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



### **Here's to Mothers Everywhere!**

others Day is pretty well universally recognised these days, but different countries celebrate Mothers Day on various days of the year because the day has a number of different origins.

In Thailand, Mothers Day is celebrated on the 12<sup>th</sup> of August, the birthday of Queen Sirikit Kitiyakara, because the Queen is viewed as 'the mother of the nation'. To mark the occasion, the Club is putting on a Mothers Day buffet and children's activities (see page 8) and this issue's front cover features a montage of photos showing Queen Sirikit as both mother of the nation and mother to her own children.

The beginnings of Mothers Day are shrouded in the mists of time. Although there were various festivals in ancient Greece and Rome dedicated to maternal goddesses and involving mother worship in one form or another, there is a paucity of evidence linking any of these celebrations to modern Mothers Day.

In the UK and Ireland, "Mothering Sunday" falls on the fourth Sunday of Lent (exactly three weeks before Easter Sunday). It is believed to have originated from the 16th century Christian practice of visiting one's mother church annually, which meant that most mothers would be reunited with their children on this day. Most historians believe that young apprentices and young women in servitude were released by their masters that weekend in order to visit their families. As a result of secularisation, the day is now principally used to celebrate and give thanks for mothers.

Mothers Day, in some form or other, is now celebrated in over 120 countries on at least 26 different days. While there's no doubting the continuing appeal of mothering, opinions on the subject vary considerably, as the following quotations attest . . .



### Letter from the Chair



Dear Members,

By the time you receive this, many of you will have already returned home for summer holidays or are taking a well earned break here in Asia. Due to the large number of members who return home around this time of year we are now entering our traditional quiet period, although you would not have guessed this looking at the activities hosted or catered by the Club over the past month.

Despite the fact we are heading into summer holidays, this month has been very eventful around the Club. A wonderful evening was held on the front lawn of the Club on July 5th to formally farewell the current British Ambassador, His Excellency David Fall, and his wife Gwendolyn, on behalf of the Club's members. I have been informed that His Excellency took up his appointment as British Ambassador to Thailand and Laos in August 2003,

his third posting to Thailand. In addition to Thailand, his overseas postings have included South Africa, Australia (as Deputy High Commissioner) and Vietnam (as Ambassador). I know that His Excellency has actively supported the Club and has participated in a number of Bangkok Community Theatre performances at the Club. The British Club Bangkok Pipe Band formally opened the evening, lead by Pipe Major Keith Walker and section chairman, Angus McKernan. A highlight of the evening was the presentation of the Club's Centenary book and flowers to the guests of honour that was followed by a very entertaining presentation of a Bangkok Gentlemen Spoofers shirt to His Excellency. The evening was also our bi-monthly New Members Night where the new members were introduced and had the opportunity to meet existing members, senior management, Club staff, and the General Committee. As with all new members, I am sure they will find the Club a "home away from home" and you will make them feel most welcome.

Other events held at the Club were the Queen's birthday party celebrations, Canada Day and the annual Fun Fair. In addition the Club catered the British Community in Thailand Foundation for the Needy (BCTFN) Alternative Queen's birthday party at the British Embassy on June 23rd where there were a large number of members in attendance. 
I wish those of you who are taking off for the summer holidays a safe and enjoyable trip, and look forward to seeing you all around the Club in the near future.

### Richard Grooks

Sadly, Richie, a resident of Bangkok and Club Member between 1989 and 1994, passed away in Hampshire on Sunday, June 17, 2007 after a struggle against cancer at the age of 53.

Richie will be known to a lot of the present membership as part of the backbone of the British Club Football First XI and when called upon a reliable regular for the Rugby First XV and will be remembered amongst other things for his supreme levels of fitness and a very dry sense of humour.

He is survived by his wife Jan, daughters Hayley and Abby, and son Sam who were regular attendees at the Club during this period.

### Grain Price

Craig Price, a cricket stalwart of the British Club through the '80s and an exceptionally good bloke, died suddenly at the age of 50 on Sunday 24th June.

