London's burning!

Id London always had a problem with fire. Following the Norman Conquest in 1066, King William the Conqueror insisted that all fires in London should be put out at night to reduce the risk of fire in houses with straw 'carpets' and thatched roofs. William's law of *couvrefeu* (literally - cover fire) became the modern term *curfew*. Even so, a huge fire destroyed a large part of the city in 1212 and was said to have killed some 3,000 people. This fire was known as the Great Fire of London - until September 2nd 1666.

The last "Great Fire" started on Sunday in a baker's shop in Pudding Lane. He'd forgotten to douse the fire in his oven when he went to bed at 10pm. The fire somehow set light to nearby stacked firewood and by 1am the shop and house were burning furiously and straw in the yard of the Star Inn next door was alight.

The fire spread rapidly in the London of 1666, a city of half timbered and pitch covered medieval buildings, many with thatched roofs. Burning embers from the fire set alight roofs and houses as they fell. The fire quickly became too fierce to be fought with the crude hand operated devices that were all that was available.

The Mayor was awoken and arrived at the scene some time around 3am, when the fire was already consuming the adjoining houses and creeping towards the paper warehouses and flammable stores on the riverfront. Rejecting calls to demolish houses to contain the fire, he made his famous remark, "Pish! A woman could piss it out", and left.

By Sunday afternoon, the fire had become a raging firestorm which created its own weather. The narrow streets and overhanging buildings produced a kind of 'chimney effect' with fresh air being sucked in at ground level to turbocharge the fire. The tremendous uprush of hot air above the flames spread sparks and flaming debris this way and that, setting light to more buildings in a wide radius.

As luck would have it, Old St Pauls was being repaired at the time of the fire and was covered with wooden scaffolding, which caught fire on Tuesday night and then ignited the timbered roof beams, the heat from which started to melt the lead roof. "The stones of Paules flew like granados, the melting lead running downe the streets in a streame . . ." reported Evelyn in his diary. The cathedral was quickly a ruin.

Alarmed by Pepys' description of the conflagration, King Charles II decided to override the Mayor's authority and sent his brother the Duke of York to sort things out. This he did with considerable determination, blowing up swathes of houses with gunpowder, until the fire was eventually halted on the Wednesday, but probably more the result of a drop in the wind than anything else.

By the end of the fire some four fifths of the City had been destroyed, approximately 13,200 houses, 87 churches and 50 Livery Halls over an area of 436 acres. The fire was supposed to have claimed only a few lives, but some historians argue convincingly that, given its intensity, deaths would have been in the hundreds if not thousands.



FORMULA ONE - LAST EUROPEAN RACES

he 2007 season seems to have sped by and we are now down to the last five races, including the last two of the European tour. After an exciting Hungarian Grand Prix Qualifier (the infamous 'Alonso delays Hamilton' race) our young English rookie is still at the top of the Championship table as we go to press – but can he stay the distance and give us our first English F1 Champion since Damon Hill in 1996?



In September we visit Italy, Belgium and China:

- In Italy we visit the Autodromo Nazionale di Monza near the town of Monza, north of Milan. It is one of the most historic motor racing circuits in the world having first been built in 1922 and major features include the Curva di Lesmo, the Curva Parabolica, and the Variante Ascari.
- In Belgium we make a welcome return to the Circuit de Spa-Francorchamps. Built in 1924 it is considered to be one of the most challenging race tracks in the world, mainly due to its fast, hilly and twisty nature and it features one of the most famous and dangerous sections of any racing track in the world, the *Eau Rouge* complex.
- China is a newcomer to the F1 championship, now in only its fourth year. The Shanghai International Circuit
 is situated in the district of Jiading near Shanghai and was designed to resemble the Chinese character shang
 (上), the first word in the name of the city Shanghai it also means 'above' or 'ascend'.

As usual, Formula 1 will be shown LIVE in the Churchill Bar each evening. Make sure you arrive early to grab a good seat!

