Have you noticed the new blackboard menu for the weekend barbecue at the salas? Many people have and the barbecues are now being sold in record numbers. Come along and give it a try!





Melvyn Birkinshaw


Mel is a semi-bachelor here, with wife Angie and children living in adoptedhome Australia; he's a civil engineer with IP-GEL





Showing the Adults How to Play

ith many away on leave and no committee meeting, there appears to have been little to ruffle the feathers of the Outpost tennis section reporter this month. 


New Court Surface

July saw the complete resurfacing of the Centre and No.1 courts, bringing them up to the highest international standards for playability, durability and safety. The old playing surface, after nearly two years of intensive use, was becoming dangerously slippery underfoot and the speed of the ball off the courts

was making it increasingly difficult to control.

We of course have to thank the Club Committee for its wisdom in allocating already overstretched funds to such a worthwhile




and necessary project and we are sure that the Club will reap the benefits of more members wanting to play on what can now be clearly seen as a very attractive facility indeed. 0

The new "Plexipave" surface was laid by Almac, run by tennis playing member Pat Dean who very generously donated new posts and nets to the Club on the reopening of the courts. A big "thank you" is due to Pat from all of us "racquettophiles".

"Plexipave" is formed from a silicon acrylic self-levelling mastic which should last for more than five years of heavy use, justifying the relatively high cost. Interestingly, the unique radiused corner, pyramidal-shaped sand grains used in the mix can be found in only quarry in the world, in Missouri, USA. After extensive testing by Nike and many similar august organisations, this particular grain shape has been found to offer the best possible combination of durability, sureness



of footing and consistency of bounce. Any Doubting Thomases should be reassured to know that Michael Chang, Bjorn Borg and Pat Cash have all installed this surface on their home courts. Indeed, Pete Sampras must now also be seriously considering installing it if he is to have any realistic hope of keeping up with our talented tennis trio of Bernie, Marc and James...



The speed of the ball off the court is very noticeably slower, allowing much more time for players to make their strokes. This should in the long run lead to an improvement in the stroke play of all players. Indeed, one can immediately see the difference in that rallies are much longer than before as it is almost impossible to win a point by outright power. At least at our level of play, placement is now paramount.

From now on accuracy, consistency and sound stroke play will be the key to success and that is as it should be. So *Go To It* all you keen types and make the most of these pristine courts which both look and play the part.




dently gave rise to the connection.



Chicken with Cashew Nuts

long-time favourite, this recipe for gai phad med mamuang (chicken and cashew nuts) has been requested by a few of you who have sampled it at the Club and elsewhere. As normal, this recipe feeds ten hungry horaces.

Ingredients

- · 2 kg chicken breasts
- 1 1/2 kg onions, diced
- 200 g spring onions
- 500 g cashewnuts
- 100 g dry whole chillis
- · 400 g oyster sauce
- · 200 g garlic
- 50 g fish sauce (nam pla)
- 50 g Waizena/cornflour
- 50 g ground pepper

Method

- **1** Dice the fresh chicken breasts and sauté with the garlic
- 2 Add the diced onion, whole dry chillis and the cashewnuts
- **3** In a separate bowl, mix together the oyster sauce, fish sauce and ground pepper
- **4** Bring the chicken, onion, chilli and cashewnuts to a hot temperature and add the oyster sauce, fish sauce and pepper mix. Thicken with the Maizena/cornflour
- **5** Serve with steamed rice and decorate with shredded spring onions

Long Jump/High Jump


These events have been amalgamated and will be referred to simply as "A Jump". Mixed teams, in loose fitting clothing only.

Mens 50km Walk


Unfortunately, this will have to be cancelled as the police cannot guarantee the safety of anyone walking the streets of any major inner city in Britain.

The Closing Ceremony



The Olympic flame will be extinguished by someone dropping an old washing machine onto it from the top floor of the block of flats next to the stadium.






Quiet Before the Storm

Central Blood Register

t's one of the worst scenarios you could face in expatriate life: Your wife, husband or child desperately needs blood and you belatedly discover that the local population rarely has that blood type. As you frantically phone around friends and organisations, your fears grow that you could lose your loved one simply because you cannot locate the few pints of fluid to save their life.

It may sound dramatic, but given that negative blood types are rare amongst the Thai population, this situation has arisen three times in Bangkok in the last few months. Thanks to the efforts of various groups and individuals, blood has been found at the eleventh hour in each case. Next time, however, we may not be so lucky. And next time it could be you or your family in trouble.

With various organisations banding together the names and blood groups of their members, a Central Blood Register (CBR) is being created. This should ensure that whatever your blood type, if it is out there, it can be located quickly should the need arise.

Many people are understandably wary of adding their name or their spouses to a list which they fear may not respect their privacy. The following points should allay these fears:

• The CBR will only be held by the two CBR coordinators, plus the duty officers at participating Embassies. All people signing up to the CBR will be given clear instructions on how to contact the register should the

need arise.

- The CBR will not be held by hospitals; however, hospitals may call up the holders of the CBR in cases of emergency. Blood has a very short shelf life, so with the limited supply of some rare blood types, it is better "stored" in people's bodies.
- Due to the procedure to be followed, if you are asked to donate, it is most likely to be an emergency.
 - You will never be charged for donating.
 - If you are asked to donate but for any reason do not wish to, your decision will be respected without your having to give an explanation. The organisers of CBR will be grateful to anyone who even considers donating.

The register is open to anyone - you do not need to be a member of an organisation.

Remember, the chances are that you may never be called upon to donate, but if you are, you are probably helping to save a life.

What a wonderful gift to give!
