





Domicile - what the Romans did for us!

Fans of Monty Python's 'Life of Brian' may well remember the disgruntled John Cleese character asking his motley crew of rebels, "What did the Romans ever do for us?" The rebels reel off a list of things such as aqueducts, sanitation, roads, and justice, with Cleese's character responding each time, "Well other than that, what did the Romans ever do for us?" Well, they also gave us 'origo' (not a lovely pasta dish but origin/domicile) — a place where you pay your taxes, of course. Domicile of origin has developed since Roman times but, while the British still hold on to this notion tightly, others' nations focus on nationality and citizenship.

Types of domicile

There are three main types of domicile: *origin, dependency and choice* – and just to make things even more complicated, there is also, for tax purposes only, *deemed domicile*. If you are a foreigner living in the UK and are resident for 15 out of the last 20 tax years the UK is your deemed domicile. This means that your worldwide assets become subject to inheritance tax at a current rate of 40% after a paltry exemption.

Thankfully there are exceptions to being taxed at this high rate but first, how do we get our domicile? A child usually takes their father's domicile at birth unless the parents are not married, in which case it is the domicile of the mother that counts. Then, at the age of 16 in England and Wales, a child can choose another domicile – but strangely in Scotland, under the 'emancipation of minors', the age of choice was once 12 for girls and 14 for boys. Clear so far?

Is not always that simple. Women who married before 1 January 1974 took the domicile of their husband whatever country that was but after that date, on marriage they kept their own domicile. A British woman who married, say, an Australian before 1 January 1974 would keep her new Australian marriage domicile even if her husband then pre-deceased her — unless, of course, she decided to change it by choice. This historical anomaly can prove an advantage tax-wise as Australia and other countries don't have inheritance taxes. However, the US said no to this under the UK/US double tax treaty and an American woman is always deemed to have her original domicile, even if married to a Brit before 1 January 1974.

A UK-domiciled person who marries a foreigner is at a disadvantage as he or she can only transfer GBP 325,000 to their foreign spouse tax-free during their lifetime. Anything over that amount is a potentially exempt transfer but would be subject to a tax charge if the British donor spouse dies within seven years of the gift. On the death of the UK-domiciled spouse, any assets left to the foreign spouse will be taxable at 40% over GBP 325,000 or possibly GBP 500,000 if a family home is among the assets. The foreign spouse can elect to be treated as UK-domiciled to prevent this tax charge as the normal inter-spouse exemption would come into play. Sound good? Well no, because on the foreign spouse's death they are taxed on total worldwide assets, whereas before then tax was only imposed on their UK assets, if they had any UK assets. Care needs to be taken with such an election and of course expert advice can ensure tax is managed efficiently!

Know the new rules

Now, by another odd quirk of birth, two children born to a UK-domiciled father could have two different domicile treatments under the new rules brought in from 6 April 2017. Example: father Jack works abroad with his wife in Singapore and they have a son, John, born in the local hospital. A few years later, they are working in an African country when Jack's wife becomes pregnant and for medical reasons, she returns to England where Nicholas is born. Each boy would appear to be treated the same for domicile – but no! Because John was born in Singapore under the new UK domicile rules, if he and his brother make Singapore their permanent home later in life, any return to the UK would have different consequences for each brother.

Say the boys must return to the UK from Singapore to look after their sick mother and, after being there a year and a half, all living in the family home, mother sets the house on fire accidentally one night and they all die. (It's a tragic scenario, but thankfully entirely hypothetical!) Under the new domicile rules, John's estate would pay inheritance tax only on his UK asset, his half share in the burnt-down property. Nick's estate however would pay UK inheritance tax on his half share of the burnt-down home in the UK **and** all his Singapore assets which, like his brother John's, are substantial.

This difference is because Nick was born in the UK – he becomes re-domiciled the year after he returns to UK and his worldwide assets are taxable, while John would have had to be in UK for 15 years before that happened to him. So by an odd quirk of fate, two brothers born of an English father, with domiciles of choice in Singapore but dying in the UK, are treated totally differently tax-wise.

Estate planning like Royalty

Now, what about an Englishman marrying someone from across the pond in America? Prince Harry and Meghan spring to mind. If Meghan predeceases Prince Harry and she leaves her assets to him, the US would impose estate taxes at 40%, there being no marital exemption where the receiving spouse is a foreigner. If both spouses are US citizens, a marital exemption applies. There is relief for US/UK marriages in the form of a US qualified domestic trust known as a qualifying domestic trust (QDOT), but its effectiveness is limited. Maybe this is why it is rumoured that Duchess Meghan is going to take the UK citizenship test.

