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
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FRONT COVER

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MESSAGE FROM THE GM

Dear Members,

July was not a good month financially for the Club. In June, business had started picking up after the unrest in Bangkok, and the first 2 weeks of July looked promising, but after that the number of Members coming down to the Club dropped significantly. However, there were of course some very positive things happening in the Club as well. This year, Reed changed the concept of the sports camps, which initially appeared to be the right decision. We therefore repeated the sports camp in August, and again it has proved to be very successful, because we had somewhere between 20-25 participants daily. July's final Friday saw our first 'Music at the Pool' evening and was very well received. This will become a regular fixture and will also be combined with New Members night in future. For the management team this shows that we need more activities and events that attract Members down to the Club, even though many of their friends are away on holiday.

We are therefore currently working on producing a schedule which will show what events and activities are planned for the coming quarter, as it is our ultimate goal to have a 6 month planning horizon so our Members will know what is going on in the Club well in advance. We have changed some of our traditions a bit already; the wine-tasting will now take place on every 3rd Friday of the month, and our new regular "Music at Dusk" will feature on the 4th Friday of the month. In future we will create events both during the week and at the weekends, but any suggestions for, or contacts with, performers would be greatly appreciated.

In the close future we will be hosting both Chamber of Commerce meetings and teacher/professional nights. It is important to note that even though these events are primarily held to recruit new Members to the Club, they are for our Members social enjoyment as well. The hosting of such events carries the intention of making your Club a central part of what is happening in Bangkok as it used to be for most of our existing Members. Seen from the perspective of recruiting new Members, one of the unique selling points is the culture of the Club, which is created by the Members themselves. One of the best ways to "sell" the Club is to bring friends and colleagues down to experience the Club or one of its events.

The service staff have now been trained in English for 6 weeks. We have deliberately chosen not to give the staff training in providing service. The reason behind this is that we believe that all our staff actually do know how to provide very high levels of service already. Furthermore, the service staff do agree that the Members do not get the service they deserve. However, in order to give the best standards of service in all our outlets, it is always assumed that you can speak the language. However most of our staff do not feel confident in speaking English and as a result many are too shy to go up and actually talk to a Member. All Members can actually experience and see this in our outlets. It becomes visible because those Members who speak in Thai get a different level of service. All our service staff are very committed to changing this, and also to changing the service levels significantly, but we need our Members' help to ensure that all our service staff become increasingly confident in speaking English so as to give better service.

We will therefore ask our Members to speak English to our staff and yes, in the next couple of months, please be patient regarding accent and pronunciation. The service staff and I promise that your patience will be rewarded with much improved service.

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HOUSE & GROUNDS

The monthly report on maintenance and development



The long drawn-out saga of the tennis court resurfacing continues. The asphalt was completed satisfactorily by the last week of July, and the date of 2nd August was agreed for starting the acrylic work. When 2nd August arrived it was accompanied by heavy rain. Acrylic cannot be installed in wet conditions so no start was made. On 7th August, the contractor turned up after lunch to install the black acrylic base. This was not good timing as it started raining in the late afternoon and work had to be adjourned.

After a few problems, the lights and brass plaques were added to the new noticeboards in the Clubhouse corridor

and reception area. We hope the boards meet with Members approval in both aesthetic and functional aspects. The useable area of each board is twice that of the ones we have replaced. In order to complete the improvements in this part of the Clubhouse. we plan to replace the parquet flooring in the reception area where it was cut out to form a recess for the carpet. We are also looking for a company that can design and manufacture directories

and small pieces of furniture which can be used for displaying information to the Members without reducing the lobby to an untidy and tacky area.

The Ladies' Changing Room is progressing on schedule and, failing unforeseen problems, should be finished earlier than the contractual completion date of 28th August. The new layout should provide a more comfortable environment. The higher entrance door will also be installed in the Men's Changing Room, once the ladies are back in their own facilities. Extraction fans have been installed in the changing areas.

