

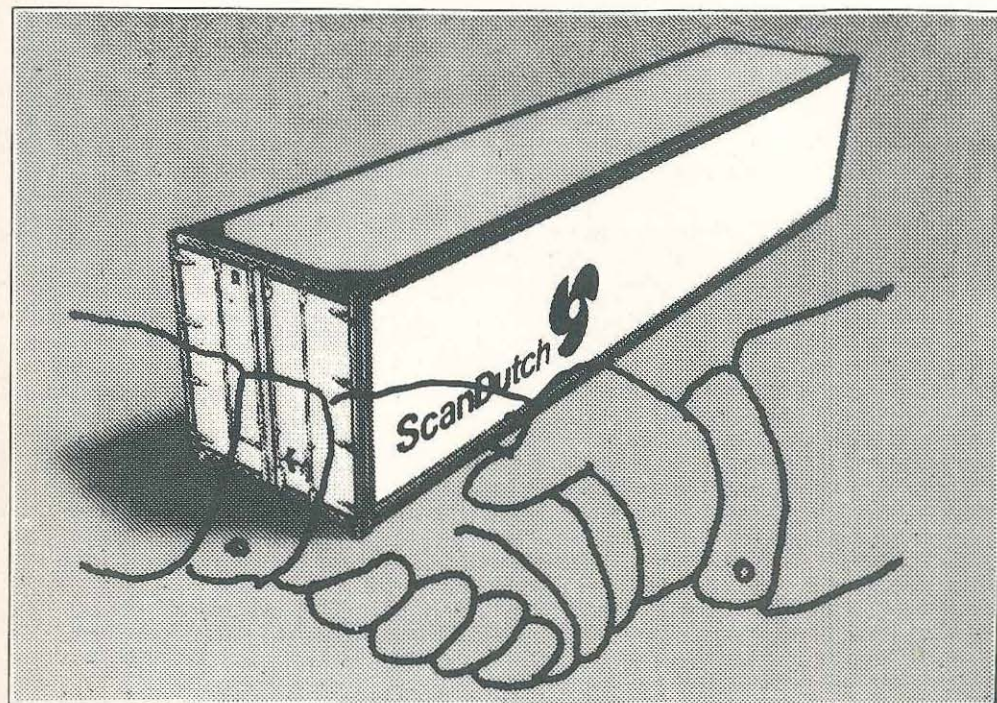

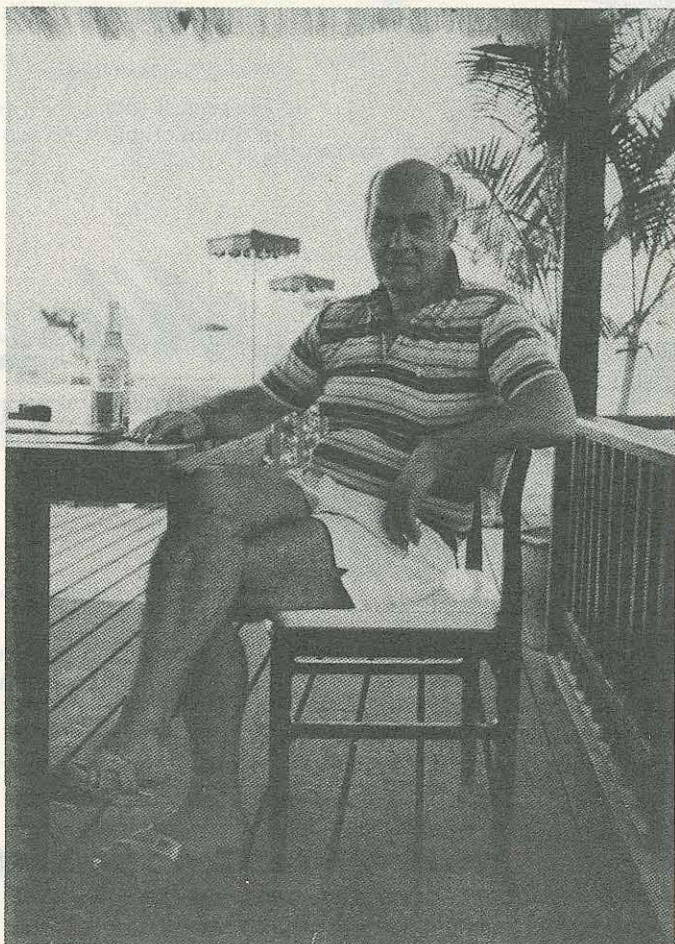

HAROLD MERCER

It was with great sadness that Members learnt of the sudden death of Harold Mercer on 2nd September whilst swimming in the sea during a long weekend with his family in Phuket. Harold, 54 years old, came to Bangkok only last year but having joined the Club immediately on arrival had soon become a familiar and most popular face. Harold was a gentle and amiable man with a kind sense of humour. He enjoyed playing squash, especially against his prettier female opponents, dabbled at snooker, swam regularly and was usually somewhere around with his wife Phoebe, always ready for a chat and a joke with anybody and everybody. Harold was an enthusiastic Club Member and was becoming increasingly involved as Secretary of the Squash Section and in helping to edit and produce Outpost. The Club has lost a very good friend.



