

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
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MESSAGE FROM THE GM



Both our levels of business and our Members' visits have begun to recover recently, since so many members went on holiday at the end of July or beginning of August. We were still 12% short of our F&B budget in August, though that was exactly the same amount as we are short for our budgeted membership subscriptions. Despite our lack of membership, now in mid-September we are exactly on target for our F&B revenue budget.

We have stabilised the development in membership so that the gap between budgeted and actual subscriptions does not increase. However, as I previously noted, it is vital that we increase our total membership to approximately 1040 before the end of the year. Our new Membership Manager, Khun Lin, has started off very well in the last month, strongly assisted by some of our existing Members recruiting other new Members. To continue this development, we need both a new marketing strategy and also a collateral strategy derived from it, and these are currently being prepared. This change in strategy will also affect the way we offer sponsorships. In the past, the Club has sponsored Chambers, Societies and other groups by providing F&B at outside functions. We will continue to sponsor events like this, provided that such events take place at the British Club. Our reasoning is that the Club itself is our strongest asset, and by actually getting people down here we can maximise the chance of recruiting new Members. With this objective, in September we hosted an Open Night targetted primarily towards teachers and other professionals who have just arrived in Bangkok, the Canadian Chamber of Commerce had a networking meeting at the Club, and the British Chamber of Commerce will be holding their evening at the Club in October. To the same end, we intend to bring along the Australian Chamber and any other Chambers which we believe may potentially contribute new Members.

Of course we must advertise in a 'normal' way as well, and we expect that much of this will appear on the Internet and in lifestyle publications. For this reason, we are embarking on a trial association with the magazine Acclimate. I am aware that some Members may be surprised to receive a female-oriented magazine, even though it may be intended for their better half! On the other hand, it has been shown that many lifestyle 'products' for men are advertised through women's magazines, because, even though few males would admit to it, a large quantity of women's magazines are read daily by spouses and even single males. Given these statistics, we are working with Acclimate on distribution and other possibilities.

For marketing purposes and to provide additional experiences for Club Members, we will be co-organising events in association with the British Chamber, the first of which was on 21st September. Such events and activities will be generated from and based on our marketing strategy.

Bringing in more Members does not in itself necessarily increase the F&B revenue, and the 12% shortfall on budget reflects varying performances between our different outlets. Over the last few months we have increased the Verandah's revenue significantly such that it is now riding 9% ahead of budget, with both the Express Luncheons and Weekend Brunches contributing to this surplus. However, the Salas are consistently 20% under budget, and during the weekdays it is obviously due to our missing two tennis courts. At the weekends, if there are no sports activities such as swimming, swimming galas, tennis training, junior football, netball or cricket with which to occupy our Members' children, then the Salas' revenue suffers dramatically. With regard to the tennis courts, John Boisclair is exerting tremendous pressure on the contractors to have them finished completely by the time you read this. To maximise usage of the Club at weekends, Reed Passmore is starting off by setting up netball and cricket training, the latter being an obvious choice as most International Schools ignore this great and traditional British/ Commonwealth sport.

Since William Ong's resignation, Khun Laak and Khun Somboon have jointly assumed the usual duties of the F&B Manager. Khun Somboon is now responsible for all service, functions and outside catering, and he will continue to be the driving force behind the improvements in all our customer services. Khun Laak will be responsible for not only the kitchens and the quality and selection of the food, but also for the continued development of the new menus, which were promised more than 2 months ago. Khun Laak has already been the catalyst behind changes like the breakfast menu, so we expect that when you read this, you will also be able to read and select new dishes from the new menus! These will be adapted to the characteristics of the outlets, and replace the long menus of old. All outlets will, however, see an increase in seasonal offerings as well as Khun Laak's specials, the goal being to provide each outlet with its own character and taste.

To enable Khun Laak to continue renewing herself as she has done before, we will arrange periodic external coaching from executive chefs, and in addition provide the opportunity to see and specifically taste what is going on around Bangkok. The next Gourmet Dinner has deliberately been scheduled for a Friday (5 Nov) to enable as many Members as possible to experience what Khun Laak can create when she is given the time to prepare exceptional cuisine excellence, good value, and satisfaction for Club Members.