We are still very busy with repair and maintenance work. The A/C in the outer Verandah is still not working properly and we now need to repair the fan coil unit. Unfortunately it is almost impossible to gain access without removing some of the ceiling. The design & build contractor obviously

didn't recognize the need to allow access to equipment. One of the A/C units in the Fitness Centre needs replacing. These two items are typical of the constant reminders that a large proportion of the equipment is already far beyond its useful life. We still have 14 old A/C units which should be replaced over the next 18 months, if we can afford to do so. Not only do they inflate our electricity bills, they also break down frequently.

Unfortunately, our aspirations to improve the front areas of the Club will have to wait. This year has not been a good one in terms of the recruitment of new Members and the revenue

we need to carry out our small development projects. For the time being, only essential repair and maintenance work will be carried out, wherever possible using our own staff. We will therefore have to live with the 'down at heel appearance' until at least next year.

There are some major issues which will need dealing with once more funds become available. The exterior of the Clubhouse is due for repainting next year;

the Suriwongse Sala roof needs replacing; the swimming pool is overdue a complete refurbishment; both of the kitchens and the Fitness Centre also need major work done, and the landscaping could do with a makeover in many areas, particularly the front lawn and the pond. The badly needed new workshop and storage facility will have to be put on the back burner for the time being so the old files occupying our office floors will have to remain there.

All of this means that we will have to keep going with the facilities we have, however old and tired they might be. It looks like we need to get out and recruit some new Members and find ways to help increase our Club's revenue.

AN EGM FOR GROWTH

Extra-ordinary General Meeting

On Tuesday 28th September 2010 the General Committee is calling an Extra-ordinary General Meeting of Ordinary and Country Members to discuss a number of matters to help the Club grow over the next decade. This article will highlight two of those areas – **Annual Membership** and **Disciplinary Procedure**.

ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP

Preamble

The time of senior business men and women coming to Bangkok with full Expat packages (including a Club membership) is gone and today's average farang working in Thailand is likely to be on a one or two year contract with possible renewal, but that renewal not being known until the end of year two. Gone also are the days when joining a Club was 'the done thing', and now our Club must compete head on with an extensive bar and restaurant scene and condominium fitness centres!

In an average month we lose 15 Members who leave the country with work needs or retire home, and we need to replace them. So over the years various General Committees have come forward with a number of ideas to increase membership - last year we introduced the six year payment plan - but none of these options have made any serious inroads into addressing our losses. We think, therefore, that a radical change is required if this Club is to grow or indeed survive through this Century **Annual Membership**.

Annual Membership

We will offer, subject to Members' agreement at the EGM, a new type of membership that is exactly what it says ... an 'Annual Membership' – a single person or a family can join for a one year fixed fee, paying monthly subscriptions, and enjoy a year at our Club. This will immediately appeal to those on a one or two year contract and those who are perhaps unsure of joining a Club and want to 'give it a try'. It will also appeal, we believe, to those on local contracts where the main 66,000 Baht joining fee is seen as a hurdle, and those who are retiring here who see it as a barrier. Many Clubs in Asia now operate this type of membership.

The membership will be open to all nationalities (subject to the usual rules on quotas) and all ages (over 21 years of age of course). This will be a non-voting type of membership with no rights to vote, propose new Members, attend General Meetings, stand for General Committee or go absent as enjoyed by full Members.

Renewal & Limits

Part of this new 'Annual Membership' is the ability to renew the membership if their contract is renewed, and we have also added in a clause that if they are to stay more permanently in Thailand than originally thought they can pay to convert to a full membership, and if they stay for six years it will automatically convert to a full membership. As the Annual Membership is already subject to our quota system, any conversion to full membership will not upset

the balance. Those on the current 6-year plan will be given an opportunity to convert to this new scheme.

Although it will be priced more than the pro-rata standard joining fee with the usual 50% discount for those under 30 years of age, the General Committee is, of course, aware that this could become too popular and thus a numerical limit will be set for those who can hold Annual Membership at any one time.