Harold was cremated in advance of a funeral/memorial service held at Christ Church on 7th September. The Club sent a floral tribute on behalf of the membership and the service was attended by a large gathering of Members and friends, many of whom returned afterwards to the Club for a quiet reception with his family. Harold above all was family man and it was most fitting that his son Chris gave the following address during the service.

"William Harold Mercer was born on the 15th February 1932 in Oldham, Lancashire.

As a boy he was very shy and had a stammer. Nevertheless he excelled at sports and long distance running in particular. He was a keen cyclist. Youth Hosteller, fell runner, stamp collector and above all, Boy Scout, starting in Cubs and from King's Scout progressing to Rovers and then Scout-leader with the Air Scouts.

Grandson of a Lay Preacher, his family had a close relationship with the church. He developed a strong moral conviction and warmth and kindness to those around him. Combining this with a strong sense of fair play, he gained many loyal friends.

Apart from his activities with Royton Harriers and the Boy Scouts, and despite his shyness, he met and courted Phoebe Knepel, his one and only true love. They married in June 1954 while he was an Engineering Apprentice with Platt Brothers in Oldham. Encouraged by his family he took an external University of London degree which he gained in 1956. Immediately afterwards he was called up for National Service. He chose the RAF and served in Canada and the UK, completing his service lecturing at the RAF college, Henlow.

During this time I (Chris) was born and he moved his family to Lincoln where he took up the position of Technical Manager with Rose Bearings of Saxilby.

These 12 years at Rose saw his managerial capability and skills blossom and his self confidence increased dramatically. Three daughters followed: Helen, Ann and Lisa - a strong and happy family to whom he was entirely devoted.

In 1968 he became General Manager of Rose Forgrove which was by then a division of Baker Perkins. The company flourished and grew under his leadership and

Harold became involved in the early hovercraft projects and even Concord. His workers and colleagues and families found solidarity in the Sports Club where Harold regularly lost at snooker. He was loved and respected by all at Rose, many of whom left when he left in 1971, and many of whom rated amongst his close friends until his death.

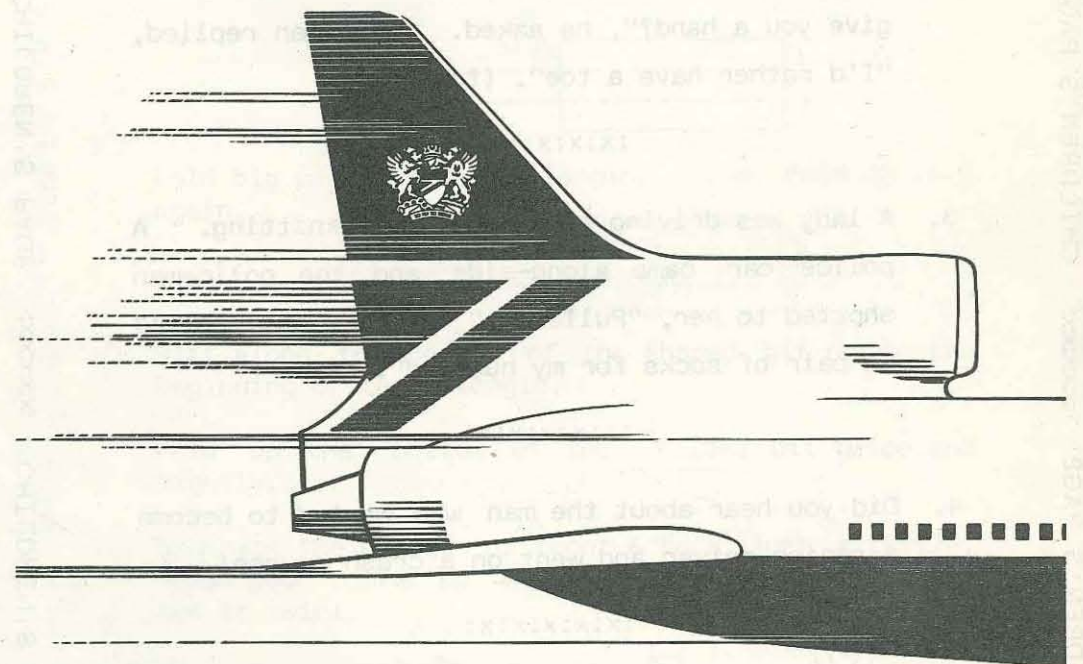
The 1970's were spent in Scarborough with his family growing up under his relaxed but firm guidance. Having developed and honed his technical skills at a subsidiary of Reed International, he joined Dak Electric at Filey as Training Officer. He was transferred here to Bangkok in 1984 and immediately began to enjoy the atmosphere and hospitality of the country, and his new social and sports life. His warmth, honesty and kindness won him many friends and his sense of humour was enjoyed by all, not least his family whom he saw regularly.

