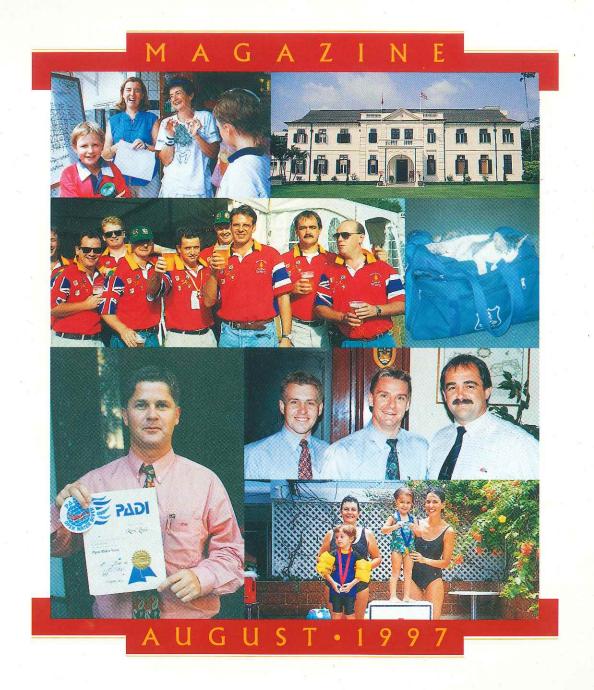

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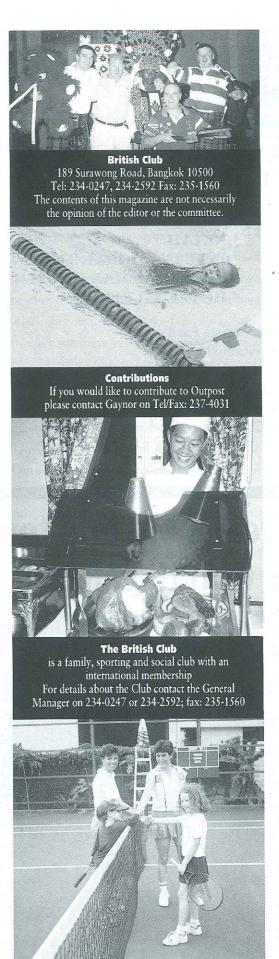

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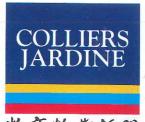

Aqua Aerobics

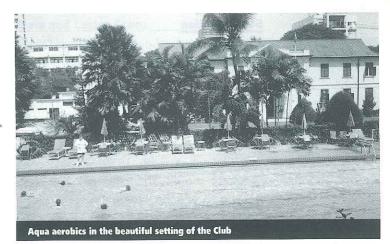

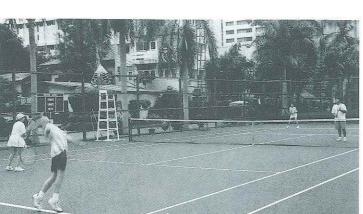

There was a final play-off in which Sharon and Chris managed to beat Tee and Pin - but only just, by 2 tie-breaks to 1!

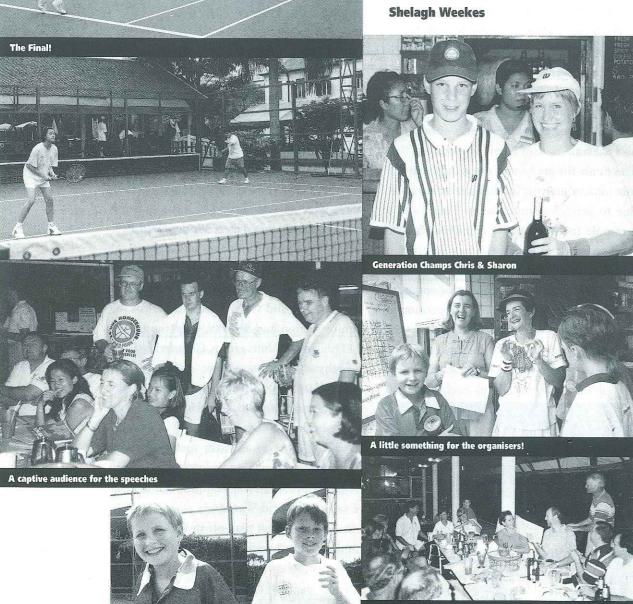
It was a great day; all the players really deserve a mention because everyone worked