BAR BALUT



The game consists of 7 rounds. In each round, you roll five ordinary dice and then score the roll in one of seven categories: > 'Fours'/'Fives'/'Sixes' - based upon the number of each you roll. > 'Straight' - like Poker, a run from 1-5 or 2-6 > 'Choice' - again like Poker, a set of three and a pair > 'Balut' - all five dice with the same number.

If you fail to score in one category you must scratch it. Once you have scored or scratched in each category, all the scores are then totalled and the winner declared!

expanding device, the lava lite.

PSYCHEDELIC SCIENCE MATERIALS:

- Glass jar
- Water with food colouring added
- Vegetable oil
- Shaker filled with salt

TO DO:

Fill a glass jar with about 3 inches of water and add food colouring until you get a nice deep shade, as in the picture. Add 1/3 cup of vegetable oil and wait until the layers settle. Watching carefully, shake salt into



the jar while you count to five. The oil and salt should form a glob and sink to the bottom of the jar. As the salt dissolves in the water, the oil should float back to the top. Keep adding more salt to watch the action repeat. As you sprinkle on the salt, watch the globs of oil sink, rest on the bottom, then rise again.

WHAT'S GOING ON & WHY:

At first, the oil floats on the water because it's lighter-or, more accurately, it's less dense than the water. It also doesn't mix with water, so it won't dissolve. The salt, however, is denser than the water and does dissolve. When you shake it onto the oil, it clings and drags a glob to the bottom. In time, however, the salt starts to dissolve in the water. At a certain point, it can no longer hold down the oil blob, which then floats back up to the surface.





Phad Cha Plakapong (Snapper)

250g snapper (cut to bite size and boil)

- 2 bunches peppercorns
- 1 tbsp minced chili pepper
- 1 tbsp minced garlic
- 2 tbsp sliced galangal
- 2 tbsp chili paste for Tom Yum
- 1 tbsp cut yellow or red sweet pepper
- 1 group scallion (cut 1 inch)
- 1/2 cup basil
- 1/2 tbsp sugar
- 1 tbsp oyster sauce
- 2 tbsp fish sauce
- 2 tbsp vegetable oil

Cooking Instructions:

1. Heat the pan, start on low flame and add vegetable oil. Wait until it's hot then fry minced garlic.


2. When the garlic smell is aromatic, increase the flame. Add chili pepper, galangal, peppercorns, followed by the snapper.

3. Mix well. Now, add fish sauce, oyster sauce, sugar, chili paste for Tom Yum.

4. Quick stir and then add sweet pepper, scallion and basil. Turn off the fire.

Snow Fish Bourguignon

Serves 6

125g shallots (unpeeled) 400 ml red wine 125g bacon lardoons 4 tsp olive oil 6 garlic cloves (unpeeled) 125g button mushrooms 50g butter 6 pcs Snow fish fillets, about 150g each, skinned 250g spinach leaves, well washed sea salt

Cooking Instructions:

1. Blanch the shallots in boiling water for 2 minutes, then drain and peel. Meanwhile, boil the red wine in a pan to reduce by half.

2. Sauté the lardoons in a heavy-based frying pan until crisp. Remove and set aside.

Add 2 tbsp olive oil to the frying pan and heat. Add the shallots, garlic and mushrooms and sauté until softened and the shallots are lightly caramelize. Stir in bacon; keep warm.

3. Meanwhile, heat the butter and remaining oil in a large frying pan until foaming. Pan-fry the Snow fish fillets for 2-3 minutes on each side until just cooked. Remove to a warm plate and rest for a few minutes.

4. Cook the spinach in a large pan over a medium heat, with a little water and a pinch of salt, until just wilted. Drain well.

5. Pile the spinach into the centre of warm plates and place the fish on top. Spoon over the mushrooms, shallots, garlic and bacon. Add the reduced red wine to the shallot pan, stirring to deglaze, then drizzle over the fish and vegetables. Serve with new potatoes.



