Invasion of the Coffee Pods

ou may know that the British Club has recently introduced a wonderful range of 'pod' coffees (see page 25). As an almost complete coffee ignoramus, I decided to rectify the deficiency by doing a bit of research. Here's what I found . . .

Coffee was first discovered in Eastern Africa in an area now known as Ethiopia and first arrived on the European continent by means of Venetian trade merchants. Once in Europe the new beverage fell under harsh criticism from the Catholic church. Many felt the Pope should ban coffee, calling it the drink of the devil. To their surprise, the Pope, already a coffee drinker, blessed coffee declaring it a truly Christian beverage. The first English coffee house opened in Oxford in 1650 and by 1675 there were nearly 3000 coffee houses in England.

Today, coffee is a giant global industry employing more than 20 million people. As a commodity it ranks second only to crude oil in terms of dollars traded worldwide. With over 400 billion cups consumed every year, coffee is the world's most popular beverage.

Sharing my office with 'CoffeeWORKS', a specialty coffee roasting company, has introduced me not only to new coffee taste sensations and aromas, but also to new auditory phenomena, such as the tapping, gurgling, gronking and spurting sounds made by coffee machines. Then there's the sound made by the humans – usually coffee connoisseurs – when they're tasting coffee. This can best be described as a cross between sipping and inhaling and takes the form of an extended aerated slurp that propels a mixture of coffee and air into the upper palate and nasal area where its chemical and aromatic composition is detected and results relayed straight to the brain . . .

Chemically speaking, coffee is an extraordinarily complex substance, having roughly 1,000 chemical ingredients including sugars, polysaccharides, alkaloids, amino acids, proteins, chlorogenic acids, carboxylic acids, and hundreds of 'volatile components' like ketones, phenols, esthers, aldehydes and alcohols!

If you're put off by drinking something that contains chemical compounds with names like "ethyleneglycol diacetate' and '3-methyl-1-hydroxybenzene', don't be. Studies linking coffee to both detrimental and beneficial health effects have generally been inconclusive.

For many, the idea of the 'perfect' coffee is one that tastes every bit a good as it smells. Hmmm. Where's my Blue Mountain Arabica? I'll drink to that.



Dear Members,

Appointment of C.E.O.

Following the summer vacation I returned to Bangkok at the end of August to learn of the very disappointing news that Russell Finney would not be joining us as C.E.O. Members will be aware that Russell was due to start work

Russell, unfortunately, had some guite sudden and serious personal problems which made it impossible for him to take up the post. It was extremely disappointing news for the General Committee.

We had started the search for a C.E.O. at the beginning of May, and with the development project now into the first phase of planning, we believed it was now crucial to get someone on board as soon as possible to take on the business side of the Club's management and allow Barry to concentrate on Operations.

The General Committee quickly reviewed our short list and also re-advertised the position. After a fairly swift interview process we were delighted to find an equally strong candidate and ultimately offered the position to Simon Roberts who will be joining us on October 1st. Development Project

Following feedback from the ten design companies who expressed an interest in the project, some aspects of the proposed plan have now been reviewed. Specifically, The DRSC (Development Rolling Sub-Committee) believed it prudent to review the timeline in order to ensure that any development doesn't compromise our Food & Beverage operation over the Christmas period. In addition we are also intending to invest some time in talking further to some of these design companies who offered a good deal of useful input, which now needs to be assimilated. However we are still planning to award the Interior Design Contract by the end of October with on site implementation commencing early January 2007. 

Good news for thrifty save

Changes to UK Pension Legislation

From 1st April 2006 (known as A-Day) major changes to pension legislation in the UK were introduced which will have wide ranging and largely beneficial implications for British Expatriates. Up until now most British Expatriates were excluded from contributing to UK approved personal pensions unless they had earnings subject to tax in the UK or were allowed to remain members of UK approved employer's schemes. With A-Day all this has changed.