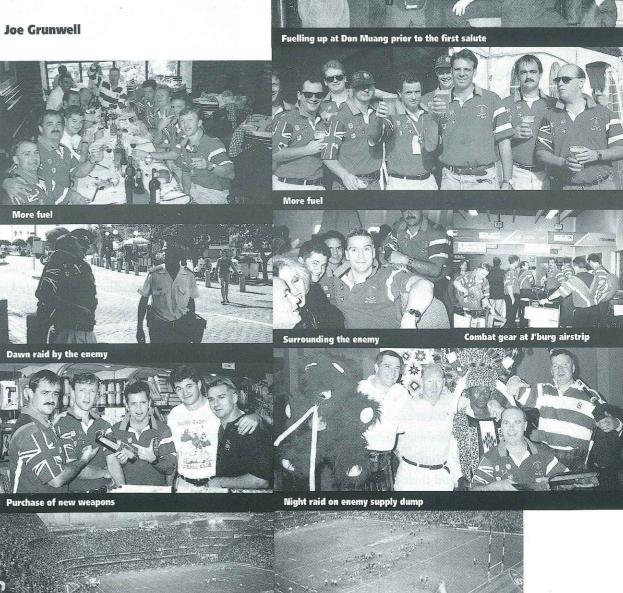




Lions in Africa

Diving News

Congratulations to PADI's most recent certified divers: Karl Eagle, Robert Scott, Gillem Lawson and one non-member Warnon Engkagul. They successfully passed the **PADI Open Water Diver** course on June 15th, having completed their academic training at my office, their confined water training in the Club pool and their open water tests in the sea by the islands of Pattaya.

Karl Eagle (see pic) has established a reputation for loving to fly underwater by doing underwater somersaults! We call them "Eaglesaults" - ask him for a demonstration in the pool sometime! Several staff and management personnel of the British Club personnel have recently participated in the **PADI Medic First Aid** course,



including Tom Bain, Taweekiat Chattaweewut, Ruengrit Turiwong, Amnat Saklebpradu and Chirachada Suwanawong. In addition to CPR and resuscitation, the Medic First Aid course includes control of bleeding, managing choking and shock, illness assessment, hyperventilation, poisoning and diabetic emergencies, epileptic seizures and injury assessment such as fractures and dislocations, head, chest, neck and back injuries, lifting and moving of such injured, snake and spider bites, eye injuries, exposure to cold and heat, burns and electrical injuries. With no diving or pool activity required, this 8-hour course is very useful for everyone - divers and non-divers alike - as we would all like to be able to do something to help and maybe save a person's life when and if the situation calls.

lived and married there in the '50s so we decided to revisit old haunts and stay in the Tanglin Club of which we were then members - we were not disappointed.

The Club is a delightful Colonial building within easy walking distance of the main Orchard Road shopping area. In spite of this, it is a peaceful oasis due to the carefully planned lay-out of the surrounding gardens. The accommodation consists of about 16 comfortable double rooms of wonderful proportions on the top floor (3rd). Each room comes equipped with tea and coffee making facilities, a fridge, a TV and a safe (and excellent) air conditioner. The bathrooms are large and modern, with a bath and separate shower cubicle, plus a hair dryer and the acceptable 'gifts' of a shower cap, shampoo, bath gel and soap. There is no room service, but the rooms are cleaned everyday and all towels lavishly replaced. The 2nd floor has an excellent library and a relaxing reading room with a huge selection of international newspapers (including the Bangkok Post) along with other rooms used for different occasions. Coming down a grand sweeping staircase to the ground floor you find the entrance and reception area - comfy chairs and flowers! To the side of this there is another lounge for casual snacks and gossip; always popular. Also on the ground floor are the two restaurants: the Churchill and the Tavern, the latter being the easy-going, crowded and noisy one. But be warned! There is a very strict dress code in both. In the Tayern, men must wear long socks and shoes with shorts (in fact, no shorts after 8 pm) and ladies "proper" sandals or shoes and suitable attire. As Des didn't own a pair of long socks he had to change into trousers! There is an Olympic-size swimming pool and a separate children's pool and play area. There are squash courts in the Club, a Billiards room and across the road are the tennis courts (check dress code). The Wheelhouse restaurant by the pool caters for meals all day and special barbecues and buffets at the weekend (swimming costumes to be covered up!). The cost per room per night is S\$ 210 + 3% Govt. tax which includes a continental breakfast