So even those in exalted circles have to plan to reduce estate tax – and we have the Romans to thank for that!

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

am writing this as I prepare to fly back to Thailand after a wonderful three-week break in England. The highlight was a happy and very rare family reunion in the Peak District to celebrate my brother's 80th birthday. 21 of all 25 surviving Dunford bloodline relatives were present to soak up a sunny weekend in beautiful surroundings with good food, lovely walks and even a beer or three watching cricket at the idyllic Hayfield village cricket ground.

Inevitably cricket was to be a fairly constant theme of my holiday ...

British Club History: I spent one very special afternoon in London with David Barrett of our own cricket section and yet another cricketer Richard Craig. Richard is a lawyer for Prospect Law UK based in Beijing most of the year, but summering in England. He met David when he visited the British Club earlier this year and joined a practice session with the boys. He was made to feel welcome and was thrilled to see his great grandfather's name on our Honours Boards.

Richard Dudley Craig, (Joey) was Chairman of the British Club in 1926 and served with distinction as Director of the Siamese Land Records Department establishing the first Siamese land records. He was awarded both the 3rd Class Order of the Crown of Siam and the Order of the White Elephant and had a




close relationship with King Prajadhipok (Rama 7). He helped the King draft his abdication speech in 1935 following abolition of the absolute monarchy in 1932 and was at his deathbed in Wentworth, Virginia Waters in 1941. According to Richard, King Prajadhipok's abdication speech was used as a model for that of Edward VIII in 1936.

'Joey' was a remarkable man, who was only in his late 20s/ early 30s at the time. Richard shared some amazing movie clips he took in the 1920s. This rare footage included miscellaneous street and klong scenes as well as the Royal Ploughing Ceremony, a train journey to Hua Hin with pictures taken at the Railway Hotel (now the Centara Grand), and Memorial Bridge under construction. It includes events inside several colonial style buildings although sadly none of them appear to have been at the British Club.

The film is not of great quality as was it already badly deteriorating when it was rescued and digitised in 2001. However, David is cleaning it up as best as possible and we plan to make it available to Members in due course together with any more of the story we can piece together

This is all very exciting because as most Members know, the Club lost all of its records when the Japanese military occupied the Clubhouse during WWII. We do do not even know the names of some of Chairmen in the early years and Richard is delving deeper into the family archives to see what else he can discover. He has already unearthed some marvellous photograph albums and is looking for anything that might directly relate to the Club. The

photographs are in excellent condition and we will endeavour to get good quality copies to share in due course. I have included a picture of Richard Dudley Craig and one he took at an elephant round up in Ayutthaya in 1926.

The Hurlingham Club: Another balmy afternoon was spent at the Hurlingham Club which is set in 43 acres of luxuriant landscaped grounds on the banks of the River Thames in Putney, and boasts its own cricket ground. It was a quiet Monday and we were there not there for cricket but to enjoy a lovely lunch on the terrace and then a family game of croquet on one of their amazing 10 croquet lawns. This is surely one of the most impressive of all our 370+ Reciprocal Clubs and highly recommended. British Club Members can take 3 guests (5 weekdays) for up to 14 days a year.



Watching and following Cricket: T20 cricket is not my cup tea, but watching an evening match under floodlights at the Oval in front of a packed house was a fun evening. This was not to be compared however



with attending Lords on the 4th day of the Second Test with fellow member David Dance and watching England notch up another remarkable victory. An amazing birthday present!








"Mike was a news junkie all of his life and a natural journalist and took an active view of a global life"







The British Embassy Bangkok recently welcomed Paul Kaye to Thailand as the new Consul. Paul will lead the Consular team in Bangkok and further afield for the next four years, as they provide essential support to British visitors and residents in Thailand. In this issue of Outpost, we grill Paul a bit on life so far in Thailand and of course Consular work past, present and future.

A bit about Paul 'I bring family with me – I have triplet teenage sons and a South American wife, and they are my most challenging customers – so keeping a work/life balance right is a priority. I've been with the FCO for 10 years, and done 5 jobs (about average for a UK diplomat's early career). Working on the Olympics was one highlight amongst many (I still recall our Close Protection Team clearing Hyde Park Corner of demonstrating taxi drivers by gently tapping on windows with their guns...). My work is a wonderful opportunity to travel too – lasting personal memories from my previous posting in Beijing include 5 days on horseback in Mongolia and visiting the Leaders Gifts Museum in the hills outside Pyongyang.'

