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



MESSAGE FROM the Chairman

52 Years Ago: Instead of my usual photo feature, I am delighted that in Outpost this month we present the first of three, two-page spreads of pictures kindly donated by Dr. Paddy Dixon (D06). These were taken in 1965 and 1966 when four of the original eight tennis courts were closed to accommodate a new Swimming Pool, Changing Rooms, Surawongse Sala, Kitchen and Squash Court #1.

Paddy tells me that most Members wanted the Swimming Pool to be built but according to the Club Centenary handbook, a minority of 'old fogies' doggedly opposed it, fearing that hoards of children and women would destroy the hitherto peaceful ambience of a gentlemen's retreat. For years afterwards apparently, some referred to it as 'that hole in the ground'!

The Club had no money at the time, and so had to raise a bank loan. To pay that off, Members' entrance fees and subscriptions had to be increased. Of course it was a great success, finally embracing families in the rapidly changing world of the Swinging 60s. The Club historian concluded that without broadening its membership base in this way it is unlikely that the Club would ever have survived into the modern era.


We are thus deeply indebted to the foresight of our predecessors and have inherited a fabulous property in the middle of town; set in wonderful gardens with a classic Clubhouse, car parking and a host of family and sports facilities. But now the place is shabby and out-of-date, our membership is ageing and our image is stuffy. Without bringing standards up to the 21st Century we will surely wither away.

52 Years Later: It is now our turn to secure the Club for future generations and it was reassuring that at the EGM on 10th August the GC was given a resounding vote of confidence, 161 votes to 41, to finally start work on the Silom Wing, the first phase of refurbishing the entire poolside. Once the contractors have been chosen and contracts signed, demolition of the old buildings will begin. The staff house has already been vacated and their facilities moved to the old Pavilion Café, and temporary family facilities on the Front Lawn will soon be ready with a shaded seating area, kiddies pool and playground equipment.

Bouncing Back: Immediately following the official 100day mourning period, activity at the Club began to pick up and in July revenue was higher than budget for the second month running. The festive season is already looking jampacked with bookings and events and the next 6-months look like being a very busy time for the Club.

We will shortly be sharing a completely fresh-look website and



other marketing material, and the campaign will begin.

 Matt is British with a strong F&B background and has a touch of music in his veins. He worked five years with the Hard Rock Café in Thailand and has a host of qualifications. He will bring much energy and expertise to upgrade our services both back and front of house and will be able to shoulder much of Khun Prem's heavy day-to-day workload.



With Kate and Matt on board, expect a burst of new ideas and activity as we head into the bustling festive season.

Outpost: Since Jeremy's departure, we have decided to outsource Outpost to Big Chilli magazine run by Colin Hastings, starting with the October issue. Jeremy has agreed to help Colin and initially it will be much as before. But as the new team takes over and our own marketing plan takes off, expect Outpost to become even more thrilling and colourful. Surely not possible!

Just a start: Optimism abounds and there is a newfound confidence in the future. Since the EGM, so many Members have said to me "now get on with it" ... "finish the job" ... "don't stop at Phase 1" ... "the guest rooms sound great, build those as well" ... "Why not just borrow the money and get it all done?"

Well, we have to deliver the Silom Wing first and we have to monitor activities carefully. I am optimistic however that we will be in a position before long to come back with plans to move beyond the Silom Wing. Besides completing the poolside redevelopment we are having concepts dawn up for refurbishing the Clubhouse to reflect our classic heritage, and indeed adding 8 or 10 guest rooms. We will bring all of this back for Member feedback in the coming months.

Neilson Hays: Yesterday I popped in to see how the Neilson Hays Library renovations were going. It is a wonderful old building and will be stunning when it re-opens in October.



Welcome back to all who have been away. These are exciting times, come along and use the Club and enjoy the changes as they unfold.



BACK IN '65 Poolside Part 1

Dr. Paddy Dixon (D6) donated a collection of pictures taken at the British Club in 1965 and 1966 when the Swimming Pool was being built. They provide glimpses into a bygone era and a wonderful record of this momentous time in the Club's history. Most of



the images are not of great quality but I am going to share the best over three months because they need to be shown at a reasonable size to be appreciated.




What is now known as the Poolside was originally a tennis club with 8 grass courts, purchased from the Danish-owned Siam Electricity Company in 1919. The swimming pool, Surawongse Sala, changing rooms, kitchen and Squash Court 1 were built on the grass tennis courts 5 and 6, and the pictures here this month show construction underway. There was a soft opening on 12th August 1966.

The first picture shows a view of Courts 1 to 6 down the driveway to Surawongse Road before construction began, and you will note cars parked along the near side of the front lawn as also shown in the second picture. According to Paddy, this would have been where tennis players parked, played their game, then jumped back in and drove off. According to our official Club history, Saturday afternoons were the busiest time on the courts with curry tiffin served on the front lawn and calls of 'Boy, another gin and tonic over here' punctuating play.


Squash was a rapidly growing sport at the time and soon a second court had to be added in 1970 and yet a third in 1981.

The AIA building piercing the skyline on Surawongse Road in picture 6 was one of the first two tall buildings in Bangkok and is still there (not to be confused with the new one next to Club built in the 1980s). The other was the Chokchai building on Sukhumvit Road which featured in one of my pictures in Outpost April 2016.






The Open and The History of the Claret Jug

The Claret Jug, or to use its proper name, the Golf Champion Trophy, is presented to each year's winner of The Open. Yet it is not the original prize. When the Championship began at Prestwick in 1860, the winner was presented with the Challenge Belt, made of rich Moroccan leather, embellished with a silver buckle and emblems.

According to the first rule of the new golf competition: "The party winning the belt shall always leave the belt with the treasurer of the club until he produces a guarantee to the satisfaction of the above committee that the belt shall be safely kept and laid on the table at the next meeting to compete for it until it becomes the property of the winner by being won three times in succession." Sounds like a British Club Golf Committee meeting minute.

In 1870, just 10 years after The Open Championship began, Tom Morris Junior won for the third consecutive time and became the owner of the belt. It was accordingly agreed that the three clubs that were to host the open in future would each contribute 10 pounds towards the cost of a new trophy now commonly known as the Claret Jug made by Mackay Cunningham & Company of Edinburgh. During the half-century in which the original Claret Jug was used, twenty-eight different players held it aloft, including Harry Vardon on a record six occasions.

However Harry Vardon and Jordon Spieth are not the only men to hold the Jug.