Craig was an excellent cricketer, an accomplished and stylish batsman, a useful medium-pace bowler and an athletic fielder with a powerful throwing arm. He played for the Bangkok British Club for many years and was selected to play for Thailand against Hong Kong in Hong Kong in 1991, where he was at the crease when Thailand scored a notable victory against a full-strength Hong Kong team.

Craig was also an enthusiastic member of the Bangkok Community Theatre. He acted in pantomimes such as "Cinderella" and appeared in "Accidental Death of an Anarchist" and one of the first plays about AIDS, "As Is".

Foster parents provide temporary homes for cats prior to adoption and for cats needing time to recover from an illness or injury. It's a wonderful and rewarding way to contribute to saving homeless pets, and a fun and flexible way to volunteer some of your free time. Best of all, it's a great way to enjoy a pet if you are unable right now to make a lifetime commitment to adopting one.

#### Skills needed...

It's good to have knowledge about companion

animal behaviour and health, but at SCAD we provide basic cat-care training. Most cats adjust quickly and just need some TLC and time in a home environment to learn to trust.

What else is required...

A spare bedroom or bathroom - or for anyone



wishing to help longer term, a garden or balcony closed-in area. Cat fostering is suitable for apartment or house dwellers, but to better facilitate easy viewing for potential adopters, a central Bangkok location is preferred. Foster parents have to be prepared to visit the vet for vaccinations and other health issues, and be willing to set aside time for play and interaction, and regular updates to SCAD.

Taking a cat into your home, loving it, and then letting it go requires a special kind of person. A cat foster parent role is to prepare the kitty for adoption into a loving home.

### Sand Mosaics

#### CRAFT MATERIALS:

- Scissors
- Black or other dark-coloured construction paper
- Shoe box or other shallow box lid
- White glue
- Sand and assorted shells

#### DIRECTIONS:

Depending on where you live, beach sand comes in a variety of hues - tan, pink, gold, even black or white. You can use whatever shades you find at the beach for this gluing project—a sort of natural version of glitter designs (except, unlike glitter, your supply of sand is practically inexhaustible).



Cut a sheet of construction paper so that it fits inside the box lid - this will be your portable canvas. To make a picture, you can draw with the tip of the glue bottle, then sprinkle on loose sand. Once the sand is dry, shake off the excess by gently tapping the side of the lid. For added detail, you can glue on shells, pebbles, sea glass or any other not-too-aromatic finds.



There'll be no lamenting about the one that got away in this fish story. Cast right on the beach from plaster and assorted found treasures, this fine specimen makes a unique and lasting souvenir.

#### CRAFT MATERIALS:

- Shells, sea glass, pebbles, or other beach finds
- 1 x 2kg (4.4-pound) box of plaster of Paris
- Water (fresh or seawater)
- Beach bucket or other container and a stick for mixing the plaster
- Spray bottle

Time needed: Weekend Project

#### DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Dig a flat fish shape in moist sand about 2 inches deep (ours was 15 inches long and 9 1/2 wide). While working and moulding the sand, use a spray bottle to mist the sand so that the mould will hold its shape.
- 2. Arrange shells (facedown), sea glass, pebbles, and other beach finds in the mould to create scales, gills, and other fish features. Gently press the items down to anchor them in the sand so they won't move when you add the plaster of Paris.
- 3. Mix some plaster, making it thick and creamy so it will not run under the items in your mould (we used 7 cups of plaster and about 3 1/2 cups of water). Very gently pour the plaster into the mould, filling it slightly more than halfway.
- 4. When the plaster has set enough to hold together but is still not too firm (generally an hour), dig the sand away from the fish and gently brush away any flaws and excess sand. Handle it gingerly until completely cured (about 24 hours).







### Seashell Sailb

This mini craft takes only a minute or two to assemble, and it's just right for launching in a kiddie pool or bathtub.

