

BRITISH CLUB 60 VS BANGKOK JAPANESE 17

When 33 players turn up for a fifteen-man game, selection will always be interesting! This was in fact the case when the BC Brains Trust selected their starting fifteen against Bangkok's oldest expatriate side at a friendly played at the Royal Thai Police Stadium on Sunday, 17 August.

Whilst the Japanese had been warming up for an hour prior to the scheduled 4pm kick off time, the "bulk" of the BC team arrived at 3:53pm precisely to be surprised at the number of players assembled. For the avoidance of doubt, "bulk" included Captain Eddie Evans and Vice Captain Morca McConnell. Whilst Team Manager Ben Knowles would not qualify as bulk these days, he was amongst the band of merry men to arrive perilously close to the kick off time. After a hasty hand out of team kit and agreement with referee, David Vicars, to three periods of 20 minutes with free flowing substitutions, the game duly kicked off at 4:10pm. Despite heavy overnight rain, the pitch held up well. During the first twelve minutes of the opening period, the sides were evenly matched before Lo broke through the Japanese line for a converted try, this was followed by a try from Bim in the fourteenth minute and the BC had opened up a 12:0 lead. The Japanese responded with a converted try followed by a try in the last three minutes to leave the scores level at 12:12 at the end of the first period.

With some rotational changes made for the second period of twenty minutes, the BC immediately started to apply pressure through the forwards leading to a five-metre line-out, and sustained pressure led to a try in the twenty-sixth minute by the afternoon's flyer on the wing, Chay. But the BC were reined in again, as five minutes later the Japanese responded with a try and the scores were level at 17:17.

The crowd, which comprised a small number of injured BC Stards (surprisingly Trevor Day's nose was not broken), wives, children plus a stray dog who at one point appeared to want to replace referee Mr. Vicars, were then treated to the first of two marvellous break-away tries from that menace from Canada, that Captain Marvellous, our one and only Eddie Evans. 0

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Having displayed his WWF skills earlier in the Season in Phuket, these were replaced by shear skill as the big fellah broke through the Japanese line, opened his rather large legs and showed the crowd his class as he headed for the line. Having taken the ball from 30 metres out, there was a complete look of surprise when, with 10 metres to go to the line, he realised that he had absolutely no support which must have kept him going as he touched down beneath the posts. By the close of the second period the BC were leading 24:17.

From early on in the third period, the BC pack started to drive into their opposite numbers and two quick ties followed taking the score out to 34:17.

In the fifty-second minute, Eddie Evans was

again surprised to find himself with the ball in the loose, this time a massive 35 metres from the try line. Now full of confidence, and encouraged by the stray dog barking in full support from the touch line, Eddie sold the Japanese midfield a superb dummy and straightened for the line. He again looked for support and the cupboard was bare! He found what was needed in his legs to complete a remarkable move and proved that if a South African prop can run in one try from the loose, he was never going to be out done by a Yarpy remember Port Elizabeth 1995! The score was now 41:17. Eddie was then heard to gloat to his Vice Captain ... "you know, this centre position is not all what it is cracked up to be!"

With the opposition having only 4 substitutes,

despite a valiant effort, time started to tell in some tired legs and the BC backs began to have their say, going over the line on 3 more occasions before the final whistle.

The final tally was 60-17. Whilst a victory was earned, the score-line may flatter somewhat as we were in a position of strength with an excess of 10 substitutes.

After the teams had shaken hands, said their thanks and had their respective photo sessions, the Japanese were seen to be either going into an equally long warm down period as they had for their warm up or were getting in some quick additional practice in advance of the commencement of the Bangkok League in mid September. In any case, we thank the Bangkok Japanese for the game and look forward to meeting them again during the Bangkok League. On that note, the TRU League kicks off on Sunday, 14 September, and continues for the following 6 weekends. 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

AND MORE FROM PAUL...

THIS IS A BRITISH DEMOCRACY!

A response from Paul Cheesman (C267) to "Towards more effective Governance", published in September's Outpost.

