## CRICKET SECTION

The following articles on cricket are of interest. The first will be of great value to anyone who is called upon to explain the game to the punters who pack the RBSC stands on Saturday afternoons to watch cricket between the races. The second will be of interest, and possibly come as a surprise, to those who know a bit more about the game.

## CRICKET - A DEFINITION

"You have two sides, one out in the field, one in out of the field. Each man on the side that's in goes out, and when he's out he comes in and the next man goes in until he's out. When they are all out, the side that's been out in the field comes in and the side that's been in out of the field goes out and tries to get out those coming in. If the side that's in declares, you get men still in not out. Then when both sides have been in and out, including not outs, twice, that's the end of the game. As you can see, it is all very simple." (Sir John Stow).

#### CELTIC ORIGINS

"At the dawn of history the Celts of the far west loved games and their national sport was to fling a sacred petrified walnut from mountain top to mountain top. In time this game became ritualised and the sacred walnut was symbolised by the rise and fall of the sun (The Great Ball in the sky, Crae-Khet). In the course of time two druidical priests called Owen-Owen and Dai Pwyll decided that their lumpy terrain was unsuitable for The Game so they set out towards the east in search of flatter ground. On the morning of the summer solstice The Great Ball rose from behind a pointed rock and revealed to them the perfect pitch (in the vicinity of Amesbury). The priests were overjoyed and immediately raised three large stones in honour of the event. Today a special ceremony is performed there each 21st June, and it is known as Owen-Dai Crae-Khet." ## GOLF SECTION

September in Thailand has traditionally been club championship month for the golf section, which has often meant that good players are on leave; this year such a fate befell Bob Reid. The original booking for Bang Phra had to be amended to Don Muang on the 12th as the club was doubled up with a Putra Cup selection trial round and the committee had no doubts about who would have come off worst. Scores on the 12th were high, with John Burrows providing a notable exception to card, an 87, which was the shared lead with Peter Adcock at the end of the day. Lying close behind were John Lenehan and James Davidson on 90, while John Gibson - 92, John Dickerson and Derek Pott - 93, and Ivan Garfoot and Hugh Jameison - 94 were also in contention. What distinguished Burrows' round was that he was right on handicap and took the monthly medal trophy with a net 72. Garfoot was second and Adcock & John Bennett took front & back nine prizes.

Come the 26th for the second & final round and tension had built up. Adcock had thought it imperative to go to Malaysia for reasons of work but had earned a reprieve and so departed to the Rose Garden on Saturday with Garfoot to practice, have an early night, wake up early refreshed, have a leisurely breakfast, etc. etc. As Frank Calvert guessed, however, the "wake up" call was an hour late and they arrived unbreakfasted and late at the course, unclear where the first tee was located. Burrows had loaded up on Saturday with Thai curry and proceeded to unload same on Sunday at intervals too frequent for comfort; Dickerson was delayed by a 747 and did not arrive at all; Davidson played squash for 4 hours on Saturday to "help" his hook and Lenehan had prepared so well that his first sliced drive missed a beckoning klong by a few inches. There's a lesson for Johnny Miller there somewhere.

The match soon developed into a two horse race - the runners being Davidson & Adcock, with Davidson's putter only in use 28 times in the round. Eventually, however, Adcock's three stroke lead and his strong play through the green on a full set of graphite shafted clubs saw him hold out with a one-stroke victory over the two rounds, shooting a 77 to Davidson's 75 on the day.

Adcock thus emulated Noel Bond in winning the McMahon Cup twice, his previous success 6 years (and 10 kilos) ago in 1970.

The medal for the day was decided on a count back between Davidson & David Sprot - both with 65. Alistair Lapping and Adcock took front & back nine awards and Davidson the low gross.

Bookings are now firming up for the Annual Pilgrimage to Khao Yai where our members traditionally sacrifice about 6 dozen golf balls to the local Lares et penates. A severe disagreement between Eric Howell and Leon van der Watt about how many baboon varieties can be found at Khao Yai will be settled this year. No prizes for identifying the funky gibbon.