Hot Chocolate Fondants

Serves 2

50g unsalted butter, plus extra to grease 2 tsp cocoa powder, to dust

50g good-quality bitter chocolate (minimum 70% cocoa solids), in pieces

1 free-range egg

1 free-range egg yolk 60g caster sugar 50g plain flour

Cooking Instructions:

1. Heat the oven to 160° C/Gas 3. Butter two large ramekins, about 7.5 cm in diameter, then dust liberally with cocoa.

2. Slowly melt the chocolate and butter in a small bowl, set over a pan of hot water, then take off the heat and stir until smooth. Leave to cool for 10 minutes.

3. Using an electric whisk, whisk the whole egg, egg yolk and sugar together until pale and thick, then incorporate the chocolate mixture.

4. Sift the flour over the mixture and gently fold in, using a large metal spoon. Divide between the ramekins and bake for 13 minutes.

5. Turn the chocolate fondants out onto warmed plates and serve immediately.



RUGBY

A ugust 2007 has been focused on preparing our teams for the upcoming league. Our teams have been organizing training games against the Bangkok Japanese, The Southerners, Lad Krabang University and Thonburi University with the purpose of sharpening our game plan for the upcoming 15s a side league.

This year's 15s a side league will be of a different format than previously. The league starts August 18th and this year the Thai Rugby Union has combined the 1st and 2nd divisions so this year's league consists of 18 teams – a large expansion from the 8 teams normally competing in the league. This event is a black tie gala event and one of the biggest social events on the Bangkok Calendar, so all interested persons are welcome. Tickets are limited - so get in fast - and will be put on sale in the near future. Tickets will also be available to Club members at the Club Reception. The Ball is intended to raise funds for the Rugby Section's annual operations and player development.

Fixture Report / Tournament Results

British Club vs. Bangkok Japanese

Thonburi University, July 14, 2007

In the first half, the British Club's new but experienced back row hunted the Japanese fly half, putting intense pressure on the Japanese back line. The ball stayed largely within the Bangkok Japanese's 22, giving several easy tries to our winger and fullback. This game gave a lot of opportunities for our back line to practice new moves and to learn from each other, which surely paid off well. British Club vs. Lad Krahang University Thonburi University, August 9, 2007

This engineering university has been coached by one of our senior members, also alumni at the university, for a number of years which has contributed to the development of their rugby skills. One example of their expanding interest is their yearly youth tournament that now hosts over 100 teams from all over Thailand.

Lad Krabang University has developed a hardplaying and very mobile pack in combination with well-drilled backs. The first half ended with the British Club on the back foot to Lad Krabang's strong and mobile pack. However, the British Club played a clever game against them by using forward tactics to make up for our lack of pace out wide, i.e. by playing for the contact, running directly at players, tackling hard and slowing the game down. The Lad Krabang University came out in top gear going 2 tries up within the first 10 minutes. After a slow start the British Club started to play and slowed them down scoring a try just before half time. The British Club scored early in the 2nd half making it 2 tries each. With about 10 minutes to go the university guys got too tired after continually defending their line and we got two more tries. The match ended with a solid British Club win 20 - 10.


The Explorers Club





THE KING OF THAILAND IN WORLD Focus

Foreign Correspondents' Club of Thailand Bt.1,450

A fascinating look at the life of the world's longest-reigning monarch, His Majesty King

Bhumibol Adulyadej of Thailand, through five decades of international media coverage.

Put together by the Foreign Correspondents' Club of Thailand – arguably the most active foreign journalists' association in Asia – this book draws on more than 160 news reports on His Majesty the King, from sources such as Associated Press, Reuters, The Economist, Far Eastern Economic Review, New York Times, and more.

Designed in a news-style format, and complimented with more than 370 photographs, this 269 page book provides a unique insight into His Majesty the King's life, and into the social, political and economic development of Thailand, in the 58 years since his coronation.

