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LETTER FROM THE CHAIR

Security, Credit Cards and By-laws.

As I write this article, the political situation continues to be unclear — both here and in the UK. I hope that by the time you are reading this we have a stable new government in UK and a peaceful end to the problems here in Thailand.

Of course the continuing protests in Bangkok have a more immediate effect on the membership, and the current atmosphere of tension has led to a reduction in Members using the Club, and the cancellation of a number of event and function bookings. Fortunately, this has not had a huge impact on Club finances to date and numbers seem to be picking up again. Over Songkran the Club was very quiet but I was very pleased to see many Members enjoying our facilities over the weekend just past, despite the sweltering heat.

Security at the British Club has been based on an assessment of the threats to expatriate communities following 9/11. This assessment no longer seems wholly relevant and prior to the protests many members had been urging the re-opening of the Suriwongse gates. In response to this, but bearing in mind the current situation, the Club is developing a more flexible three level security approach. This approach would allow the gates to be opened in normal times, but if the security situation deteriorated, they could be closed again; in extreme circumstances access to the Club could be restricted to Members only.

Thus we had hoped to open the Suriwongse gates to all Club traffic in early May, but the drive-by shootings on the night of Friday 7th/Saturday 8th has made us postpone this action. We still do not detect any direct threat to the Club itself but it does not seem appropriate to relax our security measures at this time. I have attended a number of security briefings at the British Embassy during the last two months and have kept Club management up-to-date with relevant advice received. The Club displays the latest travel advisory from the Embassy together with additional information from the British Chamber of Commerce Thailand on more local issues such as road blockages and availability of transport services.

As I mentioned last month, a particular area of concern raised at the AGM in March was the amount of bank fees the Club pays to collect membership dues by credit card. Whilst we prefer Members to settle their accounts by direct debit we do appreciate the flexibility and reward/mileage benefits that settlement by credit card offers. However, the cost to the Club of this arrangement is very high (about 915,000 Baht in 2009) and moreover constitutes, in effect, a subsidy by those Members paying by direct debit towards the rewards/ airmiles of those settling by card. After reviewing the situation, the GC has determined to continue to allow payment by credit card but to pass on any bank charges to individual Members. Those currently paying by credit card will be offered the opportunity to switch to direct debit before any charging is introduced.

We will be updating the Club's By-laws to reflect the proposed policy changes regarding payment by credit card and access through the Silom and Suriwongse gates. At the same time we will take the opportunity to fix some errors and anachronisms in the By-laws (such as references to the use of pool tables). The proposed revised By-laws will be posted on the General Committee notice board for Members review and comment for one month before becoming effective as per Rule 18 of the Constitution.

LETTER FROM THE GM

After a month in this job I am now starting to settle in to the Club. I would once again like to thank the Club's Members and the Staff for their welcome and the very constructive and positive collaboration I get everywhere in the Club.

One of the Management Team's tasks is to develop a primary business plan and a master plan for the coming 5 years. In doing this, we try to use much of the valuable work that has been done by previous Managements, Members and General Committees. However, a short review of The Verandah's performance shows that while the family restaurant concept works on Saturdays and Sundays, on normal workdays from Monday to Friday it is not sustainable for long. Consequently, in May we started to experiment with the concept of The Verandah, especially on weekdays. We have introduced the Express Business Lunch, the High Tea/Coffee, and a Fine Dining concept in the evenings. We will continue to experiment with different concepts until we have a more finalised business plan for The Verandah which the Management and the GC believe is sustainable and satisfactory for the Members in the long run. The change in the weekdays concept of The Verandah does not mean that children are not allowed in the area. It only means that children and adults are expected to behave like they would in all other better restaurants and cafés in Bangkok.

During last month, we have tried to clean up the outside area and change our gardening and cleaning procedures in order for the British Club to reflect better maintenance. Reed has taken over the responsibilities for this area, and with the team he has made a very good start. Changing old procedures and practices do take time, but we expect and hope that the Members will notice a significant difference before long, and meanwhile all constructive comments from Members are more than welcome.