Outline of the New Arrangements

Perhaps the most welcome change has been the removal of the so called "concurrency" test. This prevented investors from being active members of two concurrent pension schemes unless they were linked to the main employer's scheme via the additional voluntary contribution route. From now on any UK citizen will be able to join any type and any number of pension schemes at the same time. However, there are restrictions:

- 1. Maximum contributions into a plan is the higher of £3,600 per annum or 100% of earnings (subject to the overall maximum of the annual allowance, see below.)
- 2. The annual allowance has been set for the year 2006/07 as £215,000 contributions rising eventually by the year 2010/2011 to £255,000 per annum.
- 3. A new concept, the Standard Lifetime Allowance (SLA) has been introduced. Briefly this is the maximum amount of the pension "pot" which will not be subject to any tax penalties. In 2006/07 this is set at £1.5million rising by 2010/2011 to £1.8 million.

Provided these limits are not breached, individuals can obtain tax relief on contributions and the funds themselves will not be subject to income tax, capital gains tax or inheritance tax. Eventually 25% of the funds can be withdrawn tax free. Naturally, once the pensions are in payment they will be subject to UK income tax.

Age Restrictions

From A-day 2006 to April 2010 the minimum age to draw a pension benefit is 50, but if ill health strikes there are grounds for taking pension benefits earlier. From 2010 the minimum age to take a pension rises to 55.

From A-day, pension benefits must be taken by age 75 and cannot be deferred beyond that date.

Expatriate Revolution

As mentioned earlier, in the past it was difficult for British Expatriates to carry on contributing to UK schemes. That will now change. If there are earnings subject to UK tax, then pension contributions can obtain full tax relief. On the other hand, if there are no UK taxable earnings, pension contributions can still be made, but without the benefit of tax relief at source. The table below indicates how this will operate. The vast majority of British Expatriates will fall under Category 2 and can therefore make unlimited contributions to an approved UK Scheme. There are, however, plenty of individuals who are not resident for UK tax purposes but continue to have their salaries subject

to UK tax, with Crown Servants being an obvious example. If you fall into one of the following categories it is certainly worth considering making contributions to UK pension schemes after April 2006:

- Non-Resident but still a Member of an existing UK Pension Scheme following Secondment
 - It is possible to top up contributions or alternatively consider setting up a parallel personal pension plan for diversification and flexibility.
- (ii) Non-Resident but Member of an Overseas Pension Scheme Whilst not possible to contribute to a UK employer based arrangement there is nothing to stop individual contributions to a personal pension plan in the UK.
- (iii) Non-Resident and Member of a UK Scheme with Pension Benefits now Preserved Whilst it will not be possible to re-activate contributions to the preserved scheme, in parallel to that contributions can be made to a new personal arrangement.
- (iv) Non-Resident Retired early Abroad Provided aged under 75 years it is possible to divert some of your savings or investments into approved UK personal pension plans.

Pros and Cons

As ever, there are advantages as well as disadvantages in investing in UK pension plans.

Advantages

For many the security of dealing with approved UK institutions will be a major benefit. A key advantage is that the fund built up will not be subject to income tax or capital gains tax while it is accumulating.

In addition, if death occurs before pension benefits are taken, a lump sum can be returned in full without any tax (including inheritance tax) and paid to nominated beneficiaries.

When pension benefits are taken 25% of the Fund can be taken as a tax free lump sum. Naturally there is a wide choice of providers and a range of funds to suit all appetites for risk.

Disadvantages

For those who are non-resident with no taxable UK earnings, the downside for the contributions is that there will be no tax relief granted. Eventually when the pension comes into payment, UK tax will be deducted at source but this may be avoided using the Double Tax Treaties with your country of residence.

In summary, there are massive changes taking place which will open up the world of UK pensions to British expatriates.

Whilst it was bad news that direct property investments could not be included in, for example, self invested personal pensions (SIPPs); the availability of a wide range of property funds linked to UK and international equities and fixed interest funds should give plenty of scope for the canny investor.




MATERIALS:

4. Use a fine-point permanent black marker to draw on eyes and a mouth.

For each holder, trace one

end of the empty tissue tube onto a piece of white paper, then cut out the circle, making it slightly smaller than your trace line. (If you fold the paper into a few layers, you can cut out several circles at once.)

Cut the tube in half (you can make 2 holders per tube) and tape the paper circle to the bottom of each half

3. Wrap a 2- to 2 1/2-foot strip of gauze around the tube, first taping the beginning of the gauze to the tube. Gently stretch and twist the gauze as you wrap it to give it some dimension. When you've covered the tube, cut the gauze and tuck the end under a nearby layer.

