
the 50+ years since. Come to the EGM!

MESSAGE FROM the Chairman

This is the time of year when many Members take leave during the western summer and international school holidays. I have just arrived back from a break that took me to Rome, London, the Yorkshire Dales, Scotland and Somerset seeking out family, friends and memories. Before I get to Club affairs I will share just one happy little story from my trip.

Railway Children: The Somerset and Dorset Railway ran through my village in Somerset but was sadly axed by Beaching in 1963. Many happy hours were spent as a boy playing by 'the tunnel' and waving as steam trains emerged billowing smoke, puffing up ... and hurtling down one of the steepest and longest gradients in the country. Another little boy in the village Richard Moon's Dad was a train driver, which was most boys' dream in those days. Wally Moon was a hero to us all and would wave back as his 'banker' pushed heavy trains of growling coal trucks up the slope just as in 'Thomas the Tank Engine'. One day when he was making a solo run, off duty, he stopped and picked me and my friend Graham up by the tunnel and allowed us to shovel coal in the furnace and blow the whistle as we climbed up to the summit and back. No Health and Safety in those days! I still remember, the shaking, the smoke, the heat and the throbbing noise of this magnificent machine ... surely one of the most exciting days of my childhood!

Back in Somerset last week I attended the funeral of the local butcher of my childhood and was unexpectedly reunited with Richard, who I hadn't seen for almost 60 years. I was recalling this story when he told me 'Dad is here'! And sure enough, there was Wally, now 92, diminished in size, but as sharp as a knife. He was soon regaling not only about his life as a train driver but his exploits as a signaller in WW2 when he was the man who informed all the ships in the navy by semaphore that the war has ended. Magic! I hope everyone else enjoys their breaks as much and return refreshed.



Chairman

General Committee: It has been fun catching up on the news with Ali and Khun Prem. Much has been happening at the Club whist I was away even though some of the subcommittees have not been very active



with workloads and travel disrupting routines. We have had to replace Andrew Spedding on the GC who has returned to Oz, a big loss on the House & Grounds and Human Resource Subcommittees. We are happy however that Jason Morris has agreed to take his place.

Deputy General Manager: Sadly our recruitment earlier this year of a Deputy General Manager did not work out but we are now re-advertising the position. Once again we are receiving lots of applications and look to be making an appointment in the coming weeks. As before, s/he will be able to help put in place a strengthened management structure, take a lot of the day-to-day responsibilities off Khun Prem, creating capacity to improve operating standards and efficiency and develop new initiatives.

Marketing Manager: We have also just recruited a parttime, professional Marketing Manager who will be developing a marketing strategy and actively leading a membership recruitment campaign. Since most new Members currently find us just by chance or by word of mouth, we believe that by upgrading our promotional materials and actively working with our contacts at the embassies, schools, chambers of commerce and moving companies, we can expect to see results within a few months, both in terms of membership levels and in terms of events and attendance.

Silom Wing Preparations: Work on refurbishing the Pavilion Café as the new staff house and reinstating the Surawongse Road wall will be complete by the time you receive this and we are ready to install the temporary family facilities on the Front Lawn. After tenders for the project are opened on 22nd July these will take a week or so to process and we will then finally be in a position to award contracts and get started.

EGM 10th August: On arriving back however, my first task has been to help send out a Calling Notice for an EGM on 10th August requested by 20 members who want to postpone construction of the Silom Wing because they believe the Club can no longer afford it, pointing to a short-fall in revenue this year compared with budget. We will now await the result of this EGM before awarding any contracts.

Although this has undoubtedly been a difficult year with a downturn in activities following the death of H.M. the King, Bhumibol Adulyadej, the biggest impact was in December and January when most functions and all weddings were cancelled. Since then although usage has been sluggish, activity has been picking up to the extent that in June operating income was ahead of both last year and the budget for the first time this year.