Rule Changes

At the EGM we will need to amend rules 42, 42 and 48 – details will be sent out in the Calling Notice.

Exciting challenge

The core of our Club will always be the long term Member, in fact we have over 120 Members with 20 years of membership under their belt and hundreds over 10 years, but we live in a changing world and we must rise to the challenge of keeping the Club prospering in this new environment, and what an exciting challenge this will be!

DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURE

Preamble

Although quite rare, there are occasions when behaviour of Members and/or staff can be inconducive to the well-being of the Club, yet the Club has no working procedure on how to deal with these matters. This has lead to each General Committee dealing with different cases in different ways and matters not receiving what others have perceived as equal or fair or transparent treatment. In the past, one case of a bar prank saw a Member suspended whilst another case of violence on site (which lead to the police being called) received not even a warning. This new procedure seeks to address such inconsistencies.

A Working Group set out last year to introduce a uniform, transparent, and fair code of practice, and this year we have concluded this work and are bringing it to Members at an EGM.

Disciplinary Code

The new procedure sets out a reporting protocol, an investigative protocol and the allocation of offences, if proven, into five categories with an appropriate level of punishment.

AN EGM FOR GROWTH

Under the reporting protocol, any Member may register a complaint about another Member to either the Duty Manager, the General Manager or formally to the Chairman of the General Committee, and similarly any staff member may register a complaint about a Member with any member of the Management team.

All Complaints shall be registered in a log, the Chairman of the General Committee informed, and an investigation of the circumstances instigated by the General Manager. If the case warrants it, a Disciplinary Sub-Committee consisting of the Chairman, or any other officer, and two other members of the General Committee shall be formed to review the case and put a report to the General Committee.

Cases will be matched against five new levels of offence: 'Actual physical violence' and 'threatened physical violence' which will both warrant dismissal or suspension; 'Verbal abuse' which will warrant a written warning, and 'Inconsiderate behaviour disturbing other Members' and 'Infringement of bylaws' both of which will also warrant a written or verbal warning.

If a Member believes they have been unfairly treated, we have also set up an appeals procedure. The General Committee also reserves the right to call an EGM to expel a Member (see 'Past Participle' in July's Outpost for an example).

There is also a new procedure laid down for complaints against staff and against management in order to comply with the Labour Protection Acts of 2541 and 2551.

The General Committee feels that this sets out a level playing field for all subsequent General Committees to manage disciplinary matters against Members and staff. It is also our hope that now the boundaries have been set in writing, Members will give a second thought ahead of creating any conflict.

Rule Changes

At the EGM we will need to amend rule 69 and introduce a new set of bylaws – details will be sent out in the Calling Notice.

Exciting challenge

People may ask what has a disciplinary procedure to do with growth? Well, just as you need fertilisers for your roses, you also need weedkiller! Incidents of bad behaviour in the past have reduced other Members' enjoyment of our Club, but as I said at the start of this article, thankfully these incidents are rare.

Just for the Ladies

incision in the abdomen to examine and retrieve tissue samples for biopsy. Many follow-up procedures can then be performed by keyhole surgery" explains Dr. Wiboon.

Such surgical techniques are minimally invasive meaning that patients suffer less pain and stress. The recovery time from such procedures is also very quick, patients are often up-and-about just days after surgery and there is no longer the need for prolonged hospitalisation. In such cases BNH's team of experts will include 3 doctors — a gynaecologist, a gastro-intestinal specialist and a general surgeon, meaning that patients receive the best possible care and attention.

"Our Women's Health Centre is one of the leading women's health care providers in Asia," says Dr. Wiboon. "We form long term relationships with our patients and pride ourselves in knowing their medical history so that we can guide them through life with the minimum of fuss."

From initial consultation, through diagnosis and treatment and on to post-operative care, the concept of the family doctor is still highly valued at BNH and nowhere is that more apparent than at the hospital's Women's Health Centre.

