

EDITORIAL

COMING shortly - the E.G.M. to vote on the Capital Expenditure Budget for 1985. A total of \$1,977,000 has been proposed by the General Committee, the bulk of which will go towards the building of an "all weather hard tennis surface." If agreed upon, the "surface" will replace the two grass tennis courts just beyond the Old Sala beside the swimming pool. Costing some \$850,000 (which includes lighting for evening use), this new area will be aimed, naturally enough, at encouraging greater participation in tennis within the club. If the project proves successful - and there is great optimism in the General Committee that it will - then the bottom two courts will be similarly treated at some future date.

Some members may feel, however, that such a huge outlay for the benefit of one club section only (tennis) is not justified. It has been said that such a surface should be for the benefit of other sections as well e.g. soccer, rugby and others that could be set up such as netball, basketball and even golf (mats down, boys, and it can only be a driving range). This wider usage begs an important question: who decides who uses the all-purpose surface (if that's what it's going to be called)? The General Committee? The tennis section?

Despite the possible controversy over this new section of the club, one thing is abundantly clear - at least in the minds of many long-standing members of the club. The BC needs an injection of fresh interest in the form of improved facilities, in order to boost greater usage of other facilities (e.g. bars and restaurants) and to attract new members.

The other items on the capital expenditure list range from the purchase of a new deep freeze, new stair carpet (essential, surely) and refurbishment of the ladies' changing rooms to a new piano, staff lockers and an air-conditioned section in the Old Sala (for children's usage in the evening while parents imbibe in the bar).

The other important issue under discussion at the E.G.M. will be whether or not to expand the Club's associate membership from its present 60 limit to 120. From general observation, it would appear that this proposal will get the nod without undue problems. After all, an additional 90 members would give the Club a much-needed boost in income, not to mention the added interest a multi-national membership would undoubtedly generate.

Do make a point of turning up for the E.G.M. on Thursday, July 4 at 6 p.m. It's your right and the future of your club that you will be discussing.

Sir,

Your July number will, unfortunately, appear after the Extraordinary Meeting to which Members are summoned on 4 July, to "approve by a simple majority vote" borrowing of \$1,980,000 for various works.

This vote is invited without Members being provided with any supporting financial data. We are informed in the "Preamble" only that there "... can be little doubt..." that extra revenue will be generated, and that "... there would be no reason" why the courts should not then be used for 365 nights in the year.

Since the Committee contains one eminent banker, it is surprising that he accepts a loosely-worded general statement in place of a proper feasibility study. Furthermore we must suppose that the Committee is familiar with its own 1984 Balance sheet, showing current indebtedness of at least \$2,663,367 (an increase of 34.23% over 1983 levels), with a deficit of expenditure over income in Club Funds of \$632,228.

It would thus appear from the same Balance sheet that the Club possesses no Capital fund, and no financial reserves, whatever the real value of its Assets, such as the land occupied, may be.

Loans from Thai Banks are usually at 17 per cent per annum, and even assuming the Club obtains the 15% which it appears to be paying on its overdraft of \$706,493, interest and repayment over 5 years (the assumed fixed term) would be:

In the absence of any feasibility study from the Committee, (unless they are keeping this as confidential from the Voters). I prepared an outline assessment, and financial projections of the proposed expenditure, which I have sent to the Chairman with a request that it be circulated prior to the Meeting of 4 July as a Working Paper for discussion.

This examination shows estimated annual recurrent costs generated by the proposed illuminated hard tennis courts as \$1,215,252, which includes \$297,252 depreciation @ 15%. The latter is important since Cashflow Projections show an annual negative cash-flow (net loss) from \$709,902 in Year I to \$438,971 in Year V, with a total negative cash-flow for the five years of \$1,402,320. This can only be financed by Accumulated Depreciation over the same period of \$1,485,000, but this still has to be generated by income.

The above projections are based on mildly optimistic assumptions that the tennis courts will be utilized at 30% of their capacity in Year I, rising to 70% in Year V, and that extra food and drink sales will rise from +1% of Gross Catering Contribution in Year I to +3% in Year V. It is assumed that the hourly charge for the courts is \$80 per person/hour.

It should be clear to the committee, and especially to the eminent banker, that this expenditure cannot fail to result in increased charges for all Club Members, of whom the tennis players are a minority.

The method of obtaining approval for increasing expenditure, (when the Chairman himself says in the 1984 Report that the Club's financial position is not satisfactory,) by a vote from whoever turns up at the 4 July Meeting, is not acceptable. The Committee itself is often unable to obtain a quorum. All 380-odd Members should be circularized in writing, with proper supporting financial information, requesting them to signify approval/disapproval in writing. Otherwise we must conclude that the Club is run by a small minority, in their own interests.

