

A Busy Month with a Pagan End!

This *Outpost* must take some sort of record for the most material crammed into one Issue! This month, we have everything from historical drama to cult VDO; from food & wine to fairs & websites; from illicit affairs to pool repairs. Illicit affairs? Oh yes . . . don't miss our feature article commemorating the 200th anniversary of the Battle of Trafalgar - Remember Nelson.

One of the events in this Issue that hasn't received much attention at all is Halloween! At the end of the month is the Halloween Kids' Party. The celebration has ancient pagan roots going back to the Celtic New Year's eve festival of Samhain.

For the Celts, October 31st marked the end of summer and the harvest and the beginning of the dark, cold winter - a time of death. On that night the boundary between the worlds of the living and the dead became blurred. The ghosts of dead kinsmen returned to earth, and had to be guided back to the land of the dead by lights set in hollowed-out turnips and gourds. But evil spirits were also loose - witches and goblins - that had to be frightened off with masks and scary faces. Druids, or Celtic priests, built huge sacred bonfires, where the people gathered to burn crops and animals as sacrifices to the Celtic deities.

The result of a 400-year Roman occupation of Celtic lands was the merging of the Celtic Samhain with the Roman harvest festival to honour Pomona, the Roman goddess of fruit and trees. The symbol of Pomona is the apple - so it's no coincidence that October 21st is "Apple Day" and that "bobbing" for apples is part of Halloween today.

The Christians decided to stop all this pagan stuff in the seventh century when Pope Boniface IV designated November 1 All Saints' Day, a time to honor saints and martyrs. All Saints' Day was also called All-hallowed-Souls and the night before it, the night of Samhain, began to be called All-hallows Eve and, eventually . . . Halloween.



Letter from the Chair



Dear Members,

British Club Website

At last! This month heralds the launch of the new British Club website which we hope will provide an easy and efficient line of communication to members as well as providing more promotional opportunities for the

Club generally. The website will feature up-todate information on Club events; a monthly calendar; news from management, sports sections and the General Committee, membership info etc. It will also provide direct access to the Discussion Forum and enable on-line booking of events. Many thanks must go to all the members and staff who have been involved in its development. Check it out on www.britishclubbangkok.org and let us have your comments!

Constitution Rules and Bylaws

The review and overhaul of our Constitution, Rules and Bylaws has been a major focus of the last month and we hope to present our proposed amendments at an EGM towards the end of November. Thank you to those who have already contributed your views via the Discussion Forum, but we still want to hear from more of you! To this end, we are including the main issues in this edition of Outpost (pp 14&15) so if you have not already done so, please do spend some time reviewing these and let us have your comments. It is important to note that the outcome of this review, and ultimate vote by the membership, will affect almost everyone - either because changes to the Rules will be approved by members and therefore new policies will be established, or because members will vote to uphold the current Rules as they stand, in which case they should be enforced.

Surawongse Gate

Last month the management and GC agreed to open the Surawongse Gate for vehicular exit only. This decision was made in light of the new University opening soon in Silom Soi 18 in the hope that it will ease some of the anticipated congestion. While we appreciate (and regret) that the closure of the Surawongse Gate has caused inconvenience for some members, we have been advised only to allow access to the Oub from one entrance for security purposes.

We would therefore like to ask for members' co-operation and request that no attempt is made to enter the Club in a vehicle from this Gate. We will monitor the situation and review its success (or otherwise!) in a month or two. We thank you for your understanding and co-operation.

Yearbook and Annual Report

It has been customary for the BC Yearbook and Annual Report to be published at the end of the GC year, and distributed at the AGM. However, in recent years this has lapsed somewhat and the book has been coming out many months later. Last year's report, unfortunately, is no exception. It is, of course, important to have a record of each year's events and so the 2004 Yearbook will be finally published this month (with the collaboration of last year's GC) and will also include an interim report on 2005. We will then endeavour to get back on track and produce the full 2005 Report at the end of this Committee year.


New Menus

The decision recently to do a thorough re-costing of food and adjust prices accordingly has caused some reaction amongst members. The adjustments were made based on the standard formula for pricing for the Club (cost x 1.95% + service charge + VAT) and were considered necessary to bring the cost ratio of food sales back to acceptable levels. However, we do acknowledge that some dishes have increased significantly more than others. Some explanation for this is that, while the pricing equation has been applied correctly, this concise food-costing exercise has not been carried out across the board for many years. Also, part of the brief to the new Deputy GM/F&B on his arrival, was to improve the quality of the food and this has inevitably led to the purchase of some higher cost items and some adjustments in quantities. Nevertheless, the results of this exercise have now identified a real need to re-evaluate our overall F&B strategy and pricing policy in each outlet. This review is now taking place and we are looking at various issues including the balance of menu items offered, levels of quality and selection desired for each individual outlet, comparisons with other comparable food outlets etc. If any member would like to get involved in this process, do please let us know.