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PI GYMNASTICS VISIT TO THE BRITISH CLUB

Sarah and Ged Allan had organised that the Danish Rhythm Gymnastics & Tumbling team would give a show and a workshop at the British Club. 

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PAST PARTICIPLE

Auspicium Melioris Ævi

We continue our peek into the Club's past with a look at events of 1955 \dots

Our Club's links with the Royal Navy have been well documented in this series, but 1955 was a bumper year with three ships visiting in March, followed by visits from the Royal Australian Navy and the Royal New Zealand Navy in June, the Colombian Navy (being hosted by the British embassy) in July and the Pakistan Navy in November – a grand total of 1,000 officers and ratings were entertained to Tiffin.

The Royal Navy ships were our old favourites HMS Alert (K647), a Bay Class frigate, together with HMS Modeste (F42) and HMS Opossum (F33) both originally Black Swan class sloops now redefined as frigates. The plaque presented to the Club by the Captain of HMS Opossum still graces the Churchill Bar wall (hint – it is above the car park corner window).

Early in 1955, Changwat Krungthep (the provincial authority) decided to upgrade Suriwongse Road into a more durable roadway. The work took months as they heightened the road and built a new bridge over Khlong Chong Nonsi. As a result the Club's Suriwongse Gate was out of use for many months with Members having to enter and leave by the Silom Gate only. The end result was an awkward 'bump' to exit onto the 'new' Suriwongse Road!

April 1955 was due to have seen the retirement of our Permanent Assistant Secretary, Mr Mottet, after five years service but sadly he died just before his retirement presentation was due. The Club financed his funeral and gave his retirement gifts and funds to his widow.

Sadly the Club also lost its first Honorary Member in November 1955 when Brigadier Victor Jacques died. An account of his service to the Club can be found in the December 2009 edition of Past Participle.

The evening of 27th May witnessed an event of great excitement amongst Club Members as a 'receiving set' (radio) was borrowed and installed in the Bar in order that Members could listen to the UK General Election results as they came in. A special Steak & Kidney supper was laid on and "many Members" stayed long into the night.

The event was deemed a success so the Club purchased its own radio set and it was placed in the Rotunda Room (Wordsworth Lounge as is now) so that Members could tune in as and when they wished.



Our longest serving plaque!

In mid November 1955, in fact at the General Committee meeting of 11th of that month, a young man from the Borneo Company became a Member of the Club, his name was Dacre F A Raikes. Dacre is still a Club Member some 55 years later — our third longest serving Member!

And done it we did! Regular practices were held throughout the season in the Club's beautiful refurbished nets, match and practice kits were carried in by Vaughan from India, newly designed Club hats and shirts were donned and 6 matches were played (so far) with 23 players turning out. Two new Members joined the Club just to play cricket, with another pending. The section was generously encouraged and supported by the General Committee and the Landmark Hotel who sponsored the shirts.

And here's a rundown on the season so far, based on score sheets where available and fuzzy memories where not:

Southern Swans, 22nd January:

Feeling like naughty schoolboys playing truant, first up was a Friday afternoon T20 match against the visiting Southern Swans. BCB's first ever match on the pleasant Harrow School fields, made even more pleasurable by sneaking out of work on a Friday afternoon. Batting in the dark we pushed close but fell short of the Swans' 123 for 9 by 15 runs, finishing on 108 for 5. Nick White (1 for 9), Patrick Sanoon (2-30), George (2- 9), Jack Dunford (1-28) and Dale Lamb (2-19) all got wickets and both Joss Dimock and Dale Lamb retired after quick-fire 25's. Speddo (14) and Haroon (13*) contributed double figures, but some rusty running and far too many extras let the side down in a match that should have been won.

Chiang Mai Gymkhana Club, 30/31st January : These tours date back to 1982 and after a break in the 90's this was the 10th consecutive visit



in pursuit of the Dick Wood Cup. This was a popular family weekend and this year 40 cricketers, squash and tennis players made the trip. Squash beat CMGC for the second year running and tennis ... err ... had a good time.