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PREAMBLE

May I first of all thank Commander Ian Webb RN for his article on changing the club's constitution. Over the past half decade it has been rare that anyone save David Turner and myself has shown any constructive interest in the matter. Ian has pointed out that the past two General Committees have been seemingly ineffective, and failed to deliver a lead, and this has consequently not done the club any good. I would actually go so far as to say that it is actively doing the club ill ... if you fail to move forward in today's rapidly changing society, you are actually moving backward.

Whilst I feel Ian has identified the symptoms of our woes, I feel that he has wrongly diagnosed the cause, and hence has prescribed a totally unworkable, and highly dangerous solution. A solution that could, I fear, end up with the dissolution of this club we love so dear.

DEMOCRACY

The paramount 'giveaway' as to why I fear his solution is dangerous is the statement "Democracy is important but it has to be properly directed", and then follows a solution that undermines hundreds of years of British democracy and does to the British Club what the European Constitution will do to Britain.

At all times our Committee/Board, Chairman and even GM, must be 100% accountable to the membership, and it was this basic failure that has lead us to our present state. Without dwelling too much on the past our Membership democratically voted at an EGM in 2001 (endorsed at the subsequent AGM) a development motion that was totally ignored by one Chairman and part of that committee, the resulting impasse has brought us close to the end of two years of virtual inactivity and underlying air of mistrust between some members.

We are a British Democratic Club, and must stay as such – but that being said if the ball is now rolling on constitutional change let us grab it with both hands and bring this club into the 21st Century.

THE STATED SOLUTION

A General Committee chosen by all the people but "with no executive powers", a directly-elected Chairman of ten years membership, a Board of Governors of at least Twenty-years membership "elected for life" and all the work done by co-opted members. This sounds as democratic as the establishment of the Soviet Union, and of equal status with the teachings of Mao Tse Tung as contained in his 'Little Red Book'.

In a club where 20% of our membership rotates annually, and where most members of twentyyears membership are well into their sixties, we would end up with a Politburo which would have to meet in the Disabled Toilet and a club which can go from one extreme direction to another upon the ballot for one person as Executive Chairman. Our forefathers chose a committee system for good reason – if it works democratically it can give leadership and stability at the same time but ONLY if it works democratically.

A NEW SOLUTION

Taking the best of Ian's ideas, may I put forward an alternative model that could bring about change without throwing away democracy ... Directly Elected Officers, Directly Elected Committee, Establishment of Portfolio Sub-Committees, a monthly Forum and the widening of the franchise of Associate members, and of Spouses.

MEMBERS LETTER

DIRECTLY ELECTED OFFICERS

The establishment of five officer posts – Chairperson, two Vice-Chairpersons, Treasurer and Secretary – with constitutionally defined duties, to be elected for periods of one year, and eligible to stand for no more than three terms. These officers would be elected from Ordinary members who stand and would have authority, upon consultation with the Committee, to make decisions, lead the club forward on the 'manifesto' that they publish ahead of election, and be directly accountable for club finances, club personnel and development matters.

The spending limits which exist now only as committee guidance will be put into the constitution such that any single project over (say) 3 Million Baht required members' approval.

DIRECTLY ELECTED COMMITTEE

A newly defined Committee of up to six persons of which:

- (i) One must be from the Under-Thirty Years Old membership Group
- (ii) One must be from the Senior (over 60) membership Group
- (iii) At least one of which must be active in a Sports Section
- (iv) At least two must be female and two male
- (v) Two can be Associate members

This Committee is there to give views on matters of consequence to the officers, will deal with disciplinary matters (if any) and take the lead on Portfolio Sub-committees.

Both Officers and Committee are subject to existing rules on EGMs etc. thus membership can "call them in" if things are not moving forward.

PORTFOLIO SUB-COMMITTEES

To cover the often mind-numbing detail and tedium of everyday club life, there would be subcommittees to cover Maintenance, Food & Beverage, Membership recruitment, Communications and individual ones for each Sports section. Any member (associate or otherwise) can join these sub-committees and their decisions would be ratified by the Officers.

