign that a lot of Members care about their Club.

As mentioned in last month's *Outpost*, we have started the Global Standards training programme and the first phase of this programme will be ongoing until the end of this year.

We really do appreciate the feedback from Members, both positive and negative, in order to ensure that we are improving our services and food at our outlets.

Also this month, we have revamped *Outpost* for you. It is over two years since the layout was changed and we hope you like the new look. Do let us know what you think.

Last year in June we commenced direct debiting facilities with 6 local banks. So far, more than 300 Members have enrolled in this programme. For Members who have not yet joined this programme but would like to, we have set up Direct Debit facilities with the following banks: Standard Chartered, Hongkong Bank, Bangkok Bank, Siam Commercial Bank, Thai Farmer's Bank and Bank of Asia. 
### **ABOUT CHEF BENSON**




### BACKGROUND

# TRAFALGAR'S ELECTRIC ECLECTIC

### **But first the Medal Competition...**

On a near perfect day the second Medal of the year was played at Subrapruek on 22 April. A stiff breeze took the sting out of the sun and kept the insects at bay as the shadows lengthened (thanks to Nick White we now know more about the Mansonia Mosquito than is quite comfortable) but made for testing golf conditions and few 'great' scores were recorded.

The A Flight medal was taken by Charles Skinner with a net 69; Jo Goodliffe, having partied until 4.00am at the St George's Society Ball, took B Flight honours with another 69 apparently there *is* some truth in the story that playing with a hangover helps you keep your head still.

In C Flight Dick Taylor and Mick Murphy tied for first place again with 69, Mick losing narrowly on 'countback' but he had the consolation prize of winning the Men's Long Drive.

The club welcomed some new members, James Lane, Chris Crowley, Tom McKay and a guest, David Eastgate, who all seemed to enjoy the day – hopefully enough to play with us again.

### **ELECTRIC ECLECTIC**

The three-day **Trafalgar** Eclectic Competition, one of the club's major events, was held at Majestic Creek on 5,6,7 May. It rained the entire week before we arrived and the day after we left the heavens opened again, but we were favoured with excellent – if warm – conditions. As usual the good turnout made for a close fought match that wasn't finally decided until the last group came in off the 18th green on the last day.

Day One, Saturday, belonged to Don Robertson (h'cap 20) who shot a life-time best round of 83 - net 68 (h'cap is used to determine net score for the Eclectic). Don has apparently been reading a book entitled 'How to Win at Golf' which sounds terribly unsporting – and where can I get a copy? - to take what appeared to be an unassailable lead, followed by Mike Staples and Phil Hall.

Day two was notable for Harland Bulow (h'cap 30) shooting a 43 on the front nine

and Dale Lamb (who hadn't played on Day One) taking the Day Prize with a net 65. Unfortunately Don Robertson could only marginally improve on his first days score and at close of play Mike Staples had edged in front and was leading the field on 61, one stroke ahead of Don. Several other players managed to improve their positions that day, Larry Goodliffe finished on 63 and Dick Taylor 65 so the match was wide open at the opening bell on Monday.

Day 3 was sunny and hot but storm clouds were building from early morning; Mike Staples, who had assured everyone that he had 'shot his bolt' on Day 2, returned a staggering 75 gross (net 57), a huge 11 under handicap (in view of last months article on 'Banditry' I have no option but to bring this to the attention of the handicap secretary, who is... er... Mike Staples) and was in an impregnable position. The real drama was the battle for second place. Don Robertson was working hard to improve his score but could only manage to find another two strokes and finished on a (highly commendable) 59. Larry Goodliffe had a better day, shaving 5 strokes off his score to equal Don and Dick Taylor, in the last group - more interested in getting back to the clubhouse before the storm broke than in the technical aspects of his game, (which might explain his net 59) also tied Don and Larry for 2nd place. The Club Captain decided to break the tie on handicap, Don with the lowest was awarded 2nd place, 3rd went to Larry and Dick took 4th.

Mike Staples was the winner of the **Trafalgar** Eclectic Trophy and David Lamb was awarded the 'Lowest Gross' Trophy (for the second year running).

Congratulations to Mike on a superb round of golf and special thanks to David and Cheryl Lamb who provided the score sheets and put so much work into calculating and tabulating the results. A special mention should also go to Diane Bulow, a newcomer to the game who won three technical prizes; a near pin, and two 'birdies' and the highest score (14 strokes) on any hole! Our sincere thanks also go to **Trafalgar Insurance Brokers** who sponsored the event and provided the prizes.

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# RULES OF GOLF (ABBREVIATED)

Loose Impediments: Any *natural* object i.e. twigs, leaves, grass clippings, tree branches etc.

**Obstructions**: Any *artificial* object; immoveable or moveable. Cart paths, drinks huts etc. in the first category, cigarette butts, paper or plastic bags in the second.

