MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN



Chairman, **General Committee**

"THE MAJOR PIECE OF THE JIGSAW"

Following on from my article in the last issue of Outpost, the General Committee have had further discussions about the Silom Sala Areas Redevelopment programme. Consequently, our Architect is now working on the final version of the plans which incorporate all the comments from the Committee's final review.


I can therefore advise you all that the calling notice for the EGM will be sent out around the 1st August 2014 and the EGM will take place on Monday 25th August 2014 in the Suriwongse Room starting at 19:00 hrs.

As most of our Members will know, many of the Club's facilities have been significantly improved and upgraded over the last 30 months. All of these works have been funded by cash flow generated by the Club's operations in accordance with prudent financial policies. The works undertaken during this period have cost over 14m baht and I am pleased to inform you that despite these investments, the cash position of the Club has grown from 18m baht to over 25m baht during the same period. An excellent achievement that has put the Club back on a sound footing. This General Committee is committed to continuing the prudent financial policies and to ensure that financial buffers in excess of 10m baht are always maintained in the Club's coffers and that the improvements we make are in the best interests of the British Club moving forwards.

So now it's time to start the redevelopment works around the Silom Sala Areas. The main business rationale behind the plans is to offer better, broader and more modern facilities for families, young children, teenagers and sporting Members. The plans are ambitious and they are needed. As you will shortly see when the plans are posted on boards around the Club, the proposed project is both comprehensive and complex and is planned to built in 3 distinct phases to ensure that the Club does not overstretch itself.

This is without a doubt the single most expensive, ambitious and Memberbeneficial piece of development since the Club opened the Swimming Pool, the Suriwongse Sala and the Sports Annex in 1966. The General Committee is seeking Members support for the complete redevelopment of the Silom Sala, children's pool & playground, squash courts and changing rooms. This is the major, but not final, piece of the upgrade and refurbishment jigsaw that we have been working on since 2012.

Seeded in the Members' questionnaire which was circulated and completed by a large proportion of Members in



May 2013, and subsequently authorised by the Annual General Meeting in March this year, these matters will come to a head at the Extraordinary General Meeting (EGM) to be held on Monday 25th August 2014.

The Plans include:

- SILOM SALA an improved efficient Sala with additional landscaping, a relaxation zone, and a link to the new air-conditioned Family Room at pool level
- FAMILY ROOM an air-conditioned room for families to eat or relax, adjoining a ..
- KIDS CORNER a safe environment for kids to paint, craft and play near their parents
- CHILDREN'S POOL & PLAYGROUND same shape, but completely refurbished with all new equipment, surfaces and sunshades
- SQUASH COURTS two World Squash Federation sized glass-backed squash courts with two levels of viewing galleries
- MULTIPLE-PURPOSE ROOM fit for yoga, pilates, aerobics, dancing, musical activity, kids sports etc
- TEEN ZONE a 'chill out' area especially for our teenagers' comfort and enjoyment
- CHANGING & STEAM ROOMS extended male and female changing rooms on the upper floor with more lockers and a steam room in each
- MASSAGE & TREATMENT improved Thai massage facilities with separate massage rooms in a more relaxed and ambient environment
- GARDEN ECO-FINISH the whole development will include a vertical garden with a water feature to connect with the main poolside, providing a natural and therapeutic environs in keeping with the rest of the Club grounds
- STAFF HOUSE greatly enhanced male and female facilities for our staff members

This sounds comprehensive and addresses all the areas needing attention. The EGM is being called to agree to a budget of around 24m baht for the project which will be phased over three financial years but probably developed over two years. The General Committee believes that this project provides immense value for all stakeholders who currently use this area of our Club - families, squash players, children, staff - and we are aiming to raise the bar even higher to deliver first class facilities for all our Members.

Finally it must be remembered that all this and immediate past development work of the past 30 months will come from cash generated from operations and not from cash buffers. This is paramount and the works have been designed in phases which, if needs be, can be adapted and fine tuned to respond to any changes in the external environment which might be beyond the Club's control.

The plans and mood boards will be on display at Poolside and in the Clubhouse from early August. I am conscious that not all Members can attend and vote at the EGM so please, if you have any comments or questions, just drop me an email and I will do my best to answer you quickly and comprehensively.

"YOUR VOTE IS NEEDED

Please note that only Ordinary, Country and Honorary Members (who were previously Ordinary Members) may attend and vote at this EGM.