With a large squad we invited CMGC to provide half a dozen players to make up numbers to play a practice cricket match on the Saturday, and as usual this was a very entertaining affair. The surprise stars were Chris Clifford beefing 30 retired, and Reed Passmore, claiming to be playing his first ever cricket match, taking a wicket with his first ball, two in the over, and then standing baseball fashion, statuesque and helmeted, fearlessly bashing the ball all over the place for a rapid 30 without once moving his feet ... other than an extraordinary 10 yard backward sprint when the bowler bowled one at his legs. I've no idea who won but everyone enjoyed a great barbecue and beer that evening under the famous tree, the tennis ladies this year excelling at fuzzy duck and fizz-buzz.

Selection that night for the DWC, never easy, proved so difficult that some Members weren't even aware they had been picked until roused from their beds after the toss on Sunday morning. We had a strong team and for once "Plan A" worked. Our three star batsmen, Nick White (40*), Vaughan (41*) and Speddo (45*) all retired after scoring their 40 not outs and, being able to return if the others got out, almost guaranteed a big total. As it turned out they weren't even needed as everyone else also chipped in, Chris









continuing his imperious form with yet another thumping 37, George with 16 and Colin 14*. 217-3 off 35 overs was a handy total.

Nick White (1-24) and Patrick (1-13) both took early wickets to put CMGC under pressure, but young Tong took advantage of some erratic bowling and they were rattling along at 82-2 after just 10 overs. But then Marc (2-26), Duncan (impressive 2-9 off 6) and David (amazing, bending the ball like the proverbial banana, 3-8 off 4) bowled miserly spells. Only 13 runs came off the next 10 overs with 4 wickets falling including a steepling catch taken by Speddo which the bookies fancied at about 20/1 against. George (1-10) chipped in and CMGC collapsed to 120 all out. This was a great victory, the only one of the season as it turned out, and there were

many cameo performances. Colin Hastings attracted most derision by somehow persuading the skipper to field him permanently in the shade whilst everyone else burnt in the sun. The vodka slammers were particularly sweet this year.

HorseshoePoint, 20th/21stFebruary

: Yet another first ... not only BCB's first visit to Horseshoe Point but the first ever cricket match played at this equestrian oasis in Pattaya. It was another terrific family weekend with about 25 Members and families tagging along. The squashies pulled off another impressive victory and the tennis players ... err... played with themselves which they seem very good at.

The cricket team was missing a few stars but, batting first in a T20 game on the Saturday, made a reasonable hash of it, scoring about 110, mainly thanks to skipper Dale blasting several 6's, retiring, and coming back for more when everyone else was out. 

HSP is a great venue, they looked after us well, drew in a crowd, and this will surely be a regular fixture, maybe even twice a year.

British Club Singapore, 6th March: Just about everyone was available for this 30 over match at Harrow School, and we put out a pretty strong team, even loaning Jack and Alex to the visitors. Batting first Joss (37) and Nick (36) got BC off to a great start and both Speddo (22) and Sailesh (26*) chipped in, with contrasting styles ... fast and furious ... stylish and sedate. But the rest somehow lost the plot, skipper Vaughan leading the way with a bizarre "I'll wait here while you take the bails off" run out, Colin and Neil both getting stumped for no reason at all, leaving BC on a respectable but slightly disappointing 142 for 8.

BCS were slow getting going, with Speddo (1-9 off 6) bowling brilliantly and Anthony taking 2 for 18 at the other end. But gradually they got on top, assisted by some fairly spectacular dropped catches, running out winners by 4 wickets with 7 balls to spare. This was another game that could have been won, but everyone enjoyed Khun Laak's curry back at the Club

and enough had been done to get invited back to Singapore later this year.

Marshall Trophy vs RBSC: This trophy has been played for back to 1962, and after a gap of many years we arranged to play for it again on no less than three occasions, only to be cancelled each time. The hope is to play this as a season opener in November.