Adding to the confusion was your correspondent's statement in Ch' inchok that the Silom road entrance was to be closed. It is difficult to imagine anything of greater inconvenience to Members, who would be obliged to leave the Club in the general direction of Chinatown where few of them live. How could such a major change in the layout of the Club grounds as they have been since 1910, be put forward without a genuine referendum of Members?

Lastly, why spend \$430,000 on air conditioning what is termed a 'Sala' beside the Pool? One can imagine few more disagreeable sensations than coming wet from the pool into a chilly damp air conditioned glass box. The Committee would be better advised to provide comfortable rotan armchairs in which Members can relax, talk or read the papers, on a shady verandah on the western side of the present Bar. The furniture in this Bar is that of a cafeteria with chairs suitable for a quick lunch, but not for a relaxed drink.

The Committee might remember the comfort which other Clubs in Asia offer their members for a drink. Let us mention the Selangor in KL, (not the Tanglin which is now like a railway station at rush hour), the Bengal in Calcutta, and the Colombo in Ceylon.

Now that the Ladder is operating satisfactorily, perhaps the Squash Section Committee will consider publishing some guidelines on how they decide League placings. This would be useful to League participants and to future Committee.

Absolute rules cannot be made because of the mobility of the membership of the Squash Section. Any given League will have at least 15% new participants and may have 10% returnees.

Another difficulty is that strict placement rules can scare off potential players. Above all, we want the League to remain attractive to newcomers.

However, problems arise when players feel they have a grievance about their League placing. There are no guidelines to refer to and there is no system of redress. Complainants are told that placings are at the discretion of the Coordinators, and to grin and bear it.

Some guidelines which indicate the criteria used by the Coordinators might be helpful in such cases, since we have to know what rules have been followed before we can decide whether justice has been done.

1. Promotion

- .1 Promotion occurs when a player is placed in a division higher than the group he played with in the previous League.
- .2 Normally, those who win a division will be promoted one division in the next League.
- .3 Exceptionally, (for example, if a player has won all his games in two consecutive Leagues) a player may be promoted by two divisions.
- .4 Note that if a League has a very large entry, the promoted player may not go into a higher division. With an increased number of divisions, he may achieve promotion by staying in the same division while his previous sparring partners are moved down. He may even move down one division while the group he played with moves down two.
- .5 Players who come second in a League may occasionally be promoted, depending on the size of entry to the League, their place on the Ladder, etc.
- .6 Very exceptionally, a player who makes great progress in the Ladder, no matter what his League performance, may be promoted by one or two divisions.

2. Demotion

- .1 Demotion occurs when a player is placed in a division lower than the group he played with in the previous League.
- .2 Normally, those who are bottom of a division will be demoted one division in the next League.
- .3 Exceptionally, (for example, if a player has lost all his games in two consecutive Leagues) a player may be demoted by two divisions.
- .4 Note that, as in 1.4 above, the League number to which the demoted player may be assigned will depend on many factors, including the number of entries to the new League.

- .5 If the coordinators are to choose between demoting a person who has come bottom, or promoting someone who has come second in a previous League, then promoting the second placed player will be given priority.
- .6 Very exceptionally, a player who has fallen many places in the Ladder, no matter what his League performance, may be demoted.

3. New Entries to the Leagues

- .1 Normally, newcomers to the Leagues will have to play at least two players for League/Ladder placement.
- .2 In circumstances where there is no opportunity to estimate the new entrant's performance, he may be placed in the League at the discretion of the Coordinators, provided that the newcomer is not placed in a League higher than any established player who is above him in the Ladder.

4. Returnees

- .1 If the returnee missed only one League, he will be treated like a current player.
- .2 If more than one League has been missed, he may be required to act like a new entrant as in 3 above.

Any comments on these suggestions and any further suggestions for guidance on League Placement procedures would be welcomed, presumably, by the Squash Section Committee.

Without rules of some kind, consistency in the application of selection criteria is difficult. If rules such as those above are adopted, perfect as they are, they can be adjusted and improved. The alternative is to retain the present system, where the role of Coordinator is surrounded in mystique and the ability to perform this role handed down from generation to generation of Committee, by a mystical process, like the priesthood.

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BRITISH AIRWAYS

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97 YEARS !!

THE British Club had the rare opportunity to welcome its longest-serving member to lunch on the house the other week. Mr. C.S.I. Mabbatt, CBE, who first arrived in Bangkok an incredible 58 years ago, back in 1927, was joined by another veteran member - though mere newcomer by comparison - Mr. P.D. Howard, who joined in 1946.

Mr. Mabbatt is still well remembered for his outstanding contribution to the BC over many years, including his record stint as Chairman from 1946 to 1961. Now 78 years old and fighting fit, he was formerly with the Borneo Company.