#### CRAFT MATERIALS:

- Small triangle cut from a plastic bag, tablecloth, or other item
- Thin twig
- Modelling clay
- Clean shell

Time needed: 30 Minutes or Less

#### DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Trim the plastic triangle to resemble a sail. Cut off the very upper tip (this will prevent the top of the sail from flopping over later), then snip a series of tiny openings along the edge where the mast
- 2. Thread the twig through the openings. Press a small lump of clay (if you use too much, your boat might not float) into the shell hull and plant the mast firmly into its centre.

### A Fond Farewell

ONCE found myself seated beside a Norwegian oil company executive at a festive and, despite the 100 guests, oddly intimate gathering at the Ambassador's Residence. Looking around the diverse party my new friend said: "I don't know how David and Gwendolyn do it. It's not just that they know so many people, it's that they all become such firm friends."

An elegant summary of the Fall years.

David may be the very model of a modern major general but he is not, fortunately, quite the model of a modern British Ambassador. With none of the fusty formality of the past, David – aided of course by Gwendolyn's easy charm - has still worked in many ways against the grain of modern diplomatic service, resolutely refusing to define his role in narrow trade representative terms seeing instead his mission in the wider context of a bygone era where an ambassador's duty is to promote friendship and relations throughout his host country.

The British Club knows how well he has done that but is perhaps less aware of the skilled way he has put his networks to use to the benefit of British business as was borne on me in a recent interview with the finance director of a London-listed company.

"So you're based in Bangkok," he said. "Well before we start I have to tell you what an absolute star the Ambassador is. We've been having trouble with access to the right people in Laos – couldn't get anywhere for years – and then, pretty much in desperation, we turned to the Embassy. Fall got us what we wanted in a week. Marvellous."

David's time in Thailand has not been without its ebbs, the lowest undoubtedly his media-mugging in

the wake of the tsunami. While any response to that tragedy was bound to be imperfect, his real failing, albeit understandable, was to be unprepared for the onslaught of the Big Beasts of Fleet Street.

No one, as Pythons say, expects the Spanish Inquisition, and with Thailand mostly unnoticed in London newsrooms, there was little reason to know that the tabloid piranha tank must be kept fed with spin if it is not to seek its own prey. While those of us who are lied to daily by the professionally media-savvy may find straight dealing a refreshing change it is seldom rewarded.

It was typical of David that, throughout the hail of criticism, his one concern was that it took attention away from his staff and the volunteers who had worked so tirelessly during those dreadful days.

I know many in the Club feel slighted on David's behalf that there was no "K" for him in the recent honours list. That is undoubtedly a reflection of the value and affection in which he is held but it is, I believe, unnecessary. The award of higher baubles always recalls the entry rules to Evelyn Waugh's restaurant in Vile Bodies, where "only the most sarcastic and overbearing were given tables, and only the gross and outrageous were given food".

No, David's rightful award is the affection and gratitude of those who know his work in Thailand and the lasting legacy of goodwill between Brit and Thai (and for that matter, Australian and Norwegian) he and Gwendolyn leave behind them.

We wish them a fond farewell and a happy and fruitful retirement – because I do not think Thailand has quite heard the last of them yet.

## On the menu...

This month we feature two delicious nutritious fish dishes! Thai style or Western — why not try them both?

And if you're feeling hot, flat or stymied, get a crush on fruit with our three cool summer crushes of the month . . .

### Pla Gao Sam Ros

(Deep fried Fish with Sweet & Sour Sauce)

#### Marinade:

- 3 tablespoons oyster sauce
- 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 3 tablespoons tempura flour

Clean fish. Dredge the fish in the marinade and leave to stand for about an hour so that the fish is infused with the flavour.