We have started to change the organisations structure and the employees' work time. In many organisations, the Thai staff wants some overtime, however, our employees complain that they have too much overtime. By changing the structure and the work time of the employees, we are able to reduce the amount of overtime and adjust the opening time of the Suriwongse Sala such that we will start serving tea, coffee and other drinks no later than 6.30 am. We will focus this month on improving our service to all our Members.

The GC has been asked to make two changes to the By-laws which are important for the Club. The first concerns payments by credit card, and the second concerns access to the Club. It has already been noticed at the AGM that the Club loses almost a million baht per year on credit card charges. This credit card expense does reduce the value of the services which the Club can provide to its Members. However, we do not want to take away the facility for Members to pay by credit card. We have therefore suggested that the actual cost of the transaction will be carried by the Member who chooses to use a credit card. Elsewhere in Outpost we describe payment options in detail showing how the credit card expense can be saved by both Members and the Club.

In order to make access to the Club more convenient for Members, we will open the Suriwongse Gate as soon as the situation in Bangkok returns to normal. Opening the Suriwongse Gate means that in the future we will work with three different security levels depending on the circumstances, and whenever there is a change to the security situation, Members will advised by email and a notice displayed in the Club, as detailed elsewhere in Outpost.

HOUSE & GROUNDS

The monthly report on Maintenance and Development



I will start by continuing my report on the resurfacing of the tennis courts. Unfortunately, contrary to the hopes expressed in my previous report, our tennis players were not playing on Courts 2 & 3 when the May edition of this magazine was issued. The contractor managed to complete the work by Tuesday 27th April and Reed, to be safe, waited slightly longer than the recommended 7 days before starting to install the nets. It was then discovered that the socket for one of the posts had not been constructed properly. Worse still, cracks were discovered in the acrylic surface on the playing area. The contractor carried out the remedial work and we are now proposing to take over the courts within the next few days. Depending on the way in which the surface performs over a period of a week or so, we will decide when and whether to start work on the Centre Court and Court 1.

Since the EGM & AGM Meetings on 23rd March we have been preparing proposals for forthcoming repair & maintenance projects, and new development. As stated in my previous report, the outstanding need to repair and maintain the Club infrastructure will limit the finance available for development. We are therefore first addressing the repair & maintenance needs to estimate the cost, and will be presenting our proposals to the General Committee at the meeting on 18th May. Proposals for new development will be presented at the June meeting and will be tailored to suit the finance which we estimate will be available.

A great deal of work has been carried out over the last 10 years by General Committee members, Sub-Committee members, noncommittee members and various consultants, to develop a Master Plan for development of the Club facilities. I have gathered all this material together and, over the last year, studied it in detail. It is interesting that certain elements recur in different proposals and one can follow the logic and good thinking behind many of these suggestions. In carrying out building operations on our site we need to consider 2 major factors; satisfactory access for the contractors, and the minimization of disruption to our Members. These factors, will, to some extent, dictate the sequence of work and must be planned very carefully. Access from Silom Road would possibly require the demolition of the Staff House. This would provide an area for the contractor to work out of while carrying out the development in phases. On completion, this corner could possibly be considered as the site for an air-conditioned family building, as suggested in several proposals over the years.

One recurring proposal is to build three new squash courts into the corner of our site adjacent to the Narai Hotel. This will provide additional space for redevelopment of the facilities in the poolside building. It would be possible to build a larger gymnasium, perhaps at first floor level overlooking the pool, and a modern sauna, spa and aerobic room. A Sports Bar could be considered above the Suriwongse Sala with a balcony overlooking the tennis courts. Other suggestions have been a centralised kitchen and a multi-storey car park. We could consider new staff offices built outside the main clubhouse building. This would

enable the upper floor to be developed into spacious well appointed rooms for conferences and other group functions. The General Committee are currently considering a list of possible facilities which we have put forward as suggestions and are starting to prepare a strategic plan to help guide and prioritize the development of facilities in line with current and future Membership needs. Our Club has a very diversified Membership and it therefore is a very challenging problem to satisfy the majority of the Members. Any Master Plan adopted by the Membership would be implemented over a period of at least 5 years in order that it could be funded from revenue and disruption is minimized.