When he first came to Thailand, or Siam as it was known then, the British Club was an "owners' club," meaning that each member held debentures in the organisation. Although he was considered "too young" by his contemporaries to qualify for membership immediately on his arrival, the official line was eventually softened and he was allowed "in."

Mr. Howard, now a hearty 81-year-old, came to Bangkok at the end of the War with the British Tobacco Company to work on behalf of the Thai Tobacco Monopoly. After his retirement in 1956, he decided to stay on in his adopted land and today is actively involved in the Lodge St. John for which he is the treasurer.

Both members have a wealth of memories of the city in days gone by — many of them unique to the British community.


Mr. Mabbatt, for example, recalls the day he met a Japanese officer, samurai sword drawn, on the balcony of the British Club just days after V.J. Day. The club had been used by Japanese officers during the War and, following his release from internment at Thammasat University, Mr. Mabbatt had popped along to Suriwongse Road to determine the status of the BC. The Japanese officer had spotted him and instinctively drew his sword. On asking for the keys to the club, Mr. Mabbatt was told in no uncertain terms where he could find them. But smiles were exchanged and no harm done.

An active sportsman in his younger days, Mr. Mabbatt can recall the names of most of the players in the Bangkok Rugby XV that played against visiting ships in 1927. (He has presented some remarkable team photos from those games to the BC).

Sadly, Mr. Mabbatt lost his wife earlier this year after many decades of happy marriage. Because he is not as mobile as he once was, Mr. Mabbatt is unable to visit the club as often as he would like. Old friends and colleagues, please note.

As a token of his appreciation of the BC, Mr. Mabbatt not only donated his entire book collection to the club recently, but also presented a new trophy for the billiards and snooker section.

Today Mr. Mabbatt and Mr. Howard are both honoured members of the British Club. Between them, they have given almost 100 years of service to the BC. Their contribution should be valued and never forgotten. Good on you, gents.

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





If you want a break from Bangkok traffic fumes and don't want to sit on a beach all day, read on....



"At one Girl Guide meeting our leader suggested that we go to Kanchanaburi and stay at a place called River Kwai Family Camp,.... When we got there we chose beds in the dormitory and went over to the Obstacle Course. There were balancing beams, climbing rope, monkey bar, stepping stones, commando frame and rolling log.... After showers and rest period Hannah, Heike and Jaqueline were on table duty so they set the table and got the food.... In the morning we got ready for a long hike - seven kilometres to the River Kwai Bridge. Jigger the dog came too.... After lunch we played rounders then went horseriding. We walked and trotted in the ring and on the trails - it was fun.

We had a barbecue at night and rosted Cerian's marshmallows. We performed a play called "The Odd Gum" then learned to find North by the stars.... On Sunday morning we went upriver on a rice barge where we swam and learned to handle a canoe for Water Fun Badge.... Soon after that we had lunch, showered and packed for home. I didn't think the weekend would go so fast."

The above is a condensed version of the camp reports of some of the Christ Church Girl Guides, but you don't need to be a Guide to enjoy the facilities of the River Kwai Family Camp.

It is situated 5 kilometres from Kanchanaburi, a pleasant two-hour drive from Bangkok. There are camp sessions from mid-June to early September when you can leave children of seven and over in the excellent care of Mrs. Rhodes and Miss Verna to enjoy the riding, with instruction for beginners and experts, as well as many other supervised sports and outdoor activities. In addition to the children's dormitories there is family accommodation in cottages, airconditioned bungalows or even a barge (and you can ride with the children if you like), during the camp or at any other time throughout the year. You can also hire the rice barge for a few hours and enjoy an excellent meal and cold beer as you drift down to the Kwai Bridge, with a swim or a paddle in the canoe on the way if you feel energetic. This makes a pleasant outing from Bangkok for visitors even if you only have one day to spare - an idea for a company outing maybe?

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LIQUOR PRICE INCREASES

Since the advent of the increased beer prices the F & B sub-committee has become aware through critical banter in the bar and Outpost outbursts of some members mis-conceptions of the club's policy on bar prices. At present levels, Members Sub-scriptions and Entrance Fees contribute about half of the costs of running the British Club - the costs of its staff; maintenance of its buildings, grounds and furnishings; utilities; printing and administration; insurances, taxes, etc., etc. The other half is covered by the profits we make on sales, i.e. liquor and food in the Clubhouse and at the Poolside.

Broadly speaking, to break even we have to make a gross profit of just below 40% on our food and liquor sales. Unless we increase prices in proportion with costs, whether purchase costs or taxes, our margins will be eroded over time and the Club's finances will suffer. Current beer prices were calculated in accordance with Club policy as follows:



RUGBY