Govt. tax which includes a continental breakfast eaten at the Wheelhouse. We were given a card and number which we used for everything we ate and drank while there and paid the total as we left.

Singapore is a lovely city. You walk under the shade of trees everywhere. Taxis are plentiful, the mass transit is marvellous and everyone speaks English! A great holiday for all the family.

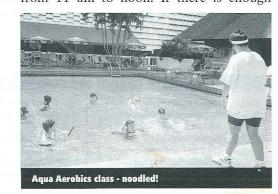
Aqua Aerobics is now in full swing. The evening class was due to commence on Wednesday 16th July but due to difficulty with getting regular participants and instruc-

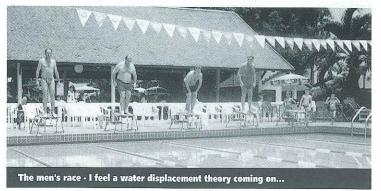

BC Surin Elephant Round-Up

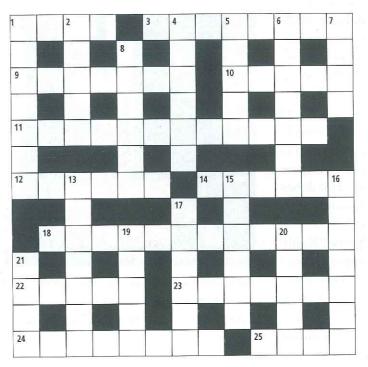
ertainly the most stylish trip available." On 14th November, the British Club will once again be packing their cooking utensils and sleeping bags ready for you to join them on this very exciting, once-a-year event. The elephant round-up in Surin makes news in Europe and the States; have you ever seen 250 elephants together in one field? All walking peacefully, munching away on bananas and sugar cane and not being lumbered by showy outfits, all au naturel! There is a show as well, of course, and an interesting market at the round-up site. Young and old enjoy this trip. We leave Bangkok at around 8.30 pm from Bangkok (Hua Lumphong train station) and arrive in Surin at 4.30 am, where you are collected by the BC tour bus and taken to our meeting point for a (Thai style) shower and BC breakfast. At around 7.30 am we set off for the round-up - plenty of time for you to have a look around the market and make your way leisurely to your reserved, covered seats to watch the round-up. The show ends

at around 12.30-1 pm, when the bus will take you to a Khmer ruin with a picnic area; plenty of safe space for the kids to stretch their legs and for you to have a quiet relax while enjoying the full splendours of the BC bar. In the afternoon there is time to visit local handicraft centres, ride on elephants in Surin town centre, visit a Khmer ruin on a hill or anything else you'd like to do which can be arranged. The train leaves for Bangkok at around 8 pm and arrives at 4 am, so plenty of time to go back to your own comfy beds. 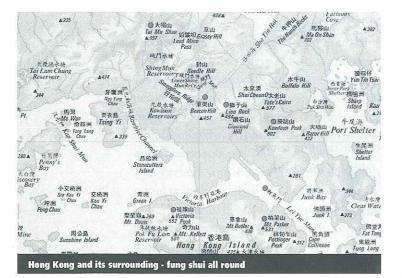

Here Be Dragons

In the wake of the handover of Hong Kong from the British to the Chinese, many wonder what the dynamic island state has in store.



However, some believe there is more to the fate of a place than politics. The following is extracted from an article by Choi Hing Wah in *The Peak* magazine and forwarded to me some time ago by David Viccars:

The transformation of Hong Kong from barren rock to international city is not just due to a fragrant harbour, opium wars and hard work; *fung shui*, dragons and heavenly water also play their part.