4. Finally, glue on googly eyes (or use the self-adhesive kind), then fill the mummy with candy treats.








The British Club Tsunami Relief Fund

We're pleased to be able to report that the project is to be run by Mr. Mechai's organisation, the Population and Community Development Association (PDA), Thailand's leading non-governmental, non-profit organisation.

A few months ago we met with Mr. Mechai who has taken on the challenge of helping affected local villagers to regain their normal way of life and even improve their economic, social, and environmental conditions so they are better off than before the tsunami. The fund had raised a total 322,695.78 baht and it was a great pleasure to present Mr. Meechai with a cheque for this amount at the New Members' Night.

PDA's staff have completed a recent exploratory health survey in 8 schools in Klong Lua, Klong Krai, Bor Muang, Laem Kruad, Lee Kee, Ta Pradu, Ban Khuan Tai and Tung Samet, totalling approximately 1,500 primary and middle school students in the post-tsunami project area and have identified a generally low quality of personal hygiene, above-average rate of dental decay, a high rate of infestation with lice among 7-10 year olds, and one-third of youth considered underweight by non-scientific methods.

In light of this latest information, PDA suggested we help put together a Preventive Hygiene Education Project, with integrated school activities as an important addition to everyday lessons. Part of the plan will include

specially designed posters in their classrooms that depict and explain preventive health behaviours. Pamphlets will also be printed to hand out at schools explaining the various hygiene issues. Trained visitors to the schools will ensure that the message gets across, along with the provision of a 'health pack' containing such basic items as a toothbrush and toothpaste which the children will have to purchase for a nominal sum of 5 baht each. Mr. Mechai explained that once students have to pay for their 'pack', they will certainly participate in the project and take care of their hygiene products.

The project is planned to last a year and it is hoped that if it proves to be successful, it will continue to be implemented, providing of course further funding can be raised. We plan to update everyone from time to time as to how the project is progressing. 

Deep fry plakapong until deep gold

Heat the stock to simmering point, and add all the ingredients except the fish and return it to the boil. Simmer for 8-10 minutes, then add the fish before serving.

This dish can be eaten as a soup course, but in Thailand soups are normally eaten with the other dishes of the dinner, rather than before them. Therefore you should use a slotted spoon to remove the fish and serve it in individual bowls to the diners. The soup liquid is then placed in a large serving bowl, from where they can help themselves (you can use a fire pot or fondue cooker to keep it hot if you wish).


ABOUT with Membership

august may have been a quiet month but September has been extremely busy on the Development front and things are really moving on.

Interior Besigners

Revised Tender Process

In the middle of September we communicated to members our decision to change the tender process for the Interior Design Companies, and the associated reasons. Following that change we contacted all the interested parties and arranged interviews. We are now in the process of collating all the information to display in the Snooker Room.

Timeline 2006/2007

The full timeline will be posted on the notice board but in summary key dates are as follows:

2nd October - DRSC presents Interior Designer information to GC.

Selection of companies made.

6th October - Information from selected Interior Designers displayed in Snooker Room.

18th October - Deadline for membership feedback on Interior Designers

24th October - Award Interior Design Contract

7th January - On site construction

Project Management/Construction Tenders

We also communicated in mid-September that we would be looking for project managers and construction companies late September, early October. We are in the process of reviewing these tenders and hope to award the contracts in the next week or two.

Phasing Rationale

It was clear from membership feedback that members were not clear about the rationale behind the phasing of the development. So here comes an explanation.

Logic

A lot of work was done on how best to phase the development across the site. The primary considerations were:

- The need to provide facilities that would cater to the entire membership during the lifetime of the project.
- The need to maximize the revenue generated by the Club throughout the lifetime of the project.

There is no doubt that the poolside does need significant refurbishment and that a revitalized environment would attract new members. However the impact of construction at the poolside will be severe and will last up to 18 months. The poolside contributes around 33%

of the Club revenue and employs a significant number of staff. In addition it is the only area of the club that caters to families. We believed that it would be irresponsible to start a major project by taking out a third of the Club's revenue without providing alternative facilities that could:

- Compensate to some degree financially,
- Provide some facilities for families, and
- Provide for prospective new members some evidence of the direction that the Club is going in.

