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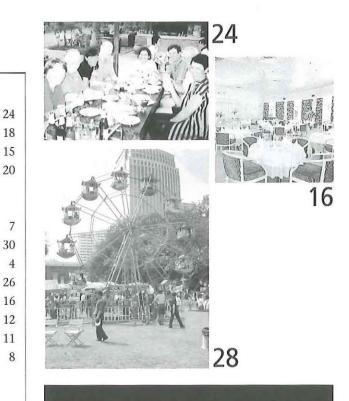

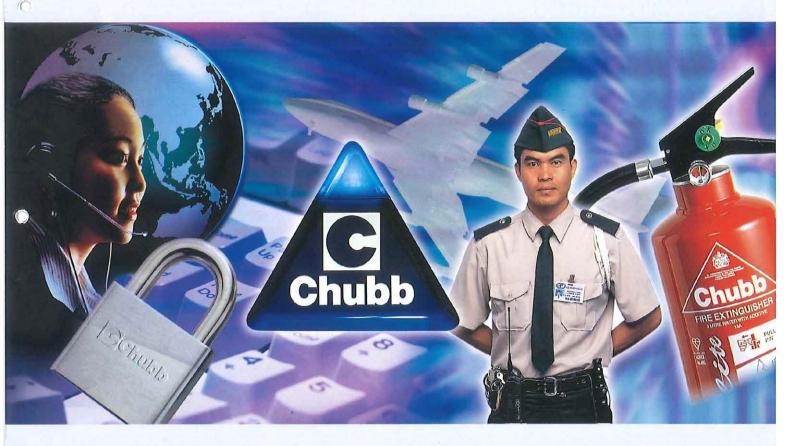

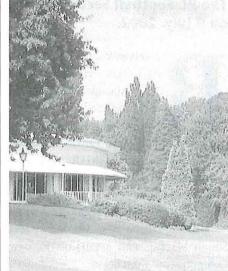
The Country Club Johannesburg

squash, croquet, gymnasium, bowls, tennis, hockey and cricket.

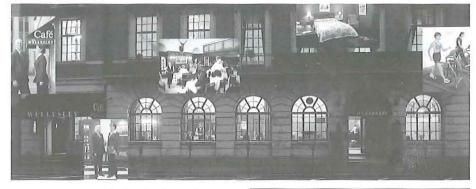

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In safe hands at the pool

Congratulations to The British Club Fitness Centre Staff members, Ruengrit Turiwongse and Amnat Saklebpradu for qualifying as the first PADI Certified Lifeguards!

ver the last several months, I have been working with them to enhance their swimming, rescue and knowledge development skills and thus qualify them as certified lifeguards. This was made possible through the PADI approved and certified Lifeguard Distinctive Specialty Course that I authored.

The Lifeguard course is designed to be a safe, supervised programme to train non-divers to act in the capacity of lifeguards in a pool or confined water environment. Training emphasises swimming ability, extraction of the victim from the water and accident management in an area with access to EMS. This is an entry-level certification for pool or confined water only and does not involve rescues of scuba divers, nor does it qualify the candidate to act as a lifeguard in open water.

A summary of the Lifeguard course requirements are:

SKILLS

Practical Application Requirements - swimming

- 1. Swim 50m in less than 50 seconds with head above the water.
- 2. Swim 300m in less than 6 minutes without using equipment.
- 3. Swim 25m underwater without breaking the surface while retrieving three objects placed 5m apart, with one object in the deepest end of the pool.

RESCUE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Perform unassisted, a combined rescue technique in the following sequence in less than two minutes:
 - Appropriate entry
 - 25 meter / 82 feet surface swim
 - Surface dive to adult / dummy to a minimum depth of 1.5 meter / 5 feet
 - Tow to the edge of the pool / confined water
 - Egress out of the water
- 2. Lift and transport a patient using a recognised transport (backboard etc) a minimum distance of 25 meters / 82 feet.
- Perform simulated rescue using a throwing aid to a conscious victim in the water over a minimum distance of 10 meters / 33 feet.
- 4. Demonstrate proper technique for the following:
 - Scene assessment
 - Arousal / assessment of consciousness
 - Activating EMS
 - Opening the Airway
 - Rescue Breathing (simulate)
 - · Finding landmark position for compressions
 - CPR (simulate)
 - Patient / Shock management
 - Set up and administration of oxygen for breathing patient
 - Illness assessment
 - Injury Assessment (fractures, bleeding etc)