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HOUSE & GROUNDS

The monthly report on maintenance and development



At the time of writing this on 15th September, the resurfacing of the centre court and court 1 is still not finished. The contract completion date of 15th May has long gone.

Heavy rainfall, almost daily in the last 2 weeks, has caused many problems in carrying out the repair of the defects left behind by the previous subcontractor, who appeared to have abandoned ship. Initially, there were numerous difficulties in the course of carrying out the resurfacing of Courts 2 & 3.

The delays then pushed the work on the Centre Court and Court 1 into the rainy season. This resulted in many additional problems and delays which have frustrated everyone, as they sat in the Suriwongse Sala watching helplessly. I have suggested to the contractor that it could be worthwhile for them to erect awnings over the working areas. The contractor and the Club are currently losing money as the rain falls persistently on the unfinished courts. By the time you receive this edition of "Outpost" I sincerely hope that the work will be finished.

The Ladies' Changing Room was re-opened on 19th August, 10 days earlier than the contractor's completion date. The door into the Men's Changing Room was then replaced with one of 2.4 metres in height to match the one just installed in the Ladies' Changing Room. These doors should be able to accommodate even our tallest members. The male members, who had chivalrously been using the temporary

changing area were then able to reclaim their changing room later that same day.

Thanks are due to Khun Prawat's company, Sawaeng for a very well planned and executed design & build project. We should also thank Peter Harper whose conceptual design for the Men's Changing Room was used again and has resulted in a functional and attractive facility. Of course, that is my opinion. As always, I am interested in the comments of the Member's. I took Peter to see the finished project and I am pleased to report that he seemed reasonably happy with our execution of his "simple minimal white concept" (his term. not mine).

The parquet flooring in the reception area has just been replaced, albeit with some difficulties in getting the lacquered finish right. The effect is that the area now appears more spacious. We are still looking for a company that can design and manufacture directories and small pieces of furniture to complete the decor.

We continue to be very busy with repair and maintenance work. In the last month we have replaced 1 pump in the pool filtration room, the pump which circulates the water in the turtle pond and the water heater for the Ladies' Changing Room. Our maintenance team are being kept very busy on routine repair and maintenance work.

As required by the Motion approved at the 2008 AGM, we are now keeping detailed records of all expenditure, whether it is on projects such as the changing rooms or routine repair & maintenance work. Due to the age and condition of our buildings, the costs are significant, and the records will enable future realistic budgeting on an annual basis without the temptation to delude ourselves that the facilities can be kept going on a shoestring. The records are available in my office for inspection by any Member who wishes to do so.

In the last month we have started making some small changes to the menus, specials and buffets. During this process, it is important for me to receive feedback from Members so that we know that we are on the right track.

The most resent change is that we are now making a Saturday and Sunday Brunch. We want this new Brunch to be like those you can get at 5 star hotels, but maintaining

our Club's favourable prices! Even though what we are doing is inspired by what is happening around us, we will continue to have some British Club/Commonwealth Specials (like the Carvery) at our Brunch. But it is also important that Members tell me what they really like and what, if anything, they want changed. Only by getting feedback can we become better. By the time you read this, we will have a Mimosa cocktail (champagne and orange juice) included in all Brunches, and we expect to have a "Sparkling Wine Menu" added to the Brunch also.

We have also cancelled the Tuesday Carvery. The reason is very simple: it did not sell enough and we therefore ended up with more wasted food than we like, and too much waste makes it impossible to keep our prices low. However, we will expand our Friday buffets, each week having a different theme. The first week in October starts with the usual curry buffet, the second week we have a German

buffet with respect to the traditional German Octoberfest. You know that we started the Octoberfest on 17th September, like in Germany, but we will continue to celebrate the festival in October as well. The third week's buffet has a Mediterranean theme, the fourth week a Canadian theme and the last week of October there will be a Spanish theme like more traditional Tapas.

Our last Gourmet Dinner was not as well attended as we hoped; some claim because it fell on a Wednesday! So to maximise the possibility of all attending, the next Gourmet Dinner is scheduled for Friday 5th November starting at 7pm with canapés and wine on the back lawn. This time the menu will be 6 courses with wine, all for 1800 baht. We will experiment a little and will try and show how good some of the local fish and meat is — even when it is prepared in an international mode. I really hope that you will come and enjoy this next evening, where we will show you the best of the kitchen! Remember remember the 5th November, ok!