Post to Thailand 'Most of Bangkok is very new to us. Our early impressions are really positive – especially the people and the food. My children can't get over the internet bandwidth, after three years of the Great Firewall of China (China has strict firewall protection which makes accesses many websites impossible)... And we are looking forward to really getting to know the country over the next four years. It's a wonderful opportunity.'

Consular in Thailand 'About a million British people visit Thailand every year. We work closely with the Thai government and our other partners here to help British people in need, for example when they become victims of crime, are arrested or hospitalised, or have lost their passport and need to get home. We also provide documentary services, for example some of the paperwork needed for a marriage here or for immigration purposes. Just as important is our focus on preventing things from happening, or getting worse when they do – we are working hard to reduce the number of motorbike accidents that occur, for example, and helping Thai authorities with more training in child protection.'



Present and future Consular work'I come to Bangkok from Beijing, where I looked after Consular issues in 5 very different countries, including North Korea. I'm now leading the biggest and busiest Consular team in the UK's network. The challenges are different but our aims are the same: an excellent Consular service for British Nationals who need it. That will continue to be my team's focus; my own focus in turn is on supporting them so they can deliver this.'

Final word to British community, including tourists and residents, in Thailand 'If you read our travel advice or talk to our team, you will know what I am going to say here. And if you are a British resident in Thailand, you will know this better than me, so this message is more for temporary visitors: most visits to Thailand are trouble-free but things can go wrong. Don't think that because you are here you can get away with stuff you wouldn't be able to do at home –you can't, and if you get into trouble it can be very serious indeed. Do your research on local laws and customs, and respect them. Don't stay longer than your visa allows you to. Subscribe to our Travel Advice, always take out travel insurance, and always wear a helmet!'



with Captain Chris Smith, RAN Australian Defence Attaché Bangkok



aptain Chris Smith joined the Royal Australian Navy in 1989, graduating from the Australian Defence Force Academy. On completion of Seaman Officer training, he served as an Officer of the Watch on a number of vessels ranging from survey ships to guided missile frigates. On transferring to Naval Aviation, he received his Aviation Warfare Officer wings in 1996 and served in embarked Seahawk Flights in HMA Ships SYDNEY and MELBOURNE, completing a tour conducting maritime interception operations in the Northern Arabian Gulf in HMAS MELBOURNE in 1999.

Commencing a loan posting to the Royal Navy, Captain Smith qualified on Lynx Mk 8 anti-surface warfare helicopters and served in the embarked Lynx Flight in HMS MONTROSE, including a tour of duty in West Africa flying in support of the International Military Assistance in Sierra Leone in 2001. Assuming duties as a Lynx Flight Commander from 2002, he served as a Flight Commander in HMS MARLBOROUGH for the Iraq Conflict in 2003, flying combat sorties in support of the Al Faw campaign.

Captain Smith returned to Australia in 2004 as a Lieutenant Commander, and instructed Pilots, Aviation Warfare Officers and Aircrewmen prior to serving as Executive Officer of HMAS STIRLING, the RAN major Fleet Base in Western Australia, from 2006.

In 2008 he completed Korean language training and was the Assistant Defence Attaché in Seoul from 2009-2012. On return to Australia as a Commander in 2013 he worked within International Policy Division, responsible for Defence engagement with China, South Korea, North Korea and Mongolia. Captain Smith assumed duties as Defence Attaché to Thailand in December 2016.

In addition to his Bachelor of Science in Oceanography and Mathematics, he has a Master of Arts in Strategy and Policy, a Master of Management Studies in Leadership, and a Master of Business. Captain Smith was awarded a Navy Silver Commendation for his extended tenure as acting Defence Attaché in Seoul in 2009, and the US Army Commendation Medal for his service with the United Nations Command in the Republic of Korea. Captain Smith is a graduate of the Thai National Defence College.

He married Marika whilst serving with the Royal Navy in the United Kingdom, and has two daughters, Isabella (19) and Teah (14), and a son, Roman (11). Isabella will graduate from the Australian Defence Force Academy in December 2018. Previously a keen rugby player, he hung up his boots in 2002 but has enthusiastically taken up a spectating role.


look forward to reading about in next month's edition if you were unfortunate enough not to experience it first-hand.

On the day Flight A winner was the ever consistent Varghese Rose while the Flight B winner was Neil Davis who narrowly edged out Brian Brook on count back.