We will be playing two matches in Singapore during another family weekend at the end of August, but our record of played 6, lost 5 is harsh judgment on this first season. However, enough has been done to whet the appetite and there will be a Cricket Section AGM at the Club on Tuesday 14th September to plan for the 2010/11 season.

SQUASHY BITS






I FIND THIS ASTONISHING! YOU'RE AMAZING! THIS IS ASTOUNDING!







KHUN LAAK'S ON THE MENU



Mushroom Risotto

(Serves 2)

Main Ingredients

- 1½ cups chicken stock
- ½ pinch saffron
- 1 tbsp butter
- 1/2 tbsp olive oil
- 1/4 lb mushrooms, sliced
- 1/2 cup Arborio rice
- salt and pepper to taste
- 2 tbsp fresh parsley, chopped
- parmesan cheese freshly grated, to taste

Method

- 1. In a medium size saucepan, place the chicken broth and saffron.
- 2. Bring to a boil, remove from heat and set aside.
- 3. In another saucepan, melt the butter with the olive oil and sauté the mushrooms for 5 minutes.
- 4. Add the rice, cook and stir until golden.
- 5. Add the heated stock 1 cup at a time, simmering and stirring occasionally until each cup is absorbed.
- 6. After last cup of stock has been added, cover the saucepan and allow to simmer stirring frequently until rice is creamy and stock has been absorbed.
- 7. Adjust the seasoning to suit your personal taste, add parsley and stir well.
- 8. Top with grated cheese and serve.



Fillet of Sea bass with a Rustic Ratatouille

(Serves 4)

Main Ingredients

- 4 small sea bass about 250g each, or 2 large ones about 500g each filleted
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- Sea salt and pepper

Rustic ratatouille

- 2 beef tomatoes
- ½ red pepper, deseeded
- ½ yellow pepper, deseeded
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
- 1 red onion, finely chopped
- 2 courgettes, chopped
- 1 aubergine, chopped
- Handful of basil leaves, roughly chopped
- Dash of balsamic vinegar

Method

For the ratatouille

Halve and deseed the tomatoes, then finely chop the flesh. Cut the peppers into 1cm dice. Heat the olive oil in a saucepan and cook the garlic and onion gently for 2 minutes to soften. Add the courgettes, aubergine and tomatoes, stir and cook for about 5 minutes to soften. Add the basil, basalmic vinegar and seasoning to taste. Take off the heat and keep warm.

To cook the sea bass

Heat the olive oil in a heavy-based frying pan, then add the sea bass fillets, skin-side down, and cook for about 3 minutes until the skin is really crispy. Turn and cook for a further 30 seconds to 1 minute, depending on the thickness of the fish. Remove from the heat, season with salt and pepper and leave to rest for a few minutes.

Spoon the ratatouille on to warm plates or a large platter. Top with the sea bass fillets and serve.



The Real Mushroom Soup (Serves 6)

Main Ingredients

- A small handful of dried porcini olive oil
- 600g/1lb 6oz mixed fresh wild mushrooms (chanterelles, girolles, trompettes de mort, shitake, and oyster), cleaned and sliced
- 2 cloves of garlic, peeled and finely sliced
- 1 red onion, peeled and finely chopped
- A knob of butter
- A handful of fresh thyme leaves
- Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1 litre/ 1¾ pints chicken or vegetable stock
- A handful of fresh flat-leaf parsley, leaves picked and roughly chopped
- 2 tablespoons mascarpone cheese
- 1 lemon
- Optional: truffle oil

Method

Place the porcini in a small dish, add boiling water just to cover, and leave to soak. Get a large casserole-type pan nice and hot, then add a good couple of lugs of olive oil and the fresh mushrooms. Stir around very quickly for a minute, then add your garlic, onion, butter and thyme and a small amount of seasoning. After about a minute you'll probably notice moisture cooking out of the mushrooms and at this point add half of your porcini, chopped up, and the rest left whole. Strain the soaking liquid to remove any grit, and add it to the pan. Carry on cooking for about 20 minutes until most of the moisture disappears.

