



TREASURER'S INTERIM REPORT

I believe that this is the first time - at least in recent history - that an Interim Treasurer's Report has been presented to Members. The report is based on the Club's Management Accounts as at 30 May 2004. It must be emphasized that these have not been audited by the Club's Auditors; the figures presented should nonetheless give a reasonably accurate outline of the Club's financial position at mid-year.

The purpose of the Report is:


- a) to give members of the Club some insight into the financial progress of the Club since the last Audited Report (as at 30 November 2003) and
- b) to improve transparency

One of the first initiatives of the Financial Year was a rewriting of the menus in order to encourage greater usage of the Club. Unfortunately at the same time there was an unexpected steep increase in food costs (of eggs, beef, pork and shrimps in particular) following the outbreak of chicken flu. Nonetheless over recent months members have been spared 'automatic' price increases to demonstrate the commitment to deliver value. The targetted increase in sales volumes has however not ensued: F&B Sales are running around 1 1/2 per cent below previous year levels (against a budgetted increase of 3 %). Unsurprisingly, the F&B costs ratio has also edged up somewhat over this period. Attention will continue to be paid not only to pricing but also to cost management in an effort to achieve the dual objectives of delivering good value and financial

During January the Club suffered considerable disruption following severe rain damage to the Poolside Building. Many members suffered inconvenience following the loss of use of facilities but gratefully the potential financial loss to the Club was mitigated by a satisfactory settlement made by the Club's own insurers QBE Insurance Ltd.

Staff costs have been running temporarily below target (by some 10%), in part as a consequence of the unexpected delay in naming the new GM and in part from a slightly sub-target headcount. Security costs, which were higher than expected over the Christmas period, have been brought back into line. A sudden inexplicable increase in the Water Bill will have hopefully been combatted by the approval of new and overdue piping work. Regrettably bank charges continue to move higher as a result of the ever-increasing use of credit cards even though lower

commission rates were negotiated with the Club's service providers early in the year.

New Member Fees have picked up a good deal after the slow start to the year but are still about 30% behind target. This source of revenue is particularly important as it effectively provides the capital from which future years' investment can be funded. Revenue from this source to date is THB 3,5m compared with THB 3,8m at the same stage last year.

The cash balance at 30 May 2004 was THB 17,5 m. Whereas on the one hand this cash surplus reflects a healthy financial position it is also a symptom of underinvestment in the Club's facilities. Expenditure on Fixed Assets was just THB 3,7m so far this year. For the second half a number of Capex items are planned to be addressed, including inter alia: replacement of

furniture in the Wordsworth Room, new staircarpet in the Clubhouse, redecorating and reinvention of the underutilised Snooker Room, replacement of some old equipment in the Fitness Centre. These can rightly be judged as 'catch-up' items. It is of course recognized that attainment of spending targets has to be subject to quality management and is not simply a numbers game.


The current GC has committed itself to write a medium term Strategic Plan over the current Term. I hope that this will lead to the formulation of a vision for the Club which can be widely shared and subsequently implemented to provide a much improved facility in the interests of the membership as a whole.

EXPENSES MIX: HALF YEAR ENDED 31 MAY 2004






There is a pre-depreciation operational surplus of just over THB 600.000,- at mid-year which is around THB 100.000,- behind target. It is worth highlighting that monthly performance is nonlinear and first half results appear relatively flattering because of the traditionally high-surplus (first) month of December. In spite of the very clear pick-up in inflationary pressure on the Club's cost base it is anticipated - subject to an Operational Result at year-end not too far short of the break-even target - that any structural increase in Membership fees above the modest annual CPI adjustment can be postponed for at least another year.

This mid-year presentation is a first attempt and there may be suggestions how this can be refined in future in the interest of providing useful information on financial progress at the Club: I am happy to receive member feedback.

I would like to conclude with a commercial: The Club is currently looking for more member volunteers who would like to contribute to the better financial management of the Club's affairs. Participation on the Treasury Workgroup is guaranteed to give interesting insights. Expressions of interest from Associate Members and also younger members will be particularly welcome. 


MARTIN AND RACHEL WAYMAN

TRAVELERS' HEALTH GUIDE

Travel in Bangkok presents very few problems for visitors but it is best to bear in mind that here, as with any tropical climate, abundant life forms not found in cooler regions exist, from viruses and bacteria to poisonous snakes and fishes. Prevention is always better than cure so we have compiled this guide to give you a few ideas of what you should look out for during your stay.

Millions of people from all over the world travel to Bangkok yearly and depart usually healthier and fitter than when they arrived. A small number, however, do experience problems such as:

MICROBIAL AND VIRAL INFECTIONS

This group probably afflicts the greatest number of people, mainly from intestinal infections resulting in mild diarrhoea. More serious are viral infections like hepatitis, haemorrhagic fevers and AIDS. Travellers should also beware of mosquito-borne viruses such as malaria and dengue fever.

DIARRHOEA AND/OR VOMITING (D&V)

Traveller's Diarrhoea (or the Thailand Trots) requires some care to avoid. If you do succumb to diarrhoea, the intensity will depend on how much contaminated food or drink you have consumed.

To minimise your risk:

- Eat food served steaming hot and cooked to order rather than food left out on trays or in bain-marie dishes. Choose
 fruit that you have to peel (like bananas or oranges) rather than those you eat with the skin intact (like apples or
 grapes) unless you can wash them. There is a huge range here so experiment.
- DON'T DRINK TAP WATER! Bottled water (check that the plastic seal is intact) or water served in jugs in a
 restaurant will be fine. Go for ice cubes or tubes rather than chips. The huge range of fruit on offer means a huge
 range of delicious shakes (fresh banana ones are simply divine), slushies (lemon is tops in this category) and
 smoothies (try the water melon ones) to drink. The ice, water and milk will be okay in over 99.99% of cases so stop
 worrying! Aim to drink around 2 litres of (non-alcoholic) fluids a day.
- Exercise caution with salads and shellfish to the same degree as you would do in your home country. You do not
 actually run a greater risk here than there.
- If you do develop D & V then drink even more water than you did before. Dehydration is the resulting problem
 otherwise, especially for children. Take them to a doctor if they have D & V for more than one day and yourself for
 more than two. You should get medical advice immediately should you notice blood or mucus in your (or their)
 diarrhoea or if the D & V is violent and accompanied by a raised temperature.

Mam continued her run of recent form to win C Flight with a net 76. Peter Bond was in second place with a net 80 and Val Ashman was third with a net 84.