Finally regarding the Menus which are supposed to be coming out. They need changing quite a bit. In future we will have a smaller amount of dishes on the permanent menu, although all outlets will have more dishes that follow the different seasons here in Thailand and abroad. Each outlet will have some different items, but of course, Members can always ask to get the menu from another outlet. The only menu that will be shared is the Thai menu. Khun Somchai, the GM, Khun Prem and I have checked out many different Thai menus in Bangkok and we do believe that our Thai, British and International menus should include the best food in Bangkok, and we really want our Members to experience that.

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ANDREW ROBERTSON 08.03.1952 - 25.08.2010



Andy Robertson, the farmer's son, moved from his local school to Kirkcudbright Academy in S.W. Scotland in 1968, and three years later to Napier College of Technology (now Napier University) to study Civil Engineering. On leaving college, Andy briefly worked in Edinburgh as a trainee engineer, but soon left for Saudi Arabia and spent the next 12 years there.

It was not until 1988 that Andy, whilst on holiday in Bangkok, was offered a position with the developer of the new expressway system. Over the next 20 years and more, Andy worked on this and other Expressway and Skytrain projects. He shared a flat in Bangkok for 14 years before deciding to buy his own condo unit.

Despite excelling in his profession as a Materials and Quality Specialist, Andy decided that he would retire at the early age of 48 to further pursue his interests in golf and tennis, and thus the British Club's Tennis Section became an important part of his life. Dragged briefly out of retirement for a short project in Cambodia, he quickly won the respect of local engineers who obviously appreciated his easy-going, polite and helpful manner. Andy was always quick to treat everyone with equal respect.

It is not difficult to describe Andy Robertson as the perfect gentleman. Reticent to raise his voice, he was a modest man right up to his far too early and sudden death on a cool tennis court whilst on holiday in Scotland. Despite living overseas for most of his working life, he never forgot his roots and his hometown, Gatehouse of Fleet. He leaves behind many friends there, in addition to his partner and friends here in Bangkok, all of whom will miss him greatly.




OPEN NIGHTSinging and dancing in the rain

COVER NOTES:Getting to the Club smoothly



A quick glance at the cover of this month's Outpost will be enough for many Members to recognise the basic layout of Google Maps for the area surrounding the Club, but to others it might have evoked no recognition at all, except possibly a piece of unconvincing and mildly pretentious alternative art from the seventies underground.

Nobody who has spent more than a few weeks on wheels traversing Bangkok's streets at varying times of the day would ever pretend to have a solution, but it may not always be as laborious as it appears.

During the peak hours in the morning and evening, it is a slow battle going anywhere, and at these times the maps shows how close either of two Skytrain stations are! The hours in between can be relatively smooth. But there are roads which are more often than not difficult to negotiate, and vice versa.

Sathorn is an artery with few sections which remain fluid. Best avoided. The upper half of Silom doesn't get clogged as often as the lower half, which is generally due to Sathorn too.

Suriwongse is used far less than Silom or Sathorn, and the bottom is one-way with an exit onto the Expressway, so it remains relatively clear, even when Silom is blocked (going down towards the Club).

The Club's Suriwongse Gate is usually a better access route than the Silom Soi 18 Gate, and getting to Suriwongse to use that gate is easier than getting round to approach from the bottom of Silom.

The Club's Silom Soi 18 Gate is usually fine, especially when exiting from the Expressway, unless there is any delay in the lower half, when it is best to slip over to Suriwongse.

Online traffic advice can be accessed either via maps.google.com and its 'Traffic' button, or via www.traffy.in.th/traffy, whence the basic cover was obtained. Good luck!



In contrast modern treatment prefers the "Interspinous Spacer" where only

a small incision is used which is about one centimeter long and requires only two stitches (it could be done percutaneously). The recovery time is significantly reduced and this state-of-the-art treatment shows excellent results. In some cases the surgery takes just a couple of minutes and does not require an overnight stay in the hospital.

While modern technology can protect you from illnesses to a large extent, it is still advisable to take good care of your health and avoid situations that can be detrimental for your back. Prevention is better than cure.