#### Ingredients:

- 1 kg whole fish
- 1 cup pork belly sliced into strips
- 2 green garlics or onions, sliced into
- 1 inch lengths
- 2 tablespoons chopped garlic
- 2 tablespoons red prik chi fa chopped
- 2 1/2 tablespoons oyster sauce
- 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 3 teaspoon palm sugar
- 3 teaspoon sour tamarind (paste, peeled, seeds and fibres discarded)
- 1/4 cup bai phak chi (coriander/cilantro leaves) chopped
- 1/2 cup of corn flour mixed in water

#### Procedure:

Heat oil for deep frying in a deep skillet or large wok over medium heat. Deep fry fish until crispy. Remove the fish, drain the excess oil, and place on a serving platter lined with lettuce and encircled by tomato slices.

Heat oil in a frying pan, add chopped garlic and prik chi fa, stir-fry until fragrant, then add the pork and stir-fry for 3-4 minutes and bring to a gentle boil. Add oyster sauce, soy sauce, sugar, sour tamarind, rice flour and continue stirring until all the paste is well mixed-in and thoroughly heated. Add green garlic and remove from the heat. Pour over the fish.

Sprinkle the pepper and scatter bai phak chee

Apple and Pineapple Crush

Bht. 60.-

 $4^{1/2}$  oz apple juice 3-4 pieces fresh pineapple  $1^{1/2}$  oz syrup 1 scoop crushed ice

Blend all ingredients together until smooth, pour into glass and garnish

### **Pan Fried Dory Fish**

Serves 4

### Ingredients:

sea salt

zest of 2 lemons, plus a little juice

- a sprig of fresh rosemary, leaves picked
- 4 x 200g/7oz Dory fish fillets

olive oil

2 bunches of rocket, washed and drained

#### For the black olive sauce:

2 large handfuls of good black olives, stoned and very roughly chopped

a fresh red chilli, deseeded and finely chopped a small handful of fresh herbs (basil, marjoram and parsley), finely chopped

1 celery heart, yellow leaves chopped

1 clove of garlic, peeled and finely chopped juice of 1 lemon

freshly ground black pepper

a couple of glugs of virgin olive oil balsamic vinegar

#### For the lemon mash:

1 kg/2 lb 3 oz floury potatoes sea salt and freshly ground black pepper extra virgin olive oil milk juice of 1 lemon

#### Procedure:

In a pestle and mortar or Flavour Shaker, smash up 2 tablespoons of salt with the lemon zest and rosemary and rub this all over the fish fillets. Put the fillets in a dish in the fridge and let them sit there for an hour.


Now make your black olive sauce by mixing all the ingredients except the vinegar together. You want the sauce to have the consistency of a coarse salsa. Then carefully balance the flavours with the vinegar to taste.

Pat the fish dry with some kitchen paper and then pat it with a little olive oil.

Peel and halve your potatoes. Put them into a pot

of salted, boiling water and cook until tender. Then drain and mash up with tablespoons of olive oil and a good swig of milk. Season to taste with salt, pepper and lemon juice. If you want to get your mash really smooth and creamy you can use a spatula to push the potato through a sieve once or twice. It doesn't make it taste any better but it will make it silky smooth, shiny and lovely. Just depends if you can be bothered, really. If it needs thinning with a little extra milk, feel free.


To pan fry, place the fish fillets in butter on a hot griddle pan and cook for about 3 minutes on each side, depending on the thickness. Whichever way you cook it serve the fish and the juices with a good dollop of the mashed potato, the black olive sauce and a little rocket dressed with the extra virgin olive oil, lemon juice and salt and pepper. Really, really good.





### TIP OF THE MONTH

Hats off to Roger Federer for his amazing Wimbledon victory for the fifth straight year. Here's a good tip from the champion that can benefit us all!

#### KEEP YOUR HEAD STILL WHEN HITTING MID-COURT:

I always hated it when coaches would tell me to watch the ball after I'd miss a shot. Of course I was trying to watch the ball! Perhaps a more important message is to keep your head still throughout the shot.

By keeping your head still, your eyes will instinctively follow the path of the ball. Experts agree that while you can watch the ball, you can't actually see the ball during contact anyway.

By keeping your head still, you will maintain better balance (our heads actually weigh a lot and when you move your head it has an immediate effect on your balance) through the course of your swing.