One of the first new facilities for which I will be seeking approval is new Workshop and Storage buildings on the land between the tennis courts and Suriwongse Road. I thought this proposal was a bit of original thinking on my part, but then came across it on a proposed redevelopment plan by someone else some years ago. This certainly underlines the fact that considerable thought has already been given to how we can improve and generally add value to our facilities and it would be a waste if these various proposals were to be totally ignored.

We will be signing a contract this month for the refurbishment of the Ladies' Changing Room. This is planned to commence on 5th July and be completed by 29th August. A stainless steel clothes rail is being manufactured for the Men's Changing Room and, if satisfactory, will also be installed in the Ladies' Changing Room. Alternative layouts for the Fitness Centre will be prepared in the next two weeks. The intention is to refurbish the Fitness Centre to an overlapping but slightly later schedule as the Ladies' Changing Room.

Over the last 2 weeks we have been monitoring our electrical consumption and, with the help of Electrical Safety Consultants, been investigating the means by which we can reduce our electricity bills. At the moment, the Clubhouse is taking electricity from our own transformer adjacent to the Silom entrance. The poolside facilities are served from the transformer owned by the Metropolitan Electricity Authority which is opposite the entrance to the Narai Hotel car park. We have been considering the possibility of obtaining electricity solely from our own transformer as it would result in a saving, once the capital cost was recovered. After carrying out the monitoring and calculations, we were slightly disappointed that the saving would only be in the region of 140,000 baht per annum. However, all such savings help and are still worth serious consideration.

We have arranged for a sample notice board to be installed at the end of the Clubhouse corridor. If this board is acceptable to the General Committee we will replace all the termite damaged boards, and the skirting, and install 2 additional boards in the reception area.



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Payment by Credit Card

Dear Member,

At the AGM it was questioned why the Club bears an expense of roughly one million baht per year for bank charges. The reason is that when payments are made using credit cards, the Club has to pay a commission to the credit card companies which ranges from 1.5% to 3.05% of the actual payment. This charge directly and indirectly lowers the service and benefits that the Club can provide to its Members. The GC has therefore, on the Management's request, started the process of amending the By-laws, with an appropriate posting on the notice board and by sending out emails to the Members.

The Club will continue to allow Members to use credit cards, although the cost of using them will be recharged to the Member as an administrative cost. The charge for using credit cards is as follows:

American Express 3.05% VISA or MasterCard automatic deduction 2.75% VISA or MasterCard pay at the counter 1.50%



All Members can avoid this cost and the Club will assist Members in doing so.

In order to save the above-mentioned cost, the Member must change the payment method from credit card to direct debit. The British Club has agreements with six banks, namely: Bangkok Bank, Kasikorn Bank, Siam Commercial Bank, UOB, HSBC, and Standard Chartered Bank.

To initiate the change in method of payment, the Member should adopt the following procedure:

- 1. Fill in the direct debit form from the Members bank (the form can be obtained from British Club or your bank).
- 2. Send the form to the British Club's accounting department.
- 3. The accounting department will send the form to the bank, in order to verify the signature. This verification process takes approximately 20 working days.
- 4. The amounts due to the Club will be deducted from the Member's account on 25th of each month.

The British Club will be happy to assist you or answer any questions. Please feel free to contact Khun Prem.