KNOWLEDGE DEVELOPMENT

- 1. Describe and demonstrate the correct application of appropriate emergency treatments in a rescue including CPR and spinal management.
- 2. Describe and demonstrate the use of appropriate medical equipment in an emergency medical situation.
- 3. Describe and demonstrate the correct use of appropriate rescue equipment in a pool, or confined water environment.
- Identify and list local regulations pertinent to managing an emergency medical situations.
- 5. Identify and list medical services available for support in an emergency medical situation.
- 6. Identify and list possible strategies for rescue and emergency accident management for pool and confined water locations.
- 7. Design an emergency plan for a relevant local aquatic workplace.
- Identify and list all relevant features of an aquatic location / workplace typical for the local area (pool / confined water) – include environment, geography, demography, resources, and safety-related precautions.

We will periodically practice these skills and rescues by the pool to keep their skill levels up to standard.

In addition to the above, I assisted the British Club in acquiring a portable DAN Emergency Oxygen unit. This unit will be in the Fitness Center room. In addition to our two Lifeguards who have been trained to operate this unit, the management staff of the British Club will be trained in its operation.

I developed two Lifeguard courses. The second course is an advanced level course entitled the Master LifeGuard.

The Master LifeGuard distinctive specialty course is designed to be a safe supervised programme to train advanced level certified divers to act in the capacity of lifeguards for swimmers, snorkelers and scuba divers in a pool, confined water and open water environment. Training emphasises swimming ability; location of and assistance to the victim in the water; surfacing and egress of the victim from the water; and management of a scuba diving accident in an area with access to EMS. This is an advanced certification preparing already certified PADI LifeGuard for scuba-related accidents in all environments, including

open water. This course requires the candidate to a minimum level of a PADI Rescue Diver or equivalent.

Both courses are available for instruction. For further information, please contact me. Additional congratulations are in order! Alexander and Duncan Skinner recently qualified as certified PADI Skin Divers.

TENNIS ETIQUETTE

Calling - Any ball that cannot be called out is presumed to have been good, and a player cannot claim a let on the basis that he did not see a ball. If this were not so, picture your opponent at the net ready to tap away a sitter. As he does so your back is to him. Can you ask for a replay because you didn't see where his shot landed? If you could, the perfect defence has been found against any shot that is out of reach: close your eyes before it touches the court.

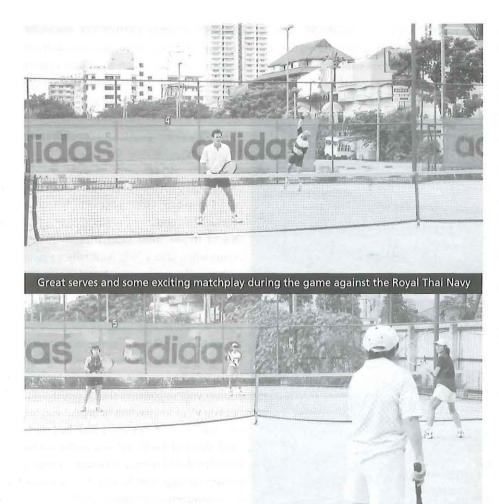
One of tennis' most infuriating moments occurs when after a long hard rally a player makes a clean placement and hears his opponent say: "I'm not sure if it was good or out. Let's play a let." Remember that it is each player's responsibility to call all balls landing on, or aimed at, his side of the net, and if a ball can't be called out with surety, it is good. When you ask for a replay of a point because you say your opponent's shot was really out but you want to give him "a break," you are deluding yourself; you must have had some small shred of doubt and that doubt means the point should be your opponent's. Further, telling your opponent to "take two" is usually not so generous as it might sound.

In doubles when one partner calls a ball out and the other one good, the doubt that has been established means the ball must be considered to have been good. The reluctance that some doubles players have to overrule their partners is secondary to the importance of not letting your opponents suffer from a bad call. The tactful way to achieve the desired result is to tell your partner quietly that he has made a mistake and then let him overrule himself. If it comes to a showdown, untactful honesty is preferable to tactful dishonesty.

Normally, asking for a replay of a point is a sign of weakness and of failure to exercise line-calling responsibilities, and should occur only on rare occasions. One of these is as follows. Your opponent's ball - a serve or otherwise - appears out and you so call, but return the ball to his court. Inspection reveals that your out call, which stopped play, is in error. Since you actually returned the ball a let is authorised. Had you not returned the ball the point would have been your opponent's. Another possible replay situation occurs when, just as C is returning A's good shot, A's overzealous partner, B calls A's shot

out. If C hits a placement he wins the point; otherwise, the point should be replayed.

