



The usual mid-year exodus has taken place and amongst those leaving Bangkok was the entire Outpost Editorial team and Production Staff. Life goes on however and this somewhat diminished edition of Outpost is beingcobbled together by the Manager. Committee, and office staff. Apologies if it fails to match recent high standards.

Since the editors took all future articles with them. we are somewhat short of copy for the month and I thought I might take the opportunity to reflect a little on the progress, or otherwise. of the club at the mid-year point and one third into the current Committee's term of office.

We were very fortunate when we took up our duties in April to inherit a Clubphysically in better shape probably than at any other time in its history.Eighteen months of dis ruptive construction suddenly ended and the Club was endowed with an attractive new poolside sala, flood-lit tennis courts and a new car park which did a great deal to enhance the appearance of the entire premises. However we also inherited a sizable debt due on loans raised for the tennis court and sala improvements, and declining trends in usage and membership which had been apparent for some time but aggravated by conditions prevailing during the construction period. This year was always going to be a challenge!

Given our outstanding debts the Committee's priorities from the very first have been to increase membership and usage whilst carrying out only essential repairs and modest improvements to the club facilities. We have attempted to present a more informal and friendly club atmosphere than may have prevailed in the past, and to 'sell' the club more aggressively than has been done before. A priority has been to attract new Associate Members within the mandate given to the Committee at the Extraordinary General Meeting of the Club back in July 1985.

So far we can claim some limited success. Many people have commented on the more welcoming atmosphere of the Club and much of this is due to the undoubted success of our new format, very social, New Members nights; the regular, varied. low key entertainment programme layed on by Richard Hopkins; and the good support being given to the Club by our enthusiastic Soccer and Rugby sections and the rapidly emerging, rejuvenated Tennis Section. We have of course had some criticism (although not all as tough as Mr. Jinjok!) and we have even been accused of 'lowering standards'. I would challenge anyone to substantiate such an accusation.

The 'New Blood' campaign has been disliked by some but after all the best Ad campaigns are always the controversial ones. It is a revelation to have British Club Membership as a social discussion topic! The fact is that if the British Club is going to survive then something positive has to be done, and quickly. Increasing competition elsewhere and the changing nature of the expatriate community will finish us off if we simply sit back and wait for things to get better.

We have attracted a lot of new members in the last few months and our Associate Membership is now over 70 for the first time, Unfortunately it has also been a disastrous period for people leaving Bangkok and we have had to do extremely well just to stand still membership-wise. The financial results so far.are, frankly, disappointing. During the first six months of the year we have experienced a small cash flow deficit of around B 80,000 at a time when we need to be generating a significant surplus to finance our loan repayments. We still face an enormous challenge!

Whilst we are reviewing our operating costs and management for possible economies, our priority of looking for new members and usage has become even more urgent. When the absent masses return after the break we will continue our campaign which will include a new Club brochure and increased PR for the Club. We would be neglecting our duties however if we did not seriously address the present sticky financial position and, much as we would like to avoid it, we may be forced to ask for a modest increase in subscriptions and entrance fees (These have not increased since 1981) to cover the short term cash-flow situation. Any increases would be kept to the minimum possible and presented to the Membership through an Extraoridnary General Meeting in the usual way.

The Committee is concerned about the long term future of the Club and will be seriously considering this over the coming months. Our present loan of \nexists 2.5 million is a modest one when set against the enormous assets represented by the property the Club owns, and indeed amounts to only \nexists 5000 per member. Furthermore, if we were successful in increasing

Club Membership from the current level of around 500 to 550 or 600 our present cash-flows problems would be resolved. However. this has been the position for years, and with expatriate trends against us, serious thought is needed for a longer term solution.

Meanwhile we have a very pleasant and attractive Club with excellent facilities, good food, active sports sections and regular social activities. Please use it! If every member spent an extra β 100 per week at the Club there would be no need to increase fees or subscriptions and our loan would be payed off on schedule.

Try us! Even the Silom Road works are now nearly completed. It's never been better!

27 players played for us in 16 matches, a larger number than normal but covering a large number of one-off appearances, particularly over the New year and Easter periodswhen we really had to scrape the barrel (Viz Buster and a busted baseball player) The fact that two of these one-off appearers proceeded to break the British Club record for the eighth wicket (39 by Dunne and Williamson) is in no way a reflection on the regulars.

We finished fourth of seven in the 50-over league, and third of eight in the 30-over league. Our top score of the season was 281-7 off fifty overs against the post, the top score against us was 275-5 off 50 overs by RBSC. Our lowest league total of the season was 110 against RBSC in the 30 over match, but we also had that dreadful 54 all out with twelve men in the early-season friendly against Chiengmai. Three sides were bowled out for under 100, the Indians for 86. Chiengmai for 88, and the Thais for 94. Craig Price topped our batting averages by a considerable margin, with 54.30 in all matches and 60.22 in the league. He scored 543 runs, nearly twice as many as his nearest rival John Bertacco. Nick White and Terry Adams also scored over 200 runs in the season, but it was Chris Cowper, who appeared in only four matches, who grabbed second place in the averages, with 114 off three completed innings.

On the bowling side, Nick White bowled a massive 144.4 overs at under three runs an over, while every other regular bowler yielded well over four an over; but he was beaten into second place in the averages by Nevilla Clissold, whose 22 wickets cost only 13 runs each, compared with Nick's 29 at 14.83.

Alistair Rider managed 12 victims behind the stumps this season, while Neville Clissold was the best outfielder, with 7 catches.

Best batting performance of the year was Craig's 151 not out against AIT. Best stand was Craig and Terry's 108 against the Post. Best bowling was Neville's 6 for 53 against Chiengmai, though special mention should be made of Nick's 4 for 5 off 4 overs against Chiengmai, and Jack's 3 for 5 off two overs against AIT.

We were bowled 52 times, caught 50 times, run out 10 times, Lbw'd 9 times, stumped 6 times and hit our wicket once.

Twixt season news is much as usual. With Mac Sayer and Neville Clissold leaving during last season and John Bertacco at the end of it, our bowling line-up has been further decinated by the sudden and unexpected departure of Pat Paterson. However experience councils against panic and two newcomes to the BC bar are already pushing their claims for fame next season. Happily one of these is an Aussie so Craig Price won't have to take all the blame for everything that goes wrong after all. Nets start in November. Watch this space. A LADIES' GOLF


