The Bouncy Castle was overwhelmed but coped admirably, arts and crafts were good, and they even had time for a bit of an Ice Age movie. It was a really rewarding day with Club staff collecting amongst themselves for goody-bag presents for each kid, and a few Members contributing as well. Anyway, most of the aforementioned are covered by reviews later on in this issue.

Last weekend we had a special presentation of a movie produced and directed by a Club Member which saw a greater than expected turnout and was a suspenseful film which everyone seemed to enjoy. Another of his movies will be shown this coming weekend. Earlier this week we saw the return of the Club's Quiz Night with 6 teams showing up despite the horrific downpour which left central Bangkok as red as a force field on Google Maps. HALF-TIME REPORT

The Honorary Treasurer

This year the General Committee has decided to give an informal interim financial report in Outpost. At the time of writing, the half-year figures have just been finalised and reviewed by the General Committee. At the time of reading, of course, we are well into the second half of the year.

Details of the monthly accounts are posted on the noticeboards in the Club and of course every Member receives a copy of the audited accounts prior to the AGM. Additionally, any Member is free to attend the Treasury Working Group, which is held monthly and chaired by the Treasurer. The dates are posted on the noticeboards, however for those who do not visit the Club frequently, the meeting will be held at 1700 hours on the third Tuesday of each month in the Silom Room.

The past few years have not been years of plenty for the Club. One can point to a variety of factors, however these should really be confined to the history pages. In the more recent past, there has been political instability in the city which is our home and natural disasters such as flooding. This has also been against a background of financial turmoil in the world at large.

These factors have all affected the Membership and thus the revenues of the Club to a greater or lesser extent. Closer to home, we have had instability in the Management Team at the Club. The reasons for this have been, and continue to be, debated by many Members. However, one thing that must be clear is that if there is instability in the management structure, there will be financial instability too since the system of driving revenue and controlling costs starts to creak and, as many will undoubtedly comment, the 'Revolving Door' management policy comes at a high price.

We now have a stable Management Team in place and the results will speak for themselves. A corner appeared to have been turned towards the end of 2011, and by early 2012 it was clear that this was not just an unsustainable spike. The comings and goings of the management team caused some distortions to the monthly figures, which have now unwound. Q1/12 saw average monthly operating surpluses of just over THB 700,000 but this was during the period when certain key management positions were unfilled. In Q2/12, we have seen average monthly surpluses in the order of THB 275,000. These figures include monies spent on our enhanced repair and maintenance drive, such as the Deep Clean operation, the replacement of some elderly kitchen equipment, painting works and repairs to the pool pumps.

Our total cash position at the end of June was THB 19.5 million. This compares with THB 12.5 million at the same time in 2011 or an increase of 56%. After provision for the staff retirement fund, this leaves THB 13.4 million.

Costs are under control and the payroll has now unwound from the turbulence of last year and is stable. At its monthly meetings, the Treasury Working Group drills into any costs that appear to be rising, however small the rise. There is no current cause for concern and for that our Management Team are to be congratulated.

We have also had well-attended and profitable events and functions such as the Queen's Jubilee Fête, Canada Day and the Lady Gaga concert. Other ad hoc events, such as the Gentlemen's Final at Wimbledon (in July) were also excellently organised at short notice and well-attended. More events are planned for the future.

For the first half of 2012 we have a net profit of THB 2.9 million compared to a loss of THB 2 million in the first half of 2011.

It is against this background therefore that the General Committee believes it is time to move from focusing on cost-saving towards a policy of prudent expenditure on improvements and introducing new services and facilities for Members.

The much-delayed painting of the Clubhouse was completed in the early part of the year and the entire estate is now undergoing a deep clean, landscaping and maintenance programme. This includes brightening up the gardens, making modifications to the back lawn and the all-weather playing area and painting those areas often neglected, such as the front gate area, as reported recently by the GM. Investments have been made in Bangkok's biggest Bouncy Castle and a trampoline, both of which were seen in action at the Jubilee Fête. All these costs and investments are already included in the figures reported.

