

IN MEMORY OF D1 - A CHARACTER

Mike Dutton joined the Club in 1968. Except for a brief period of absent membership in 1976 Mike must have been the most frequent user of the Club - until he went on the ill-fated leave in early June, which he had been looking forward to so much.

It was his first home leave for four years and it tragically ended in an Essex hospital, some 12 days after he was attacked

in Greece by five youths who apparently mistook him for someone else.

There can be few members who have not met D-1. The white Ford Fiera truck was often to be seen in the carpark and Mike was then either having breakfast at the poolside or ensconced at the bar with keys, current paperback, Bic lighter with rubber bands and whisky arranged in front of him.

He was always ready to pass the time of day (or night) with members old or new and to make visitors feel at home.

No member can have made more use of the suggestions book, known to successive committees as Dutton's Diary. In his characteristic microscopic script D-1's contributions ranged over the entire spectrum of the Club's activities - and perhaps this is his legacy to the Club - as many of his suggestions were implemented with beneficial results, and almost all are worth reading.

Mike represented the Club at cricket (behind the wicket) and at darts and even on occasions wheezed around the squash courts. Few could out-scrabble him.

It was always a pleasure to see Mike, usually in the bar, wearing his regimental tie. The inevitable conversation which ensued might cover a lot of ground, as one would expect from one so widely read. Favourite topics were food, of which he had unrivalled knowledge, and books of which he was an avid reader and collector.

Some members will remember the "Dutton Food Fests" when Mike would host lunches in restaurants he had "discovered". The menu was always carefully chosen and would often include something surprising or outrageous.

Mike also contributed to the Club by serving on several subcommittees and by penning the popular Galloping Grommet page in the Club Newsletter. His association with OUTPOST since its inception was to have continued and he had planned to edit this issue.

Mike had his ups and downs, which is not remarkable. He was generous, honest, amiable, a lover of life, interested in his adopted country, his fellow man and his Club, which are rarer attributes. Above all he was a character. He will be missed.

THE HILLTRIBE SALES

For many, the monthly Hilltribe Sales at the International School, Soi 15 Sukhumvit Road, are dates not to be missed. In just 2½ hours of hectic trading each Sale sees a vast array of colourful handicrafts snapped up by thronging masses at bargain prices. Many of the products are unique, most are indeed made by hand and their distinctive traditional colours, patterns and shapes make ideal presents or mementoes of a stay in Thailand.

But the origins, aims and achievements of the Sales are perhaps less well known and we hope make a worthwhile topic in Outpost's series of articles on institutions and events around Bangkok.

The origins of the Sales can be traced to the time when missionaries up-country started to sell handicrafts produced by the people they were working with ... hilltribe people, leprosy patients and others in need ... as a way to raise a little extra cash to pay for schooling, medicines, or simply just rice. At that time, around the mid-1960's, the hilltribe handicrafts were not seen in the Bangkok shops as they are today but were genuine everyday articles used by the tribes people themselves.

Many of the missionaries involved in this pioneering work were connected with the International Church on Soi 19, Sukhumvit Road, and found a market for the crafts through women in the congregation in Bangkok, and others in the community, who sold the crafts privately to friends and women's groups.

After a time the ladies of the International Church had the idea of selling the various crafts together at one time and in one place, and in this way the Hilltribe Sales were born. The first experimental Sale was held at the Parish House at the Church in December 1971 with crafts from just two tribal groups, Karen and Lahu, raising the princely sum of about 7000 baht!

Since then the Sales have never looked back, growing steadily in size and taking in more and more producing groups. In 1975, after a number of temporary homes, the Sales moved into more spacious accommodation at the International School. Now the crafts of some 19 different groups are sold at the Sale and the last Sale in May this year raised a record 660,000 baht - in just $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours! In the 5 Sales so far in 1980 over 2.4 million baht have been taken.

The Sales are staffed entirely by volunteers and organised by the Women's Association of the International Church (WAIC), including some British Club Members. The original purpose of the Sales was to help economically depressed or disadvantaged people by marketing their handicrafts on a non-profit making basis and providing them with an income by which to alleviate their poverty through their own efforts. The Sales also helped the Christian Agencies representing them to extend their witness of Christian love and concern for these people.

As the Sales grow, increasing numbers of organisations approach WAIC for permission to sell their goods and great care has to be taken in vetting these applications before accepting them into the Sales. The selection criteria used relate directly to the Sales objectives. Firstly the goods must be produced by economically disadvantaged tribes or community groups, and secondly they must be channeled to the Sales through a Christian institution, mission or agency.

At the moment there are about 1500 individual workers producing crafts in 19 different Thai, tribal and refugee groups. The handicrafts arrive at the Sale in many different ways, but essentially, one WAIC lady acts as the co-ordinator for each group, and is responsible for receiving the goods from the Christian agent, supervising the Sale, keeping inventories and forwarding payment.

For those who have not attended a Sale, the large gym at the International School is awash in a sea of colour on Sale day, with an endless variety of crafts on offer, both large and small. Sale items include basket work, needle craft, patchwork, woodcarvings, fabrics, tribal musical instruments, silverware and jewelry - all hand made. And one of the attractions of the Sales is that because the items are individually made, the choice varies from month to month. Over the years the quality of the workmanship in many of the crafts has improved enormously, and to widen their market, new colours and designs have been introduced extending the range of the traditional patterns.

For the volunteers, the reward for their considerable efforts is in knowing that the Sales directly benefit the people who have made the crafts. All prices are fixed by the producers themselves and initially WAIC withhold 10 per cent of the sales to cover immediate direct costs - rentals, electricity, postage etc., but in fact this deduction far exceeds actual costs. Once a year the WAIC then gives back the balance of this commission to the groups in the form of education grants and scholarships. In this way about 97 per cent of total Sale proceeds go back direct to the craftsmen who make them.

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The WAIC have, however, become increasingly concerned that these groups should not become dependent on the Sales, since there can be no guarantee that voluntary labour and management on the scale presently provided by the Hilltribe Sales will continue into the future. It is their fervent hope therefore that for these groups of craftsmen the present Sales are only a start in their finding increasing independence and eventually establishing and managing their own permanent markets. The present WAIC committee are now directing their efforts into achieving this new, difficult, but very worthwhile goal.

Meanwhile the Sales are in their annual recess, but for regular shoppers and newcomers alike the dates for the Hilltribe and Handicraft Sales in 1980/81 will be:





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
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SWIMMING

'tis sad indeed so young he died.