THE ROCKY HORROR PICTURE SHOW

Anthony Trail

nthony Murray Traill (Tony), a long time resident of Bangkok, died peacefully on Sunday 21st August 2005, while on holiday in England.

Mr. Traill was born in Preston in 1918 and grew up in Salisbury. A gifted sportsman, he spent his teenage years playing sports to a highly competitive level; water polo, rugby, springboard diving and swimming.

Mr. Traill went to college to train as a teacher and spent a few years teaching in London. When World War II broke out he joined the army and was posted to India with his brother Sinclair who was in the RAF.

After the War, began a great interest in Athletics and sports and nutrition - starting a long and successful career. He trained at Loughborough University to be a track and field coach. During this time he played rugby for Loughborough and then later for one of the premiere rugby clubs, London-Scottish. After accompanying the Great Britain Athletics team to the Melbourne Olympics in 1956, he moved to the East to train the Pakistan national track and field team. He enjoyed great success in Pakistan, and was placed in charge of the team at the Empire Games and then the Rome Olympics in 1960. Mr. Traill returned to England, and took up a teaching post for the next few years in London and then in Brighton. While in Brighton he took up weight-lifting and became Southern England champion in his weight division.

In 1964 Mr. Traill was offered the job as coach to the Thailand national track and field team. He accompanied the Thai team to the Tokyo Olympic Games. Thailand was to become his permanent home, where he met and fell in love with his wife to be, Chinda. He was also involved in his early years as a spring-board diving coach, and while as a weightlifting coach, was responsible for coaching the Thai lifter, the late Khun Chaiya Sookchinda, who under Mr. Traill's tutelage became the world record holder for his weight division.

In 1966 Mr. Traill founded the Traill International School (initially known as the Preparatory School), and was Principal of the School right up until last year when he retired from the post. He has been an active member of the British Club for 35 years, playing football for the Club in the Farang Soccer League until he was 62 years old. Mr. Traill continued to be involved throughout his time in Thailand in a variety of sports in coaching and administrative roles. He is survived by his wife, Chinda, daughters Christabel and Lillian, son Robert and granddaughter Alexia.



MOVING INTO THE 21st CENTURY!

et us get the hard bit out of the way first. This letter is about the Club Constitution and the review currently being conducted to update it into a constructive document fit for the second 100 years of the Club! Whilst we appreciate that this is not everyone's cup of tea, we really do need members' input on a variety of issues before we can propose any policy changes. So please read this and, better still, do let us have your views! (See end of letter for how to do this.) Thank you to those members who have already posted your comments through the on-line BCB Discussion Forum.

Although the General Committee will publish all proposed amendments in a calling notice for an EGM planned for late November 2005, we would like to float a number of 'key' changes with members ahead of time. It is important for members to understand that after an EGM, all existing rules, amendments and any new rules adopted will be enforced for the benefit of all members.

1. GUESTS

a) Number of visits per year: As a Members' Club, entry is for members and their immediate family only. One of the privileges of membership is to be able to introduce guests into the Club. However the Constitution restricts the same guest, if resident in Thailand, to only THREE visits in any ONE YEAR – that is not three times each with a number of different members but three times in total. This is because many of these 'guests' are eligible for Club membership in their own right and with limited capacity in our Sports facilities, it is considered only fair that these facilities are only used by members.

In 1998, in order to boost Food & Beverage sales in both the Churchill Bar and the Lord's Dining Room, this restriction was lifted for those two venues ONLY, for a trial period. However, the trial was never ratified and six years down the track we now not only have 'regular guests' who enter with members weekly or even more frequently to drink in the Bar and eat in Lord's but also who play racquet sports, or swim, all without paying a joining fee or a monthly subscription.

There are, thus, a number of options open for members to clarify Club policy in this area: do we –

- Uphold the existing rules (three visits in one year) and enforce it?
- Ratify the Trial allowing freer access to the Clubhouse and enforce the rules at Poolside?
- Consider a different option . . . like

charging members, say 100 Baht for each guest per visit, or limiting guests visits to (say) 10 times per year?