July is already looking good and prospects for the remainder of the year look healthy. We should be able to hold our very popular Guy Fawkes Day and the Trafalgar Dinner, which were cancelled last year and, with bookings still coming in, we are already ahead of budget for income from functions for the period through November. Beyond that, six months in advance,

we already have three weddings booked for December compared with none last year due to cancellations.

More good news is that whilst revenues have been down, so too have expenses, by as much as 11%. This means that our cash balances are only slightly down (less than THB 1 million) from what we projected for the end of June when the Slim Wing was approved in January.

All in all therefore, the club is in good shape. The financial situation has not changed significantly since the EGM in January. With prospects already looking good for the second half of the year and the new momentum we expect as our Marketing Manager starts work and is joined by a Deputy General Manager, we remain confident that the Club can still afford the Silom Wing and that this a good investment for the future.

It is a vital first step towards bringing the Club facilities up to the standards of the 21st Century which we believe will attract new Members as well as provide much improved facilities for existing young families and sport/ health enthusiasts.

Nothing has changed since Members voted overwhelmingly to move ahead with the Silom Wing in January and the GC is asking Ordinary and Country Members to vote NO to the EGM motion to postpone the start of the project.

Some Members have expressed concern about the vulnerability of Staff Retirement funds even though we have often stated and can again confirm that we do not plan to access these for the project. They are effectively 'ring-fenced' already and the GC is looking at the best way of investing them securely to optimise the benefit to the staff. We will inform Members when this has been done.

It is no bad thing to have an opportunity for everyone to study the facts and we will be able to send out more detailed accounts as well as the results of the construction tenders in advance of the EGM so that everyone is fully informed. We will have accurate cost estimates for the project and revised cash/flow projections

As many previous Club Chairs have pointed out, EGMs are good for bar takings! I urge all eligible Ordinary and Country Members to attend the EGM on 10th August. I trust that once again we will have the necessary support to get started at last on this long overdue and much needed project.



DAN PATERSON 1973-2017



Daniel John Paterson, always known as Dan, was born on May 10th 1973 in Watford and grew up in Hemel Hempstead with his mother and sister, Rachel. He disliked his schooling but loved drama classes and out of school he sung in the local Church choir, being confirmed there, thus the Christmas service became an annual event of his life.

In his teen years Dan had ambitions of going to RADA (The Royal Academy of Dramatic Art) but this was not to be and he instead went to work in Kuala Lumpur in Malaysia. Upon his return he moved to London and worked for Hodder & Stoughton, then did financing with CCLA (Churches, Charities and Local Authorities) and finally became a consultant. It was during this time he met Guu Sinmoo, they moved in together and eventually became civil partners. In 2009, Guu was offered a great job opportunity in his native Bangkok, so they moved to set up home first in Don Mueang then Chaengwatthana and Dan even remained in a house next door when they separated a few years ago.

Rachel wrote "Dan was so full of life. He made a huge number of friends (which Dan referred to as his 'chums') through an active social life and through the British Club. He loved to entertain, and bring people together, and especially loved to cook ... although Guu would point out that any cooking left their kitchen looking like a bomb had exploded!"

"Dan enjoyed many things" Rachel added, "He loved a debate, quizzes, politics and most things Science Fiction with an emphasis on Star Wars and Doctor Who ... Dan always said that the best Doctor was Tom Baker and who knows what he would think now the next Doctor is a woman!"

Guu reminisced "I had the pleasure of sharing my life with him for nearly 17 years in London and in Thailand. I hold many good memories about our life together and I will treasure them forever. Although we decided to separate, we remained very good friends to each other ... not many people would want to live literally next door to their 'ex."

In late June 2017, Dan visited Penang but came home complaining of feeling unwell. This, mainly stomach problems, continued until Wednesday 12th July when Guu found that Dan has passed away on the sofa at home. A Christmas-Doctor Who themed funeral was held in Christ Church, followed by a cremation at Wat Kaeo Chaem Fa and a big party to celebrate his life at the British Club.

Dan's friends will remember his wit, humour, cooking, laughter and charm.

Goodbye Dan ... May the Force be with you!