The foundations for successful treatment are the

- **Right Diagnosis** Finding the fundamental cause for the symptoms enables the doctor to determine the correct cause of action.
- Right Time Regardless if it is mild or severe pain, the origin of the pain should be detected. Avoidance can only worsen the situation and an early consultation can help elucidate the symptoms in order to determine the therapy needed. Most importantly, early treatment allows the bones to heal in a more normal way as nerve damage is less advanced.
- **Right Treatment** There are many types of treatments available. Each treatment is suitable for different symptoms and there is not only one applicable to all. It is important for the patient to understand the details of the different options to achieve the most satisfactory result.
- **Right Doctor** Experience and expertise play a vital role in the treatment. Treatment by a specialist lessens the risk of erroneous diagnosis and needless treatments. Hence the treatment by a specialist enhances the chance of success.



We continue our peek into the Club's past with a look at events of 1956 ...

Our Club had a number of 'Sports & Games' Sections – Tennis, Darts, Bowls, Bridge and Billiards to which in 1956 we added Table Tennis. We spent 4,400 Ticals (about £70) buying a table tennis table with equipment, and instigated two cups for all Members to play competitively as well as being "just for fun".

The Gentlemen's and Ladies' Cups were played until November when Mr D.S. Smith beat Mr T.G. Lightfoot in the Men's final and Miss T.D. McKeen beat Miss P.N. Tadman in the Ladies final.

Our staff have always been our most important asset as a Club so when living costs began rising very steeply in mid 1956 we gave our staff huge pay rises. Our Butler received a 20% increase to 1,200 Ticals per month although his wife only received an extra 25 Ticals as Wash Amah! The No.1 Boy ("Head Waiter") got a 25% increase to 1,000 Ticals per month, No.2 and No.3 Boys saw their wages rise the same to 950 Ticals per month and our Coolies wages rose to 500 Ticals.

Thailand's trade was also suffering so they pegged their currency to the U.S. Dollar at an exchange rate of 20.8 Ticals to 1 Dollar.

Following the sad passing of Mr. Mottet, our Permanent Assistant Secretary ("General Manager") in 1955, we appointed Mrs J.A. Pegg to that role. In July 1956 she left Thailand so we appointed Mrs F. Martin - unfortunately her husband was posted to British North Borneo (now known as Sabah) in October so we had to appoint a third Permanent Assistant Secretary in just over one year, namely Mrs T.A. Madar.

Thankfully Mrs Madar was here for the 'long haul' and served for ten years becoming our longest serving Permanent Assistant Secretary or even General Manager since WWII.

Although it did not materialise for nearly ten years, 1956 was the first year that there is any minuted record that the Club should build the horror of all horrors in a Gentlemen's Club ...a swimming pool! At this stage it was only one of two suggestions in the Members' Suggestion Book and was quickly dismissed. The other idea was for a barber's shop ... now that should have been followed through!

1956 ended on a high as far as Club events went. Over 387 Members and friends attending the Christmas Ball and 100 children of Members and friends attending the Children's Christmas party. We were also host to the Oxford & Cambridge Dinner.

"The Minutes were nearly right!"

During the week there are duplicate Bridge competitions at The Polo Club on Friday morning and at the Sports Club on Monday and Thursday night; for the sleepless or obsessed, there is 24 hour Bridge on the Internet at Bridgebase.com Like the opening sequence in the Sam Peckinpah movie "The Wild Bunch", Duplicate Bridge can be wild, brutal and possibly fatal; a newspaper in the UK reported recently a husband standing trial accused of the murder of his wife aftera row regarding her supposed lack of Bridge expertise. Provocation was not raised as a defence!

Young Guns join the Bunch

As the Oldies mulch down a band of juvenile Bridge players has joined the Bunch.

Charles (aged 13) - Wunderkind and Winner of the 2010 London Bridge Open Tournament

Modest and respectful to his adult inferiors, Charles plays Bridge like a machine. Fluent in English and Thai, his prospects of gaining a place on the Thai National Team would seem outstanding, particularly as there is no-one of his generation who comes within a country kilometre. Having been well-schooled by his mentor Manthanee, he has been known to open '4 spades' in fourth position merely to shut out his younger brother.

Tricks for beginners:

Defending at Bridge against the declarer has the advantage that one or other of the defence team leads the first card. As on average you will be defending twice as often as playing as the declarer, it is important to learn to make the correct opening lead.