Your view as a member is important here . . . All guests are potential new members . . . but which balance is fair?

b) Guest numbers on any one visit - At present we are limited to introducing three guests to the Club on any one visit without prior agreement from the Management or the GC. This was presumably to ensure the number of guests did not cause inconvenience to other members. Should this be extended, say, for people wanting to dine in Lord's or indeed extended per se to any part of the Club premises?

2. NON-MEMBER PLAYERS

To clarify, the term 'Non-Member Players' does not refer to guests who come in to play tennis or squash with a member. It refers to some players in our four Field Sports Sections (Rugby, Soccer, Cricket and Hockey) who practice in the Club but play on Sports Fields away from the Club.

Typically each sport needs a squad of 15 to 20 players and over the years we have been increasingly unable to field complete 'all member' teams. At present our rules allow these Sections to have five non-members in their team and as per Rule 63 that they only play away from the Club.

However, for our teams to be competitive there is a need to bring in a larger number of young non-member players to play and, as a consequence, for them to practice in the Club with their teammates. Rugby as an example has won dozens of trophies over the past few years by having such people dedicated to the team – these are students, young Thais, local contract expatriates or non-working children of non-members, who are not in a position to afford to join the Club.

We are looking at a provision to allow up to 50% of our Squad to be young non-member players but with clear rules on Club entry, use of facilities etc, so that our Field Sports section can continue to prosper and the Club continues to enjoy the prestige of winning major sporting tournaments. Would you support this?

3. 'ASSOCIATED' GROUPS

A major area of constitutional vacuum is the question of the numerous groups that are "associated" with the Club. These are outside organisations, with their own memberships but with British Club members in their number, who use our facilities on a regular basis. These include, and the list is not complete - the Bangkok

Community Theatre, The Society of Professional Engineers in Thailand, the Societies of St George, St Andrew, St Patrick and St David, the British Women's Group, ANZWG, BAMBI, CCSDPT and to lesser extent the British Council, Canada Day Committee, the Chambers of Commerce and some Masonic Lodges.

There are members who welcome the diversity that these groups bring to Club life, and there are also members who fear that such frequent use of Club facilities deters the non-members from actually joining the Club. Our own Constitution points the way in that we exist for the benefit of all in the British community in Thailand recognising a broader remit of the other core nationalities of Australia, Canada and New Zealand. However, the non-member use of the Club is currently unconstitutional.

As with the need to regulate non-member players in our Field Sports teams, it is proposed that we establish clear constitutional criteria to give these organisations use of the Club with clear regulations on entry, use of facilities, payment methods etc. Continued use of the Club's facilities could then be ratified by members annually at the AGM.

With a clear framework to build on, it is believed that the Associated Groups can make a valued contribution to Club life. Would you support this?

4. OTHER MATTERS

The full review of the Constitution also highlighted a number of other areas where policy may need to be changed or even created . . .

- CHILD CARERS/MAIDS Are these guests of members, or part of a member's family? Should they be allowed in the Club without a member being present? Should we charge a fee for entry of a member's staff?
- TEMPORARY MEMBERS These are mainly reciprocal members from other clubs, with some short-term visitors as well. At present they may not bring in guests at all - many clubs have relaxed this - should we reciprocate?
- PARENTS/SIBLINGS/CHILDREN (OVER 21) ON HOLIDAY - These are currently treated as guests or temporary members. Should it be a member's privilege that your parents, children or siblings can use the Club whilst on holiday here, say for up to a month in any year?
- RETIRED PARENTS If a member's parents retire to Thailand they are, at present, treated only as guests - should we have a reduced entry fee for such retired parents of say, over 60 years of age?

- SINGLE PARENTS At present, interpretation of Rule 56 is that single members with children must be family members. However, should single parents with children (under say 8 years old) be allowed on a single membership?
- DIVORCEES In all cases only the member retains the membership; thus we have two 'problems'. Firstly if the divorced spouse is of associate nationality and wants to join in their own right should they have to join the waiting list or should they be allowed to join immediately? Secondly, if the couple were originally two single members (i.e. two joining fees had been paid) should not they both retain individual membership?
- CHILDREN IN HIGHER EDUCATION At present children of members of more than five years' standing enjoy a 75% discount on joining fees when they reach the age of 21. At present this can be deferred one year. Should this be deferred to 25 years of age if they are out of Thailand in Higher Education for example?
- SIGNING IN OF GUESTS a rule "more honoured in the breach than in the observance" - should we delete the existing rule and create a by-law reflecting the changing security needs of the Club in managing entry of nonmembers onto the premises?
- SPOUSE To reflect modern lifestyles, should we redefine spouse within a family membership to be 'spouse or domestic partner with whom one co-habits' thus encompassing those who are not married.