### COACH'S CORNER, by Marcel Petit (continued from July 2007 Outpost)

Last month veteran junior coach Marcel Petit described the joys and pitfalls of involving your child in competition. In this month's Outpost, Marcel continues with a description of the various types of childplayer profiles and how each one should be handled.

### DIFFERENT CHILDREN REQUIRE DIFFERENT APPROACHES

There are approximately seven different child profiles seen on the court today:

- 1. The observer: this child stays on the side of the court, his eyes riveted on the other children involved at play. This child should NOT be forced to participate but rather he is to be encouraged to learn from watching. The risk is trying to get him onto the court too soon, before he has had a chance to figure out for himself how things work.
- 2. The intellectual: this child speaks before taking action, and with a vocabulary that is both rich and precise. Trainers and coaches MUST respect this child's natural intellectual curiosity and accept the fact that he is likely to discuss or question some of the things he is asked to do. On occasion, his mother could be asked to sit courtside during the first few training sessions. The risk is wounding the child with insensitive behaviour such as, "Do what I say." This child is sensitive and must understand the reasons behind his actions.
- 3. The placid child: a slow-starter who is not worried about his play; he's usually all smiles, and totally relaxed with strokes that develop quickly but for whom putting it all together comes progressively, over time. The coach should humour this type of child, tell him it's ok to take his time. The risk is rushing this child, which would confuse him and probably cause him to give up
- 4. Hypotonic: the very awkward but supple child who is nonetheless flexible and whose movements are uncoordinated and ungracious...with little effectiveness. Talk to his parents and find out if he started walking late. He might benefit from professional help in improving his motor coordination. Coaches must be careful not to criticize this child and make him feel inferior: he is intelligent and must learn to harness and control his elasticity.
- 5. The depressed child: the turtle in his shell, introverted and who cries easily when he fails or loses. This is a sad child who often stays after the session is over, but only to play alone. Coaches must show empathy, but must not minimize his situation by saying things like, "You'll see, tennis will help you forget your troubles." The temptation to treat this child like the others is great (do NOT criticize his tears); coaches must accept the fact that his depression will only deepen if and when his partners make fun of him.
- 6. The perfectionist: they call him "slow-poke," only because he wants his movements to be exactly like his coach's. The coach and trainer must accept that he will play at his own speed because in the final analysis, he will end up at the same point as other "faster" kids who may also be more impulsive. Coaches often make the mistake of criticizing this child for being slow (which leads to the child dropping out) without realizing the significance of his enormous capacity to concentrate.
- 7. The hyperactive child: so impulsive, this child is the first to want to hit the ball "any old way". He's often the first on the court, the first to replace another player, pick up balls, etc. His physical activity takes priority over his ability to comprehend the basics of movement and stroke production. This child would benefit from private lessons so that he can learn to focus his attention on one activity. Parents or friends should not be allowed courtside as they would distract him. This child is usually quite happy to come to tennis lessons but after the excitement wears off, he stops making progress and his behaviour becomes disruptive.



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








# Book Reviews



### THE CHOCOLATE LOVERS' CLUB

By Carole Matthews ISBN: 9780755337811 Paperback 448pp Was Bt.425, now Bt.299

Fans of Sophie Kinsella and Jill Mansell will be pleased by the arrival of Matthew's latest addition to the chick-lit genre, which saw great success in the UK market with more than 250,000 copies sold in hardback.

We all know that men are at best unreliable, and at worst little more than pig-headed oafs, causing the women in Matthews' book to fall back on something much more dependable, and ultimately irresistible – chocolate.

Centred around the core character, one Lucy Lombard, the author pens a story of sweet seduction in which Lucy and three other very different women, Autumn, Nadia and Chantal, meet regularly to satisfy their collective addictions, gorging themselves on sweet treats and gossip.