Either an impediment or obstruction may be removed to play a ball, but there is a crucial difference. If the ball moves as an **impediment** is removed there is a one-stroke penalty, but there is no penalty if it is an **obstruction** that is being removed. In both cases the ball must be replaced. A free drop, one clubs' length clear of an immoveable obstruction, (to the *nearest* point of relief, no nearer the hole) is allowed only if the obstruction interferes with a players **stance** or **stroke**. There is no relief for 'line of sight'. Another key difference is in a hazard – obstructions can be removed **but not impediments**.

Water Hazards: Are defined by yellow or red marker stakes (red shows a 'lateral' hazard which offers additional options.) Be aware that the stakes themselves are 'obstructions' they lie within the hazard and may be removed. You may play a ball lying within the hazard without penalty – but remember, it is a hazard and you may not ground the club (touch the water) or remove ' impediments'. If your ball is lost a one-stroke penalty is incurred, you then:

- Play a second ball from where the original ball was struck ('stroke and distance' option).
- 2. Draw an imaginary line from the pin, through the point where the ball last crossed into the hazard and extend it backwards. You may drop a ball anywhere on that line, no nearer the hole.

Lateral Water Hazards offer two extra options:

- 1. You may drop within two club-lengths of the point at which the ball crossed the edge of the hazard, no nearer the hole.
- 2. You may also drop on the far side of the

*hazard,* again two club lengths from the edge and no nearer the hole.

Note: in none of these options does 'line of flight' play any role.

**Relief:** Is usually granted under 'local rules' from:

- Casual water conditions such that the ball is in water or, when the ball is addressed, water is seen around the players feet. The ball may be lifted, cleaned and a free drop, (one club length, no nearer the hole) taken. Relief from casual water is also available in hazards i.e. bunkers but not a water hazard, refer to the section on 'bunkers' for the rules governing this situation .
- 2. 'Ground Under Repair'
- 3. Holes made by borrowing animals (not in a water hazard).
- 4. Flower beds.
- 5. Staked trees and young plants that are designated as part of the course.
- A ball embedded in it's own pitch-mark (not applicable to hazards).
- 7. Deep ruts caused by maintenance vehicles. [When to use a one or two club length dropping zone. As a rule of thumb if you are permitted a 'free drop' ie, from casual water, then **one** clubs relief may be taken. However if you are dropping as a result of a penalty (in a hazard, ball unplayable etc) then **two** club lengths relief is granted.]

Out of Bounds and Lost Balls: Note that OB markers, boundary posts and fences are *not* classed as 'obstructions'; they may not be removed to facilitate a shot and there is no relief if an OB marker interferes with stance or stroke. 'OB' is determined by drawing a line connecting the parts of the stake, stone or marker *closest* to the fairway. All of the ball must lie outside this line to be classed as 'OB'. Should the ball land OB a second ball must be played from the same place as the original. This rule also applies if a ball is lost (unless it is lost in a water hazard or 'abnormal ground conditions' ie. extensive casual water.) **Provisional Balls**: Shall be played if the player believes his first ball has gone OB or is lost (outside a water hazard). The provisional ball is played up to the point the original ball appeared to have reached. A search is then made for the lost ball, should the ball be discovered OB or, after 5 minutes, not found, then the provisional ball becomes the ball ' in play'. However if the original ball is found (or has not gone OB) then the player resumes with the original ball without penalty.

Unplayable Ball: The player is the sole judge of whether a ball is unplayable. He then has three options, all incur a one-stroke penalty:1. A second ball is played from the same position as the original was struck.

2. The ball may be dropped 2 club lengths from where the ball lay, no nearer the hole. (Note: this does not necessarily mean clear of the conditions i.e. undergrowth, that caused the ball to be unplayable). If after dropping, the ball is still unplayable it may be lifted and dropped within another two club lengths – at the cost of another penalty stoke – and so on ad infinitum.

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3. A line is drawn from the hole, through the place where the ball lay and extended backwards. The ball may be dropped anywhere on that line, no nearer the hole. Should the ball be declared unplayable in a bunker then the ball may be dropped under conditions 2 or 3 but must remain in the bunker. The option to return to the place from which the ball was originally played is always available.

Bunkers: The club may not touch the sand within a bunker until the stroke is made (a stroke is deemed to begin at the top of the back-swing). Neither may a player test the condition of the sand in any way before he makes his stroke. 'Obstructions' (anything artificial; rakes, paper cups, soda cans etc) may be removed but not 'impediments' (anything natural; leaves, apple core, twigs etc). Footprints or any irregularities in the sand may *not* be smoothed before the stroke

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
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- but if the irregularity was caused by a burrowing animal 'relief' can be taken (in this context a dog is not classed as a 'burrowing' animal). Relief is also available from 'casual water' in a bunker ie.