COMMITTEE CORNER By now you should have received the revised rules regarding leagues and ladders. The intention is to stimulate activity for both leagues and ladders, and give more tennis to those who are keen to participate. Please do make your thoughts and views known to your Committee Members. If we have got things wrong, we will make changes. Have you noticed that we are now exclusively using Dunlop Tennis balls - Volley for Mix-Ins and Fort for Matches and Team practices? 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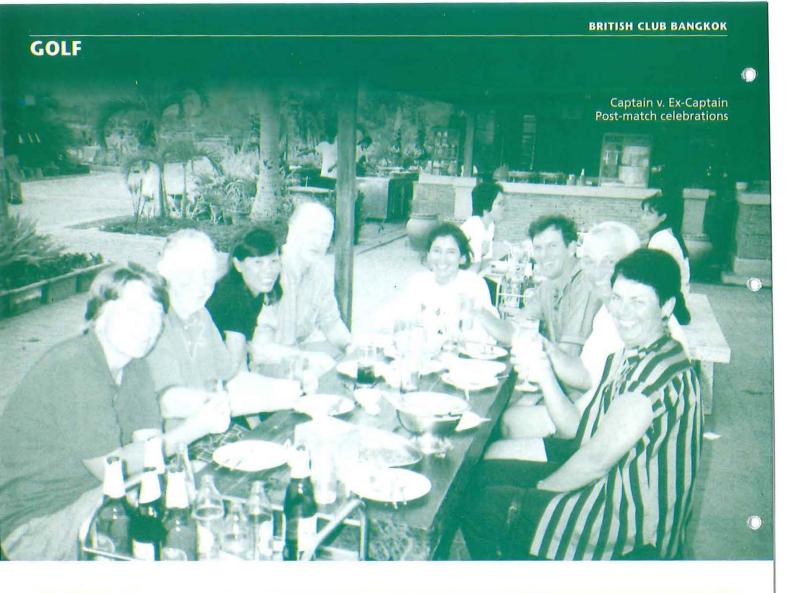

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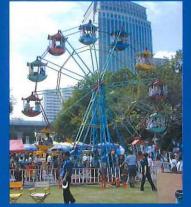


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Ploenchit Fair at the Royal Plaza Saturday 23 November 2002

Life Story of Mr. Richard Davey Hempson, OBE



It is with great sorrow that Richard Davey Hempson, OBE passed away earlier this year. Richard joined the British Club on 1 January, 1935 and had been a great supporter of the Club over the past 67 years.

ichard Davey Hempson, OBE was born on April 14, 1906 in Essex, England. After he graduated, he started his job in Anglo-Thai Corporation at its head office in London. In 1936, he became the marketing manager for the Thailand Branch of Anglo-Thai Corporation, based in Thailand.

During World War II, when Thailand was invaded by Japan and the country lost its sovereignty, all allied civilians were locked up in Thamasart campus at Tha Prachan. Richard Hempson was no exception and he was confined together with other Western immigrants. After slightly over one year in the campus, Richard Hempson and his colleagues were released when the Japanese lost to the allies in 1945. He continued his marketing role for another 5 years.

As Senior Executive of the Board, he returned to England and as a result of his great achievement in marketing of British products and in recognition of his capacity, commitment and achievement to render outstanding service to England, he was given the OBE by Queen Elizabeth II.

Not only was he a successful manager, his kind heart and contributions to Thai society were a major aspect of the respect he had in Thailand. The gratitude to Thailand and the Thai people was repaid by Richard Hempson, OBE by supporting society with the valuable gift of education. Many intelligent children from mainly poor families were sponsored by him to study and graduate abroard in the hope that one day they would return and help develop the country.

He moved back to Thailand after his retirement in 1977, bought a house in Pattaya and later on, in 1987 moved to Maerim Chiengmai. He passed away peacefully at 2.00am on March 17 2002 at the age of 96.

He is now leaving us for a better world. May the kindness and merit he has done bring his soul to heaven forever.

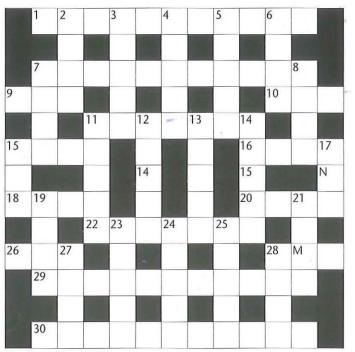