The General Committee believe that the integrity of motion must be maintained, in that any substantive changes which affect cost will make the motion invalid, thus in keeping with Roberts Rules of Order, no such amendments will be taken at the meeting.

193 NOT OUT! HONORARY MEMBERS DINNER

The Chairman of the General Committee, Phil Alexander, hosted a dinner on the evening of Wednesday 25th June for the four long-term Members who have recently accepted Honorary Membership of the Club.

Our Executive Chef, Kornnisara Nongku (Khun Laak), prepared a wonderful three course meal with some excellent wines to say a big thank you for their contributions to the Club and to the local community over the past 60 years. Speeches were kept to a minimum just to note that the four Members being honoured had 193 years of membership between them, including the longest serving Member, the oldest Member, and the first Ladies Privilege to become a full Club Member.

Those honoured were Mr & Mrs Roy Fordham, Dr & Mrs Paddy Dickson, Miss Edith Stewart MBE and Mr & Mrs Sam Cohen. Also present were the Club's Honorary Treasurer and his wife Mr & Mrs Bill Wilcox, the Honorary Secretary Mr Paul Cheesman, and our General Manager Mrs Premrudee Tanyaluck.


We look back to the history of our Club in 2001 ...

The year started with the rejection by the Australian Ambassador of the Honorary Membership of the Club that is always offered. Officially it was a personal decision by the ambassador "as it was not directly linked to his job or of Australian origin". This latter comment would probably, of course, have offended one of our founding committee members in 1903, Mr Ronald Worthy Giblin FRGS, who was a native of Hobart, Tasmania. Unofficially rumours went around at the time that it was because his application to become a Club member was rejected back in the seventies when he was first at the Embassy (then in the Anglo-Thai Building in Silom) as is he was not "of British descent" being born in Czechoslovakia.

The incoming committee decided to streamline their workload and introduced two 'mega' sub-committees (Operations and Strategy) to replace seven individual subcommittees. There was also seen to be a perceived need to redraft the bylaws when a member demanded to see "where it was written" that mobile phones cannot be used in the Churchill Bar and, to his annoyance, the General Manager found out it was not in the bylaws despite being a 'rule' since 1989. The bylaw was thus drafted.

2001 was not a happy year if the Suggestions Books are anything to go by 177 complaints received by the committee in the year and the largest number were divided between bad behaviour in the Churchill Bar and the new 'collared shirt' dress code introduced in July. Bad behaviour was generally limited to a small number of members but against a large number of complainants which lead a number of member suspensions. The Dress Code {see insert} was more tricky – brought in as a side-way of improving standards in the bar it lead to the resignation of one committee member and literally dozens of complaints about the code or its enforcement each meeting thereafter. The code battled on until 2005 when it became collarless!

Staff matters came to a dizzy height in 2001 - twice we were taken to the Labour Court for insufficient payment of compensation when a staff member was sacked. Then the Court 'reminded' us that we had no



Staff Handbook to comply with the Labour Protection Act B.E. 2541. (1998) so we used a local lawyer to draft the first version of our Staff handbook gaining the Court's approval in October 2001.

The major event or events or even nonevents for the year was the plan to build a two storey building on the waste area of the back lawn (where the Multi-Purpose Court now stands). The plan dubbed the 'New Wing' would provide on the lower floor a Sports Bar with pool tables, darts, large TV screens plus toilets and additional changing facilities whilst the upper floor would have the Club's offices and a meeting room thus freeing up the space taken by the Clubhouse offices - most members being unaware that the Silom Room and the Suriwongse Room were of equal size originally. The 'New Wing' to be linked by a covered patio to the Clubhouse.

An EGM was called for 6th November and the 'New Wing' was agreed by 78 votes to 16. However a number of members complained that they had not received a Calling Notice. An investigation by the 'Vice-Chairman & Honorary Secretary' found out that no address stickers were printed hence no Calling Notices sent out, for Senior Ordinary members and Ordinary members under 30 years of age thus making the EGM unconstitutional. A 're-run' was duly called with address stickers 'counted out and envelopes counted back in' and this time the EGM, held on 11th December, the 'New Wing' was approved by 89 to 29 votes.

Permission was granted. We had the money. So where, you may ask, is the New Wing? Ah well, you must wait until next month to find out the answer!

Tickets are Bt 2,250 per person (Club Members & guests), Bt 2,500 for others. A non-alcoholic menu is available at Bt 500 less.