Hong Kong is a territory with good fung shui. It is blessed land and is likely to remain so despite political and economic fluctuations. At the heart of its good fung shui is Tai Mo Shan, the territory's highest peak at 957 metres. It is part of a mountain range which rises in Guangzhou and sweeps through southern China to the New Territories and Hong Kong island. The range twists sinuously, sometimes disappearing only to rise in another place. These twisting, winding hills are known

as Dragon ranges.

The dragons within the mountains can be alive or dead, and vegetation plays a crucial role in determining its well-being. Lush vegetation not only looks beautiful, it also protects the earth and body of the dragon; thus a mountain covering in flourishing woods indicates a healthy dragon and good fung shui while desolate highland signifies a dead dragon and poor fung shui.

The quality of the fung shui in each place depends on whether it can be "held", which requires geographical barriers around an area such as rivers, mountains or hills. It's complex to explain but where fung shui is held in place, towns and business districts form.

There are three mountain sub-ranges in Hong Kong centred on Tai Mo Shan, all of which house living dragons. The first stretches to Lion Rock, another reaches Beacon Hill and the third rises at Kowloon Peak, drops down to Lam Tin and dips under the harbour at Lei Yue Mun. It rises again at Mount Parker then twists along the spine of Hong Kong island to Victoria Peak from which the dragon can look back at its body on the Kowloon peninsula. The good fung shui provided by this living dragon is held in place by the water in the harbour. According to Chinese tradition, a body of water begins in heaven and exits to earth. In Victoria Harbour, the water at Western District is regarded as "heavenly". This is, obviously, good fung shui. The Lei Yue Mun basin "holds" the water in the harbour preventing it from flowing away to earth. The mountain range which begins in China channels good fung shui from the mainland into Hong Kong where it is held by the basin of water at Lei Yue Mun. So whether you judge the territory's fung shui in terms of mountains or water, you come up with the same answer: Hong Kong is blessed with excellent fung shui which has helped this barren rock become an internationally important city and one which is likely to stay that way.

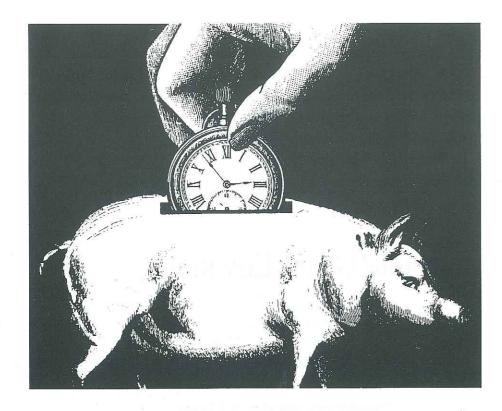

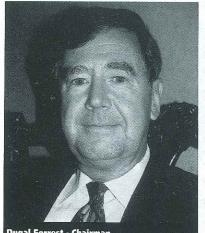

month of relative peace and quiet at the Club with all facilities readily available as and when you wish to use them. So come on down and enjoy it all.

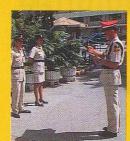

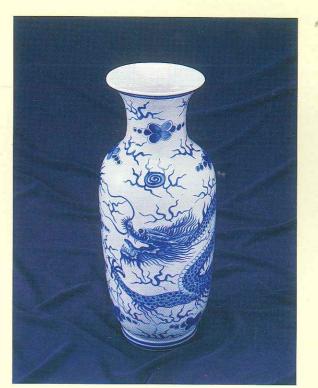

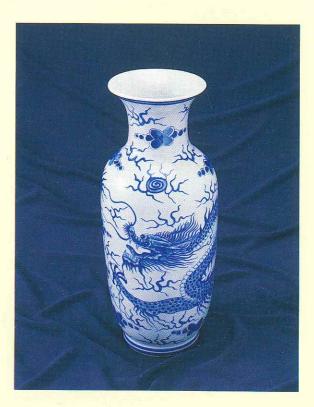