Season to taste, and add your stock. Bring to the boil and simmer for around 20 minutes. Remove half the soup from the pan and whiz it up to a puree a this point, then pour it back in, adding the parsley and mascarpone, and seasoning carefully to taste.

You can serve this soup as you like, but there are a few things to remember when finishing if off. Mix together a pinch of salt and pepper with the zest of one lemon and the juice of half of it, then spoon a little of this into the middle of the soup. When you go to eat it, stir it in and it gives a wonderful flavour. Other things you can consider are little slices of grilled crostini put into the bottom of the bowls before the soup is poured in. Or you could even quickly fry some nice-looking mushrooms like girolles, chanterelles or oysters, and sprinkle these on top of the soup.



September Drinks



Banana Chocolate Milkshake

Ingredients

- 1 cup skimmed milk
- 2 tbsp cocoa
- 1 tsp vanilla ice cream
- 1 medium ripe banana, sliced
- 8 large ice cubes

Directions

Pour milk and cocoa into blender. Cover, blend on low speed until well mixed. Add sugar substitute, followed by vanilla and banana. Then blend until smooth. Add ice cubes, one at a time, blending until thick and serve immediately. Make two 12 ounce servings.

California Smoothie

Ingredients

- 7 large strawberries
- 8 oz yoghurt
- 1/3 cup orange juice



Directions

In a blender, combine frozen strawberries, yoghurt and orange juice. Blend until smooth and pour into a glass ready to serve.



Kiwi Papaya Smoothie

Ingredients

- 3 kiwis
- ½ papaya, seeded and sliced

Directions

In a blender, combine everything into a blender and liquefy.

Papaya Surprise Smoothie

Ingredients

- 1 peeled papaya, seeded and diced
- 1 banana, sliced
- ½ cup fresh strawberries, sliced
- 1/3 cup milk
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 15 ice cubes

Directions

In a blender, blend the papaya, banana, strawberries, milk, sugar, and ice cubes until smooth.

BUST THE BOREDOM!



PAPER PUPPETS

All you need for the basic version of these puppets is a sheet of paper, tape, and a marker, making it a great boredom-buster when you're on the go. We dressed up ours with additional cut-paper features.

Materials

- Letter-size sheet of paper
- Coloured paper (optional)
- Tape Markers
- Scissors (optional) Tacky glue (optional)

Instructions

- 1. Fold a letter-size sheet of paper in thirds lengthwise (A).
- 2. Tape the seam closed (B).
- 3. Fold the paper in half. Fold the ends in half, in the opposite direction, so that the paper ends up accordion-folded into four equal sections (C).
- 4. Create a face with markers and, if you like, coloured paper pieces attached with tacky glue. Slip your thumb and fingers into the two ends of the folded paper to bring your puppet to life.

PAINT A BATCH OF BEETLES

Decorate a colony of brightly coloured beetles. Try to spread out your bug-making over two afternoons - one to mould the beetles and one to paint them.

Materials

- 1 packet Plaster of Paris
- Disposable plastic spoons
- Acrylic or tempera paintsInsect book (optional)
- Magnets (optional)

Instructions

Mix a cup of plaster of Paris according to the directions on the package. Pour the mix bit by bit into disposable plastic spoons and let them dry overnight (you can make 20 to 40 at a time and save some for later). The next day, pop the bugs out of the spoons and paint them with acrylic or tempera paints. An insect guide, book or magazine can offer some fun inspiration for colors and designs. Painting the bugs can take up the better part of a rainy afternoon, but you can also extend this project in other ways. For example, make your beetles more functional by gluing them onto magnets. Or challenge yourself to create an interesting beetle cage from any supplies around your house (toothpicks are a good jumping-off point).



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


















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