Therefore we decided to look at the potential in the Clubhouse. By re-developing the ground floor we believe we can:

- Maintain the revenue from the Churchill Bar, approximately 30% of the total Club revenue.
- Create a new F&B facility that will generate additional income over and above the revenue generated by Lord's, currently 8% of the total, by:
 - o Creating additional capacity
 - Catering to a greater cross section of the membership:
 - Sports Sections after training
 - Families with children who would simply like to have a meal in an air conditioned environment
 - Integrating the back lawn into a fully serviced F&B outlet with additional seating.
 - Providing a more robust infrastructure to support external functions.
- Create a new `Front Page' for the Club that would reassure members, both existing and potential prospects, that the British Club was moving forward.
- Move Club development forward whilst planning carefully for Phase 2 and the associated revenue and staffing implications.
- Create temporary recreational facilities for families with children as the poolside development progresses in Phase 2.

The new outlet will be extremely versatile in order to be able to support the different needs of the membership. Also as popularity of existing events such as the Quiz Night develops, and new events come on line, we will be able to switch locations from the Churchill Bar to the new outlet as required.

Financial Statistics

Cash Flow

The existing financial model is based on the need to predict cash flow over the time of the development. In addition it was designed to minimise the assumptions that had to be made

in order to support the model and therefore minimise the potential for error. Therefore the statistics used were based on actual recorded performance. The factors included:

- Average Number of New Members per Annum
- Average Number of Members Leaving per Annum
- Percentage of Members using Fitness Centre
- Percentage of Members using Sports Facilities
- Average Number of Times each Member uses each Outlet
- Average Spend per Outlet

All of these factors are recorded historically in the Club accounts and as such provide a transparent benchmark from which to project forwards both the Profit & Loss position and the cash flow.

Profit & Loss by F&B Outlet

The Club does not create individual Profit & Loss accounts for each F&B outlet. Instead they report the revenue generated which is then merged into an overall Profit & Loss account for the entire Club. In order to project P&L by outlet a significant number of assumptions would have to be made in order to create the base position and these assumptions would then

have to be projected forwards to create the model. As such we felt the exercise would provide unreliable information. Going forward the Club management will need to determine whether P&L accounts by outlet are a necessary management tool and, if so, how best to implement them. In the interim, revenue generated will continue to be the benchmark.

Cost Per Sq Metre

The budgeted costs, currently at unit level, Churchill Bar, Snooker Room, etc, are in the process of being converted to Cost/Sq Metre figures. These will be published on completion.

Phase 2

We have now compiled the following:

- Prospect lists for Sponsorship
- Details of Sponsorship Packages/ Membership Packages

We are now arranging appointments which will take place during October.

So the next update will be in November's Outpost magazine. Hopefully not such a lengthy one as by that time work should be well underway. See you next month.


The Monthly Hassell Stableford at Krung Kavee: 3rd September



Squashy Bits



The Pacific Club

he oldest organisation of its kind west of the Rockies, The Pacific Club in Honolulu has spanned over 150 years of history. Born in an era of polished manners and strict decorum, the Club has lived to see the niceties of yesteryear fade into history and become but quaint traditions.

Founded as "The Mess" in 1851, it stood for a place of companionship, good conversation, camaraderie and memorable times. The original charter, fastidiously adhering to the wishes of the founding fathers, specifically stated the Club was conceived for the purpose of "promoting friendship and the mutual exchange of opinions among its members, and for providing a place for the reception of strangers, travellers and residents of the kingdom". And so it remains to this day.

The Club's memories and the cavalcade of history are irrevocably entwined. Two Hawaiian kings and many of their cabinet officers were members and for generation after generation the Club roster has been inscribed with the names of civic, business and cultural leaders who figured prominently in the history of Hawaii, from Kingdom, to Republic, to Territory, to Statehood.

Perfectly situated on three and half acres at the edge of downtown Honolulu, The Pacific Club is an oasis of city convenience and serenity within walking distance from downtown businesses. The present Clubhouse dates from 1960, with major additions in 1970 and 1985, and full renovations in 2002.
