

BRITISH CLUB WIN THE MENS CUP COMPETITION AT THE CHRIS KAYS MEMORIAL RUGBY 10'S TOURNAMENT 2004 HELD RECENTLY IN PATTAYA

Some great rugby was played at The Horseshoepoint Resort and Country Club over the recent holiday weekend of 1st and 2nd May at the **Chris Kays Memorial Rugby Tens** Tournament, hosted by the Pattaya Panthers RFC. The British Club won the Mens Cup competition with an awesome defensive display, which included not a single point being conceded during their pool matches on Saturday 1st May. Ninety-nine points were racked up against the Patana Tigers, Taipei Red, Kasertsart **University and The Southerners** Gold.

Games on Sunday 2nd May were to prove a little more closely fought as the games progressed into play-off stages with The Southerners Black team up first in a closely fought semi-final between two of Bangkok's leading teams. In a game that saw some ferocious tackling by both teams, it took the BC a while to find their rhythm and by this time they were trailing 7-0. By the time the BC had equaliseded at 7-7 they were defending their try-line with the clock running down until the whistle signalled the end of the match. After a quick consultation with the tournament rules, it was realised that a sprint-off by one team from each team with a rugby ball in hand would settle who would progress to the final.

The BC boys were confident as our chosen player Khun Keng is not only a current Thai National Team player but was previously a member of the That Athletics sprinting squad! That aside, he was only the winner by half a metre and as the teams shook hands and as The Southerners graciously accepted defeat, Khun Keng complained of a sore shoulder. It was only then that it was discovered that he had run a full 100 metres with a semi-dislocated shoulder. Running repairs were carried out but medical advice prevented him taking part in the final against the Taipei Baboons.

The semi-final was also notable for the fact that a number of Southerners suggested that British Club Captain Eddie Evans should perhaps stop playing and referee the match as he was doing more talking than the ref!

The final was to prove to be no less physical but the BC stood their ground and made the Baboons play their rugby on the back foot - it was to prove to be a little less close with the BC running out winners 22-14 with tries scored by Khun Che and Khun Kitti. This being the final match, all the teams headed for the pool to enjoy some ale together before Jimmy "The Ratcatcher" Howard delivered a marvellous



BANGKOK LIONS: AN UPDATE ON THE FOLLY MASTER'S LATEST CUNNING PLAN

The Bangkok Lions Mini Rugby Union was formed earlier this year and has been a roaring success. British Club Rugby is firmly committed to this initiative, and literally is supplying the "Bulk" of organisation and coaches. Here is a look back on week's one to three.

RUN FOR COVER!

An idea by a handful of Dad's to give mini rugby "a bit of a go" to enable our children to learn and play rugby has led to over 200 children registering and playing rugby, and has also led to a number of regular meetings usually involving the famous saying ... WEEK ONE - 28 APRIL

Week One was somewhat chaotic, mainly for the fact that close to thirty children were awaiting registration on the first morning, which also coincided with the handing out of kit and Scribe's late arrival with the sole copy of team lists and registration forms. The under 17's were coached for close to ninety minutes by a combination of British Club Captain Eddie Evans and Rugby Chairman Jon Prichard which included learning general ball handling skills along with rucking, scrummaging and lineout drills, The Eagles beat The Falcons 4 tries to 2 in a very entertaining match which included some very good forward play along with powerful running from the back line.

WEEK TWO - 1 MAY

Week Two saw Scribe's late arrival policy continue with The Folly Master delivering yet further verbal rogerings! A further ten children registered and despite the fact that many of the coaches were playing in the Chris Kays Memorial Tens Tournament in Pattaya, plenty of parents were on hand to assist in the coaching. Noticeable improvement amongst all age groups could be seen. With the holiday weekend and a short working week to follow, it was a surprise that well over 150 children turned up to participate.

Amongst the matches in the 4 to 6 year age group, the Krungthep Warriors beat the Bangkok Harlequins by six tries to one with all six tries being scored by Ben Farebrother, who after scoring nine tries in two weeks has been moved to a higher age group. The other match in this age group saw the Siamese Cats beat the Bangkok Wasps by five tries to two with Finm McElroy scoring two tries for the Cats. In the 7 to 8 year age group the Krungthep Wanderers beat the Siamese Crusaders four tries to two with Ian Ramsey scoring two tries for the Wanderers whilst the other game in this age group saw the Bangkok Sharks beat the Bangna Vagabonds by five tries to two.


WEEK THREE - 8 MAY



The winner of our Day Prize on Day 1 was Ed Ashman with his net 66.





Mariya Gainsford has recently completed her Naturalist Specialty course. She clearly demonstrated her ability to quickly spot and identify marine life underwater. In fact, she was able to complete all her underwater course requirements during the first of two dives at Koh Man Wichai's south end at the "Five Fingers".