MONTHLY FORUM

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With power comes responsibility so the Officers would hold an open Forum each month to allow any member to come and raise a point or ask a question. The Forum would be limited to sixty minutes and all matters raised would be minuted and placed on the club notice board.

WIDENING OF THE FRANCHISE

Our club was founded as a British Club and the first six articles of our constitution define who we are both as a club and in the eyes of the Thai Civil & Commercial Code and I fear grave danger in

tampering with these concepts too much.

However, the two loudest areas of complaint I heard when Club Secretary was that Associate Members (who are members only by invitation) and Spouses of members had no voice and no role in the club - in fact some spouses went as far as swapping membership with their husbands in order to get heard.

If we are to look at totally changing the nature of our club then that must be a long-term objective, and be very carefully considered and it is clearly outside the parameters of this article. In the short term, however, there should consider two relaxations of existing rules and procedures ...

Attendance: Associate members and spouses of members should be allowed to attend and speak at club meeting, even AGMs. Voting will still be restricted to 'the Member'.

Involvement: Associate members can be elected to committee and be involved in the portfolio sub-committees.

MOVING FORWARD

We have a great club. It has survived the thirties economic slump (and one in the nineties), occupation by a foreign power in the forties, the building of the Swimming Pool (very contentious in the sixties), the allowing of females into Membership (very contentious in the eighties), and long may it continue to serve the needs of the 3,000 or so members, spouses and kids for the next hundred years. I put this paper forward for discussion as a means of moving us forward to 2103!

A big thank-you to all those who turned out to play for the British Club. We look forward to more victories in our remaining matches this year.



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

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

ALL ABOUT WOMEN

It's one of those things that women tend to leave to the boys, but the girls are fast catching up.

Until recently heart attacks, strokes and deep vein thrombosis were considered to be problems that only men suffered, but they are becoming leading causes of illness in women too. As women take on more roles outside the home like combining a career with the more traditional roles of caring for children, and perhaps a husband, they are increasing their risk of succumbing to what have previously been considered men's health problems.

The incidence of women suffering from all kinds of vascular conditions, especially the silent killer of a heart attack is increasing. Some of these women will need to have major surgery to repair the damage. In 2002 there were over 2000 coronary bypass operations



performed in Thailand and the number is increasing every year. Although the majority of those will be performed on men, many women are in need of this surgery. More worrying is that women who have a heart attack are less likely than men to survive the initial event - and even if they do survive, they are more likely to die within a year. Women's symptoms tend to be slightly different from those of men, women experience angina more commonly than do men, and they may respond differently to treatment. The condition that most people call a heart attack is known by doctors and nurses as Coronary Artery Disease or CAD.

What then is CAD? The heart is covered with a fan of arteries that supply it with the blood and oxygen that it needs to keep on working. These arteries are narrow and easily blocked by substances like cholesterol, and become narrowed and hardened by poisons contained in tobacco smoke. The first indication of damaged cardiac arteries is a condition known as ' angina' this is a sign that your heart's arteries are already suffering damage from fatty deposits and cigarette smoke and that the process that leads to coronary artery disease has already started.

Angina is felt as an intense pain in the chest, spreading to the neck and lower jaw, it comes on suddenly, without warning. It is severe enough to stop any activity that you may be doing. With a few minutes rest it will ease. But CAD and angina are signs that the body's other small arteries are suffering the same damage. The arteries of the feet and legs are more often affected.

Younger women have some protection against vascular disease, as oestrogen seems to protect them from developing peripheral vascular disease and CAD. However, after the menopause and certainly after the age of 60 years women have a greatly increased risk. So much so that they overtake men in the risk stakes, as women live longer than men, and as the population ages, more and more women will develop these debilitating conditions.

There are some things that can be done to reduce the risk of worsening CAD and peripheral vascular disease. The first and most important is to stop smoking. Cigarette smoking accounts for twenty percent of all cardiovascular deaths. So quitting will go a long way to reducing your risk.

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Now we all need to eat some cholesterol, but foods that are saturated in fats and cholesterol will raise the levels in the blood. This increase will eventually form plugs and shut off the circulation to the heart or to the legs. A 10% increase over normal blood cholesterol levels gives a twenty per cent increased risk.