- 1. The ball may be dropped within the hazard, clear of the water but as close as possible to it, and no nearer the hole.
- The ball may be dropped on a line drawn between the hole and where the ball lay, but not nearer the hole and within the hazard.
- 3. The ball may be dropped outside the hazard on the same line, but there is a one-stroke penalty.

(Note: if the water is so deep and extensive that the ball is 'lost' it may be replaced without penalty). If you decide your ball is ' unplayable' refer to that section of this guide.



### THE FIVE HAMLETS....

The Memsahib and I enjoy a bit of theatre and we were thus rather looking forward to Daniel Foley's one man show, "The Five Hamlets" which was presented at the Club on 11th May. We had attended one of his earlier presentations on Shakespeare which proved to be a pleasant evening, if not exactly earth shattering, but a nice bit of culture nonetheless.

All told 20 odd intrepid souls turned up for the show on the 11th. Such a low turn out must have been a little disappointing for the staff who had put in much work preparing an excellent supper. Whether or not it was disappointing to Foley is hard to say. He may have been relieved at the small number on the grounds that he would be less likely to be booed off the stage. Given what was to come, a reasonable Thespian would have expected nothing less.

The show, when it eventually started, began badly. The first few minutes were totally inaudible. Foley chatted away in a stage whisper so low that even a stage cat would have been hard pressed to know what he was talking about. Ever resourceful the BC staff jumped in to help by turning off the air conditioning, but that didn't help much.

Eventually the audience were able to deduce that Foley would recite five passages from the play, in each case wearing a different jacket or hat to signify one of the great actors who had played Hamlet through the centuries. Each piece was preceded by Foley depicting the actor learning his lines by squinting at a book, face screwed up, moving mouth but no sound. One wondered if this perhaps was actually Foley swatting up on the lines before the recitation, or maybe he had a sore throat.

The names of the great Shakespearean actors to be so portrayed were extracted from the audience in a process akin to trivial pursuits, led by Foley. This illuminated some other trivial facts such as the profession of Shakespeare's father (glove maker) or why one great American actor by the name of Booth had to take a break from the stage (his brother shot President Lincoln). And so on. But we did not learn anything about the play itself. Only 2 or 3 of the audience claimed to know anything about the play and it would not have been amiss to run through the plot or to discuss why it is considered such a masterpiece or, even the old favourite, "what is bugging 'amlet". The opportunities to entertain and educate with such material are endless.

After the first half and a bit of a break one thought that things could only get better. However such hopes were quickly dashed by Foley announcing that he could not continue with the show because he had unfortunately left his script behind in a tuk tuk, together with his shoes (that explained why he was wearing sandals over his socks). All he could offer was a bit more trivial pursuits. Five more minutes of this and the show was over.

Despite everything, the Memsahib and I had a pleasant evening at the club and we will certainly attend any other cultural evenings in the future. We were not put off by the Foley follies, and the 99.8% of the membership who were not there shouldn't be put off either.



## EXPAND YOUR KNOWLEDGE -

Scuba diving allows us to move through a third dimension, an additional one compared with the two dimensions we largely experience when travelling on land. While diving we also experience floating up and over, and down and under within a peaceful, beautiful and relaxing environment. Unfortunately, most of us divers feel that our time is too short as we are limited in most cases by our no decompression time on dives in the 15 to 30 meter depth range. Using Enriched Air Nitrox (EANx) can extend your bottom time within recreational dive limits significantly, thereby giving you more time for your money on those far too infrequent dive trips.

It works like this; our no decompression time (dive time limit assuming we have ample air in our tank) is controlled by the amount of nitrogen we are consuming during our dive, which is 79% of the air we are breathing





of 36% oxygen to 64% nitrogen our no decompression time, at 30 meters for example, is increased from 20 minutes to 35 minutes. Think about how valuable this time would be when exploring a wreck, floating along a wall on a drift dive, or just relaxing while enjoying the sea life.

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The PADI EANx course is designed to teach you the procedures for safe, recreational, no decompression diving with enriched air. You will learn how to plan dives, determine your no decompression limits and the proper procedures for obtaining enriched air. I will be happy to schedule a course for anyone interested in this fun specialty certification. On the local scene, British Club Member **Graeme Werrell** completed two advancedtype courses in April in Pattaya; the Advanced Open Water Diver Course and the Drift Diver Specialty. Graeme really enjoyed the Deep Diver portion of the Advanced Course to a depth of 30 meters near the west tip of Shark Point off Koh Lan and has scheduled the Deep Diver Specialty for mid May that will take us through four dives at depths to 40 meters. As you can see by the photos, Graeme is a proud and happy diver with his accomplishments.

I will be happy to talk to you about scheduling a course tailored to your interests and schedule so you too can begin to learn this rewarding and fun aspect of diving. Also, please contact me for other diving schedules including the Open Water Course for those

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
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
