
Mr. Anthony Wright


The season will see the welcome return of the 25 Over League to complement the 50 Over








Excellent turnouts







Total eclipse of the sun

Once in a blue moon...

n Tuesday 24th October there will be a total eclipse of the sun which will be visible from much of the eastern hemisphere. We in Thailand are lucky enough to be in the direct path of this rare and spectacular event.

Throughout history, solar eclipses have inspired awe, fear and reverence. Ancient civilisations like the Incas took an eclipse to be a sign from the gods. Nowadays, this celestial spectacle is treated as an object of scientific study, but it's still breathtakingly magnificent to watch. For those interested in this remarkable phenomenon, this is my nontechnical summary of a NASA Eclipse Bulletin.

Path of the Eclipse

The path of the moon's umbral shadow¹ will trace a path from the Middle to the Far East; starting in Iran at sunrise, passing through Afghanistan and Pakistan and into northern

India within an hour, travelling at a speed of 2.255 km/second and broadening in width. In Burma, the path reaches 61km across and the eclipse lasts up to 1 minute 30secs. Rangoon

will see only a partial eclipse, being 100km south of the path.

There should be great views from the Ganges delta, as Indian skies are usually clearer than ours at this time of the year. Odds are 85-90% for good visibility there compared to 50% in Thailand and Cambodia. However, totality² will last longer in the latter countries.

An hour and a half after first sighting, the umbra will enter Thailand just south of Mae Sot. Slowing down to a speed of 0.73km/ second as the sun rises, the umbral shadow will be travelling southeast over Nakhon Sawan and Pak Chong (south west of Nakhon Ratchasima) crossing the Cambodian border west of Sam Rong. Due to its relatively narrow width, few cities lie in the path of the shadow; however, Nakhon Sawan stands out as the place to be, with an eclipse duration of 1 minute 45secs and an umbra 68km wide. In Cambodia, Angkor Wat will have a marvellous view of the total eclipse lasting 1 minute 48sec, as will Siem Reap. From there, the umbra crosses Vietnam, passing 100km north of Ho Chi Minh City, and out across the South China Sea, touching the northern tip of Borneo before swinging eastward between the Philippines and New Guinea, end0

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ing at sunset over the Pacific Ocean. At greatest eclipse, duration will be 2 minutes 10secs. A partial eclipse will be visible within the much broader path of the moon's penumbral shadow³, which

includes most of Asia and Australia.

Bangkok lies 140km south of the umbral path, so we will only get to see a partial eclipse of 0.957 magnitude (i.e. 95.7% of the sun's diameter will be obscured by the moon). And that's if it's fairly cloudless, which unfortunately is unlikely, as we are situated in a river valley and at the tail end of the rainy season. To improve your chances of seeing

Nakhon Sawan is the place to be

something special, head north/northeast: the air is less polluted and inland skies tend to be clearer.

The Sky at Totality - things to look for

When the eclipse enters the 'total' phase, the sky will darken rapidly, resembling twilight about half an hour after sunset. This is a great opportunity to view planets and bright stars in the daytime sky, given clear sky conditions. Venus (the brightest planet

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A great opportunity to view planets during the day

) will be located 17 deg. east of the sun, and will be almost unmissable. Jupiter is well-placed at 42 deg. east of the sun, and it may be possible to spot it several minutes before totality. Mercury is 18 deg. west of the sun and another easy target. Many important stars will also be visible.

Saros Series 143

The total eclipse this month is the twenty-second member of Saros series 143, a family of 72 partial and total eclipses which began in 1617 AD and is due to end on the April 23rd 2897. Note that this eclipse is the twelfth and last total eclipse of Saros series 143.

Safety first!

Mind your eyes!! The sun can only be viewed with the naked eye during the brief seconds of totality. Even if 99% of the sun's surface is obscured, the remaining crescent is intensely bright and cannot be viewed safely without eye protection, like specialised filters. The invisible infra-red rays cause the most damage, so even though it doesn't feel 'sore', it doesn't mean you aren't permanently damaging your eyes.

For photographers: never look through the lens without using a mylar or glass solar filter during partial phases. A low to medium speed film is recommended (50 to 100) and a zoom

of around 200mm+ gives good results. If you have a point-and-shoot camera with 35mm lens, try photographing the ground under nearby shade trees during the partial phases - the gaps between the leaves act like pinhole cameras and each one projects its own tiny image of the sun

(don't forget to turn the flash off!).

A total eclipse happens once in a blue moon - don't sleep through this one!


- 1 Umbra shadow cast by the moon upon the earth during a total solar eclipse

Recipe

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Trifle

he recipe for this all-time favourite dessert comes from a friend of mine, and I can attest to its absolute deliciousness. Trifles are deceptively easy to make, so I would highly recommend trying this one if you want to spoil the family. It has been adapted slightly for ingredients actually available here in Bangkok.

Ingredients:

- 1 medium sized Pound Cake
- Seedless Raspberry Jam
- 1 cup of broken biscuits (amaretti or you can find biscuits topped with almond slivers in Villa)
- 1 cup of Marsala wine, plus a little extra for diluting the almond essence
- Frozen raspberries (thawed- about a cup) optional

For the sauce:

- 3 tblsp sugar
- 1 1/2 tblsp. cornstarch
- 3 egg yolks
- · 2 1/2 cups of milk
- 1 teasp real vanilla extract

Topping:

- 2 cups of heavy whipping cream (try to avoid the UHT cream if possible since it takes a long time to thicken here in Bangkok)
- 1-2 tblsp of icing sugar
- 1/2 1 teasp almond essence

Method

Cut the cake into slices - not too thick - and poke with a fork. Sprinkle some almond essence diluted with some Marsala wine lightly over the cake. Spread the jam thinly on both sides. Cut into cubes.

Crumple the biscuits into crumbs. Add some Marsala and almond essence to the crumbs, and toss into a bowl with the cake cubes. Add the cup of Marsala wine gradually to the mixture to ensure that it is quite moist. If you have the raspberries, add a little of their juice to the mixture.

Over the layer of the mixture, place a thin layer of raspberries (optional)

Making the Sauce

(like Creme Anglaise or Custard)

Whisk the sugar, cornstarch and egg yolks together until pale yellow in colour. In a saucepan heat the milk with the vanilla extract. When hot but not boiling, slowly add the egg mixture, stirring continuously. Keep on very low heat for about 6 minutes stirring continuously until the mixture begins to thicken. (Tip:- the best way of checking this is on the back of a wooden spoon. Dip the spoon in the mixture and run your finger down the back. If the channel of the mixture does not refill then it is ready). Make sure you do not allow it to boil or you will have scrambled eggs instead of a thickened Creme Anglaise.

Allow to cool and pour over the trifle.

Making the Cream Topping

Beat the cream until thick (can stand up in peaks), adding the icing sugar and almond essence near the end. After the trifle has stood for a few hours, add the cream topping and decorate.

You can also add some decorative raspberries or strawberries if available.

Leave to cool in the refrigerator.

Note: It can be eaten within a few hours but improves after a day or two as the ingredients, especially the Marsala, sugar and almond essence combine, giving a much better taste.