Salt intake is a major factor in increasing blood pressure, and a high blood pressure has been proved, beyond doubt, to increase the risk of a stroke, and many other conditions. There are no symptoms of high blood pressure, that's why it is important to have it checked at least once a year.

Exercise will help you stay healthy. As little as three ten-minute bouts of activity will reduce your risk of heart attack by up to 40%. Also take time to relax, listen to some soothing

music, read a book, meditate, or simply breath deeply, with your eyes closed in a quiet room. There is increasing evidence to implicate stress in your job or home life as a risk factor in heart disease.

Heart and vascular diseases take years to develop, often starting in early childhood. Parents have the responsibility to ensure their children have a

healthy diet, take plenty of exercise and are discouraged from smoking. Get a checkup, good advice for everyone no matter what your age! But it is especially so if you have any of the risk factors or have a relative who suffered or died from a stroke,



peripheral vascular disease or CAD. If this describes you then you too could be at risk.

Until recently the diagnosis of peripheral vascular disease and CAD meant invasive techniques, or long and complicated investigations that often took some time to complete. Now a new procedure to assess your risk of suffering from a stroke or a heart attack, is available in Bangkok. This non-invasive screening is over in just minutes and is available at the BNH Hospital, in Convent Road.

TEE UP AND TEA CUPS IN SRI LANKA!

Sri Lanka had been on our list of "places to visit" for a long time when our friends Mohd and Lorna Ali suggested recently that we make a trip together, so we readily agreed.

For the Ali's it was a nostalgic trip as they had lived in Colombo from 1985 to 1988 when he had been the country manager for Malaysian Airlines. The current lull in hostilities between government forces and the Tamil Tigers, coming after twenty years of sectarian strife, provided an opportunity for Pauline and I to fulfill a wish and for our friends to renew old acquaintances. Sri Lankan Airlines flight UL423 took off from Don Muang on 28 August with a full complement of passengers. The 3-hour flight to Colombo across southern Thailand, the Andaman Sea and the Bay of Bengal was smooth and comfortable in an Airbus A330. The slight aroma of curries emanating from the galleys giving just a hint of gastronomic pleasures to come. We arrived at 11.00 p.m. local time.

Visas are given on arrival and without charge. Thai Baht can be exchanged for Sri Lankan Rupee's at Colombo airport. The departure tax is R1, 500 per person (= Baht 750 Aug '03).

DAY ONE.

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After 4 hours sleep, we got up and headed out to the golf course! Imagine the struggle that would have entailed if the visit had been a business trip and the first appointment had been at 6.30 a.m.!

The Royal Colombo Golf Club, established in 1879, was designed and built by a British railway engineer and is reputedly the second oldest golf course "East of Suez". This was a man who clearly loved his work and his sport equally because he managed to combine them in a most unusual way. Running through the middle of the golf course is the railway track! For the uninitiated it can be somewhat disconcerting to be teeing up and then having to wait as a sixcarriage diesel powered locomotive, with passengers hanging out of every door and window, and others sitting on the roof, ploughs down the fairway!

It is also possible that our railway engineer had been into the toddy during the design stage because the clubhouse is built at the end of the 8th fairway, not the 9th. So you play 8 holes, stop for drinks and then go out and play 10 more. That evening our gracious Sri Lankan friends invited us to the "Golden Mile" - a beach area south of Colombo dotted with clubs and restaurants where we enjoyed excellent food and convivial company, all the time fanned by a fresh breeze coming off the sea.

By 11.00 p.m. our beds were calling but little did we know we still had some excitement to come! Between the beach restaurant and the car park lies a double railway line. As our party of 12 persons (ranging from toddler to octogenarian) was negotiating the tracks young Zariq shouts "Train coming, train coming!" We just managed to scramble clear as a train thundered round a bend leaving our party split on each side of the tracks. We learned later that trains in and around Colombo have killed more than 30 people so far this year. The odd crossing gate and some audio visual warnings should certainly help to lower the casualty rate.

DAY TWO.