There is no major capital expenditure planned, however there are four projects in the Poolside area that will be undertaken as soon as the required tendering and analysis procedures have been correctly completed. Some of these are now urgent since they were put off in leaner years. To minimise inconvenience to Members, these will be carried out concurrently, subject to the conclusion of tender processes and contract negotiations. By the time you read this, we anticipate that the work will be well underway.

These are:

(1) Refurbishment/partial rebuild of the Suriwongse Sala: this is due to existing damage to the roof structure which has been postponed repeatedly and can no longer be postponed. As part of the same project, the preparation room and kitchen at the back of the Sala will be refurbished and modified.

(2) A solution to the pool lining issue: previous GCs have, through no fault have their own, postponed full repairs or applied the sticking plaster approach through lack of funds. This can no longer continue as tiles continue to break free and accidents will and, sadly, do happen. At the time of writing, two independent consultants have given their views and a number of suitably qualified Members have added theirs. Suffice it to say that there is no single view. The Poolside Works Working Group is ploughing through this. Four companies have tendered and their submissions are under scrutiny for compliance with the Club's procedures.

(3) Repair and overhaul of the pool pumps: these pumps are ancient. Nevertheless, it is the opinion of those consulted, inside and outside the Club and including the Club's own maintenance team, that a full overhaul and replacement of key parts will keep us going for years to come.

(4) The extension of the Fitness Centre outwards towards the pool.

These are not development projects but essential works. In carrying these out, the GC also aims to add value by making modest improvements in the areas where the works are required.

On the back lawn, a working group is looking into extending the permanent walkway from The Verandah to the multi-purpose playing area, adding fixed barbecue pits, a drinks station for regular outdoor events and resurfacing and providing more suitable fencing and perimeter boards for the playing area.

Overall, the first half of 2012 has been a good one financially. The emphasis is now on revenue: how to increase membership numbers, functions, events and Members' services so that we can continue to grow financially, plan for the future, and provide a Club environment and atmosphere in keeping with the wishes of our Members.

Thanks to the hard work of the previous incumbent, this Treasurer is in the happy position of considering projects on which to spend money rather than ways of cutting costs, and we are therefore keen to receive ideas and suggestions for the improvement of the Club, its services and ambience. This is your Club.

CELEBRATING HALF A CENTURY

Anglo-Thai Society's 50th Anniversary Gala Dinner

On 11th June 2012 at a gala dinner in the House of Lords, with a spectacular view overlooking the River Thames, members of the Anglo-Thai Society (ATS) celebrated their 50th Anniversary.

The ATS was formed in 1962 following the King of Thailand's auspicious visit to Britain in 1960, when there were already close ties between the two Kingdoms. Samaggi Samagom, the Thai Students' Association, was established by King Rama VI circa 1901 to bring Thais living in Britain together through a variety of events and activities.

During its 50 years, the ATS has organised innumerable events to further relations and understanding between the two countries. With the sponsorship of several British peers, annual summer receptions have been held at the House of Lords. Society members have enjoyed a variety of events including winter receptions for Thai students, visits to the Buddhapadipa Temple in Wimbledon, art exhibitions and theatres, lunches at Thai restaurants, celebrations for Songkran and Loy Kratong and talks about Thai culture and history.

The ATS has raised funds for Thai people in need and also supports the education of Thai students in financial difficulties. The ATS scheme of Educational Awards for Excellence, acknowledging the achievements of Thai postgraduates at British universities, was set up in 2005. It has received

support from H.E. Kitti Wasinondh, the Thai Ambassador, and others including Liverpool University, Oxford University Press, Cambridge University Press and Bangkok Bank.

Based in London, the ATS is a friendly and welcoming society that works closely in the UK with the Royal Thai Embassy, Samaggi Samagom, the Tourism Authority of Thailand, Asia House, Thai Societies at various universities, Thai and British businesses and the Royal Over-Seas League.