CONCLUSION

If you are still awake at this point congratulate yourself! Please remember that this is a Members' Club and all rules and regulations should be for the benefit of the members. This means we need YOUR opinions. Please take a little time to consider the above and give us your views in any of the following ways:

Who was this Fawkes guy anyway?


Once again, the Club will celebrate Guy Fawkes Night with a bonfire and fireworks extravaganza (see page 22). For those not familiar with this aspect of English history, the official version is roughly as follows . . .

Guy Fawkes (better known to his friends as Guido) was caught in a cellar underneath the English Houses of Parliament in the early hours of November 5th, 1605. In the cellar with him were 36 barrels of gunpowder and in his pockets were slow-burning matches and assorted kindling. Now, it just so happened that November 5th was the formal opening of Parliament at which the King himself would be present. Naturally the

King was not at all amused by these developments and gave special permission for Guy Fawkes to be tortured, a practice that was illegal unless authorised . . .

To cut a long story (and torture session) short, it turned out that Guy Fawkes was one of more than a dozen Catholic extremists who had planned to blow up King James I and the entire Parliament of England during its formal opening, thus triggering, they hoped, a rebellion that would result in the restoration of Catholicism.

How could it have come to this? Well . . . right



harsh penalties being dished out to "recusants" (those who refused to worship in the Church of England).

Some historians say that the "Gunpowder Plot" was a last desperate attempt to re-establish Catholicism in England; others that it was all cooked up by the King's men in order to provide a pretext for cracking down on the Jesuits . . . Whatever the true version, Guy Fawkes and most of his fellow conspirators were eventually hanged, drawn and quartered, a particularly nasty death reserved for traitors.

The failure of the Gunpowder Plot was celebrated by a relieved King, Parliament and most of the non-Catholic citizenry. The November 5th anniversary is still celebrated in England with fireworks and bonfires, on which are burned effigies of the conspirator (called "guys").

"Guy": According to Wikipedia, the free Internet encyclopedia, Guy Fawkes' name is also the origin of the word "guy" in the English language, particularly in American spoken English. The burning on 5 November of an effigy of Fawkes, known as a "guy", led to the use of the word "guy" as a term for "a person of grotesque appearance". Over time, the word evolved to become a general reference for a man, as in "some guy called for you." In the 20th century, under the influence of American popular culture, "guy" gradually replaced "fellow," "bloke," "chap" and other such words in many English-speaking countries.



THE BATTLE OF TRAFALGAR -

200TH ANNIVERSARY

The Battle of Trafalgar, fought on 21 October 1805, was the most significant naval engagement of the Napoleonic Wars and the pivotal naval battle of the 19th century. A Royal Navy fleet of 27 ships of the line destroyed an allied French and Spanish fleet of 33 ships of the line west of Cape Trafalgar in south-west Spain. The enemy lost 22 ships; the British none. The British commander Admiral Lord Nelson died late in the battle, by which time his victory had ensured his place as one of Britain's greatest military war heroes.

The British victory put an end to Napoleon's plans to invade Britain across the English Channel. Once the threat of invasion was removed, British troops could be used to fight on the European continent, which was a major factor in Napoleon's ultimate fall. After the battle, the Royal Navy remained unchallenged as the world's foremost naval power until the rise of Imperial Germany prior to the First World War, 100 years later.

REMEMBER NELSON

Horatio Nelson was the fifth - and third surviving - child of the Reverend Edmund and Caroline *Nelson. He was born in 1758 in the now demolished rectory in the village of Burnham Thorpe in Norfolk, where his father was the rector. The church still stands.

Caroline Nelson, whose parents were prosperous Cambridge bakers, on her mother's side was a second cousin of the first Prime Minister, Robert Walpole, in whose gift was the rector's living at Burnham Thorpe. She was to have six further children, but was to die when Horatio was nine, having, as her last child Catherine was later to say, bred herself to death.

Whilst never a strong child, the young Nelson had determination and also greatly admired his Uncle Maurice, his mother's elder brother and by then a Captain in the Royal Navy. Perhaps partially to ease the life of a widowed village rector, who had a large and young family to care for and certainly by Horatio's own choosing, Edmund Nelson wrote to his brother-in law and asked him if he would take the boy.