The object of the Bridge defence is, of course, to break the declarer's heart. There are many ways of destroying the declarer, but the best way is with the killer lead. All too often the declarer's heart remains unbroken - just because West starts off on the wrong foot. Sometimes, when there is an R in the month, your partner bids so then you should lead your partner's suit; you will rarely be scolded for doing so. With two cards in his suit, lead the highest card. With three, always lead the highest unless you have one of the top four honours and then lead the lowest. It is particularly important to lead low from King or Queen. There is no reason to let the declarer make two tricks with AJ. He will do, if you open with your honour. Even with Jack, it is best to lead the lowest card. Leading in Bridge can be practiced alone using practice hands or a computer programme. Like practising a tennis serve, you don't need a partner to return the ball.

Where the declarer arrives in a three No Trump Contract over partners major suit opening or a minor suit overcall, you can fairly assume that the declarer has stops in partner's bid suit unless partner doubles, in which case your partner is commanding you to lead his suit. If partner does not double, then he is unlikely to have that much. Then with a singleton or worthless doubleton, there is a perfectly good temptation not to take partner too seriously. Can you think of something better? No trump contracts are, without doubt, best attacked when the lead is a King from a KQJ sequence, and with a couple of outside entries. However, such hands are like those exotic South American Beauty-Queens who marry older men only for love: you may wait a lifetime to meet one and while you are waiting you have to find something to do!

The Trump Lead

In leading against a suit contract, an all important clue is the bidding. When the bidding indicates that the declarer hopes to ruff something in dummy, then in the absence of a bid from partner, a low trump from a sequence of nothing may deprive the declarer of essential ruffing power which he was counting on. If the declarer ends up playing in a suit other than his opening major suit choice, then it is because dummy has two or less of that major suit. Accordingly if left alone, the shortage in Dummy can be used to ruff losers in the first choice major suit: one or more low trump leads may take out Dummy's trumping power and defeat the contract.

New players very welcome

Next time you are at the Club on a Sunday afternoon, why not introduce yourself to Winlock or Martin? If you wish, sit in and "Kibitz" on a few hands. You don't need to have a Maths brain to play Bridge or even have reached year 10 at High School. Young or old, good or bad, beautiful or ugly, all are welcome at the British Club Bridge Section.




It's October already! Time really flies when you are having fun!







QUIZ NIGHT

After a two month hiatus due to the illness of our quizmaster, Rodney Bain, the Tetley Smooth Flow Quiz Night resumed on September 7th with a stand-in quizmaster, Tim Footman, formerly of "The Beasts", serving up a rather tasty range of questions.

Four teams answered the call to challenge for the September Quiz crown: Bangkok Gentlemen Spoofers, Jim's Junkies, Jokers Wild and Under Par. The odd one out in this case was David Lloyd George because he was not born in Wales, despite being the UK's first and only Welsh Prime Minister. Round One finished with Bangkok Gentlemen Spoofers on top, with Under Par and Jokers Wild following closely behind, and Jim's Junkies bringing up the rear.

Round Two started and ended with movie questions and included questions on jazz, politics, a question about some character called "Bagpuss" and a particularly tricky geography question that almost resulted in a lynching at the Jim's Junkies table (the answer is Paraguay!). Scores in Round Two were almost identical to the Round One scores, with Spoofers in the lead, followed by Jokers Wild.

Overall, an auspicious debut for our stand-in Quizmaster, but a low turnout of teams restricted the prizes to 1st and 2nd only.



KHUNLAAK'S ON THE MENU



Asian infused tuna

Try to buy firm, deep red tuna. The idea is for it to be eaten raw – just like sushi – but, in actual fact, the acidity of the lime juice starts to cook the fish.

Serves 6-8



Main Ingredients

- 455g/1lb tuna, bluefin if possible
- 1 ripe avocado, peeled and diced
- Juice of 4-5 limes to taste
- 1-2 fresh chilies, deseeded and finely chopped
- 3 tablespoons sesame seed oil
- 4 tablespoons coconut milk
- 1 good handful of fresh coriander, finely chopped
- 2 heaped tablespoons sesame seeds
- A little fresh ginger, peeled and finely chopped
- Soy sauce, to taste

Method

Finely dice your tuna and place in a bowl. Add the rest of the ingredients, stir and add soy sauce to season. This fantastically flavoured tuna is great n thinly sliced toasted bread.