The Five Fingers are strings of coral shaped like fingers of a hand starting from shore and extending out 50 meters into the ocean descending to 15 meters depth. The fingers have numerous varieties of marine life and are one of the more interesting dive sites of the outer islands of Pattaya.

Trevor Adams recently completed the Rescue Diver course. The Rescue course is often described as "Serious Fun". It is an advanced level course that teaches the advanced diver how to identify and prevent problems as well as directly participate in and/or management of a rescue. The course involves first completing the CPR/First Aid course followed by academic knowledge development with lots of practice in the pool and finally demonstrating 12 rescue skills out in the ocean. It is a physically and mentally challenging course. Good swimming ability and organisational skills are essential. Completion of the Navigation and Search & Recovery Specialty courses are strongly recommended prior to beginning the Rescue Course.

Christopher and Jonathan Steele just completed the Advanced Open Water course. Their five dives over two days included Deep, Navigation, Night, Wreck and Photography. For the Deep dive located Northwest of Koh Larn, we descended to 30 meters to see if they were affected by nitrogen narcosis by giving them some simple coordination skills to complete underwater at depth. Jonathan showed a tendency to have become affected by nitrogen narcosis.

For the navigation dive at nearby Koh Sak, we had first practiced the compass, time, distance and natural navigation skills out in the back lawn of the British Club prior to going to the ocean. The limited visibility and a very mild swell in the ocean created unique challenges. After only two tries, working as a team, they were able to complete the rectangular course requirements using a compass. (I still personally evaluate even an experienced diver by how well they can navigate underwater with and without a compass.)

For the night dive we entered the water almost 20 minutes prior to sunset in order to become accustomed gradually to the increased darkness. During this time we explored using our bright underwater lights to see some of the local marine life. When full darkness was complete, we continued to do compass navigation skills, but due to currents and some minor buoyancy control problems had to abort these until later. It had been a long day for the two boys and they were tired. They needed to rest up for next day's wreck and photography dives.

The following morning, we left the new pier at South Pattaya to Koh Man Wichai for the photography dive first due to stronger currents in the morning at the wreck dive site. We completed the navigation skills from last night's dive before beginning the photography adventure. As with the navigation dive, I

had had a separate practice session earlier in the BCB pool preparing and using the camera equipment so the two students were more confident in the ocean. In reality, to become proficient with underwater photography it requires many hours and dives just learning about marine life and equipment. I let Jon and Chris shoot 18 pictures each using different lenses, natural lighting and strobe. Some pictures I helped set up and then let them try themselves. I later developped the pictures and we had a critique session.

We moved north to nearby Koh Pai for the wreck dive on an old USA WWII LSD, recently sunk for divers. The morning currents were now almost completely gone and we were the only dive boat at the site. Great! It was also high slack tide. Normally, divers begin the first dive of the day as the deepest and each following dive being shallower in order to reduce nitrogen gas buildup in the diver's body tissues. Today was different. The top of the wreck's deck is usually 15-18 meters depth where as our earlier photography dive had been held to 12 meters depth. We planned this dive using the PADI tables which I always keep with me underwater at 18 meters for a maximum of 20 minutes. There was also another new instructor using a dive computer with us. Upon descending the line down to the wreck the visibility was only 3-4 meters. When I reached 18 meters I could just make out the top of the tallest part of the wreck. The deck was even deeper due to the extra high tide! I decided to continue another 4 meters down until we reached the deck. There I was able to rapidly recalculate a safe shorter

time to depth dive. I also checked with the other instructor's computer who had also been with us on the photography dive that we were OK with the revised dive plan. We had a nice tour along the wreck's deck and saw some friendly batfish that came very close as well as several schools of fish.

After a 3 minute safety stop at 5 meters we surfaced and boarded the waiting dive boat

for our return to Pattaya and dive back to Bangkok. The wreck dive was definitely their favorite dive and both are interested in later completing the full Wreck Specialty course.

Finally, Henry Brown completed his Jr. Open Water course. Peter, Henry's farther, is a diver and he accompanied us on all the dives. Our first dive was at Koh Rin's south end. The weather was not good and we had light rain, white caps and surge. The second dive was at Koh Sak. The weather had calmed down, but underwater visibility was very limited with 2 to 3 meters only. Still, we were able to successfully complete a 100 meter compass underwater return exercise back to our boat.

Last day we were able to go to Koh Man Wichai as the weather and sea conditions were very good. First dive was on the Five Fingers, both visibility and marine life were great. We had the entire dive site to ourselves. The afternoon and final dive was just around the SW corner along the "wall" which is approximately 100 meters long and 11 meters high. It was another very nice dive. Henry had completed all his skills and I'm sure he and his father will have great fun diving together.