This somewhat informal Chocolate Lovers' Club gather in their newfound sanctuary, Chocolate Heaven, as often as they can to discuss a cheating boyfriend who promises he'll change, a flirtatious boss, a gambling husband and a loveless marriage.

Whilst she touches on real issues women can relate to, Matthews competently creates a story that combines just enough realism with, at times, decadent injections of escapism. This book is really all about one thing - FUN. And for those of you out there who yearn for a brief respite from the drudgery of everyday life, you could do much worse than picking up this romantic and witty breakout novel from a rising star of women's fiction.

If there's a moral in this story that you'll be sure not to forget, it is this – when all else fails, chocolate is a girl's best friend.



### ASIAN GODFATHERS: MYTH AND POWER IN HONG KONG AND SOUTH EAST ASIA

By Joe Studwell ISBN: 9781861977014 Paperback 328pp

A hard-hitting and insightful look at who really wields power in the Southeast Asian region, by veteran journalist and editor of *China Economic Quarterly*, Joe Studwell.

The author's razor sharp analysis, wedded with a penchant for myth-busting, takes readers on a historical, economic and political tour through the territory's most famous business families and cartels. Studwell argues convincingly that more often than not, these self-professed bastions of Southeast Asian economic development built their empires through the use of political influence and the exploitation of protectionist local policies, rather than the fairytale renditions of how they pulled themselves up from poverty to the pinnacle of success.

Whilst at times dense, the book punches well above its weight, and it is the only investigation of its kind in print. Bearing in mind the fact that less than 50 families control the region's wealth and that 13 of the world's richest families come from Southeast Asia, perhaps it's time they got some coverage.

Exposés on Thailand's Shinawatra, Bunnag, Chearavanont, Khaw, and Sophonpanich clans, make for some particularly juicy local reading.



### TOXIC CHILDHOOD: HOW THE MODERN WORLD IS DAMAGING OUR CHILDREN AND WHAT WE CAN DO ABOUT IT

By Sue Palmer ISBN: 9780752880914 Paperback 368pp

Investigates what Palmer calls the "Toxic Childhood Syndrome," a complex of behavioural problems that are the results of the pathological influences of modern living that affect children today: sleep deprivation, junk food, computer games, lack of family time, etc. Presented in bite-sized pieces, Palmer's tone is informative, without verging on the patronising or puritanical, simply aiming to educate readers in identifying the problems and presenting simple solutions to the flood of toxifying influences affecting the youth of today.



# What Makes for Effective Training?

Have you ever thought about what makes for effective training for adults? All too often, we "check the box" without thinking about what makes for effective training, training that will have a positive impact on our bottom line.

I'd like you to think about the most effective training that you've ever participated in. What was it that made it memorable? What did you learn from it? Why?

If you're like most people, you didn't come up with a lecture or e-learning. Probably, your experience with effective training was "hands-on", with a lot of feedback and learning from experience.

Think back to your experience in University. How much do you remember from classes? I remember two lines. So, what did I learn in those four years? I learned how to do research, to manage my time and schedule, to build relationships, to work in a team, to get along with a wide variety of people. I learned to take care of myself and to be an adult.

Why did I learn all those things? The reason those lessons stick with us is because we did them. Over and over. We had the experience, and we practiced the lessons we gained from that experience. That is how adults learn, by experience. And effective training recognizes that. It provides participants with an experience to learn from and provides feedback on that experience so that they learn the lessons intended. Ideally, it gives them chances to repeat the experience in different ways to reinforce the lessons of that experience.

Sounds simple, doesn't it? In some ways, it is. It's a straightforward approach that any professional trainer should be able to consistently follow. However, to be truly effective, the experience must be built to match the participants; their culture, their physical limitations, their mindset, and most importantly, the intended outcomes. When that isn't done, you get participants who feel that they have wasted their time, or worse, who learn a completely different lesson from the training.

In the next few columns, I'll write about the cost impact of "check the box" training, the process of building training, and pass on some ideas that I've picked up over the past 30 years for you to look at in light of your experience. I hope you find it interesting.

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
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