Entrance and Security

Dear Members,

In order to both secure the BCB premises and at the same time create a more pleasant entrance, the Club will start working with three different levels of security. The level of security existing at any time will relate to the security recommendations from the core members group's embassies. If one of the embassies considers that there is an increased risk, the security level will automatically be raised. All Members will have to identify themselves with their membership cards at all security levels. The security levels will be categorised as follows: 1. Low Risk, 2. Medium Risk and 3. High Risk. The Risk Level will be communicated at both the Silom and Suriwongse entrances.

RISK LEVEL OUTLINE

Low Risk Climate:

Roles:



Primary: Provide traffic control, identify Members/non-members. (and follow non-members to the reception)

Secondary: Assist with parking, assist with transport to destination and provide safety for all Members. (and children/cars)

Entrance: Access to the Club is possible from both Surawongse Rd and Silom Soi 18, for vehicles, Members, temporary members, and guests.

Medium Risk Climate:

Roles:

Primary: Provide traffic control, identify Members/non-members. (follow non-members to the reception)

Secondary: Identify risk and report. Maintain visual on all exits and entrants

Entrance: Access to the Club from Surawongse Rd is restricted to Members and temporary members arriving on foot. All vehicles or guests must arrive at the Silom gate.

High Risk Climate:

Roles:

Primary: Identify Members. Non-members are not allowed on Club premises. Deter and detect possible danger.

Secondary: Reduce risk to the Club and Members with Step-Up procedures.

Entrance: Access to the Club from Surawongse Rd is restricted to Members and temporary members arriving on foot. All vehicles or guests must arrive at the Silom gate. A secondary check-point will be posted further down the Silom Soi 18. in order to ensure early warning.

ONE UP FOR OUR BRITISH DEMOCRACY!

A REPORT ON OUR ELECTION RESULTS PARTY

"No one pretends that democracy is perfect or all-wise. Indeed, it has been said that democracy is the worst form of government except all those other forms that have been tried from time to time."

Winston Spencer Churchill

Thirty plus people packed the Churchill Bar, some from 5.30am on General Election results morning (7th May) to see who had won and who had not. The numbers varied each half hour with some even venturing on until the wee small hours of the afternoon! Many returned later for the various leaders postelection speeches as they tendered their wares in public.

To delight punters we had a 99 baht Breakfast, and Party Political Muffins of various flavours and colours – and even the beers (at Happy Hour prices) took over the leadership of each party! One TV showed BBC News (what else?) and the other Sky News - that was all well and good until they showed the same declaration and you find that the BBC is a full second faster than Sky so deafening echo resounded across the bar.

All in all a good party atmosphere prevailed with cheers going up when the "bad" guys lost - goodbye Peter Robinson, Lembit Opek and Jacqui Smith, and a few groans when yet another UK Independence Party (UKIP) candidate's vote was more than the vote required for Tory victory in that seat.

And of the serious politics – the actual results did not give an immediate impression that any good could come out of the night. For the three major parties the Tories "failed" to get an overall majority, Labour they "failed" to hang on to even enough seats to form a pact and the Liberal Democrats crashed out as Cleggmania "failed" to materialise into votes.


The results are all in except Thirsk & Malton in North Yorkshire where a candidate died so their vote is now on 27th May.

Such are the vagaries of our electoral system that with 650 MPs you should get one MP for each 0.154% of the overall vote, or 10 MPs for each 1.54%, or 100 MPs for each 15.4%, but we are a British Democracy and so you can win a seat with well less than half the votes - in fact less than 5% of all MPs actually took more than 50% of their constituents votes (Alistair Carmichael, Charles Kennedy, David Cameron, Nick Clegg and Gordon Brown to name a few), and a few took their seats with less than a third of the vote (Albert Owen and Caroline Lucas as examples).

However in every cloud there is a silver lining or in this case a blue lining with yellow edging – as we go to press

(17th May) a Conservative and Liberal Democrat coalition has been formed, the first time since the first elected parliament in 1265 that the two parties have come together outside of war and the National Governments elected in 1931 and 1935. Coincidentally both those governments were formed at a time of national

As commentators will have mentioned no doubt, David Cameron becomes the youngest Prime Minister since Robert Banks Jenkinson, 2nd Earl of Liverpool, took the office on 8th June 1812. Nick Clegg becomes the first Liberal Democrat in a Cabinet post since Sir Archibald Sinclair was Secretary of State for Air in Churchill's wartime government.