It was during his last family gathering, on a warm sunny morning in Phuket, that he died, surrounded by his family in the country he had grown to love.

His memorial stone will read, "Here was a man - and we loved him".

Harold's ashes rest behind that memorial plaque in the "Garden of Remembrance" at Christ Church in Convent Road. The British Club extends its deepest sympathy to Phoebe and her family for their tragic loss.

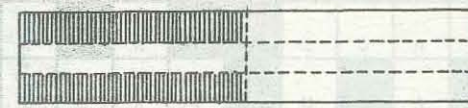

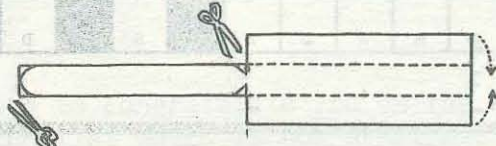
: TO MAKE A PAPER HELICOPTER :

S.C. BAKER

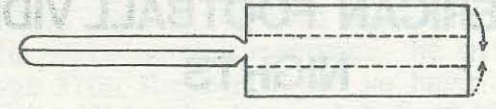
Take an oblong piece of paper about 5x7 (or 3x5). Crease in half on the long side, re-open. Crease in 3 on the short side, open out.



Cut or tear off shaded parts. Round off the single end as below, snip out a triangle.



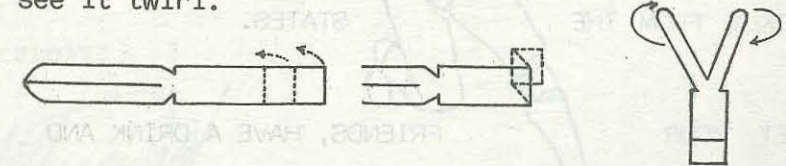
Fold big part in 3 overlapping, then fold it in 3 again.



Slit along the centre of the shaped bit up to the beginning of the triangle.

Fold up the bottom of the folded bit twice and tightly.

Separate the blades to front & back just a little. Throw your copter up into the air heavy end first & see it twirl.



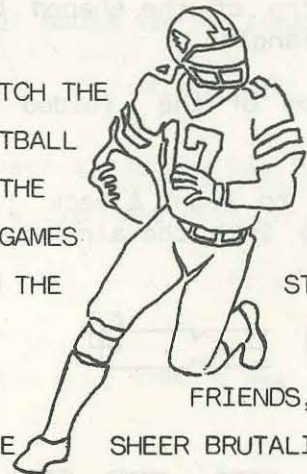

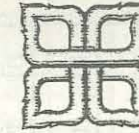

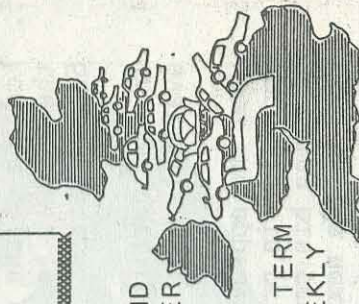

A New Procedure for Prospective Associate Members

The new rule changes governing Associate Membership are an attempt to promote a wider and more active use of the Club. Towards this objective the Membership Sub-Committee was asked to prepare a new procedure for the entry of Associate Members into the Club. This procedure has now been approved by the main Committee.

Although this procedure does not form a part of the Constitution, Rules and Bylaws of the British Club, it is considered essential that the membership should be made fully aware of the steps to be taken in recommending an individual for Associate Membership. These new approved procedures are as follows:-

Ordinary Members of the Club, in good standing, may recommend an individual for Associate Membership.

This recommendation should be made in the following way:-

1. Completion of a "Recommendation for Associate Membership" form, by the ordinary member.
2. Attachment to the "form" of a brief personnel and professional resumé prepared by the prospective associate member, along with a clear indication of the level of intended Club usage.
3. Lodging of the completed "form" and "attachment(s)" with the Manager (office) for the attention of the Membership Sub-Committee.
4. Initial vetting of the "recommendation" at the next available main committee meeting.
5. Upon the approval by the main committee of the recommendation in principle, the ordinary member is invited to bring his prospective associate member to the British Club on the next available main committee night (1st or 3rd Tuesday of the month) to meet as many members of the main committee as possible.
6. The prospective associate member(s) is then voted upon at the next available main committee meeting.