Mixed Leaf Salad with Mozzarella, Mint, Mango and Prosciutto

If I make this for my lunch, I use a nice, ripe mango, a ball of mozzarella and a couple of slices of prosciutto. Pinch the skin and peel from the bottom to the top then quarter them. Rip the mozzarella into small pieces and place on a plate with the mango. Lightly season. Lay a couple of slices of prosciutto over the top. Dress yourdrinks ch mixed salad leaves and torn-up mint with a little of the olive oil and *lemon juice dressing**. Throw the leaves on top of the plate.

Olive and lemon juice dressing

2 tablespoons lemon juice 5 tablespoons olive oil Salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste





Banana Orange Lassie

Main Ingredients

- 1 peeled banana
- 4 oz orange juice
- ½ cup yoghurt
- 1 ½ tbsp honey

Method

Mix all ingredients in a blender until smooth.



Apple Citrus Refresher

Main Ingredients

- 4 oz apple juice
- 4 oz orange juice
- 2 oz lime juice
- 4 oz ginger
- 1 scoop ice cubes

Method

Mix Apple juice, orange juice and lime juice. Just before serving, pour in ginger Ale, Serve over ice cubes.



Susie's Kids Korner



Ghostwriter



Materials

- Disposable ballpoint pen
- Modelling clay
- the kind that dries without baking
- Toothpick
- Craft glue
- Plastic fingernail (you can find these from the cosmetics sections of stores and malls)
- Nail polish

Instructions

- For each one, cover a disposable ballpoint pen (cap removed) with a 1/4-inch layer of the modelling material, leaving the tip of the pen exposed.
- Sculpt the clay into a finger shape, forming thick bumps on one side for knuckles. Mark wrinkles and creases around the knuckles with a toothpick.
- 3. Next, use craft glue to attach a plastic fingernail near the pen's tip, leaving room enough for the pen to write. (If you like, trim the nail with scissors beforehand for a jagged effect). Use the toothpick to create lines around the cuticle area and coat the nail with nail polish in a frightful hue.
- 4. Allow the clay and the polish to dry completely before using the pen.


MUMMY HEADS

You Will Need

- 1 round plastic ball of any size or even a smaller ball or ping pong ball.
- Black duct tape or black electrical tape.
- Cheesecloth, cut into 2-inch wide strips. You can also use very thin medical gauze.
- Fabric stiffener or spray starch for ironing.
- Googly eyes
- Glue

What to Do

- 1. Cut a 3" piece of tape and place it on the form as the background for the eyes. (Most of the tape will be covered up.)
- 2. Pour the fabric stiffener into a bowl. Dip one strip of cheesecloth into the liquid.



- 3. Repeat this process until the mummy's head is covered except for the eye area. Have cheesecloth between the eyes (this defines the space for the eye sockets and gives the mummies personality). Build up the surface of the brow by adding smaller, folded pieces of cheesecloth.
- 4. Add eyes by applying a couple dots of glue to the back of each googly eye.

# Pumpkin Face

#### NOTE: You'll need parental help for this! Materials

- Face paints
- Sponge
- Floral wire
- Pipe cleaners
- Green tissue paper
- White glue
- Green ribbon





#### Instructions

- 1. Begin by brushing your hair back from your face.
- 2. Next, use a damp sponge to cover your eyebrows with white face paint.
- 3. Once that has dried, use a make-up brush and yellow face paint to create triangular eyes, a nose, and a toothy jack-o'-lantern smile over your lips.
- 4. Now sponge orange face paint onto your entire face, surrounding the yellow features.
- 5. After the orange paint dries, use a makeup brush to outline yellow eyes, nose and mouth with green face paint.
- 6. Top off your disguise with handmade pumpkin leaves and vines. For each leaf, twist short pieces of floral wire around the top of a pipe cleaner.
- 7. Next, cut two large matching leaf shapes from green tissue paper. Lightly paint the surface of one leaf with a white glue solution (3 parts glue, 1 part water), lay the floral-wire frame on the glued surface and then cover with the matching leaf. Wind the stems of the finished leaves around your hair or pin them with some hair pins.
- 8. For pumpkin vines, just tie on lengths of curled green gift ribbon.