We continue our peek into our Club's past as we look at events of 1952...

1952 was the year of the 'Five Ships', in that we played host to five warships of the Royal Navy: the first four were HMS Jaseur (J428), HMS Magicienne (J436), HMS Maened (J335) and HMS Michael (J444). All were Minesweepers of the Algerine class which docked on 15th and 16th January, and the Club hosted 200 sailors to Tiffin. The fifth was a return of HMS Alert (K647), a Bay Class Frigate, on 21st and 22nd November when we entertained 60 crew.

Of course the major difference in the two visits was that in January they were 'His Majesty's Ships' and in November it was 'Her Majesty's Ship' – the Committee held a minute's silence on the death of H.M. King George VI on 6th February.

In May, the Committee agreed to re-instate the Chiengmai Gymkhana Club as a Reciprocal Club. The two Clubs had had a special relationship since before the First World War, and it was felt that such reciprocity would benefit both sets of members. This arrangement lasted over 40 years until it was decided around 1994/95 that Reciprocal Clubs should be overseas only.

1952 also was the herald of the first (of countless) 'Master Plans' for the redevelopment of the Club. This 1952 plan was very extensive and involved the lower floor of the Clubhouse only: 'The Bar' (now the octagonal part of The Verandah) was to refurbished in grey and a new longer bar created to allow for ten bar stools. The external wooden doors to the 'Verandah' and the back lawn (between the TV and The Verandah's bar) were to be removed and the external marble 'Verandah' as was (now the outer part of The Verandah) to be enclosed and made part of the bar.

The 'Ladies Bar' (now the lower office and Games Room) would be turned into a 'Snack Bar' with luncheons being brought in from outside and other snacks made in the pantry (to the rear of The Bar). There was a side plan to move the Assistant Permanent Secretary's office from the ground floor (The Verandah's dogleg) to upstairs.

This was costed out at 77,580 Baht, which was virtually the whole balance of funds of the Club. Thankfully the Extraordinary General Meeting called to approve this had the common sense not to do so and only The Bar was refurbished.

In August the Bangkok St. Andrew's Society received permission to hold their monthly Reel Club within the Club. In order not to negate our newly-won exemption from Hotel & Restaurant Tax (see last month's article), all St. Andrews' members had to be signed in as guests and prohibited from consuming F&B unless paid for by a Member.

1952 was an eventful year with around a 100 Members and guests attending each of the bi-monthly dances, and the bi-monthly Sunday Night Cinema becoming so full that it had to be split over two nights to accommodate all. On the downside, the bi-monthly Stag Nights saw declining numbers and were destined to be phased out. A total of 343 persons attended the Annual Christmas Ball and by the year end we boasted a membership of 235, a gain of some 23% in one year.

After an eventful few months both in and outside the Club, I am pleased to tell you that more sections have started up again, like Rugby and Football, but first the Juniors:







THE UNION JACK

The Union Flag originated in 1606 when King James I of England, who was also King James VI Scotland, decreed that a new flag be produced to represent the Union of the two kingdoms even though each kingdom remained an independent state. The flags of St. George (England) and St. Andrew (Scotland) were therefore merged. Wales had no recognition in the Union Flag as it had been annexed by in 1282 and was therefore legally part of the Kingdom of England.



Later in 1801, the flag of St. Patrick (Ireland) was added, after the Kingdom of Ireland merged with what had become the Kingdom of Great Britain, resulting in the current design.



The 'Jack' is likely to have been named after King James I, (Latin for James was Jacobus), or perhaps referring to the flag which flies from the bowsprit of a ship, known as a jack, which often denotes nationality.