During the last extraordinary general meeting, a question from the floor enquired how the Committee proposed to increase the numbers of Associates. The answer to this is that now we have rectified Rules 42 and 43, and now that we have a new set of procedures outlining the steps to be taken in recommending an individual, it is incumbent upon the membership to introduce prospective members who they feel will use the facilities and enhance the atmosphere of the Club.

Already we are evidencing an increase in Associate Membership - interest from those who have heard of the club's new policy. I would now call upon the membership to take advantage of this policy and help ensure, along with your committee, that this very important rule change which was unanimously agreed to at the last AGM is fully capitalised upon.

"Recommendation for Associate Membership" forms are available from the Club office now.

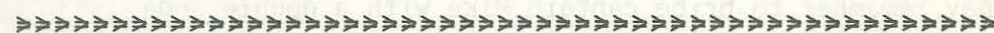

There is much speculation as to who has left Thailand or is about to leave, who is coming back, who is coming back, who is going to be captain of the different clubs, and who certain individuals intend playing for.

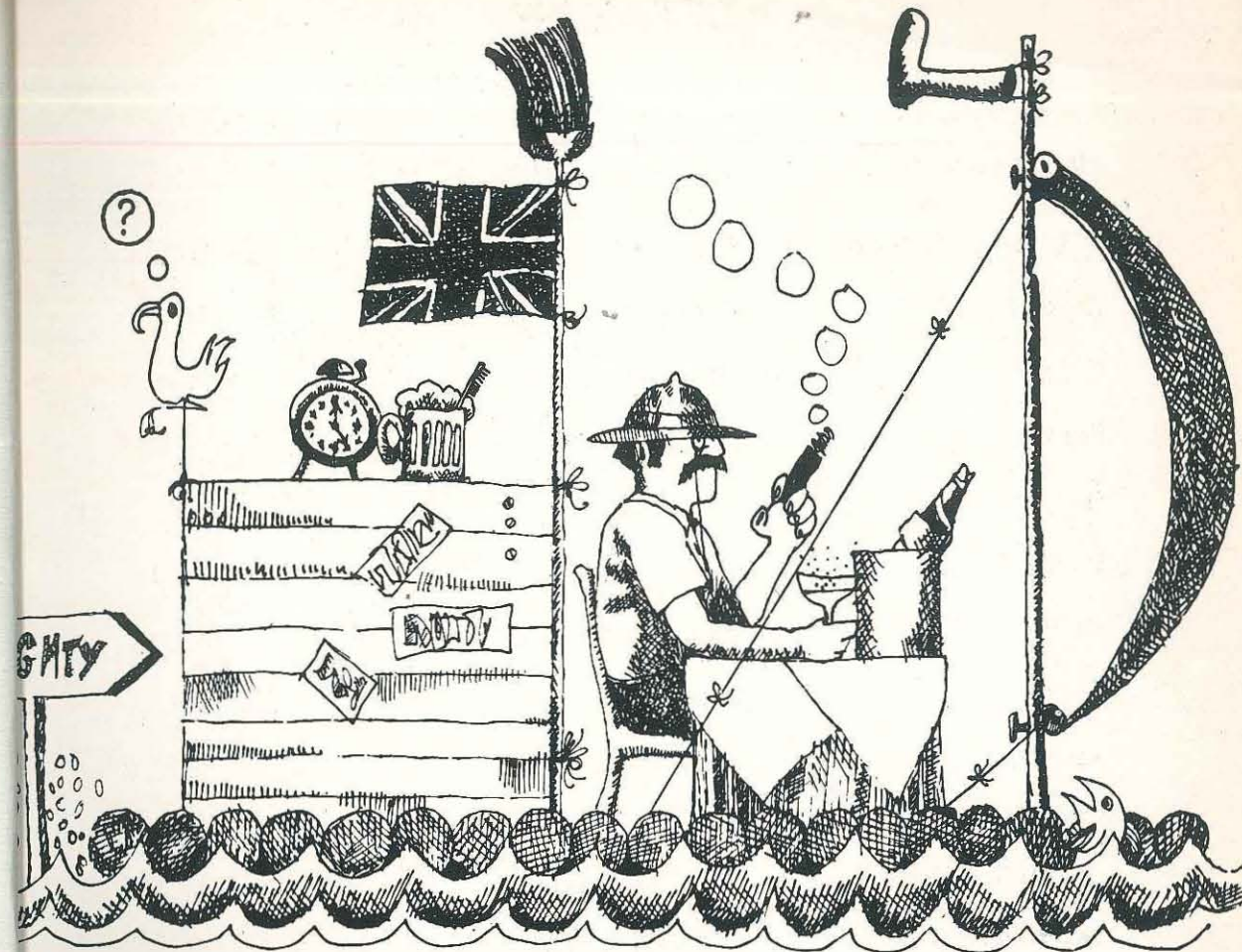