The 50th anniversary gala dinner was attended by H.E. Kitti Wasinondh; Lord Geddes, current patron of the ATS; five former British Ambassadors to Thailand; representatives from the Thai Embassy, ATS members and their guests. Entertainment included puppetry from the Thai Dance Academy and traditional music from the Thai Music Circle.

Current ATS Chairman and former British Ambassador to Thailand David Fall thanked the many sponsors and the event's organisers. H.E. Kitti Wasinondh, who completes his time as Thai Ambassador to the UK shortly, gave a splendid speech as well.

This was a totally unexpected and immensely charitable thing to do. The children were so grateful when they were presented with their goody-bags at the end of the day after their buffet dinner. There were also some donations from British Club Members on the day and these were put towards rice for the Temple and presented to the head Monk.

HOLIDAYS & FESTIVALS

This is the third most important Buddhist holiday in the Calendar and is called to celebrate the day that Buddha gave his first sermon to his first five disciples. This sermon is commonly known as Dhammacakkappavattana Sutta or The Setting in Motion of the Wheel of Dharma. Although the sermon was proclaimed around 527 BC (or later with some scholars) the earliest known copy of the accepted text comes from 170AD. As explained last month, for this year it is being celebrated one month later than usual.

ASARNHA BUCHA

August 2nd

KHAO PANSA

August 3rd

This is a Buddhist holiday, literally 'Rain Retreat Day', to celebrate the start of Vassa, or Buddhist Lent, and 'traditionally' the start of the Monsoon Season. It was also the traditional start of the main crop growing season thus monks would remain in their monastery for three lunar months to meditate and also to avoid damaging young crops during their spiritual wanderings. For the lay Buddhist, the three months are a time to give up meat, alcohol, or smoking – some followers even add gossip and sex to the list of abstinences.

Her Majesty Queen Sirikit was born on 12th August 1932 and thus this day is honoured amongst Thai people and celebrated as a Public Holiday, Thailand's Mother's Day.

Born M.R. Sirikit Kitiyakara (M.R. [Mom Rajawongse] being a noble title equivalent to 'The Honourable') she was educated at Rajini School, then Saint Francis Xavier Convent School, before moving to the UK where her father served as Siamese Ambassador to the Court of St. James (the formal title for an Ambassador to the UK). She then studied in Paris where she met H.M. King Bhumibol. After a quiet period of getting to know each other, they became engaged on 19 July 1949 and they were married on 28 April 1950, a week before The King's coronation, where she was elevated to the rank of Queen Consort (as H.M. Queen Sirikit). In 1956 Queen Sirikit served as Regent of Thailand whilst His Majesty was became a monk in honour of the passing of his Grandmother (Queen Savang Vadhana) and The Queen was elevated to the rank of Queen Regent.

Her Majesty Queen Sirikit is the world's longest serving consort to a ruling Monarch although at the age of 91 The Duke of Edinburgh (consort to Queen Elizabeth II) remains the eldest.

In 2012 it is a Sunday so Monday 13th is a substitution day for the holiday.

AUGUST BANK HOLIDAY

Prior to 1834 the Bank of England (as the main clearing bank) alone closed for 33 religious holidays each year but that came to an end with the Bank Holidays Act 1871 which outlined four Bank Holidays for all people. One of these was the August Bank Holiday, set on the first Monday in August. This remained so until 1965 when a trial was held in England, Wales and Northern Ireland to push this holiday to the end of August or beginning of September. Finally in 1971 it was agreed to be the last Monday in August and the Banking and Financial Dealings Act 1971 was passed to confirm this. As Scotland has its own legal system the change did not affect Scotland which still celebrates the Bank Holiday on the first Monday in August.

We look back at events of 1978 ...