Still used as a part of many Commonwealth countries' official flags, it is one of the most recognised emblems in the world and not being symmetrical, is often seen being flown or printed incorrectly.

Inthe 1960s, abrilliante conomic stimulus package for retailers and manufacturers, known as the "I'm Backing Britain" campaign, saw the flag often used on many commercial products. Nowadays, the flag is also a eye-catching fashion item, snapped here in a trendy Bangkok mall

KHUN LAAK'S ON THE MENU



Duck, Pomegranate, Cranberry and Almond Salad

Serves 4:

- 1 Gressingham duck
- Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1 level tablespoon ground cinnamon
- A sprig of fresh rosemary
- 1 tangerine or 1 small orange, halved
- 2 large pomegranates
- 6 small preserved lemons
- A large bunch of fresh flat leaf parsley
- A large bunch of fresh mint
- Extra virgin olive oil
- 50g/1.75oz shelled pistachios, chopped
- A handful of dried sour cherries or cranberries
- 2 large handfuls of lamb's lettuce, washed and dried

Method:

Preheat your oven to 180C/350F/Gas 4. Wash the duck and wipe it dry, inside and out, with kitchen paper. Mix a teaspoon of salt and a teaspoon of pepper with the cinnamon and season the duck with it, both on the inside and outside. Stuff the duck with the rosemary and the tangerine or orange halves — they will hold everything inside. Place the duck on a roasting tray, breast-side down, and roast in the preheated oven for an hour.

Take the tray out of the oven and spoon all the fat out of the roasting tray. (Don't forget to save it for your roast potatoes!) Turn the duck breast-side up and roast for another hour. Turn the oven up to 200C/400F/Gas 6 for the last 15 minutes if the skin needs some extra crispening up.

Near the end of the cooking time for the duck, halve the pomegranates. Scoop the insides out of the preserved lemons and reserve. Chop the lemon skins roughly. Pick the parsley and mint leaves.

Remove the duck from the oven and leave it to cool down a little. When it's cool enough to handle, take the tangerine halves out with a spoon and set aside. Rest the duck on a clean serving dish while you prepare the rest of the salad.

Hold a halved pomegranate, cut side down, over a bowl in the palm of your hand. Smack the skin side with a wooden spoon. The seeds should tumble out from the fruit and fall between your fingers into the bowl below. Do the same with the other 3 halves. Once you have all the pomegranate seeds, put twothirds to one side and pulse the rest in a food processor with the juice

in a food processor with the juice from the tangerine halves and the insides of the preserved lemons. Pour through a sieve and mix in an equal amount of olive oil to make a dressing. Season it lightly with salt and pepper, and put to one side.

In a large mixing bowl, combine most of the parsley and mint leaves with the toasted almonds, the pistachios, the sour cherries, the skins of the preserved lemons, the whole pomegranate seeds and the lamb's lettuce. Toss in some of the dressing. Pull the duck meat off the bone, including the crispy skin (you can wear a pair of clean rubber gloves to do this if it's still a bit hot, and tear it up into chunks. Arrange the warm duck on a large serving plate, top with the dressed salad and the rest of the parsley and mint leaves, and drizzle with a little more dressing before serving.



Chickpea and Chorizo Soup

Serves 4:

- Olive oil
- 150g/5½ oz Chorizo sausage, finely chopped
- 1 onion, peeled and finely chopped
- 1 clove of garlic, peeled and finely chopped
- 2 sticks of celery, finely chopped
- 500g/1lb 2oz fresh spinach, washed and chopped
- 8 fresh tomatoes, deseeded and roughly chopped

Method:

Put a couple of tablespoons of olive oil into a large pot and add the chorizo. Allow to heat up and cook for a couple of minutes until the fat comes out of the chorizo, then add your onion, garlic and celery. Turn the heat down and cook slowly for 15 minutes with a lid on and without colouring the

onions. Now take off the lid – the smell and colour will be fantastic. Stir it around and get some colour happening now. Add your spinach, tomatoes, chickpeas and chicken stock. Bring to the boil, then lower the heat and simmer for around 40 minutes.