Who will win that one? Or any of the other nine fixtures of week one? Who will be crowned EPL Champions next May? Man City again? Arsenal? Liverpool? Chelsea? Man U with their new Dutch manager? How will the three newly promoted teams of Leicester, Burnley and QPR fare? Who knows? And who really cares at this stage as it's the fantasy side of the game we are most interested in here. Phil Alexander was our first season's Champion from a league of a dozen managers. Last season's BCB league featured more than 30 and was competitive until the very end with Laurence Fay deservedly taking the trophy. Season three's BCB Fantasy Premier League Champ? Well, it could be you, if you join up to play.



If you are a BCB member and have played Fantasy Football before, you know what to do and are more than welcome to join the BCB Fantasy League for this season. The BCB league for season 2014/15 is open to all BCB members and their

families and has been named British Club Bangkok 1910. The web link is http://fantasy.premierleague.com/

Clink the link, create a profile/account (It's completely free!) and with your budget of £100 million pick a squad of 15 current EPL players - two qoalkeepers, five defenders, five midfield players and three strikers with no more than three players from any one EPL club. Give your team a name, design a team strip and enter your team into the BCB Fantasy Football League using this exclusive code: 92887-52985

As well as being a Fantasy Premier League manager in the BCB league, your team will automatically be entered into the overall Fantasy Football League and you may join any other Fantasy Football leagues if you wish.

The FPL system takes care of all the calculations of points and other technical stuff. All you have to do is to manage your squad, select your team before the deadline each week, and hope that your players perform in the real EPL and score you sufficient points to make you competitive in the BCB Fantasy Football League.



How are the points scored? They are based on how your players perform in the real EPL matches each week. Here are some examples:

Plays for 90 minutes - 2 points (up to 60 minutes - 1 point)

Clean Sheet (defenders) - 4 points (midfielders - 1 point).

Goals - strikers/midfielders/defenders (incl goalie) - 4/5/6 points.

Goal assists - 3 points.

For every three saves - 3 points

Penalty save - 5 points

Bonuses for best players - 1 to 3 points

Yellow card - minus 1 point

Red card - minus 3 points

Penalty miss - minus 2 points

For every 2 goals conceded by goalkeeper/ defender - minus 2 points

Own goal - minus 2 points

Player selected as captain (regardless of whether a captain in the real EPL) - all points scored are doubled.

There are other rules regarding transfers, injuries, suspension, etc., but it is all explained in very simple terms on the website. The main thing is that you enter the BCB Fantasy Premier League for this coming season and that you help make it bigger, better and more exciting than last season.

HAROLD MOLLIN'S **EVERYTHING YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT PLAYING TENNIS**



The rains are here, many tennis players are away on home leave: Not much tennis news to report this month. However, wherever you are - in Bangkok, catching up with family and friends back home, or vegging on a beach - you'll want to keep your tennis skills sharp and improving. This month, Club member and international coach Harold Mollin begins a monthly column of tennis tips so you can become improve your skills and become the best you can be at tennis. This month:

THE VOLLEY

To volley properly and effectively, let's start with a few simple Dos and Don'ts.



First, the VOLLEY DON'Ts:

- 1. DO NOT use your wrists on the volley
- 2. DO NOT swing at the volley (racket should not go back at all)
- 3. DO NOT stand up when you are hitting the volley (unless it's a high volley)
- 4. DO NOT lean back upon contact

Now the VOLLEY DOs:

- 1. DO bend, and then bend some more
- 2. DO keep your wrist firm
- 3. DO have your weight going forward
- 4. DO hit the volley in front
- 5. DO stay on your toes

Every great player who volleys well understands these key points!

Now, some hints to help you hit volleys from different heights.

The High Volley

Do not hit down -- still try to hit through the volley. Most high volleys (slight slice) are either hit into the net or hit way too short.

Try to not have your volley follow through - or very short follow through, if any - so it goes towards your target.

The Low Volley

Bend, bend, and bend some more. And then, open your racket face and let the ball and the face of the racket do the work. Again, DO NOT let your racket head hit the court surface: still go through towards your target.

A great player who volleys well has very few moving parts: she keeps the wrists firm, has no backswing, and a very short follow through -

but uses her body effectively.

Use your feet

This may sound a bit strange but it is 100% true with players who volley well: YOU VOLLEY WITH YOUR FEET, NOT YOUR HANDS!

Sure, your hands hold the racket but the quick movement of your feet gets you into position, and gets your weight going through the volley, giving it sting!



HARD BALLS