- Whether Temporary membership is sufficient marketed
- Whether some membership categories are obsolete

The MSC does not deal with Membership Recruitment as this is the role of the wonderfully styled Markitcom (Marketing, IT & Communications) Sub-Committee.

Mike, or Spikey as he is known, was born in Abercarn, a then small mining town and urban district in the county of Monmouthshire. As a youngster Mike played for a number of youth rugby teams including Cwmcarn Youth, Gwent Schools and South Monmouthshire Schools and then at the age of 21 joined Crumlin RFC. Two years

later he moved into first class rugby by joining Clwb Rygbi Caerdydd (Cardiff RFC) where he stayed for a number of years until he moved to Newport RFC. In 1984 Spikey was capped for Wales in the Five Nations Championship where he was almost promoted to Captain. Spikey captained Wales for three further matches before retiring from first class rugby.

His full career and the fascinating details of his 'life after rugby' are contained in his autobiography *"Spikey: 2 hard to handle"* [ISBN 9781902719405] which

was published in 2014 and is available from Amazon or by special order from the eCommerce Team of Asia Books. Mike, and his wife Yaowarat, now reside in Bangkok.






Our Guest Speaker ... Colonel Roger Lewis

Commissioned from the Royal Military Academy, Sandhurst into the Royal Engineers in 1984, Roger undertook Regimental Duty in Germany, the UK, New Zealand and Norway and was deployed operationally to Bosnia with UNPROFOR and again as Manager of the UN Mines Action Centre in Mostar.

After Staff College he was deployed to Kosovo as Deputy Chief Of Staff, 19 Mechanized Brigade and again as Officer Commanding 3 Armoured

Engineer Squadron. He also commanded the squadron on Operation FRESCO in Leeds and Operation TELIC in Iraq. As a Lieutenant Colonel, Roger was appointed Military Assistant to the Deputy Supreme Allied Commander Transformation, in Virginia USA and then took command of 38 Engineer Regiment in North Yorkshire. He led the regiment in Northern Ireland and on Operation HERRICK 10 in Afghanistan,



where he also commanded the Joint Force Explosive Ordnance Disposal Force and High Risk Search teams. After a stint as Assistant Director Force Development within Army Headquarters, Roger subsequently returned to the USA as the British Liaison Officer to United States Northern Command & North American Aerospace Defence Command (NORAD).

Roger is currently the British Defence Attaché, Bangkok, a student at the Thai National Defence College

and an Assistant Commissioner in the Scout Association of Thailand.


Going Home 1993





Between 1975 and 1993 around one and a half million Indochinese refugees fled to Thailand or to the Cambodian border. Thailand accepted them as 'displaced persons' only on condition that all had to be sent to 'third' countries or return home. Over half were given new homes in the 'west', about 70 % to USA, 12% to France and 7% each to Australia and Canada. They were given rudimentary skills and cultural orientation before leaving, mostly at Phanat Nikhom camp. After peace negotiations in Cambodia about 400,000 were sent back to start new lives after a closing ceremony at Site 2 in March 1993 presided over by Mrs Ogata, the then UN's High Commissioner for Refugees. All of the camps were closed in the early 1990's.








Doubles Clinic






Celebrate

How are the points scored? They are based on how your players perform in the real EPL matches each week. Here are some examples:

Clean Sheet (defenders) - 4 points (midfielders - 1 point).

Goals - strikers/midfielders/defenders (incl goalie) - 4/5/6 points.

Goal assists - 3 points.

For every three saves - 3 points

Penalty save - 5 points

Bonuses for best players - 1 to 3 points

Yellow card - minus 1 point

Red card - minus 3 points

Penalty miss - minus 2 points

For every 2 goals conceded by goalkeeper/defender - minus 2 points

Own goal - minus 2 points



Player selected as captain (regardless of whether a captain in the real EPL) - all points scored are doubled (one 'triple' captain available per season).

There are other rules regarding transfers, injuries,

suspension, etc., but it is all explained in very simple terms on the website. The main thing is that you enter the BCB Fantasy Premier League for this coming season