We are off to the hill station of Nuwara Eliya. Situated at 6,200 feet above sea level and set against a beautiful backdrop of mountains, valleys, waterfalls and tea plantations Nuwara Eliya – the "Little England" of Sri Lanka is supposed to be one of the coolest places on the island. Evidence of the British influence remains in the race track (although there is no horse racing today), the Hill Club (now a hotel), country cottages with chimneys, Queen Ann style mansions and the Nuwara Eliya Golf Club.

DAY THREE.

We made a courtesy call on the secretary of the Golf Club. The previous day there had been a golf tournament organised by Sri Lankan Airlines and the town was full of golfers and dignitaries from Colombo and the surrounding areas. In spite of having "partied" until 2.00 a.m. Mr. L.H.C.(Clive) Tissera was "on duty" and kindly agreed to receive us. Now close to his seventies Mr. Tissera, a retired professional Tea Plantation Manager, has been a member of the club for 53 years first as a member then committee member, trustee and now secretary following his retirement from the tea industry. Nuwara Eliya Golf Club celebrated its Centenary in 1989. It was founded during the Easter Week of 1889 by golfing enthusiasts of a detachment of the Gordon Highlanders



stationed in the island at the time. In 1891 the first Championship of the Island was played at Nuwara Eliya and the Men's and Ladies Championships continue to be played here in alternate years.

The Club also features a badminton hall, a billiard room, library and 11 well-appointed bedrooms with attached bathrooms.

It was now late morning and time to head down to Mount Vernon Estate where we have been invited to lunch by Tarique and Khairy Omar and family. Tarique has recently been transferred in as manager at Mount Vernon, an estate of 600 hectares employing approximately 1,250 persons.

Proving yet again that it's a "small world" we discover that L.H.C. Tissera was manager here 10 years earlier! From Tarique we learned that the tea industry, established by the British, was nationalised by the Sri Lankan Government in 1970. The British planters then went off to Kenya and set themselves up as competitors! The Sri Lankan industry has now been partially re-privatised by the government and the momentum, partially lost in the '80s and '90s, is slowly being recovered. A new player to enter the international tea market and beginning to make its presence felt in the world trade is Vietnam.

Last year Sri Lanka produced approximately 310 million kilograms of tea at an average auction price of US\$2 per kilogram – a lot of cups of tea!

After several libations and curry Tiffin at 4.00 p.m. it was an hour before dusk when we finally set off on our 2 hour journey to Kandy. Our abstemious driver "VJ" hauled us safely down the slick rain soaked mountain switchbacks and we pulled into the Mahaweli Reach Hotel at 8.00 p.m.

DAY FOUR.

Kandy nestles in the foothills at about 2,000 feet. It is the second largest city in Sri Lanka and is located about 120 kms. from Colombo.

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Kandy was the last capital of the Sri Lankan kings and is a World Heritage Site. Kandy features a large man-made lake built by the last Sinhala King, Sri Wickrama Rajasinghe, in 1798. Located by the side of the lake is the well-known and revered Temple of the Tooth Relic.

Twenty-one kms. to the east of Kandy, in a small town called Rajawella, is the Victoria Golf Club founded in 1999. The Club Secretary is an English lady, married to a Sri Lankan, Mrs. Jannine Weeratunga. The secretary was not in when we dropped by but we met the Mr. Ajith Nishantha, the club professional.

Sumith, as he prefers to be called, by his own admission suffers no work related stress (see photo). From Monday to Friday the course may see an average of 2 or 3 groups a day. Weekends and holidays the action heats up apparently. We were there on a Monday and there was one player out on the course! BC golfers may care to check out www.srilankagolf.com

100,000 REASONS TO BE CHEERFUL (PART TWO)

daycare basis) was close to completion, and that the Spoofing donation could best be used to fit out a new Kitchen in the home. By co-incidence, CCD had already received quotations for the equipment and kitchen fitout, which came very close to the monies raised.

The Bangkok Gentleman Spoofers have thus decided to go ahead with this culinary concept, despite the irony, perhaps, that Spoofers are more known for their liquid culinary talents than solid foods!