'What has poor Horace done, who is so weak, that he, above all the rest, should be sent to rough it out at sea? But let him come and the first time we go into action a cannon ball may knock off his head and provide for him at once', wrote Suckling, encouragingly, in reply. And so it was that Horatio Nelson went to sea with his uncle, Captain Maurice Suckling, in 1770, at the tender age of 12. The young Nelson joined the captured French 3rd rate HMS RAISONNABLE, then commanded by his uncle Maurice, at Sheerness at the mouth of the Medway in 1770 and went to the West Indies for a year. It was to be no picnic and far from healthy. Nelson was later to suffer from recurrent malaria and also to be dreadfully sea-sick from that day until the day he died. He did well enough and by 1779, the height of the War of Independence, was a Post Captain at the age of twenty-one, something not unusual in those days.

He also had a number of sea commands of increasing size, more notably of HMS Albermarle in 1787, where one of his officers was Prince William, the second son of the King and the future King William IV. It was reputedly he who, standing for the Loyal Toast to his Father, banged his head, since when officers of the

Royal Navy have always toasted the Sovereign's health sitting down. It was also at this time that Nelson met and married Frances Nesbit, a British widow, on the island of Nevis in the West Indies. Prince William gave her away.

The end of the American War of Independence brought a short period of relative peace with France. The Royal Navy was run down and Nelson was put on half pay and 'on the beach' in 1787. Despite persistent requests he was not recalled until 1793, when he was given

command of the 64 gun HMS Agamemnon. It was later that year, whilst commanding her and during a routine visit to Naples, that he encountered for the first time the daughter of an illiterate Cheshire blacksmith, who in the space of nine years had risen from obscurity to being the wife of the British Minister in Naples. Her name was Lady Emma Hamilton.

Nothing happened at that time and Nelson went off for what was to be a busy and injurious period. He was to cover himself in glory as a Commodore at the battle of Cape St Vincent in 1794, but later the same year to lose the sight of his left eye in Corsica, and in 1797 to lose the

lower part of his right arm in an action in Tenerife. In 1799, however, things took a different turn.

Intent upon interfering with the British route to the Orient, Napoleon had sent an army to Egypt, with a view to eventually moving towards India. However, its support required sea transport and the protection of the French Navy, which force was crushed by (the now Rear Admiral) Nelson's squadron at Aboukir Bay, just east of Alexandria, in 1799, in what became known as the Battle of the Nile. Nelson's decisive victory left the French army in Egypt with no support and brought to an end any French ideas of moving eastwards. With that defeat the Mediterranean was largely freed of the threat from Napoleonic France and Nelson returned to

Naples in triumph. He was created Duke of Bronte, in an event orchestrated on behalf of King Ferdinand and Queen Maria Carolina by Sir William and Lady Hamilton. Notwithstanding his loss of an eye and an arm, Emma and he started a passionate affair within days of his arrival and this was to be, as they say, the love affair - and scandal - of the century.

Sir William, by now in his seventies, behaved impeccably; but the same was sadly not to be said of Nelson - and yet a menage a trois was established, with Sir William simply ignoring what was clearly happening. However in 1800 his term as Minister in Naples came to an end and it was time for the Hamiltons to return to England. Nelson had been slightly wounded at the Nile - little more than a scratch on his forehead in reality - but in his increasingly theatrical and vain way, he pleaded an inability to come home with his ships. In reality he wanted to spend his time with Emma and he returned home with the Hamiltons across Europe, eventually landing at Yarmouth. What the arrangements were along the way is not recorded, but Nelson had by this stage reached new pinnacles of vanity and relished the glory that was heaped upon him everywhere they stopped.

News of his affair with Emma had reached the ears of many in England and not least those of his wife, Frances. During the next year Nelson behaved appallingly and subjected her to untold embarrassment and humiliation, before finally ditching her. Emma was also already pregnant with his child, their daughter Horatia, born in 1801, the year in which Nelson achieved further glory at Copenhagen. It was here that in a famous incident, wishing to ignore the recall signal from his CinC, he put the telescope to his

blind eye and said, "I see no signal".

Sir William gradually withdrew from the scene and died in 1802, by which time Nelson was living openly with Emma at Merton Place, near Wimbledon. He was never to marry her, and neither was he to divorce Frances.

The peace at the end of the Revolutionary Wars in 1802 was not to last and at the outbreak of the Napoleonic Wars in 1803, Nelson was made Commander in Chief Mediterranean and was away from England for nearly two years, returning

briefly, for what was to be the last time, in August 1805. During that period he traveled one day from Merton to London to see the Secretary of State for War, Lord Castlereagh. Nelson was shown into a waiting room, as Castlereagh was running late and where there was another man waiting, who recorded the event.