It is, without a doubt, the most objective book on His Majesty the King available in Thailand. Reportage follows him from the tragic death of his brother King Ananda Mahidol; through Thailand's negotiations of the tumultuous Indochina wars; numerous military coups, and the horrors of the 1973, 1976 and 1992 massacres.

Coverage includes the formation of a new constitution and the economic meltdown of 1997, through the Thaksin era to the present day.

In-depth reporting of the King's Projects and His Majesty's sustainable development programmes is included.

A fantastic book that is strongly recommended for anyone wanting to know more about this fascinating country.

SALMON FISHING IN THE YEMEN By Paul Torday Bt.299

Mild-mannered and unimaginative Dr. Alfred Jones, a fisheries specialist, receives a letter asking for his participation in a project to introduce Scottish salmon and the sport of salmon fishing into the wadis of the Yemen during the yearly rains. Finding the whole idea ludicrous he ignores the letter, until the Foreign

and Commonwealth Office and eventually the prime minister weigh in.

Through letters, e-mails, memos, diary entries, newspaper articles, records of the House of Commons, interviews, and even intercepted al-Qaeda e-mail traffic, the story of Alfred's efforts to create a suitable environment for salmon in the mountains of western Yemen unfolds.

Despite the story's unlikely premise, this is a delightful satire that pokes fun at every aspect of British society. With a wickedly wonderful cast of characters - a visionary Sheikh, a manipulative spin doctor and Fred's devilish wife - this is a novel about hypocrisy and bureaucracy, and the transforming power of faith and love. It's a lot of fun and was widely admired when first published at the end of last year.



MOMZILLAS By Jill Kargman Bt.299

When Hannah's husband Josh gets offered a job at an investment bank, she's happy to abandon West Coast life for the bright lights of New York. But motherhood in Manhattan is a whole different ball game – in fact for the wealthy women of high society, it's practically an Olympic sport!

In a world where how you look is everything, our likeable heroine falters as she encounters "Reximoms" (mothers who drop the baby weight in two weeks or less), "Nannyjackers" (mothers who try to steal other people's nannies – not unlike Bangkok then) and Momsicles (cold-hearted mothers who never cuddle their kids).

Overwhelmed, when an old flame re-enters her life, who can blame her for wondering what might have been? Like a cross between The Devil Wears Prada and The Rise and Fall of a Yummy Mummy, this is a funny and sassy way to while away the rainy season.

"Check the box" training

In my last column, I mentioned "check the box" training. What do I mean by that? Well, I'm referring to training that is required, either by company directive or by law. Do you have safety training that must be conducted every quarter? That's "check the box" training, because when it is completed someone ticks that one on the list.

Sometimes, this sort of training is taken very seriously and every effort is made to get the best quality of training to fulfill the requirement. Other times, this sort of training is run as cheaply and as quickly as possible in order to get that box checked. I've even seen both of these attitudes in the same company. For those of you who are responsible for training, I'll bet you have seen these attitudes too. Which attitude you've seen usually has to do with the perceived value of the training.

If the training is perceived as important, it is taken seriously and efforts are made to make it successful. If the training is perceived as unimportant, just a chore that has to be done, then the cheapest and quickest solution will be used (which reinforces the perception that it isn't important).

How do we form our perceptions of training? For most people, the biggest influence on their attitude towards training is the attitude of their immediate boss towards that training. If the boss ducks out on the fire drill, will the employees consider it important?

Now, I'm not suggesting that some "check the box" training shouldn't be filled with the cheapest solution available. If you must provide English training to workers who never use English, use the cheapest solution available. Language that isn't used is lost, so why spend a lot training people in a language they don't have an opportunity to use? On the other hand, if you have a requirement for presentations training by the people who make presentations to the Board of Directors, you might want to invest in the best training possible. Really, you have to weigh the return on investment from quality training vs. the return from poor training. And sometimes that return isn't in money terms.

Next column, I'll write about the process of building effective training, and pass on some ideas that I've picked up over the past 30 years. I hope you find it interesting.