1 Citizenship, and in particular what defines a British Citizen, took up much committee time in 1978. Although the (UK) Immigration Act 1971 had been in effect for many years, it had no bearing on the Club until we changed the membership criteria in 1977 to 'British Citizen' and removed the term 'of British descent'. The Club had used the holding of a British Passport as proof of being a British Citizen only to find out that such passports were being issued for a number of reasons, under the 1971 Act, to persons of Irish and Commonwealth nationality. After months of talking with the Embassy, the British Consul was able to provide a legal definition and from on then all applicants had to show the words 'right of abode' in their British Passport ahead of being considered for 'ordinary' or 'country' membership.

2 The year 1978 was the Club's 75th Anniversary and as such a potted history of the Club's founding (extracted from 'Twentieth century impressions of Siam' by Arnold Wright & Oliver T. Breakspear) was published in the British Club Newsletter. In addition an anniversary cocktail party was held on the 7th July to celebrate the 75th opening of the Club's first Clubhouse, a wooden house situated just off Suriwongse Road – pictures of which are in Reception and The Verandah.

3 The Club came under the firm hand of the law in 1978, twice for not complying with it! We were fined in January for not joining the Workman's Compensation Fund – this had been created by a National Executive Council Order in 1971 and came into force in 1974 but we seemed unaware of it. In August two drivers and a staff member were arrested for gambling on the premises, and in November we were fined again for failing to register our Chairman with the police. At least we implemented on time the increase in minimum wage from 28 to 35 Baht which affected 15 staff, with a further 24 staff needing increases to maintain their salary differentials, which was announced for October.

4 The Long-Range Plan approved in 1977 started to come to life after the Chartered Bank agreed to loan the Club 1,000,000 Baht. The first of the 'new life' being born into the Club was a Poolside Kitchen (adjacent to the Squash Courts) which opened in May, and a huge Stores, Bakery and Main Kitchen extension which opened on 18th December. Minor works like air-conditioning the Restaurant, moving the Water Pumps to the side of the Clubhouse and adding a ramp to the front entrance approach road were also completed.

5 The addition of 10 Associate members, the expansion of core nationality to Australian, Canadian and New Zealand citizens plus a strong recruitment drive amongst the Embassies did its job with membership at the year-end rising to 447, an increase of 15% over the previous year. The Club thus ended the year one member short of its previous membership record of 448 in 1973.

At one time, the Chinese economy would have been largely ignored by its Western counterparts, yet in a short period it has grown from a fledgling emerging market to an economic powerhouse which now occupies the number two slot in the world's biggest economies, lying only behind the USA.

The impact of something that would have been a relatively small move in the markets in one country can now be felt elsewhere much more keenly, thanks to the way that the financial institutions now work together across the globe. So a decision about sovereign debt in Europe can mean a significant move in markets in Asia, which will automatically have an impact on how much your own investments are worth.

The changing pace of the EU crisis has been incredible at times, with the latest warning from the International Monetary Fund in July that it expects the European Central Bank to do more to stabilise the region's economies. It is already moving towards banking union in a bid to save the single currency, but there are concerns that this is not moving at a fast enough pace. With Nouriel Roubini - the New York professor who predicted the financial crisis - suggesting there will be a 'perfect storm' to derail the global economy next year, including a 'hard landing' for China and a further slowdown in the emerging economies, there is likely to be more volatility to come.

The Nikkei 225 has seen a 9.5% fall in its value since the start of the year, at the time of writing. The Hang Seng has dropped by 9.1%, but, this has certainly not been a one-way street.

The markets have peaked and troughed throughout the year, de-

spite currently being below their start point.

But what does this mean for you as an investor? The reality is that markets around the world are becoming ever more sensitive to news - both good and bad - from countries that at one time would barely have merited a flicker on the trading screens of the investment houses. Now, and partly thanks to the euro crisis and the continued inability to resolve the issues surrounding the indebted countries, such flickers are costing investors thousands of dollars at a stroke.