"I met a gentleman, who from his pictures and the loss of an arm, I immediately recognised as Lord Nelson. He entered into conversation, if you can call it conversation, for it was all on his side and all about himself and in reality, in a style so vain and so silly as to surprise and disgust me.

I suppose that some thing I happened to say may have made him guess that I was somebody and he went out of the room, I have no doubt to ask the office keeper who I was, for when he returned he was a different man in both manner and matter. All the charlatan style had vanished and he talked of the state of the country, the aspect and probabilities of affairs on the continent with good sense and a knowledge of subjects both at home and abroad that surprised me equally and more agreeably than the first part of our interview had done; in fact he talked like an officer and a statesman."

The man in question was Major-General Arthur Wellesley, the future Duke of Wellington, fresh from victories in India, whose time, in the Peninsular War and at Waterloo, was yet to come.

Nelson left England for the last time on 15th September 1805 and he was to die of a musket ball wound at the Battle of Trafalgar on 21st October. His body was brought home, reputedly in a cask of brandy. All the other 440 British dead, save one buried in Gibraltar, went over the side. The Spanish, however, fared much worse, losing 1,022 and the French 3,373. Of the 33 French and Spanish ships 22 were sunk, wrecked or taken. The British lost none. This was not merely a victory, it was an annihilation, from which the Royal Navy gained command of the seas, so vital for what was to come. It was a supremacy that the Navy was to hold for over a century, only surrendering it, despite a close scrape in 1917, by default to the United States sometime in 1942.

So what is my judgment of Nelson? Physically courageous, he certainly was, even if sometimes foolhardy and theatrical and whilst vain and also morally weak, he was brilliant at what he did. His brilliance came from his ability to do two things; to think strategically and to weld those under him into a team - the band of brothers - who, at all levels, adored him.

THE TRAFALGAR NIGHT DINNER

This year marks the 200th anniversary of the Battle of Trafalgar and a dinner to commemorate it will be held on Friday 21st October 2005 at The Landmark.

The dinner will be formal, black tie, gentlemen only around one "U" or "E" shaped table, with an orchestra to play during dinner. The toast to The Immortal Memory will this year be proposed by Vice Admiral Sir Robert Hill, KBE FREng.

Before dinner there will be a group photograph to commemorate the occasion, a copy of which will be given to those attending before the end of the evening.

After dinner and the speeches there will be a musical interlude with a "Last Night of the Proms" to include, along with other well known themes, Sir Edward Elgar's "Pomp and Circumstance" and Sir Henry Wood's "Fantasia of British Sea Songs", the latter being specially composed for the 100th anniversary and first performed on 21st October 1905.

This has become a very international gathering, with a uniquely British theme, which it is important to note is not for the glorification in a victory and others' misery, but rather the marking of an historical event of huge significance and the celebration of the varied and colourful life of its hero, Nelson, saluting his memory and those of the nearly 5,000 other souls who died that day.

here's more to swimming pools than meets the eye - and fixing them is not as straightforward as it may seem . . . At 42 years old, the Club's main pool needed a little T.L.C and, as the picture shows, this was no small undertaking.

The pool floor tapers down to a depth of three meters at one end, presumably to allow high diving. Although any diving boards have long since disappeared, the pool's unusual shape means that it holds just on 700 cubic meters of water (as a comparison, one of those ubiquitous giant concrete trucks carries about 10 m3 of concrete!). So, although it would take a long time to fill the pool with a garden hose, the real concern is the weight of that water. The weight is easy to calculate, thanks to the metric system: 1 cubic meter of water contains 1000 liters, and 1 liter weighs 1 kg, so 1 cubic meter of water weighs 1000 kg or a metric ton.

What happens when you pump 700 tons of water out of a swimming pool? Well, maybe, if the pool floor is not strong enough, the bottom of the pool will just crumple upward . . . not good. Fortunately the BC pool is made of sterner



stuff, but there was an incident when the removal of a tile resulted in a mini-fountain on the pool floor. This was caused by water pressure, as the deepest part of the pool would be well below the water table. Fortunately, the hole was able to be securely plugged, thanks to the quick actions of the General Manager, who put his finger in the hole and screamed for help (OK, OK, this last bit didn't happen!).

Despite the odd hiccup, the project was a great success, with over 5000 tiles replaced and an automatic chlorine system added, amongst other things - all accomplished in less than a month.


The British Club/Elite team will be competing in the local league again