At this point you can remove about a third of the mixture and purée it in a food processor. Pour it back into the pot, give it a good stir and season to taste with salt and pepper. Remove from the heat and stir in the pata negra or ham and 2 or 3 tablespoons of good Spanish extra virgin olive oil. Divide into bowls and grate some hard-boiled egg on top.

Grilled Sea bass with sautéed Vegetables and Serrano



- 3¼ lb 4½ lb/1½ 2kg gurnard
- $4\frac{1}{2}$ lb/2kg vegetables in season, such as artichokes, green beans, turnips, green asparagus, carrots, leeks, celery, tomatoes
- 8 Slices of fatty Serrano ham
- 1 leek
- 1 clove garlic
- 4 bay leaves
- A few leaves flat-leaf parsley
- Olive Oil
- 1.67 cup/400 ml brown veal stock
- salt and freshly ground pepper

Method:

Clean and trim the vegetables, peeling them where necessary. Cook each type separately until al dente. Allow to cool.

Fillet the fish and cut into four 5½ oz/160g pieces. Place 1 bay leaf between the skin and flesh of each piece. Bake the seasoned fish with the olive oil and 1 clove garlic for 10 minutes.

Cut half of the ham into fairly thin strips and sauté with the vegetables in a little butter. Add the veal stock and parsley and simmer, covered, for 2 minutes. Deep-fry the julienned leek.

In a skillet, sauté the remaining 4 slices of ham. Place a nest of vegetables on each plate, top with the fish and finish off with the fried leek and the ham. Drizzle with a little olive oil and serve

Strawberry Protein Shake Ingredients:

- 4 pcs strawberries
- 2 oz strawberry juice
- 60 g vanilla protein powder
- 4 oz fresh milk
- 1½ tbsp honey
- ¼ scoop cracked ice

Method:

Blend all ingredients together and pour into a glass.



Raspberry Sunset

Ingredients:

- 1 tbsp_raspberries
- 1 oz fresh lime juice
- 3 oz fresh orange juice
- 1½ oz syrup
- ¾ scoop cracked ice

Method:

Blend all ingredients together and pour into a glass.

BC Kir Royal Wimbledon Special

Ingredients:

- ¼ oz Crème de Cassis
- 6 oz Sparkling Wine
- Half piece of sliced fresh strawberry

Method:

Pour the sparkling wine over crème de cassis in a tulip champagne glass and top with sliced fresh strawberry.

Strawberry Sangria

Ingredients:

- 4 oz red wine
- ½ oz Brandy
- 1 oz orange juice
- ½ oz strawberry juice
- 1 tsp brown sugar
- sliced oranges and diced strawberries

Method:

Stir ingredients and served in a wine glass.

Make a Swarm of Tumblebugs

Set these little critters on an incline and watch them cartwheel as they make a bee-line to the bottom. The secret to their antics is a marble rolling around inside.

Materials

- Scissors
- 2 one baht coins
- Toothpick
- Black marker
- Glue stick

Card stock

- Tacky glue
- Marble (1 for each bug)
- Coloured tissue paper

Instructions

1. For each bug, cut a 5½ inch by ¾ inch strip of card stock and two 1¾ inch by ¼ inch card stock ovals.



2. To make an oval, lay the 2 coins side by side on the card stock and trace around them, connecting the top and bottom.



3. Glue the strip into a loop, overlapping the ends by an inch. Pinch it or use a paper clip to hold it together while the glue dries. Next, use a toothpick to line one edge of the loop with glue, then set the loop on top of an oval.



4. When the glue dries, place a marble inside. Line the edge of the loop with glue and press the other oval on top.



5. Once all the glue is dry, use a marker to add a face and other features. Cut out a couple of 2 inch long wings from tissue paper and use the glue stick to attach them to the top of your bug.




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
